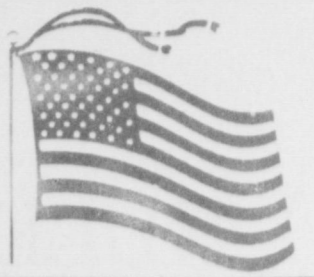

Results of the Pre-Plant Soil Moisture Survey conducted by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. One show that soil moisture conditions are the best they have been in five years.

In that portion of Bailey County which lies within the Water District's boundaries, soil moisture deficits generally range from two to six inches. This means that from two to six inches of water will need to be added to fill the top five feet of the soil profile to field capacity prior to planting.

There are, however, isolated areas within the county where the soil moisture deficit ranges from only zero to two inches and another area where the deficit ranges from six to eight inches.

Generally speaking, soil moisture conditions across the Water District's 15-county service area show that most soils are at or near field capacity in the upper two feet of the five foot soil profile, with the lower part of the profile commonly standing at 65 to 80 percent of field capacity, according to Mike Risinger, Soil Scientist with the USDA-Soil Conservation Service. Fifty percent of field capacity approximates the permanent wilting point for most field crops grown in this area.

The good soil moisture conditions are partly attributed to the above average rainfall received in late 1986. However, some soil moisture deficits also exist where rainfall runoff occurred during the period from August to November when the soil conditions were least suitable for taking advantage of the precipitation.

Farmers may wish to check the soil moisture conditions in their fields individually to determine their specific needs. In addition, Risinger suggests that farmers check for hardpans in their fields and destroy any that are found.

Hardpans can reduce water infiltration into the soil. Significant numbers of hardpans may be found where harvesting equipment was run under wet

SPS Will Hold Another Meet To Release Industrial Study

Area communities will learn the results of an extensive economic development study at a second gathering of government and business leaders in an "economic summit" sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

Leaders active in economic development from throughout the four-state area served by SPS will meet Tuesday, February 24, in Lubbock. SPS provides electric service to a population of about one million in a 52,000 square mile area covering much of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

Lubbock was chosen as a meeting site because it is in the center of the SPS service

territory.

This meeting is a follow-up to a similar gathering October 14 at SPS's Tolk Station power plant near Muleshoe. About 200 mayors, chamber of commerce presidents, and others attended the October meeting.

Since the October meeting, a task force of 13 prominent

area civic and business leaders and a professional demographics firm have established a target list of industries suited to the characteristics of this area.

"Our meeting on February 24 will give communities the results of the target-industry

CRP Sign-Up Underway More Acres Expected

The next sign-up period for putting cropland into the government's Conservation Reserve Program is underway.

The current sign-up period began Monday, Feb. 9, and runs through Feb. 27, points out Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural, Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

A new "wrinkle" in the program this year is that a bonus is being offered on a one-time basis for corn land. The bonus is \$2 times the farm program payment yield for corn times the number of acres of corn base designated for enrollment in the CRP. This bonus will be paid by generic commodity certificates.

Another new provision classifies land planted to alfalfa and other multi-year grasses and legumes in rotation during the years 1981-85 as cropland and thus makes it eligible for the CRP.

Also, there has been a slight revision in land eligibility classifications, says Tanksley. That may allow additional land to qualify for the program, so landowners need to check with their local SCS office.

Almost nine million acres of highly erodible cropland across the nation were committed to the program during three sign-up periods last year.

So far, Texas farmers have put more than a million acres in the program, which is aimed at curbing soil erosion while at the same time improving water quality and wildlife habitats, explains Tanksley.

