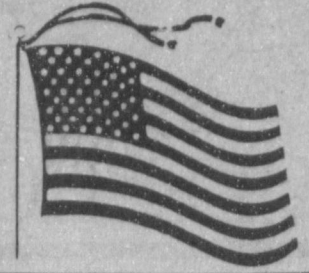

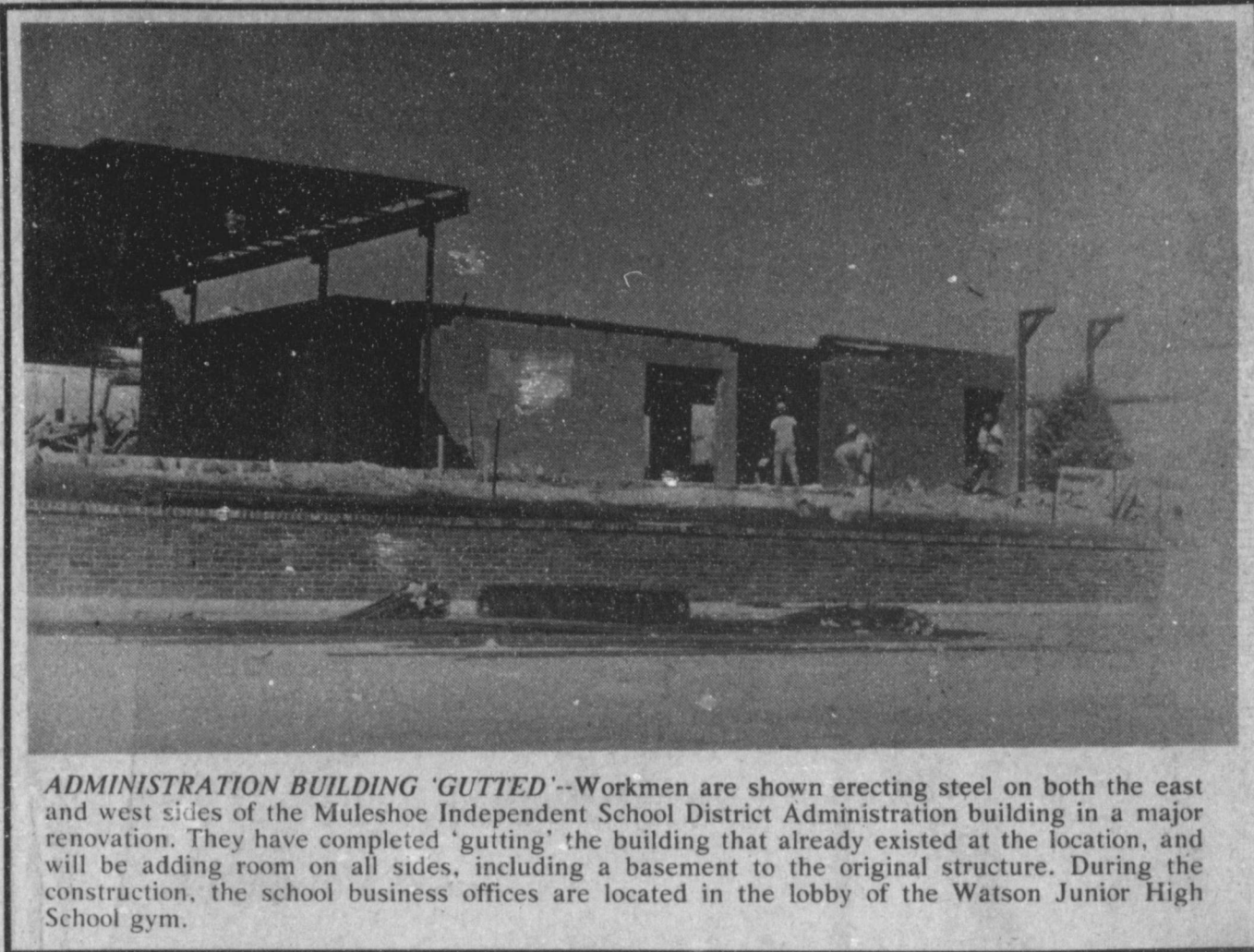

Every year, on the Saturday before the Fourth of July, Sudan stages a massive and impressive celebration. It starts early and ends with a street dance. The celebration this year is scheduled for Saturday, June 27.

On the north side of the square at Sudan, you will find children gathering at 8:30 a.m. for the coin dig. Sanboxes will be peppered with coins, and the three age groups, 2-4, 5-6, and 7-8, are welcome to participate.

