FSA Supervisor Wants List Of Farms For Sale

James S. McKnight, County Farm Security Administration supervisor, has invited landowners who have farms for sale in Callahan county to list them with him for consideration in the FSA's tenant purchase program.

"We make this request in order to get landowners with farms for sale together with farmers who want to buy their farms," Mr. McKnight said. "The FSA makes a loan for the entire purchase price of the land, which the new owners pays the former owner."

He explained that where additional improvements are needed on the land the FSA will in some instances include this amount in the loan. In general, loans are made for good farms of sufficient size and fertility to support a farm family in moderate comfort.

Farms are valued first by a committee of local farmers and secondly, by a technical appraiser. The FSA office, where farms for sale are to be listed, is located on the 3rd floor of the Courthouse Baird, Texas. The supervisor does not purport to act as agent for the owner in securing sale of his farm.

To Wheat Growers of Callahan County

As a wheat grower, you are well aware of the fact that farming is a gambling proposition. If you harvested a good crop this year, you will only have to think back a few years to the time when you were robbed of a year's income by drought, hail, insects, wind, or some of the other natural enemies which are continually gnawing on the farmer to make his business the hazardous proposition which it is. If you had crop insurance on your crop in either 1939 or 1940, you are well aware of the protection which this phase of the program offers and how it may absorb the shock of a crop failure. If you did not have an insurance contract, a large number of your neighbors did and can tell you from actual experience how this insurance contract gave them a lift when their crops failed.

If you knew of some improved method of preparation of the seed, bed, seed treatment, or a variety of whens which would increase your chances of making a crop, you would not hesitate to use these practices or to secure the better variety of seed. However all this extra effort and expense may go for naught if the weather plays you foul. A crop insurance contract with the Federal AllRisk Crop Insurance Corporation will protect your investment and guarantee you at least three-fourths of an average crop each year.

We have recently furnished you with the yield and premium rate for your farm and we are now writing applications on the 1941 crop. All applications must be filed before August 31. Therefore, it will be necessary that you act right away. You can secure this insurance without paying out any cash at the present time since the premium may be paid by deduction from some of your future benefit payments earned under the Agriculture Conservation Program.

We should like an opportunity to explain the program in detail and answer any questions which you might have. We hope, therefore, that you will call at the county office at your earliest opportunity, and, in no event, should you delay this visit until after August 31. If the weather brings you good luck this season you can well afford all-risk crop insurance; if it brings you bad luck, you cannot afford to be without it.

If it is not convenient for you to call at the county AAA office and you will drop me a card, I will be glad to send you policy to you for your signature.

Texas Bankers Make 804,000 Loans Totaling \$1,081,000,-000 In 1939

New York, Aug. 8.—Twenty-two per cent of the commercial banks in Texas made more than 804,000 loans totaling over \$1,017,000,000 to business firms and individuals throughout the state during the year 1939, according to the second semi-annual survey of banks lending activity of the American Bankers Association made public recently.

The survey, which was participated in by 191 banks or 22 per cent of the 840 commercial banks of the state, showed a definite expansion of bank credit in the field of new loans. The number of new loans made between July 31 and December 31 was 6,341 greater or 3 per cent greater, and the dollar volume of new loans made during this period was \$46,905,304 or 23 per cent greater than reported by an equivalent number of banks for the previous six months.

The 191 banks reported that during 1939 they made: 493,783 new loans totaling \$452,865,850 305,492 renewals of loans totaling 552,230,101 5,178 mortgage loans totaling 13,716,556 804,453 \$1,018,812,507

The survey reveals that business firms in the state are using only about half of the "open lines of credit" maintained for their use on the books of the banks. Twenty-four banks in the larger centers of the state reported that they carried on their books during half of the year \$49,681,550 in "open lines of credit" consisting of specific amounts of credit offered to and kept available for established borrowers for use as needed by them. Of this amount \$85,865,987 or 52.0 per cent was actually used.