Land accepted into the CRP must be kept out of production for 10 years and prescribed conservation practices must be followed. This includes planting the land to grass or trees to prevent wind and water erosion, with costs shared by the

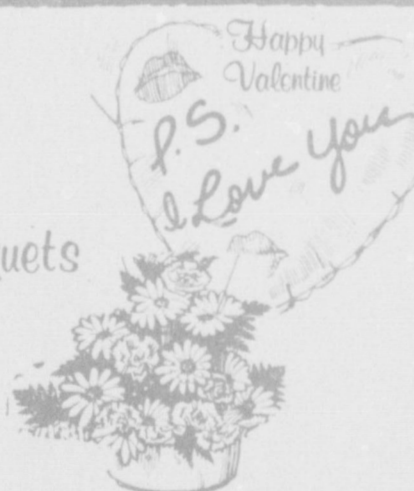

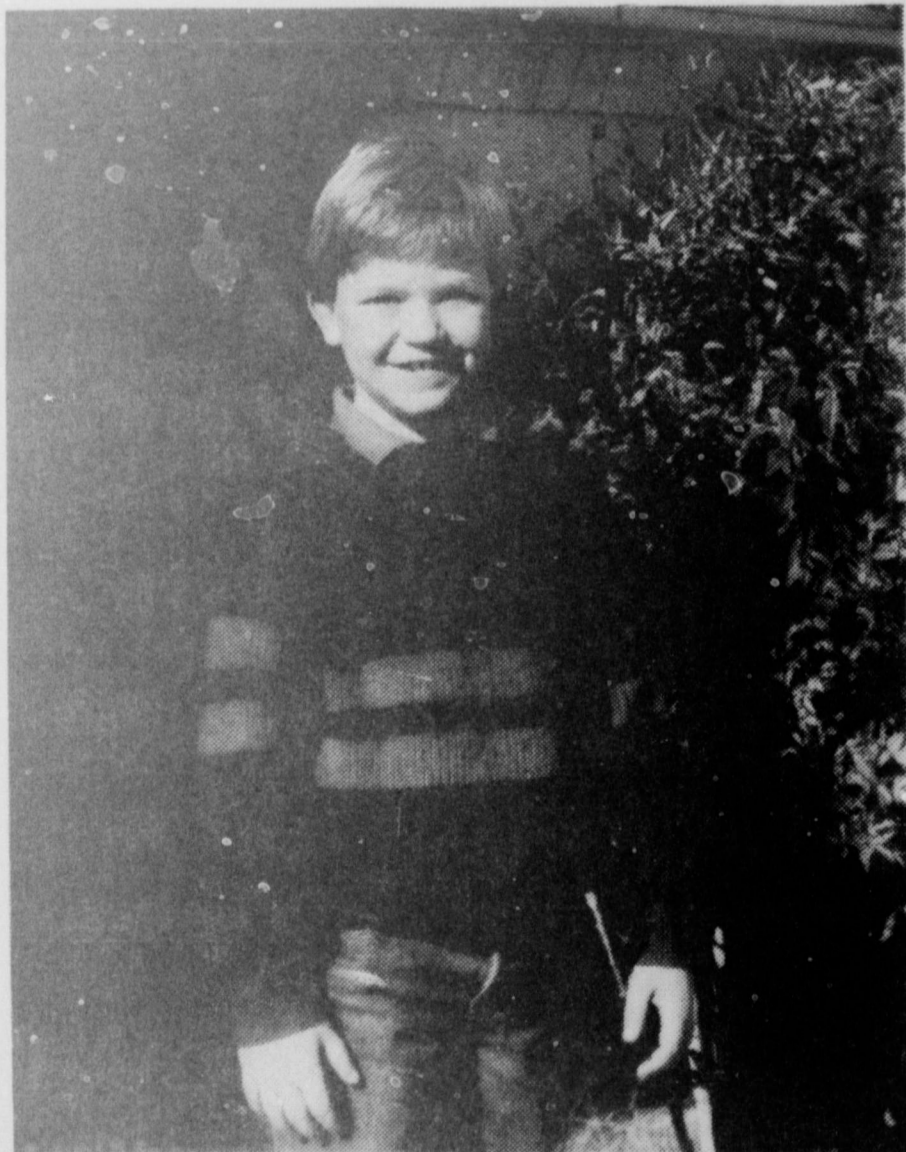

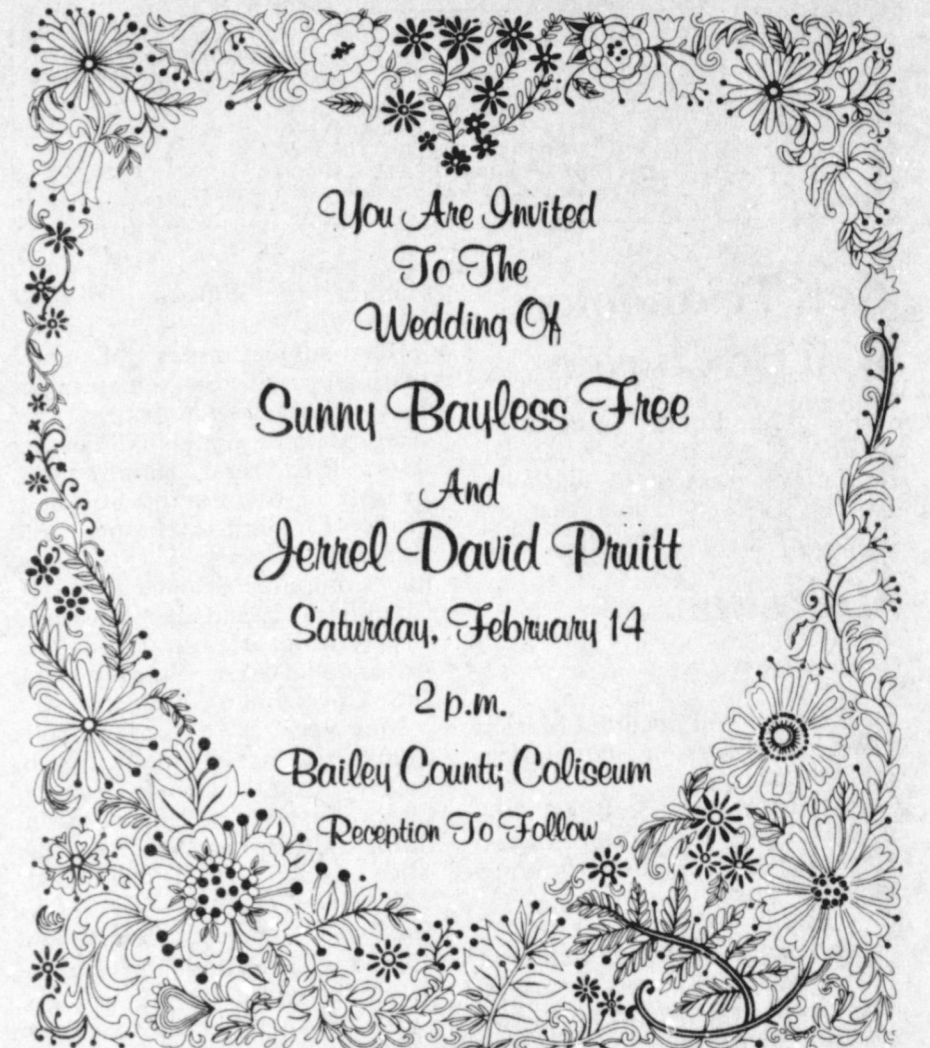
Meeting Held

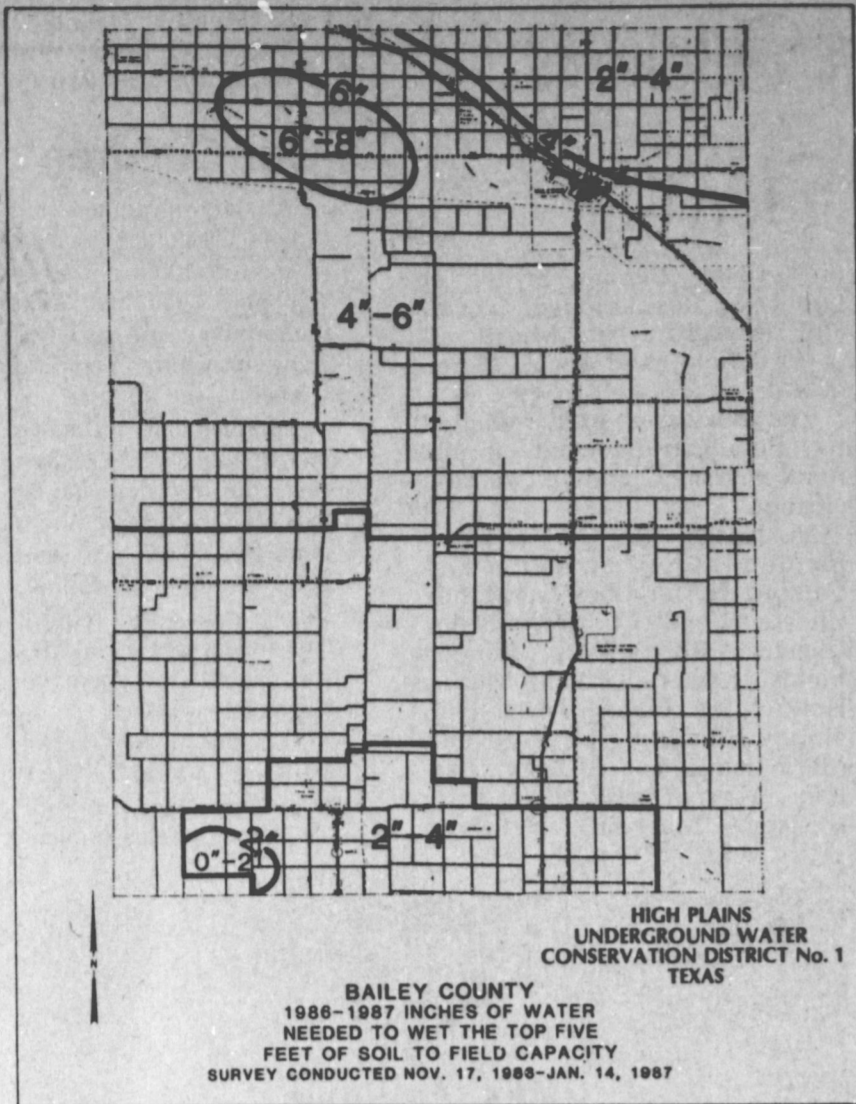

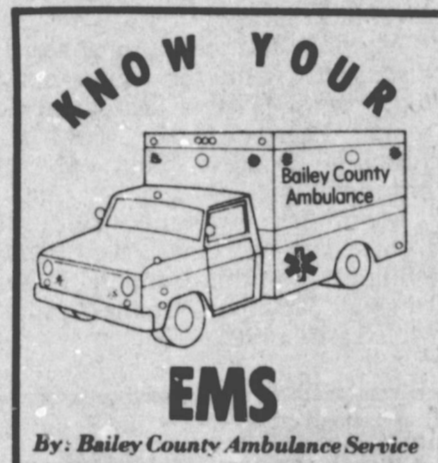


Maple Volunteer Fire Department Receives Check

The soil moisture survey is conducted by the High Plains Water District in cooperation with the SCS. Soil moisture sites are selected to represent the farm management and cropping patterns typical of the site area, and are monitored in cooperating with local landowners. If the bid is accepted, landowners will be paid that price annually over the 10-year period provided they follow the prescribed conservation plan. The average acceptable bid in Texas was just under \$30 an acre during the last sign-up period.

Because several new phases of the CRP are being enacted this year, including sodbuster, swampbuster and conservation compliance, interest in the CRP should increase, says Tanksley. Details on the total program are available at any local ASCS office. The CRP is part of the 1985 farm bill and was initiated last spring as a five-year effort to take some 45 million acres of erodible cropland out of production across the U.S.

