

Prospects For A Decrease In Wool Crop Over World

Shearing of the 1935 domestic clip is now under way in the western states and large offerings of this wool will soon be available. Prospects still indicate that the clip will be smaller than for any of the past four years and may not differ greatly from that of 1929 when production of shorn wool amounted to 328,000,000 pounds.

As a result of the great improvement in domestic mill consumption thus far in 1935 and the marked increase in sales of wool on the Boston market since the latter part of February, prospects for the marketing of the new clip are now much more favorable than had been expected earlier. However, dealers are still carrying relatively large stocks of old clip wool and the recent improvement in demand conditions may not be fully reflected in the domestic price situation until the movement of the new clip is further advanced. Prices of domestic wool continued somewhat irregular in March and April and slight declines have been reported on most grades of territory wool at Boston in recent weeks.

The present low prices of wool in this country should reduce the use of wool substitutes and recovered wool and increase the consumption of raw wool. The large government contracts recently awarded will also provide an outlet for a considerable quantity of raw wool. Mills are reported to have sufficient orders to maintain production at a fairly high rate thru the first half of the year and total mill consumption for 1935 will probably show a considerable increase over the unusually small consumption in 1934.



Health Column

Dysentery

A Doctor Lyon has been studying infantile diarrhea in West Virginia. He finds that the death rate among children under two years only two of these United States have higher rates. These two states happen to be New Mexico and

While a good home and careful parents give some protection they cannot guarantee a baby against dysentery when this disease exists in the neighborhood. Of 300 children from such homes, all under private medical care, thirty-seven per cent had dysentery in the first five years of life. In another group taken from the welfare clinic 72 per cent of the children had dysentery. These children came from poor houses, often overcrowded, generally ill ventilated. Screens and other means of controlling flies were generally lacking.

The important lesson for New Mexico to learn from these studies is that as long as we breed flies and do not keep away from sewage we too shall have this high death rate and higher sickness rate from dysentery. It is not enough that my own house is connected with a sewer or that my privy is flyproof. Less than ten per cent of New Mexico privies are fly-proof. My neighbor's children may run a bigger risk than mine but that will not comfort me much when there is still one chance in three that each of my children will suffer dysentery before he or she reaches the fifth birthday. 
