## MAC Group Finalizes Celebration For May 2

### MAC Will Sponsor Several Summer Golf Tournaments

Eddy Morris, chairman of the Muleshoe Activities Committee, told a group of MAC members Tuesday morning, that MAC had conducted a survey to find out 'What Muleshoe needs the most.'

He said according to the survey there was not enough activity for youth in the community.

Consequently, the MAC committee met with Wayne Holmes of the Mule Putt Miniature Golf Course and scheduled two putt-putt golf tournaments per

month for May through August.

The tournaments will be May 11 for couples and May 25 for individuals. Then on June 8, it will again be for couples and on June 22, for individuals. The July tournaments will be on July 13 for teams, and July 27 for couples. In August, the tournaments will be August 10 for couples and August 24 for individuals.

Morris said trophies will be presented to the individual, couple or team in the first, second and third places.

At the end of the tournaments, the individual with the most games played, and the lowest score, will be presented a TV, donated by Bob Donaldson.

Each entrant will be given a ribbon designating their participation in the summer tournaments.

Entry fees of \$3 for individuals, \$5 for couples and \$10 for a team of four players will be put back into trophies for the winners.

### School Board Trustees Given Oath Of Office

It may not have been a record number, but according to most school board elections, a large number of local residents turned out to cast votes in the Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees election Saturday, April 4.

Returned to the school board was incumbent Howard Watson, with 370 votes; also elected were Sam Harlan, former board member, 284 votes; and Cindy Purdy, the second woman to ever be elected to the board, with 283 votes.

Ben Roming received 275 votes; Sandy Noble, 240 votes and Terry Field, 148 votes.

A total of 501 voters went to the polls on Saturday, and added to the 97 absentee votes, reflect a total of 598 votes cast in the election.

During a special board meeting Monday night, the votes were canvassed, and the new members were administered their oath of office by Bailey County Judge Gordon H. Green.

## Heritage Foundation Celebrity Auction Plans Are Underway

## Farm, Ranch Technology Helped By Computer Use

No longer does a farmer just go out to the field and 'stick some seeds in the ground.' No longer does he just put cows and calves in a pasture and forget about them until it is time to market them.

When he starts planning his year, his seed and fertilizer needs, his feed and supplement needs, and his personal budget, he just may turn to a computer to have instant information.

Such a farmer/rancher/seed salesman is Matt Phelps, who lives southwest of Muleshoe on Rabbit Road No. 11.

Phelps is modernizing and streamlining his operation by using a Tandy 1000SX personal computer. It has two disk drives, and a 380K memory, expandable to 640K.

He says he keeps all his personal books on it, and pays his bills by using special computer checks. "I can keep better, more complete records on the computer," says Phelps, "and can do my books on the computer in half the time or less than it used to take. I used to spend at least two days on books, now, I spend a day or less, and everything's done."

The only thing Phelps has not done with the computer is stuff and lick the envelopes. "But," he said with a smile, "My four year old son, Chess, likes to lick the envelopes and stamps."

Phelps' wife, Kristi, is head of the English department at Watson Junior High School and teaches seventh grade English. They are also the parents of one year old Christina.

A luncheon of fried chicken and drinks will be provided by the Association, and they ask those attending to provide 'the trimmings.'