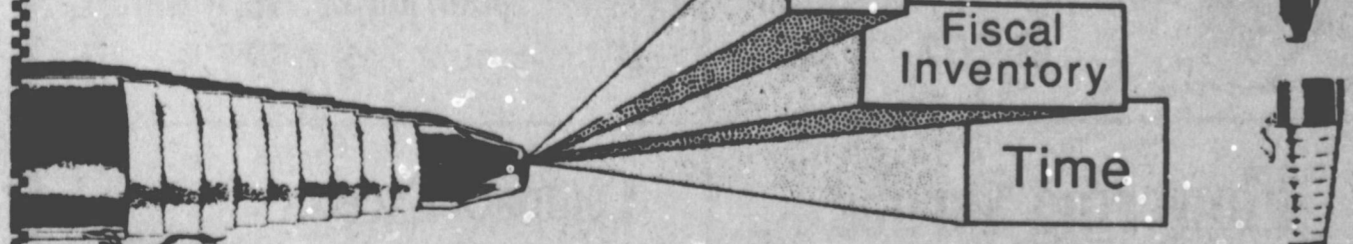

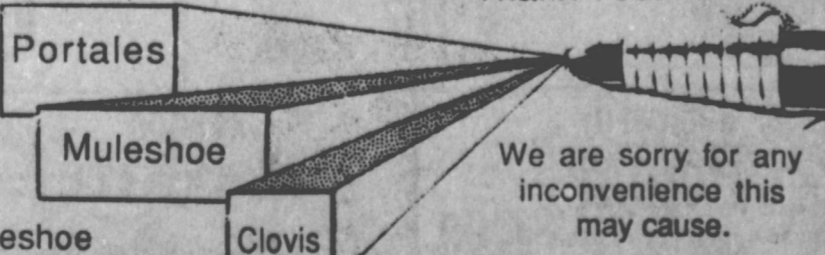

To: The members and stockholders of Southern Farm Supply Association, Inc., a dissolved Texas non-profit cooperative organization.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a suit has been filed in this Court that may affect your legal interests. This case has been certified by the Court as a class action by the plaintiffs against the defendants. A class action is a lawsuit in which one or more persons in the same or similar situation. The records in this case indicate that you are in the same or similar situation as the defendants, and that you are a member of the class the named defendants represent. The Court has ruled that the defendants may prosecute this lawsuit on behalf of all persons who are members and stockholders of Southern Farm Supply Association, Inc.

AS A MEMBER OF THIS CLASS, YOU ARE FURTHER NOTIFIED IN THE FOLLOWING MANNER:

1. Plaintiffs instituted this action on November 29, 1984, as Cause No. 65, 323-C in this Court against the following defendants, Bushland Grain Co-Op, United Farm Industries, Dalhart Consumers Fuel Association, Inc., Abernathy Consumers Fuel Association of Hale County, Farmers Cooperative, White Deer Supply Co-Op, and Consumers Fuel Co-Op Association, Inc.

2. Plaintiffs allege that this action is brought against not only the named defendants but against all members and stockholders of Southern Farms Supply Association, Inc.

3. Plaintiffs allege that they are ready, willing, and able to pay the remaining funds to such persons or entities as are legally entitled thereto, but that they are uncertain as to the priorities of distribution of proceeds to the holders of second preferred shares, holders of preferred shares which were not exchanged for second preferred stock and holders of common stock. Plaintiffs further allege that these conflicting claims will or may expose them to multiple liability.

4. In answers filed in this action defendants United Farm Industries, Abernathy Consumers Fuel Association of Hale County, Dalhart Consumers Fuel Association, Inc. and Bushland Grain Co-Op generally deny the matters set forth in Plaintiffs' pleading. Additionally, Bushland Grain Co-Op alleges that it is entitled to receive the sum of \$2,158.23 plus all accrued dividends that are unpaid plus \$75.00 representing the par value of the common stock plus all interest allowed by law thereon.

5. Plaintiffs have deposited with the registry of the Court all funds within their possession and control. These funds total \$287,429.22.

