Sata Fe, May 23 .- Foreign born residents who have declared their intention to become citizens but who have not taken out final naturalization papers are barred from hunting and fishing in New Mexico, Attorney General Harry S. Bowman said today in an opinion for the state game and fish department.

Mr. Bowman quoted the act passed by the last legislature, which says:

"It shall be unlawful for any unnaturalized foreign-born resident of New Mexico or adjoining states to hunt for, capture, kill or wound any wild birds or game animals within this state."

The act further prohibits such persons from having in their possession any firearms.







The sheriff was called to Loving

Tuesday to investigate the killing of Jose Corales and wife, Victoria, whose bodies were found at their home a mile south of that town by a Mexican youth the same morning. Arriving at the scene of the killing, the officers found the woman lying across the doorway of a small tent just to one side of the shack, and the body of the man in the brush, where he had evidently been attending the demands of nature. The woman was shot twice, one shot entering at the point of the chin and coming out at the lower part behind the ear, shattering the jaw bone; the other shot went through her head. One of the shots went through her head and a corner of the tent, embedding itself in the corner of the house. The man was shot through the juglar vein and killed instantly. No motive is assigned for the deed, as the couple was old, between 60 and 70 years, and were poor, only \$6.10 being found on the premises. A coroner's inquest was held and testimony given that one Mexican living near by had heard three shots the night before the bodies were found, about 9:30 or 10:00 o'clock. The murdered couple was well thought of by the people of Loving, particularly the native population. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the deed .-Carlsbad Argus.

### TOBACCO'S FOES LOSING GROUND

Canvass of 7,847 Editors Shows 7,393 Communities Against Abolishing Weed.

ANTIS LOSE THREE STATES.

Utah, Under Mormon Influence, Only Commonwealth to Adopt Prohibition Measure During Year.

the question asked by Garret Smith

that while there has been increased agitation and legislative activity on the subject of tobacco following the success of the drive for prohibition of liquor the efforts of reformers seeking to abolish tobacco have no general support. This opinion is based on the results of the questionnaires on the subject sent out to newspaper editors of the country by the Press Service Company of New York City.

The questions asked were:

(1) Do you favor the enactment of laws prohibiting the personal use of tobacco by adults?

(2) In your judgment does the general sentiment of your community favor such legislation? (3) Is the use of tobacco personal-

ly objectionable to you? No arguments accompanied the questions and from their form it was impossible for any editor to determine

the attitude of the questioners. Out of 12,518 editors questioned, 7,847 replied according to the summary given. These editors, it is estimated, represent a combined circulation of 21,870,046. Of the 7,847 editors replying, 7,893, or 95 per cent, represent public sentiment in their communities as opposed to anti-tobacco legislation. Only 260 editors, or 8 per cent of those replying believed there was any considerable sentiment favorable to tobacco prohibition. There were 174, or 2 per cent, in doubt, while 20 failed to record their judgment.

Editors' Judgment Unbiased

"It is of special interest to note that 569 editors in answering the first question, personally favored such legislation, although only 260 of them reported that public opinion also favored the prohibition of tobacco-an New Mexico honored at the presenindication of the conscientious effort made by the editors to distinguish public opinion from their own personal

opinions," the article continues. "The highest percentage of replies reporting public opinion favorable to prohibition of tobacco came from Utah, where 42 per cent of the editors thought the public were for such a Judge Colin Neblett, of Santa Fe; A. The result was forecast by several of the editors who stated that the influence of the Mormon Church was against tobacco. The Mormon Church is also strong in Idaho, which is the other state where the use of tobacco was recently prohibited. but the governor has signed the bill just passed, in which the prohibitory legislation is repealed. In this state 89 per cent of the editors estimate sentiment in their communities as against tobacco prohibition, which, nevertheless, is 6 per cent below the average reported opposition.

"The legislature of Tennessee some weeks ago passed and the governor has signed a bill repealing the anticigarette law of that state. The questionnaire showed 93 per cent of its editors believed the public against anti-tobacco legislation. The legislature of Arkansas has also passed a bill repealing its anti-cigarette law. In this state 94 per cent of the editors

reported against tobacco prohibition. Arizona's Practical Joke



STATE'S FIRST FISH HATCHERY TO BUILD ON LISBOA SPRING.

New Mexico's first fish hatchery with a capacity of 3,002.000 trout a year, will be located at Lisboa spring, on the Pecos river, not far from the Valley ranch, some 28 1-2 miles east of Santa Fe, Thomas P. Gable, state game and fish warden. announced yesterday that the commission had reached a final decision in the matter. The attorney general's office is now examining title to the spring and the 5 1-2 acres of land which will be purchased. Construction work will be commenced in July, Warden Gable believes.

The state selected only after the three members of the commission-Grath, of Belen-had inspected the proposed sites. The commission accompanied by Warden Gable, recently went to Denver and made a study of the Colorado state hatchery that is located near Denver. After this careful study of the whole situation it was decided that the Lisboa spring would meet all requirements and was the best avallable.

The last legislature authorized the use of \$30,000 from the gasoline collections for this hatchery.

The state of Colorado now has 10 fish hatcheries in operation.—State