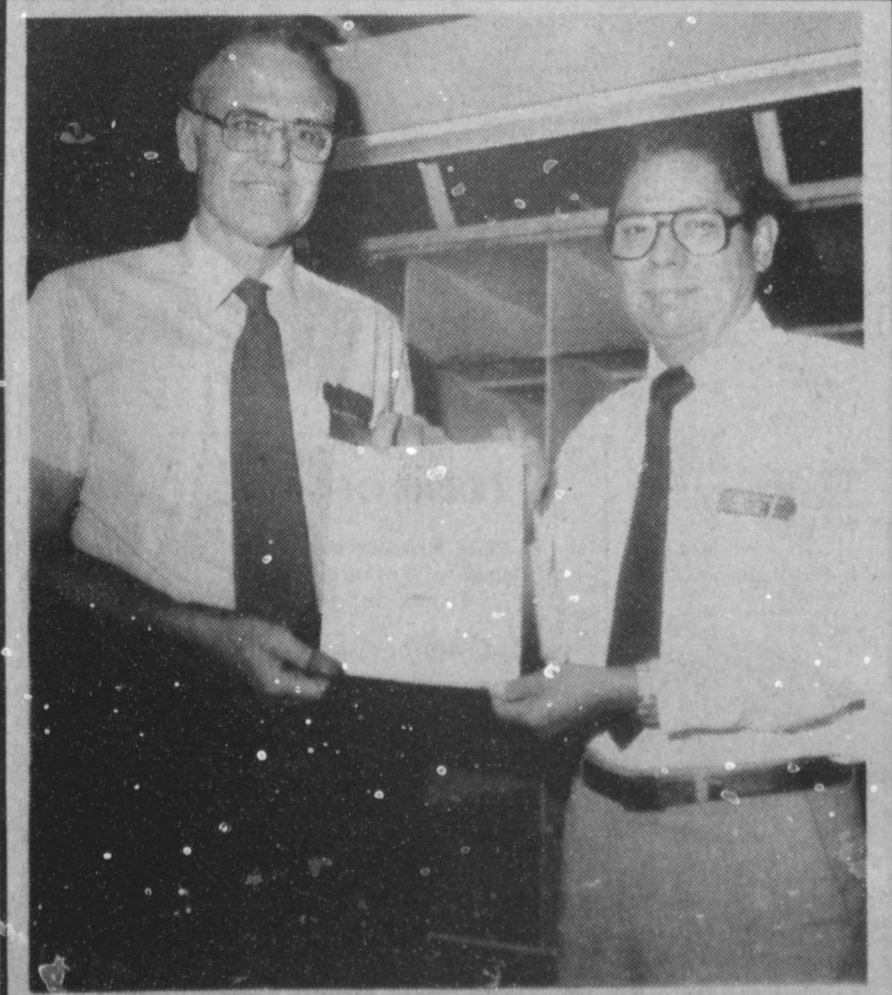

Hey, Kids! It's that time once again. If you are a toddler through the fifth grade, you are especially invited to the annual Jennyslipper Easter Egg Hunt.

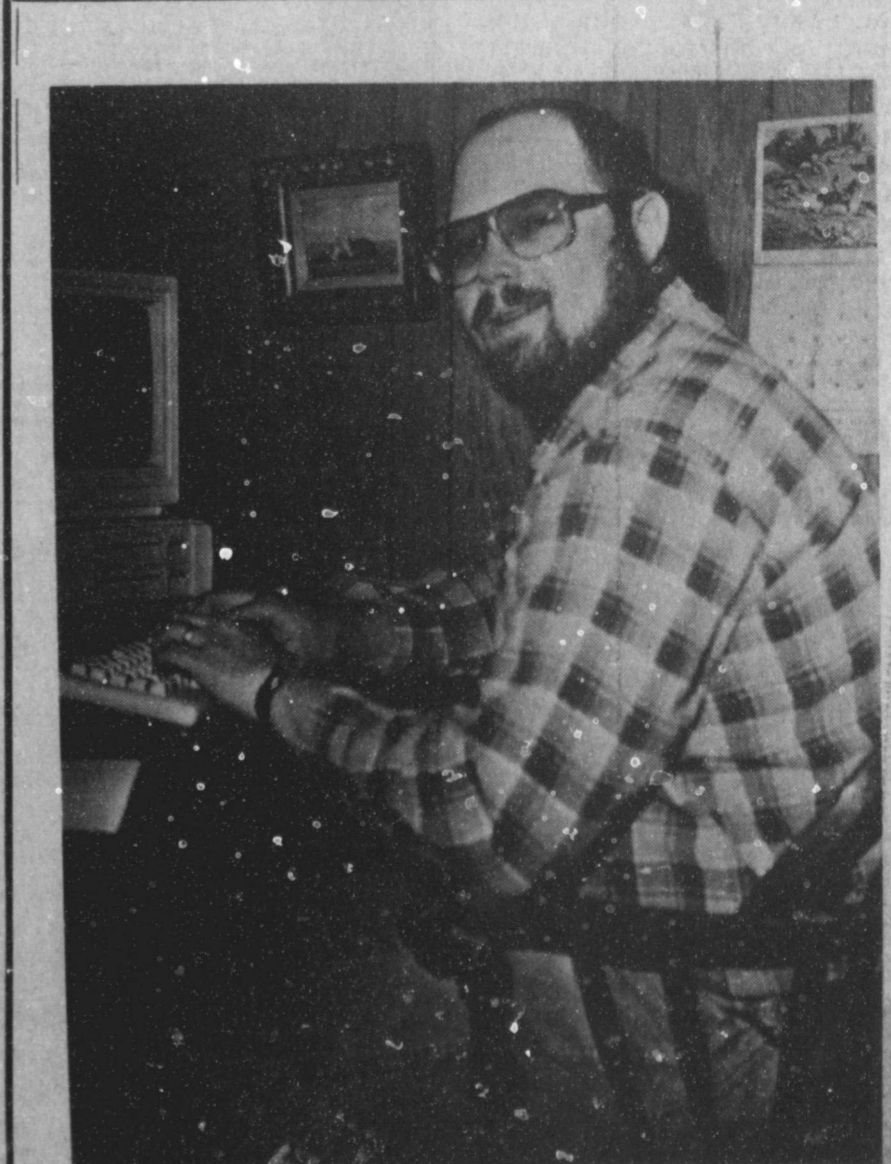
There will be lots of Easter Eggs, lots of prizes to claim, and to top it all off -- You can meet the Easter Bunny, too!