Several events begin at 9 a.m., including pioneer registration, which will be in the old Sudan Hotel. The Arts and Crafts show will open in the Senior Citizen's building and at 9 a.m., the turtle race, open to all ages, starts on the north side of the square.

Registration begins at 9:30 a.m. for the children's tractor pull, sponsored by the Young Farmers, starts on the south side of the square, to begin at 10 a.m. Five age groups, three through seven years, will be participating in the tractor pull.

Games for children ages eight and above, begin at 10 a.m. in the park, and merchant's drawings will also begin at the same time.

Recipients of the prizes must be present to win and some of the tickets for various items to be given away will include: quilt and one-half beef, Sudan Senior Citizens; VCR, Firemen's Auxiliary; \$100 savings bond, Heritage Committee; riding lawnmower, Lions Club; charcoal smoker, Twirlers; \$125 gift certificate toward pair of boots, 4-H club.

Three to seven year old children have been practicing up for the big race at 10:45 a.m. Stick horsees will be galloping along on the west side of the community center.

One big attraction is always at the southeast corner of the square - where the Sudan Fire

Department will be sponsoring pumper team races for area fire departments.

Again this year, domino tables will be set up in the old Fire Station, with play to continue throughout the day.

Concession stands will be set up at various locations to serve lunch, as well as cold drinks, snow cones, and other warm (hot?) weather goodies. Live entertainment starts around noon, and will be continuous in the afternoon.

At 1 p.m., the Fire Department hose lay races will be held in front of the Senior Citizens building and at 1:30 p.m., Joe Salem will show a film of past fall festivals held in Sudan.

At 3 p.m. the annual parade is scheduled, with line-up beginning at 2:30 p.m. Bicycles are asked to line up at the Church of Christ parsonage at 2:30 p.m. to be judged.

Beginning at 4 p.m., the Fire Department will have water polo in front of the Senior Citizens Building, with ribbons to be presented in the children's divisions.

At 5 p.m., the second Annual Great Outhouse Race should draw a large crowd. In its first year in 1986, the Outhouse Race proved to be quite a crowd pleaser.

At 5:45 p.m., winners of the various drawings will be announced, along with awards to the Best Decorated Store Windows, Arts and Crafts, and the Heritage Foundation awards for the Pioneer Award and the pioneer traveling the greatest distance to attend the celebration.

Adding to the day will be the annual Lions Club Barbecue, with serving scheduled to get underway at 6 p.m. Tickets will be \$5.00 for adults, and \$2.00 for children under 12.

Lt. Wayne Holmes Chosen To Be Muleshoe's New City Police Chief

Following an Executive session Tuesday morning, members of the Muleshoe City Council announced they had

chosen longtime Muleshoe City Police Officer, and acting chief, Wayne Holmes as Muleshoe's City Police Chief, effective immediately.

Chief Holmes is a native of Muleshoe, the son of the late 'Shorty' and Florence Holmes. After growing up in Muleshoe, Holmes joined the U.S. Navy.

He retired from the Navy on July 1, 1974, and was hired as a Muleshoe City Patrolman on July 5, 1974, beginning work on July 17, 1974.

Holmes worked his way through the ranks, under former chiefs Buddy Black, Johnny Richards and Les Irvin, and at the time he was named chief on Tuesday, was lieutenant.

Chief Holmes and his wife, Joyce, are the parents of four children, Bryce, with the United States Air Force, stationed in Idaho Falls, Idaho; Jackie Ledgerwood, a member of the U.S. Navy, stationed with her husband in Scotland; Joy Harris of Illinois; and Jessie, who is a student at Eastern New Mexico University Portales.

They also have two granddaughters, Bryce and his wife, Earlene, are the parents of Sarah and Krystal.

His wife, Joyce, has been manager of the Bailey County Civic Center for several years.

They have both been involved with youth activities, and were instrumental in the construction, and operation of the Mule Putt Miniature Golf Course. Chief Holmes also spends much time presenting drug prevention programs at schools and for civic clubs.

