Clovis AAU Director Speaks Here

Jeff Smith introduced Pete Robbins, of Clovis, as guest speaker for the Muleshoe Rotary Club Tuesday. Robbins is with the National Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) Girl's Basketball program as program director.

He gave the background of the AAU, saying it started in 1948, and that up to that time no athletic program existed to serve youth 8-18 years of age.

Now, according to Robbins, more than 20,000,000 youth in the United States participate in AAU.

Robbins told the Rotarians about the National AAU Girls' Basketball Tournament hosted in Clovis in 1984, and said that in the 5-6 days the 80 teams, and some 200 coaches and scouts were in Clovis, some \$4 million was left behind in Clovis, benefitting Clovis merchants and business.

The speaker also said many benefits could come to the surrounding communities who are supportive of such activities as the planned National AAU tournament in Clovis.

Again this year, after bidding and receiving the 'nod' to host the AAU National Tournament for 1987, the tourney is scheduled July 3-10 in Clovis.

The AAU program director told the Rotary Club that Debbie Isaac and Debbie Brown are both expected to participate in the upcoming AAU tournament.

Attempts were made to get an AAU Boy's program underway, but after winning everything locally and statewide, the boys group came up some \$3,000 short of the \$8,000 needed to attend the national tournament in Florida.

One side note to the AAU tournaments is the \$15,000 the Clovis AAU now has to help AAU girls with money for college.

In the absence of President Bill Liles, incoming president, Tommy Gunstream conducted the meeting and told the Rotarians about the upcoming district conference, urging all Rotarians possible to attend. He also spoke briefly about the riding lawn mower, which will be given away by the Rotary Club on Saturday, June 6.

Five Week Summer School Slated Here

H. John Fuller, superintendent of Muleshoe I.S.D., announces that there will be a five week summer school for students in grades K-12 beginning June 1 and ending July 3. This summer program is designed to help students who did not meet State minimum requirements, or who need some more time on certain concepts or for students who would like enrichment or extension activities in math, language arts.

Math and language arts will be offered in grades K-12 and a health course will be offered for high school students if enough students enroll for the courses.

Enrollment will be based on three priorities namely, (1) students who did not meet State minimum requirements (2) students who are recommended by their teachers to attend (3) students whose parents request they attend for enrichment or extension of concepts.

K-12 classes will be held on the individual campuses. Classes will begin at 8:00 A.M. and continue until 12: NOON. There will be no tuition fee and transportation will not be provided.

If a student attends the required five weeks and passes a mastery test, it is possible for him to make up one course (math or language arts).

Applications are available in the four principals' offices for students to complete if they want their child to attend summer school. The deadline for returning the application to the principals is May 15.

"This is a great opportunity for students to catch up or extend their basic skills in math or language arts and to receive one semester credit for Health in High School," concluded Fuller.

Practice Video Before Filming

During the past weekend, Kenneth Richards and Reydon Stanford, founders and members of the Anchor Brothers Band, were in Dallas practicing for a video which will be filmed on a Monday, June 18 at Dallas.

Stanford explained that the video will be filmed at night at the Southfork Ranch near Plano. He said the night filming will be done at night, to eliminate spectators. Filming at Southfork, the featured ranch on the television show "Dallas" always draws a crowd if they are aware such filming is to be done, so it will be done in virtual secrecy, he added.

Entitled "Sweet Song of Liberty" the video is being filmed by USCO, the Christian music segment of the USO, who perform extensively for military bases throughout the world.

Included in the video will be clips of the Statue of Liberty and the New York City harbor. Also participating in the video, along with approximately 75 other entertainers will be four Dallas Cowboys.

Prior to the national release of the video in mid-July, a copy will be presented to President Ronald Reagan at The White House in Washington, according to Janice Luke, one of the co-founders of the USCO.

While in Dallas for the filming of the video, the Anchor Brothers Band will be 'spot-lighted' in performances on Saturday, May 16, at Carswell Air Force Base in Fort Worth.

USCO has also invited The Anchor Brothers Band, well known throughout this entire area, to make a Caribbean tour of military bases during this summer.

UIL Targeted In Action For Claiming Ineligibility

By the time the 1986 football season was over for the Three Way Eagles, they had won 11 straight games, including both the district and bi-district titles, while losing out on penetrations in the regional playoffs.

Many of the Three Way Eagles came in for special honors - then it all got stripped away following an investigation by the University Interscholastic League, based in Austin.

According to an "anonymous telephone call" to the UIL, Three Way was said to have played an ineligible player during both the football season and the basketball season that followed.

With their games stripped away, the Three Way Eagles who had been named to honors along with their parents, decided to appeal the decision to forfeit their games for the year.

An appeal was not accepted by the UIL, so some 14 athletes, in some cases with the suit filed by their parents as "next friend," and the two Three Way coaches, filed a suit in the 287th District Court in Muleshoe.