### School Task Force Attends Drug Meeting

Last Friday, a delegation from Muleshoe Independent School District attended the South Plains Task Force on Substance Abuse, conducted in Plainview on the Wayland University campus.

Attending from the Muleshoe Schools were H. John Fuller, superintendent and counselors, Linda Marr, high school; Ben Gramling, junior high; Connie Kenmore, Mary DeShazo and Gayla Gear, Dillman.

Following an introduction of Task Force members, area school representatives, the area MHMR counselors, area members of the Ministerial Alliances; area probation officers and area county judges, an update was given on work accomplished by the groups to date.

Included in this discussion was a report on the South Plains

Substance Abuse Resource Manual and a follow-up on a 'Needs Assessment.' Goals and Objectives were discussed, and include the following:

A long-term goal is to develop a broad base communication network which will effectively address the problem of substance abuse in the South Plains.

Objectives are to identify concerned groups and individuals to become members of the Task Force; develop a directory of resources on substance abuse in the South Plains; identify gaps in services; identify the extent of the adolescent substance abuse problem; describe the scope of factors which contribute to the specific substance abuse problem in the South Plains area; design a comprehensive set of strategies to address the problem and prioritize and implement the strategy.

Concluding the work portion of the meeting was the identification of a work plan and time line.

With the next meeting set for Friday, May 1, the Muleshoe ISD was specifically asked to coordinate the sharing time with

other school representatives to discuss the Drug Awareness program the Muleshoe schools are implementing. This meeting will be a sharing time with all the area representatives.

#### ARE YOU A HOME TOWN GRAVE DIGGER

In nearly every community may be found quite a number of persons who consider themselves leading citizens, but who in truth are helping to dig a grave for their town.

They do it through their failure to support the institution which make the town what it is. They do it by sending away for merchandise which might be bought with equal advantage at home. All the fine talk about civic pride that we may indulge in will never make a town, so long as the life blood of the community--the cold cash is spent elsewhere.

A man may make boosting speeches until he is black in the face, but unless he spends his money where he makes it he is a home town grave digger.

### 30 Years Ago

1957

#### WORST STORM OF WINTER BLASTS PLAINS

The West Plains, while suffering from high winds, blowing and drifting snow and sand escaped much of the blunt of a three day weekend gale which swept over the Panhandle and South Plains, paralyzing some towns and stranding many motorists.

In Muleshoe, winds up to an estimated 75 miles per hour with gusts to 90 mph, began blowing Friday night and by early Saturday, snow blanketed the ground several times, melting soon after it fell. In some protested spots snow did drift up fairly high, but the amount of snow on the ground at any time was negligible.

Highways north and west of

## Scalping Helps Green Up Lawn For Summer

About this time of the year home lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the upcoming spring season.

Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, suggests three operations that can get a lawn off to a good start--scalping, fertilizing and applying a weed killer.

Scalping a lawn in early spring serves to revitalize it and promote early spring green-up, points out Tanksley.

Begin the operation by lowering the blade of your lawnmower 1/2- to 1-inch below the normal setting. Then mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other. Remove the clippings after each mowing. They are excellent to add to a compost or to use as a mulch for garden and landscape plants.

Tanksley also recommends

keeping the lawnmower blade lowered until mid-summer.

After scalping the lawn, apply a complete fertilizer (one containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium; to promote leaf and root growth, advises Tanksley. Use 1.5 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. This is equal to 18 pounds of an 8-8-8 fertilizer or 12 pounds of a 12-4-8 fertilizer. Repeat the application in the early summer and fall.

For a dark green lawn, Tanksley suggests applying nitrogen every 50 days at the rate of one pound to 1,000 square feet. Monthly applications of iron chelate or iron sulfate during the spring and summer promote a healthy color in St. Augustine lawns.