The average number of new loans made per bank was 2,585 and the average new loan was \$917.

The average number of renewals per bank was 1,599 and the average renewal was for \$1,808.

The average number of mortgage loans per bank was 27 and the average mortgage was for \$2,649.

The Texas survey was part of a national bank lending activity survey made by the American Bankers Association.

For the country as a whole or 44 per cent of the commercial banks reported that they made 24,998,000 credit extensions totaling \$39,810,810,000 during the following:

12,680,000 new loans totaling \$23,120,000,000 12,003,000 renewals of loans totaling 15,791,000,000 285,000 new mortgage loans totaling 899,810,000

24,998,000 \$39,810,910,000 The number of new loans increased 10 per cent and the dollar volume increased 20 per cent.

Centers that have completed processing are; Enterprise, Clyde Midway, Eula, Zion Hill, Putnam, Cottonwood, and Cross Plains. Centers that have not completed are Oplin, Denton, and Union. Centers that will open are Dressey, Tecumseh, Admiral, Rowden, Baird, Ione, and Dudley.

A total of 470 mattresses have been processed and 211 more are

to be made.

A "Cotton Home" Federal agencies may exhibit their plans for every known use of cotton in an effort to raise America's standard of living, for both the 1 1/2 million producers and the 130 million cotton consumers, may result from current conversions in Washington.

This demonstration of cotton's contribution to the America standard of living is still in the preliminary stages, but its sponsors the National Cotton Council and agencies within the Department of Agriculture believe it will help cotton make a major advance into both industrial and household mass markets for cotton.

According to Mrs. Bernice Clayton, specialist in home improvement for the A and M. College Extension Service, such a house could have; cotton insulation; walls covered with cotton-reinforced concrete shingles; furnish ing including cotton rugs, drapes, shades and curtains, cotton upholstery and slip covers; cotton mattresses, blankets, spreads, sheets and pillowcases; cotton towels and bathmats, table and dishcloths; groceries packed in cotton bags; a larded stocked with cottonseed salad oil, margarine, and shortening; cotton clothes for the wardrobe closets.

A Jack and Jill Story How many miles is it from the house to the well on the average farm?

An engineer for the United States Department of Agriculture recently found that a farm woman who was born and who died on the same farm after an active 50 years of operating the place had been obliged to make an average of four trips a day from the house to the well to provide water for the household. The well was 20 feet from the house and was 10 feet lower, so that a walk down hill and up was necessary.

Th engineer calculated that during 50 years this woman had carried 7,000 barrels of water form the well to the house, had walked a distance equivalent to that form New York to San Francisco and back and had climbed up a distance equal to 100 trips up and down Pikes Peak.

Home Demonstration agents and other workers of the A and M College Extension Service are constantly urging farm people who are financially able to install home conveniences, providing they do not already have them. According to Mrs. Bernice Clayton, extension specialist in home improvement, there is no household labor-saving convenience of more value than a farm water system and sewage disposal. Literature on probably cost and how to install water systems is available from Extension Service.

Garrett Makes Bid To Return To Congress

By FINIS MOTHERHEAD Reporter-News Staff Writer EASTLAND, Aug. 5.—Clyde Garrett came home today to make his bid for re-election as congressman from the seventeenth district of Texas.

With scarcely a pause after arriving, he spoke tonight from the steps of the Eastland courthouse in which he occupied an office eight years as county judge.

Garrett, the only Texas congressman faced with a runoff, replied angrily to charges which he said opponents have made during his absence in Washington and the tenor of his remarks indicated the fur may yet fly before the second primary.

He did not arrive until 3 this afternoon. The Eastland congressman had flown to Fort Worth to be met by a delegation which accompanied him here.

From the time of his arrival, Garrett's unpretentious law offices hove the corner drug store hummed with activity. Studying a tentative schedule he promised to undertake a wearisome tour of the 12 West Central Texas counties in the seventeenth district in three weeks leave from congress.

