

EL PASO, TEXAS, March 30 .-To establish rights and relations of New Mexico original owners of war finance corporation cattle now in Mexico, if possible, to the satisfaction of the original owners, officials of the corporation are here from Washington, D. 

Hotels on floating islands in mid-Atlantic will be a feature of the new airway to be opened next spring, which will make it possible to reach Buenos Aires by way of Paris in less than a week from London. The scheme has been prepared by Pierre Latesoers, the French airway magnate, and only the formal sanction of the French government is now required.