To keep crabgrass or other unsightly weeds from becoming a problem, apply a pre-emergence herbicide (weed killer) in early spring, after the grass has recovered from winter, says Tanksley. Applying a pre-emergence herbicide too early could further weaken turf-grasses injured by winter conditions. Combinations of herbicides with fertilizers are available and convenient to use but, as with all herbicides, should only be used according to instructions on the label.

Proper maintenance is essential for a healthy lawn, and these practices will give new life to a dormant, weedy lawn, notes Tanksley.

graduated from West Texas State University, Canyon, in 1980. At that time, he still had little interest in computers. But, he became more interested as his operations became more diversified.

A friend, Monti Vandiver, helped him learn the computer and helped him set up his programs to fit his own operations.

As he used the computer more and more, Phelps said he began to realize the many ways it could help his operations by using the new methods offered.

For his seed company, Phelps keeps his inventories, starting with the beginning inventory, including all the different sizes and types of seed available, and how much delivered to his customers. Then he puts returns (from where a farmer has purchased too much seed) into the computer, adds and subtracts automatically, and at any given point, can quickly draw up the data to provide information on what he has available.

He explained that he has

eight varieties of corn, with 19 different sizes, and the computer makes it much easier to keep up with it all.

He also has eight different grain sorghum varieties; one sorghum-sudan grass and one sudan grass seed suitable for the CRP cover crop.

As a seed dealer since 1983, he said the computer helps keep his other operations streamlined. Phelps said he first became interested in seeds while helping his father, Bernard Phelps, decide what type of milo to plant. In researching the different kinds of seed, he used demonstration booklets from the Halfway Experiment Station, the Bailey County Extension office and the Clovis Experiment Station.

First, Phelps put what he had learned about seed into practice for himself, then decided to help other producers in deciding what to plant.

In his computer, he has the farmer's name, location of their land, the acreage, type of soil and what nutrients, fertilizers, and weed killers are used.

In the near future, Phelps plans to expand his computer's usage to making up farm budgets for his various customers and producers.

For his cow/calf operations, Phelps keeps up with the number of cows and calves and what is happening with each one -- what cow or calf needs medication or some type of supplement -- when the cow produces the calf and then, what ultimately happens to his livestock.

Farming isn't 'just farming' anymore -- and the cowboy must be 'up' on all the latest technology, in order to survive -- just ask Matt Phelps.

### 1987 FmHA EMERGENCY LOANS TIED TO CROP INSURANCE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 -- Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration for crop losses in 1987 will need to have crop insurance if it is available, FmHA Administrator Vance L. Clark said today.

"All family-size farmers should be aware that a newly-effective provision of the 1985 farm bill prohibits emergency loans for crop losses that could have been insured under multiple-peril crop insurance programs sponsored by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation," said Clark.

"Therefore, I urge every family-size farmer to seriously consider this new relationship between insurance coverage and emergency-loan eligibility."

Federally-subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is now available for all wheat, corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, upland cotton and rice, plus an additional 35 specialty crops in most growing areas. The government subsidy reduces the program costs by about 50 percent, Clark said, making crop insurance a worthwhile option to consider regardless of the newly-required tie-in with emergency loan eligibility.

If a farmer obtains the insurance required, and if the value of his crop loss is still 30 percent or more after the insurance payment, the operation will be eligible for consideration for an emergency loan.

Effective January 1, 1987, the new requirement affects crop planted in 1987, and thus will not affect winter wheat or other winter-seeded crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987. Insurance must be multiple-peril, covering most forms of disaster, rather than hail-only.

The closing date for insurance sales on spring-planted crops in most areas of the country is April 15. However, the date is February 28 for potatoes in the South and March 15 for potatoes and peas on the Atlantic Coast; dates for vegetables in the South will vary. Because of these dates and the fact that a prevented-planting endorsement for eligible crops must be elected 45 days prior to sales closing, Clark urged farmers to contact their local insurance agents promptly.

The senioritis bug has bitten all seniors, so teachers and parents alike should be prepared for unprecedented feelings and wild behavior.