Some two and a half years ago, both Chief Holmes and his wife were honored for their many years of involvement with local and area youth by being

designated 'Couple of the Year' by the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

The new police chief plans no immediate changes in operations of the Muleshoe Police Department, as he has been acting chief for the past few months. He will be welcoming

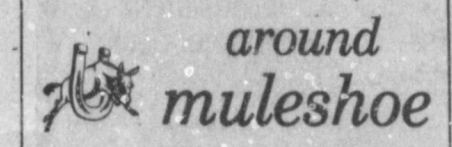

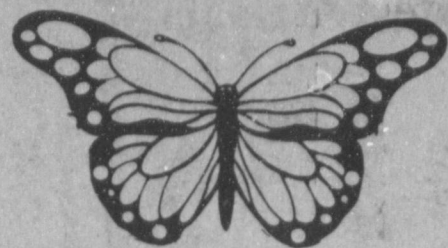

Vacation Traffic Accidents

When packing the car for a vacation, don't forget to add first aid supplies and some extra precaution. These may keep you from becoming a statistic in Texas traffic fatalities.

"Traffic accidents always increase during holiday seasons," says Dr. Mary Ann Heussner, a health education specialist with the Texas A&M

University Agricultural Extension Service. "There are more people on the road, often not driving as attentively as they should be; and summer is one long holiday."

According to the Texas Department of Health, 3,823 people died in Texas traffic accidents last year; 1,053 of these deaths occurred in the summer months of June, July, and August. In July alone, 374 deaths were recorded.

"There are ways to decrease the chances of being involved in an accident," says Heussner. "Plan the trip ahead of time. Know which highways to travel to avoid last minute decisions and desperate lane changes. Also allow plenty of travel time, both on the way there and on the way back. Rushing to get

there, and fatigue and desire to return home may put an end to more than just a vacation."

"Check the car carefully before starting the trip," the specialist suggests. "Make sure the brakes and lights are working properly, fluids are at correct levels, windshield wipers are functioning, the tires have the correct air pressure, and the spare is in good condition. Also carry flashlights, flares and a first aid kit in your car."

It's also important to remember that wearing seatbelts is a law in Texas, for adults as well as children, remarks Heussner. Last year the Texas Department of Health reported 6,603 injuries and 78 deaths of children age 0 to 4, all due to traffic accidents.

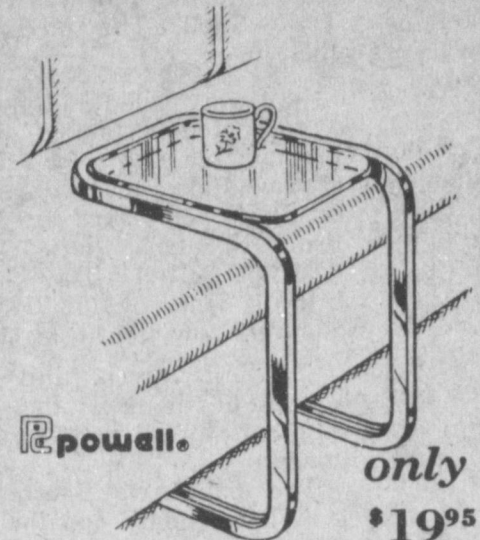
The purpose of creating the new district is to lighten the docket in district 64. This will enable both criminal and civil

cases to be disposed of with less delay than has been necessary.

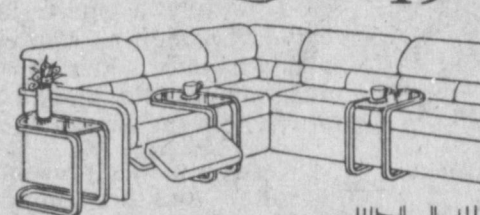

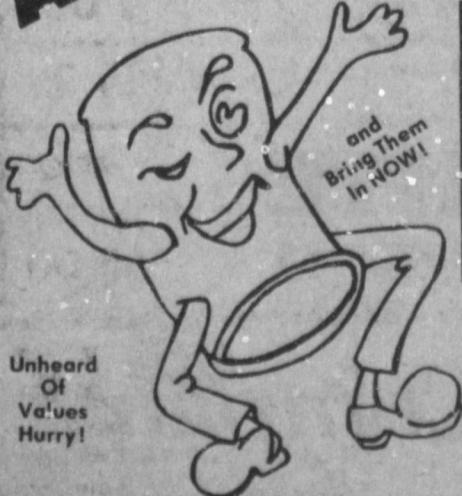

Hints To Help Refrigeration

As summer temperature soars, it's even more important that your refrigerator keep its cool. Proper installation and maintenance can make that possible.

Dr. Susan Quiring, a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Extension Service says, "To keep the refrigerator and freezer at proper temperatures during war, humid weather, try to open them as few times as possible. Don't leave the doors standing open for a long time while searching for something, and try to take out everything needed at once instead of opening and closing the doors a few times."