Johnny Duarte, as next friend of J. J. Duarte; Oscar Guillen; Domingo Guillen; James Kindle, as next friend of Bryan Kindle; Jesus Medina; Leo Rubalcava as next friend of Ernesto Rubalcava; Jose Rubalcava; H. E. Soward, as next friend of Cecil M. Soward and Jarrod Sowder; Curtis Tucker; Ernest Tucker as next friend of Kelly Tucker; Gay Williams, as next friend of Michael Williams; Maria Snitler as next friend of Robert Zamora and Wanda Sanders as next friend of Shawn Walls.

Also listed as plaintiffs were C. W. Williams, coach at Three Way High School; and Greg Jeffcoat, coach at Three Way High School.

According to the Original Petition of the lawsuit, the Three Way High School had a 1986 football season of great achievement and success, and outlined the post-season action.

Three Way ISD is a member of the UIL, according to the lawsuit and is a member of the District 1-A football district, which also includes Amherst,

Cotton Center, New Home, Smyer, Silverton, Southland, Texline and Whitharrel school districts.

The basis of the lawsuit hinges on the eligibility or non-eligibility of Shawn Walls, who transferred from the Morton ISD to Three Way School.

Also, according to the action filed in Bailey County District Court, Walls moved with his aunt, Wanda Sanders to Three Way School.

It says the courts gave the Sanders custody of the young man in 1985, and Mrs. Sanders, who had taught for several years in the Morton ISD and received employment as a fifth grade teacher at Three Way.

When informed that Walls would have to reside in the district in order to participate in sports under UIL rules, Mrs. Sanders purchased an 80-foot mobile home and moved it onto school property at the Three Way School.

The petition also states that Mrs. Sanders rented a post office box at Maple, the nearest post office to the Three Way

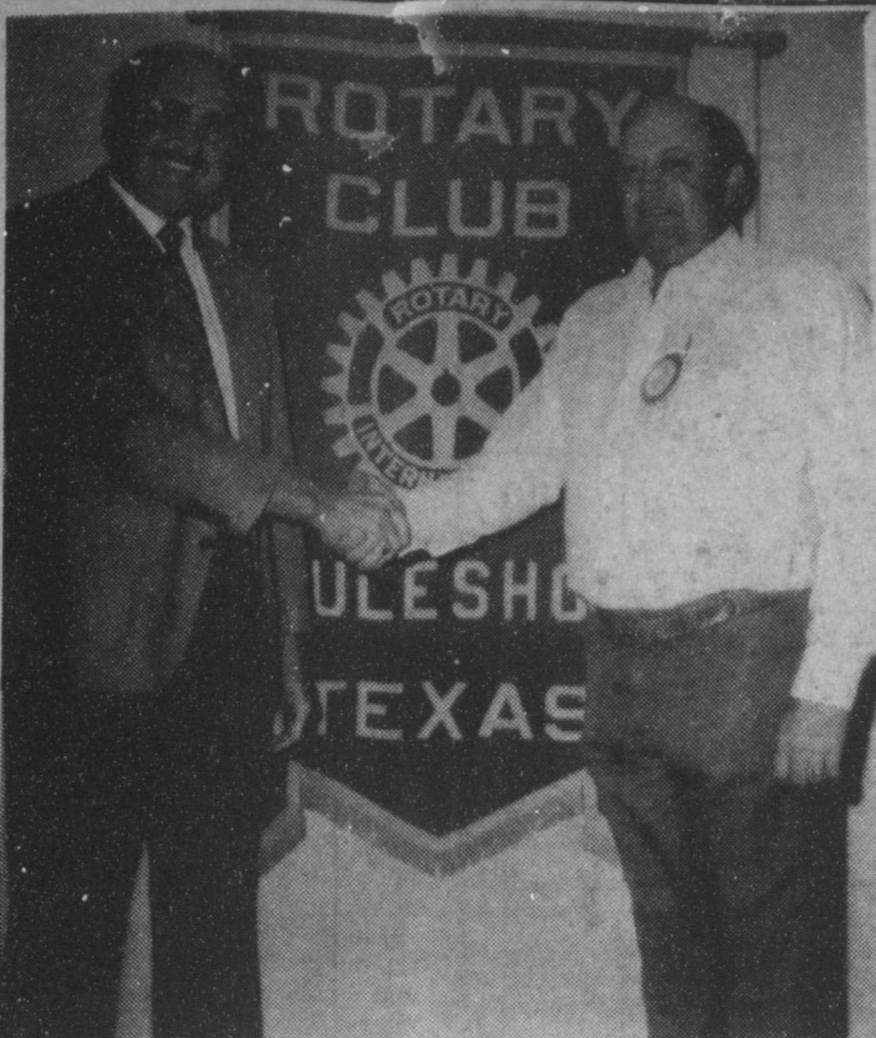

School, and after consulting with other member schools in the District I-A, it was determined that Walls met the UIL criteria in order to participate in sports at Three Way.

However, allegations were made that Walls never, in fact, became a bona fide resident of the Three Way School district according to UIL rules and regulations.

Dr. B. J. Stamps, who is assistant to the director of the UIL, made a report favorable to Shawn Walls and to the school following a visit to the school.