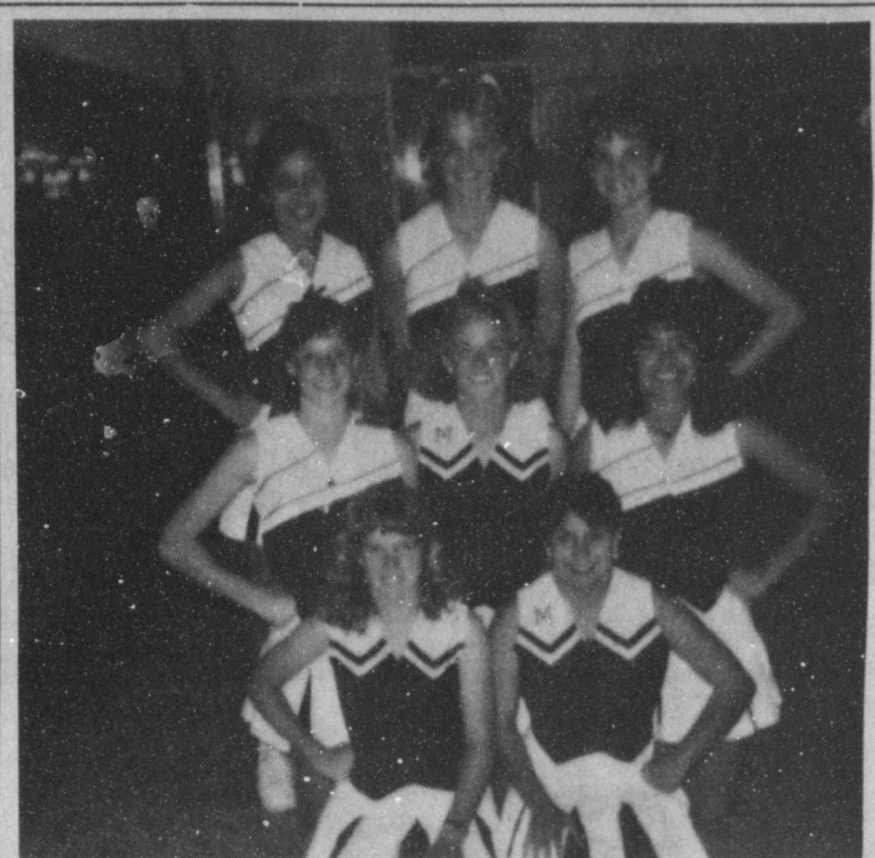

### What The Constitution Means To Me; Our Country

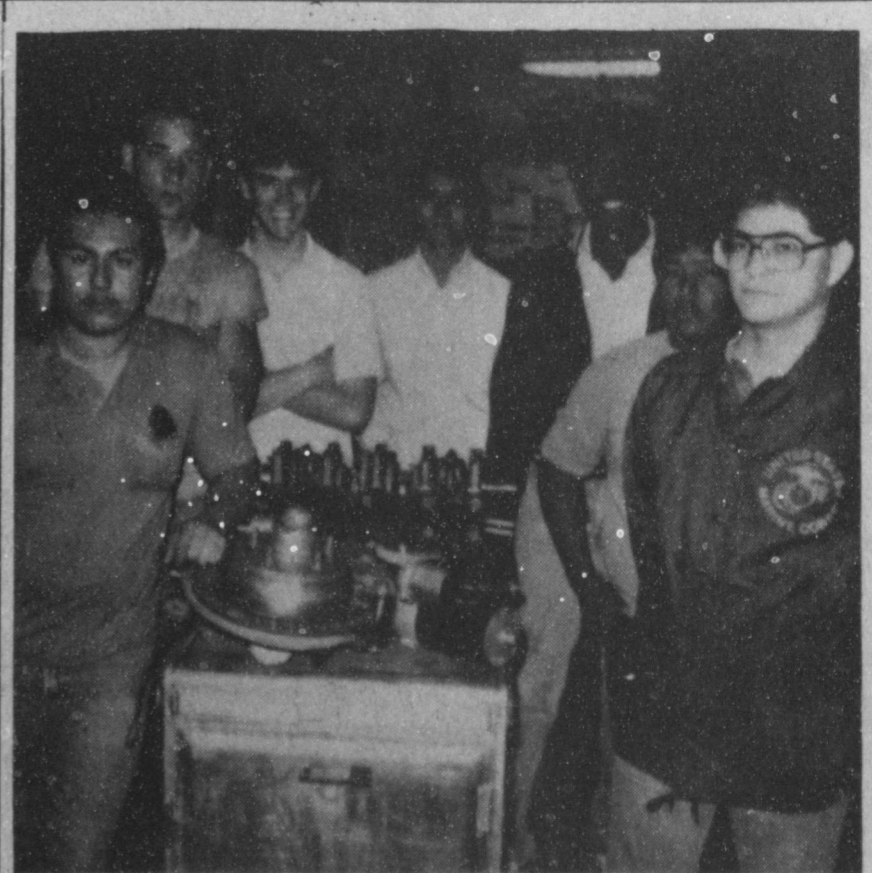

# Exchange Student Tells About Her School, Customs

Martina Schornhorst, a German exchange student from West Germany, has lived in Muleshoe for the past several months, and has attended school here. Tuesday, she was speaker for the Muleshoe Rotary Club.