YOU ARE NOT BEING SUED. THERE IS NO REQUIREMENT THAT YOU ATTEND COURT, HIRE A LAWYER, OR PAY AND COSTS OF THIS LITIGATION. IF YOU CHOOSE, YOU MAY HIRE YOUR OWN ATTORNEY AND APPEAR IN THIS ACTION. YOU WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR PAYING YOUR OWN ATTORNEYS FEES.

YOU ARE FURTHER ADVISED THAT AS A MEMBER OF THE CLASS, under Texas law:

A. You will be bound by the terms of judgment.

B. The total amount of recovery in the action may be reduced by attorneys fees and expenses which are incurred in the prosecution of this litigation, all of which will be paid from the funds prior to the distribution of net proceeds to the class members.

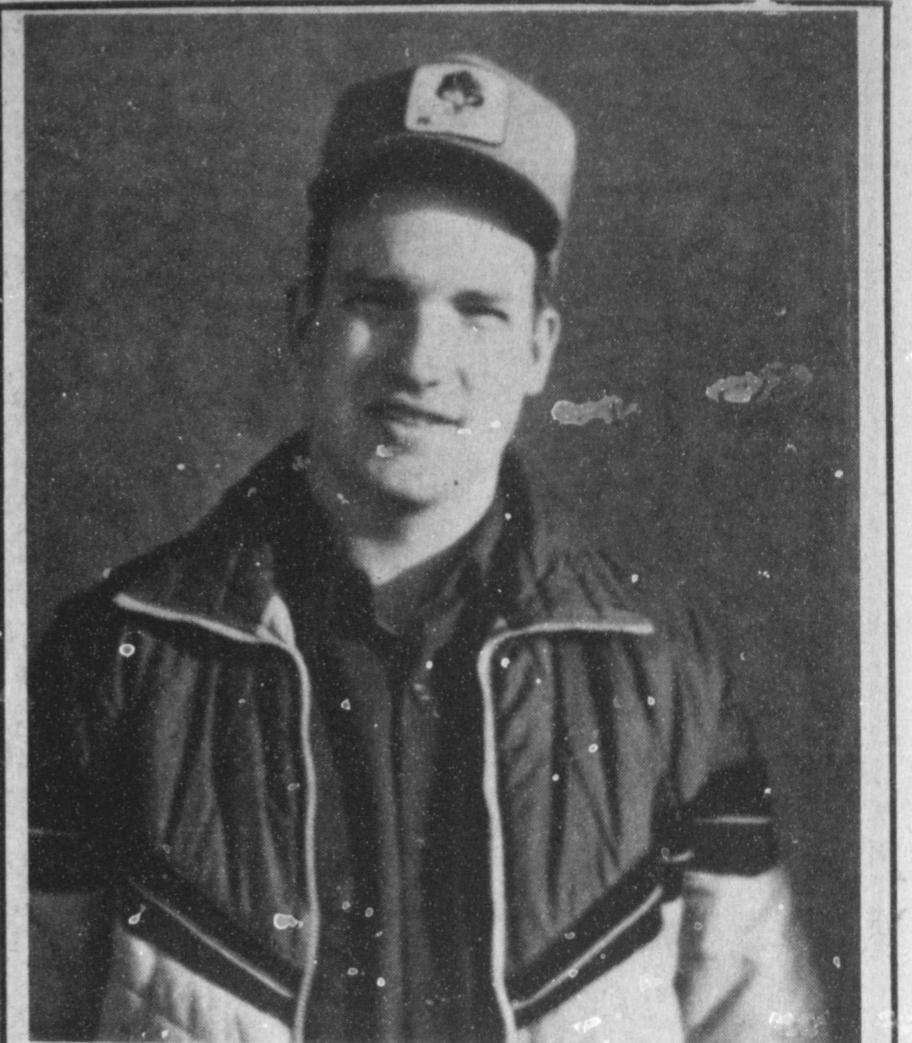