His report said in part, "It is my further opinion that all concerned believe that the steps taken were necessary to establish residence for UIL rules and purposes and that the actions taken were sufficient to establish eligibility."

However, Dr. Bailey Marshall executive director of the UIL, issued an opinion letter to Don Parker, Superintendent of the Three Way ISD and to Monty Lee, Superintendent of Cotton Center Independent School District and President of the District I-A Executive Committee. According to the opinion letter, Dr. Marshall determined that Shawn Walls was an illegal player for Three Way ISD.

In a meeting of the I-A executive committee, it was

determined that Shawn Walls was ineligible because his mobile home at Three Way did not meet the primary residence requirement.

According to the petition as filed, it requested that Shawn Walls be declared an eligible player, and that the decision of the District I-A Executive Committee be set aside, held null and void and of no force and effect, and that the contests (games) forfeited be reinstated.

It also asked that any athletic honors and awards be restored to all the football players affected by the ruling that forfeited all games played in by Shawn Walls.

On April 29, the UIL filed a counterclaim, denying any and all wrongdoing in the disputed case, and asked that the case be moved to Travis County (Austin) as the proper place for the case to be held.

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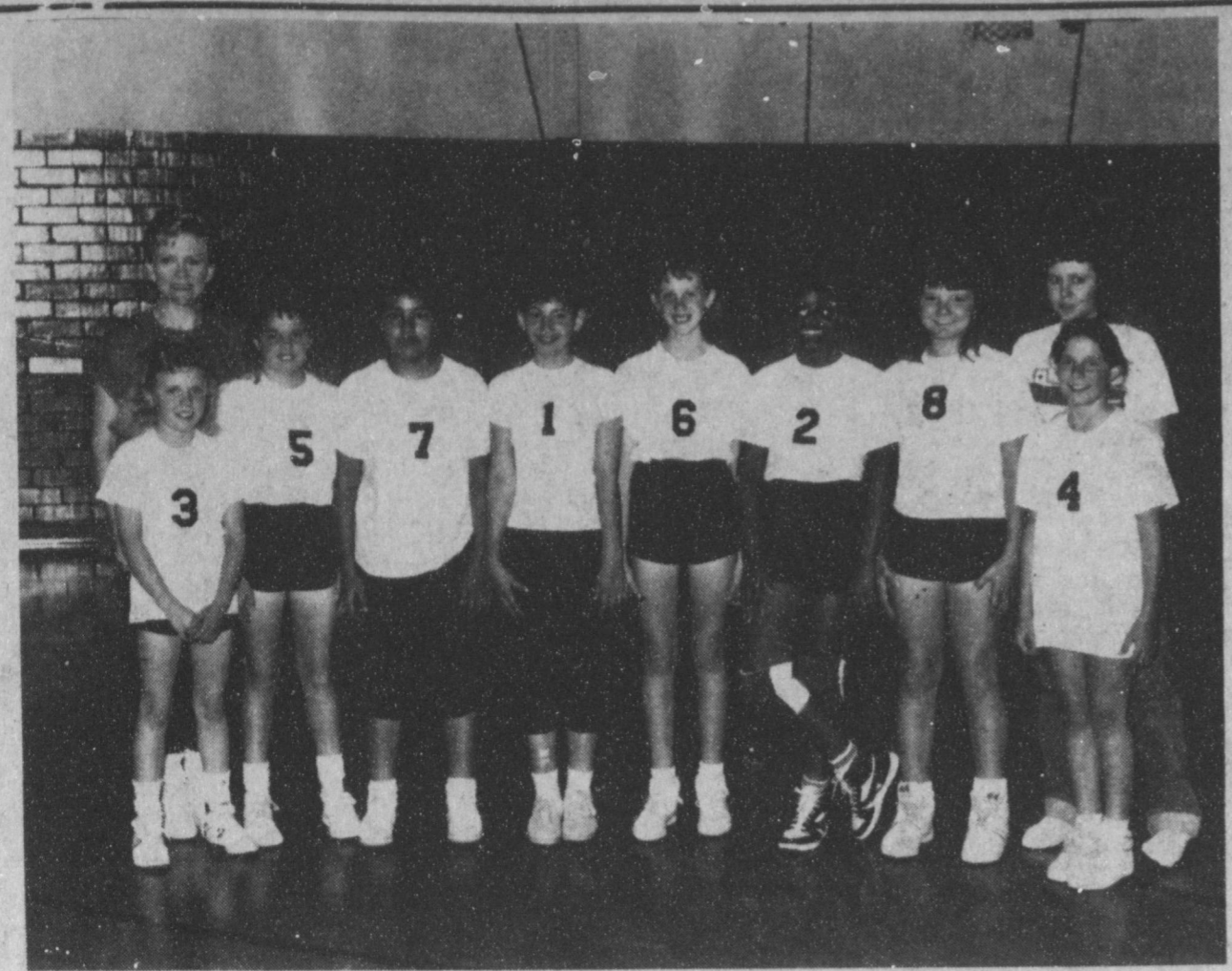
