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

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



PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS



HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

- You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. Even if your bill goes to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or else paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can put your own opinion

of your property's value on record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

• By filing a special type of rendition called a report of decreased value, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available at this office.

The new deadline for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

For more information, get a free copy of the pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, at your appraisal district office or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

Continued dry weather of the Plains Regions serves to increase interest of its farmers in irrigation, many of such have made contracts for such to be drilled before spring planting whom are now having irrigation wells.

Drillers and pump representatives say they are having more inquiries and making more digging and sales contracts than ever before, while governmental administrators so authorized are having more appeals for loans than heretofore.

Statistics show that in April 1936 there were 507 active irrigation wells in the entire South Plains irrigation area, while at the end of 1937 there were 1,310 such wells.

While farmers are not anticipating any severe drought, some insisting there will be plenty of rain during this month, yet in the shallow water area many have found irrigation excellent to supplement natural rainfall, frequently just one such irrigation at the right time insuring a bountiful crop.



Mrs. Jennings said the Committee discussed the entire Special Education Program, including staff, students, and activities. Spring and fall semesters activities for 1987 were highlighted.

These included, Scottish Rite Training of two teachers to work with dyslexic students, Special Olympics, S.O.S. Week, and the State Meeting for the Texas Council of Administrators of Special Education in Austin. 

CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available to all homeowners on their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

Apply to your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this office.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1987, you won't need to apply again for 1988 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1988.

The deadline for applications is April 30, 1988. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

Computerized Accounting Featured In Workshop

A three-day shortcourse to assist farmers and ranchers to use their computers for record keeping and accounting will be held in Sweetwater February 24-26, at the Texas State Technical Institute (TSTI) campus, by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

It is the second of four courses being taught by Extension, with the cooperation of TSTI. This session is designed to teach producers some basics of financial statement preparation, double versus single entry accounting, and cash versus accrual financial records.

It will emphasize establishment of a computerized accounting system in a typical farm and ranch situation, processing typical transactions, and handling special problems, said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension agricultural economist at Lubbock.

Part of the program will assist in making computer purchase decisions and in evaluating possible accounting software.

"Sound financial management is essential for farm and ranch business profit and survival," Smith said. The continuing cost-price squeeze and volatile agricultural commodity prices create circumstances that reward correct decisions and penalize the business for poor decisions, he said.

The use of computerized

record keeping systems can give a farmer or rancher the up-to-date financial information necessary to successfully manage the operation," the Extension economist said.

Enrollment in the course will be limited to 20 to insure the opportunity for hands-on computer use by participants, and a high staff-participant ratio. The \$125 fee will cover educational materials, four meals and refreshments.

Persons interested in enrolling should contact their local county Extension agent or telephone Smith at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock, (806) 746-6101.

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
