The following suggestions are made to those parents who are interested in the Educational development of their children. presume of course that this means all parents. The problem before us though is such as to need more than just ordinary-casual attention. Under what conditions can a growing child do his best work, are we creating just those conditions, if we are not, who can, just how far we are responsible for strong, sturdy, powerful, responsible, reliable, honest, truthful, accurate, healthful, moral, men and women to fill the ranks of society -yes and just how far are we responsible for the opposite of all virtues; these are I maintain, only a few of the many phases that we are responsible for directly. In other words our training and our children.

Our standard for school work this year is such that whatever your child may be in school in the future he will not be considered to have had inferior work. Our efforts are to make our work above the ordinary. Our demands for promotions are that a pupil must be efficient in the subject before he secures a credit. Half done work is not to be accepted or tolerated. In other words every student must come to our standard of work or fail. Indications are some needless failures for the first term pupils must do more work. It is an injustice to the child to give a high grade if the work has not been done. It is an injustice to the child not to make the standard right. It is also an injustice to the child for him or her to be allowed to spend an excessive amount of his time at something standards mean all in all for our that interferes with his work at school. Poor students are made

materially handicapped. It will be almost impossible for him to make more than half his credits in a creditable manner, especially in the upper grades and in the high school. If a child is thus handicapped the only just thing is to keep him out of school to do the work or play and when he is through with that let him do school work. In other words make school worth while. Don't misof school-it means to give him every advantage. No pupil should be allowed to be out later than 11 o'clock, at any time while in school. Once a week even at this hour is too often. If your child is not in bed asleep by this time every night in the week he is abdo.