An overloaded refrigerator is inefficient. It doesn't allow the air to circulate and cool all the food. Clearing out near-empty jars and leftovers that haven't been used in a few days will help, she says.

"When you have a large amount of hot food to cool, divide it up into smaller containers. Small quantities of food in narrow layers will cool faster," says Quiring.

"Door gaskets need to be in good condition to keep a refrigerator running properly. Damaged gaskets allow cool air to seep out, and warm air into the cabinet. The specialist suggests checking the gasket by putting a piece of paper between the door and the gasket, and close the door with a little of the paper sticking out. Pull slowly on the paper. If there is some resistance, the gaskets are working fine, she says.

Also keep frost from building up in the freezer or dust and lint from collecting on the condenser. Large buildups may cause the unit to work harder

than necessary to maintain desired temperatures.

"Summer heat and humidity may make it necessary to adjust the temperature and air controls," Quiring adds. "The ideal temperature for a refrigerator ranges from 33-39 degrees, and freezers should be set anywhere between 0 and -8 degrees."

Electric Joins

New Cooperative

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), in an order issued June 18, authorized Amarillo-based Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc., to provide wholesale electric service to 11 of its member cooperatives, including Bailey County Electric Cooperative.

The FERC authorization follows nearly three years of work by the Golden Spread member cooperatives to serve their own electric needs.

Golden Spread is the only electric cooperative subject to the jurisdiction of FERC. In addition to regulating Golden Spread, the FERC regulates 186 investor-owned electric utilities, five federal power marketing agencies, and oil and gas pipeline companies.

The Electric Cooperatives who will purchase their power from Golden Spread are Bailey County Electric Cooperative, Muleshoe; Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Wellington; Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Hereford; Lamb County Electric Cooperative, Littlefield; Light-house Electric Cooperative, Floydada; Midwest Electric Cooperative, Dalhart; South Plains Electric Cooperative, Lubbock; Swisher County Electric Cooperative, Tulia; and Tri-County Electric Cooperative, Hooker, Okla.

Golden Spread also represents five additional electric cooperatives which purchase wholesale electricity from SPS in wholesale rate protests and related matters.

These cooperatives are Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Tahoka; Central Valley Electric Cooperative, Artesia, N.M.; Farmer's Electric Cooperative of New Mexico, Clovis, N.M.; Lea County Electric Cooperative, Lovington, N.M.; and Roosevelt County Electric Cooperative, Portales, N.M.

