





FIRST STATEREFINERY J. BACA DIES FROM CO SELLS AN INTEREST TO GILLILAND OIL CO.

The First State Refining Company of Roswell has sold a half interest in the company to the Gilliland Oil Company of Tulsa, and the name of The state senate is not meeting tothe Company will be changed to the day Gilliland Oil Company of New Mexico. Three directors of the Gilliland Oil Company will be named on the Board of the new company and offices of the branch will be maintained in Roswell and a branch office established in Artesia.

Pipe has been ordered for a pipe line from the field to a point somewhere on the Santa Fe Railroad between Artesia and Carlsbad. Material also has been ordered for a pump station which most likely will be erected on the Company's leases in the field. Two carloads of two inch pipe are on the road for gathering lines to take care of any outlying producing wells in the field, should the owners desire to dispose of their oil. The Company's policy will be confined as near as possible to the outright purchase of crude and will try to avoid producing themselves. The refinery at Roswell will be enlarged so that eventually the plant could handle two thousand barrels of crude a day. Should the field demand, storage tanks will be crected to take care of any surplus crude which the company would not be able to run though their plants.

The Gilliland Oil Company is a Deleware corporation and is one of the largest independent oil producing companies in the Mid-Continent field. It was organized in 1918 and has been a consistent producer of crude oil to this date. They have production in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas and this merger has put them into New Mexico, which is the sixth state the Company has entered.
