



Local, Area Rebate Checks Are Still Low

Late last week, State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$56.1 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. According to Bullock, this year's payments are down by nearly six percent overall compared to payments made by September of last year.

Muleshoe is showing a slow 'come back' from a depressed economy. Their share of the tax rebate for the latest reporting period was \$13,987.19, up from the \$12,654.69 received for July a year ago. To date this year, Muleshoe shows a decrease of 6.92 percent, with total payments to date of \$138,772.70, compared to the \$149,086.27 received through July a year ago.

Morton still shows a high percentage in a decrease in sales tax rebate revenues. Their latest figure is a 12.43 percent decrease for the year, with \$35,072.17 received to date for this year, compared to \$40,049.99 received at the same period a year ago. Their current payment was \$3,885.33, compared to last year's payment for July of \$3,836.60.

Littlefield is also playing 'catch-up' with only a 3.06 percent decrease for the year to date. Their current payment for the current period was \$17,413.78, compared to last year's figure for this date of \$15,234.25. Their current payments to date are \$181,043.12, and a year ago were \$186,764.55.

From Parmer County, Friona shows the smallest decrease of the surrounding counties in sales tax rebates. With current payments of \$78,618.19 to date this year, and \$80,407.63 for the same period last year, Friona is only down by 2.23 percent. Their current payment was \$7,907.82, compared to \$8,099.53 for the same time last year.

The city of Houston received the largest payment -- \$8.6 Cont. Page 6, Col. 3.

These items would be exempt from taxation only if they originated outside the state and were located in the state for a period of 175 days or less for purposes of assembly, storage, manufacture, processing, or fabrication. Such property could be taxed by a county, school district, or municipality if the governing body of the political subdivision took official action to provide for the taxation of the items while they were located in the political subdivision. If the governing body of a political subdivision took official action to tax the items before January 1, 1988, the tax would be effective for the 1988 tax year. If the action were taken after January 1, 1988, and before April 1, 1988, the tax would become effective January 1, 1989. The proposed amendment will ap-

PROPOSITION NO. 19 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 88 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which will be used to establish a superconducting super collider fund. The fund would be used to provide economic incentives for the superconducting super collider research facility, and the agency administering the fund would be authorized to grant land or property to the United States government for undertakings related to the facility.