Martina told about German school systems, saying that grades one through four are elementary school.

This is followed by three other stages of school.

Grades five through nine can prepare a German student for blue collar work; or the student can opt to take the five through ten year school which is a little harder.

Students who are going for college or for big company employment take the grade five through grade 13 classes, which are the hardest of all.

Martina is working on her 13 year classes, because she plans to attend college after returning to her home in Germany.

German youth, unlike boys and girls in the U.S., cannot drive legally until they are 18, years of age, as there are no driving permits. The prospective driver is required to attend driving school.

With living conditions so bad in East Germany, which is under communistic rule, there continues to be a lot of trouble between East Germany and

democratic West Germany.

Communists do not allow their people to enjoy much of the luxuries, good living conditions or wages enjoyed by their West German counterparts.

Unlike very strict conditions of just a few years ago, people can now visit relatives and friends in Berlin and East Germany, even though visiting conditions can become just a little shaky at times.

Martina also told the Rotarians that West Germany is patterned more like the Democracy of the United States, in the case that they have 'parties' much like the Democratic, Republican and Libertarian parties in the U. S.

Martina is the upbeat, friendly, modern young German, who is apparently enjoying her visit in the U. S., but getting ready to return to her family in Germany. Her father is a doctor in West Germany.

Rotary President Bill Liles informed those present that the District Conference for Rotary has been set for May 7-9 at the Inn of the Gods in Ruidoso, N. M. He also scheduled workers for the Rotary Blood Drive scheduled for Thursday, April 9, at Summit Savings.

J.D. Cage presented the Club with a Rotary banner from a Maryland Rotary Club he had visited. Brad Poyner was in

charge of the program on Tuesday and it was announced that the MHS Jazz Band will be guests next week.

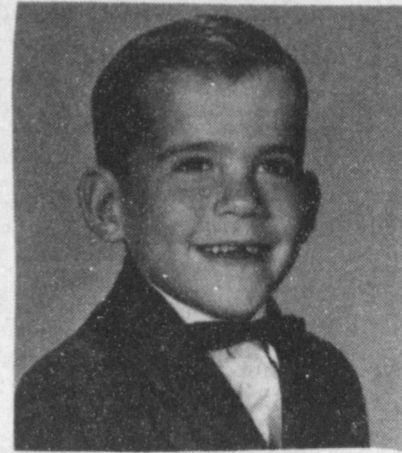

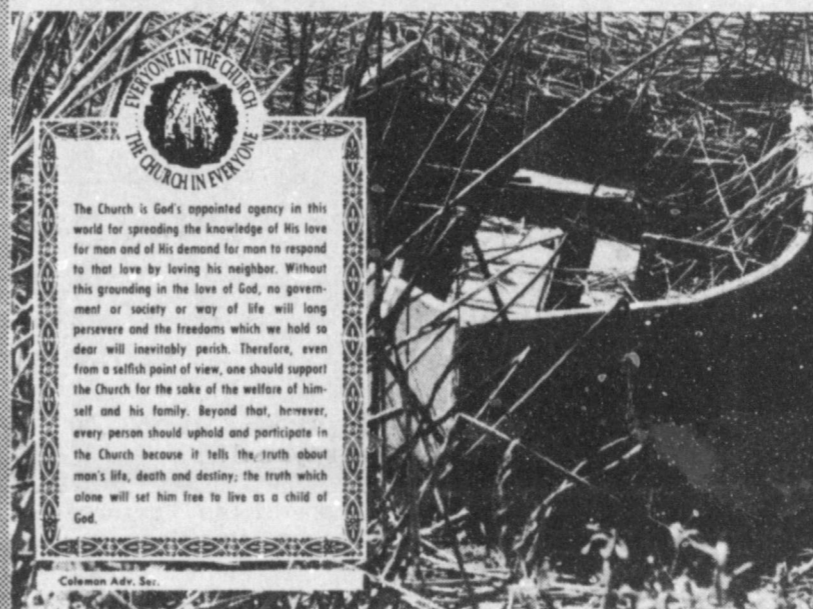