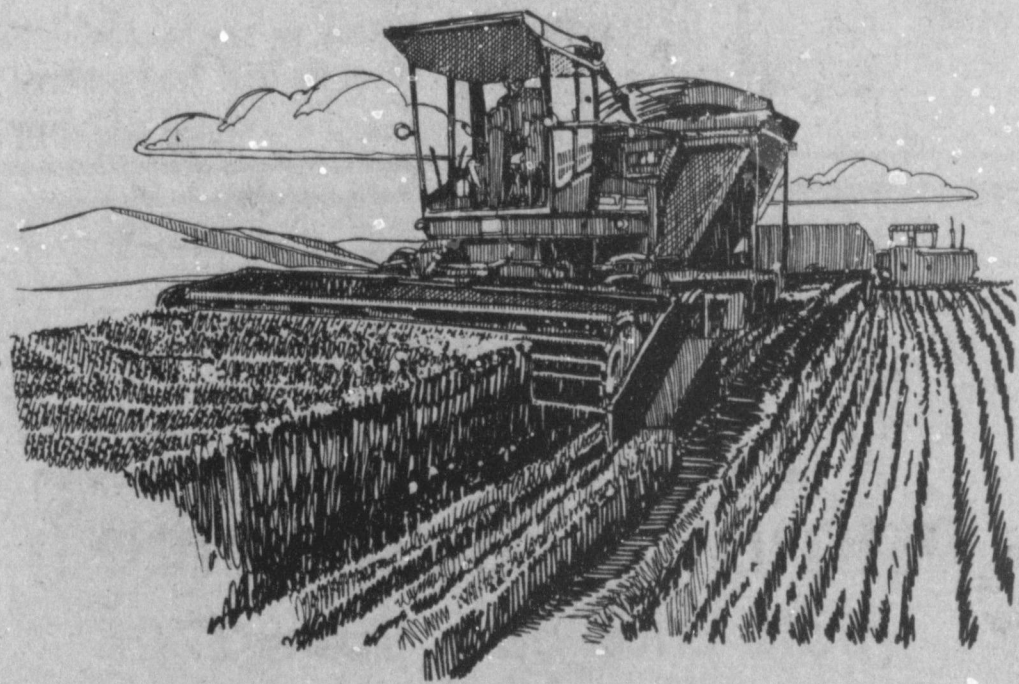

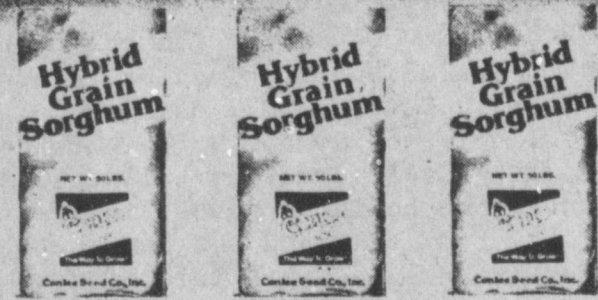

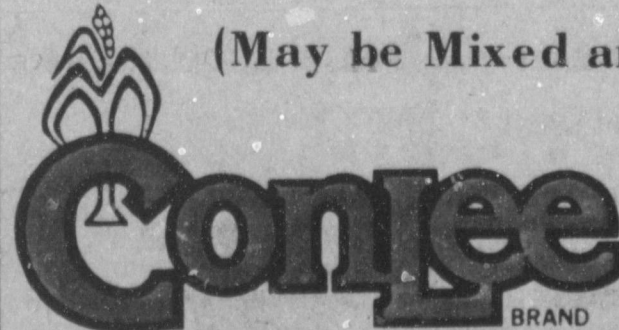

Texas A&M Planning Annual Tillage Workshop

Conservation tillage and how it fits into a farming operation will be the focus of the regional conference hosted by Texas A&M University July 1-2.

"Conservation Tillage: Today and Tomorrow" will be the theme of the Southern Regional No-Till Conference at the College Station Hilton Hotel and Conference Center.

"The conference is aimed at promoting conservation tillage practices through an exchange of the latest technology and information related to this method of tillage," points out Dr. Tom Cothren, associate professor of agronomy with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas A&M's Department of Soil and Crop Sciences and publicity chairman for the conference. The Experiment Station along with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and various soil and water conservation agencies and organizations are cooperating in hosting the conference.

"Agribusiness personnel as well as individuals engaged in research and education programs are invited to attend," says Cothren.

Addressing these sessions will be Dr. Neville P. Clarke, Experiment Station director and interim deputy chancellor for agriculture with The Texas

A&M University System, and Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, Extension Service director.

The first theme session will focus on implementing conservation tillage systems in Texas. Staff with state and U.S. Department of Agriculture agencies will provide an overview of conservation tillage, fertility requirements, water

management, the economics involved and tillage practices on highly erodible soil. Several farmers will be on hand to tell about their experiences with conservation tillage in a sub-humid climate and in a semi-arid climate.

Another session will be devoted to advances in conservation tillage farming systems. Discussions will deal with maintaining soil productivity, planter requirements for soils with surface residues, irrigation, weed management, tillage effects on microbiological release of soil organic nitrogen,

and effects of crop residues on pests, soil water and temperature.

The day-and-a-half program also will feature a session on research findings and results of new technologies as applied to conservation tillage farming systems, Cothren adds.

The conference was established in 1984 by the Agricultural Experiment Station directors of the 13 southern states to promote the exchange of information and new concepts related to conservation tillage and to enhance its acceptance as a viable farming system.

Coccidia Hurts Young Calves; Caution Urged

Coccidia are one-celled parasites that cause an intestinal disease of young cattle. The disease is most prevalent in calves three weeks to six months of age, but can be a problem in cattle up to two years of age, says Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Coccidia are spread by infected cattle continuously passing cysts in manure onto the

ground. The cysts develop under moist and moderate temperature conditions, and cattle continuously swallow them.

Coccidia are commonly transmitted during rainy periods in spring, fall and warm winter. Bloody diarrhea is the main symptom and is often confused with diarrhea caused by hairworms, explains Tanksley.

To control Coccidia, prevent overcrowding and overgrazing, use a pasture rotation system,

provide good drainage and sanitation, and separate cattle into age groups.

Wormers are not effective against coccidia, says Tanksley. Effective drugs are amprolium (Amprol, Corid), decoquinate (Deccox) and sulfonamides.

ORDINANCE NO. 275A.