Representative Garrett led off tonight with enunciation of a firm stand for defense spending. Scornfully and in considerable he denied accusations "I have done nothing for my district.

REVIEWS RECORD

His one-term record in the national capital he reviewed at some length, endorsing many of the new deal agencies which he said his vote had helped to create.

Garrett also reiterated a strong stand for old age pensions, preferably to be paid with federal funds, sniffed at charges "I am communistic", and made caustic reference to "my predecessor wanting to get on my present opponent's bandwagon."

Here for the rally was a delegation from Taylor county including the Bradshaw band directed by C. M. Watson. There also were Garrett campaign leaders from nearly every county in the district. They held a conference after the rally.

Appearing with the Bradshaw band in a near-battle of music was the Eastland high school band directed by Moreland Baldwin. Virgil Emberry, Eastland Attorney, introduced the congressman.

Homefolks overflowed a roped-off block of the street on the south side of the Eastland square to hear Garrett.

Preceding his talk with a five-minute transcription of his speech before the house of representatives to state his views on national defense. In that appearance he proposed to "match navy-for navy with all foreign powers on ocean for ocean" besought an adequate army and air force, and censured delay as dangerous.

Garrett referred disdainfully to mud-slinging by opponents in the first primary campaign, during which he remained in the capital and scorned the "whispering campaign" which he said had been waged against him.

"I have no apologies for my stand on old age pensions," he said of his vote for the Townsend pension measure, reminding that "I ran on a platform which included a pension plank and I was pledged to the best I could get."

"I felt that it was a step in the right direction. I knew it would not pass . . . had it passed it would have gone to the senate . . . and it would have come back with amendments in some workable form. . ."

Much of his address was devoted to personalities in which Garrett said his opponents had indulged.

He concluded with reassertion of his stand for further defense spending toward the goal of keeping the nation out of war.

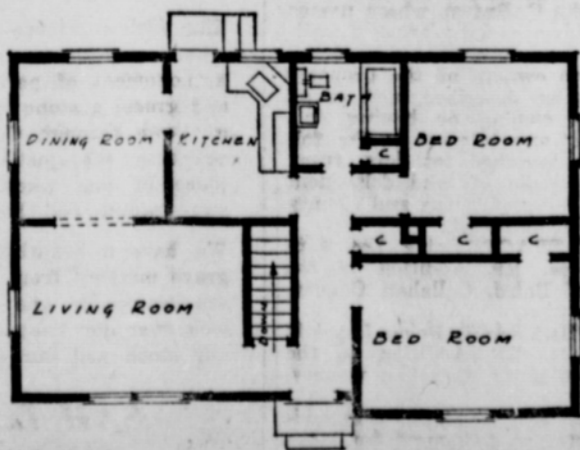

**Simple Design Necessary
For The Low Cost Home**

One of the biggest problems in designing the low cost house is the retention of a modest simplicity. It must be prevented from appearing too high off the ground, while the appearance of sitting in a hole is equally undesirable. Projection of the roof and height and shape of chimneys and cornices all should be treated with care. This 5-room house is of simple design and good proportions. Many architects feel that the hood over the entrance is unnecessary, but this feature would not likely cause much variance in either the cost or marketability of the home. This home has a half basement in which the heating plant is located. Valued at \$3,000, this home could be financed with a mortgage of \$2,700 insured by the Federal Housing Administration. Monthly payments over a 25-year period would average about \$16, excluding taxes and hazard insurance.

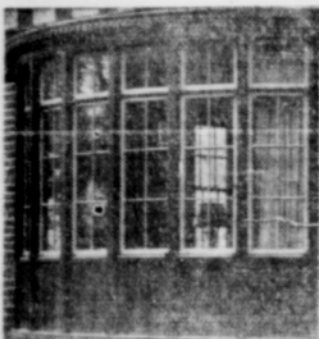
EVERY HOME IS BUILT AROUND ITS WINDOWS

Sponsor of Famous World's Fair Home Points Out Importance of Good Windows

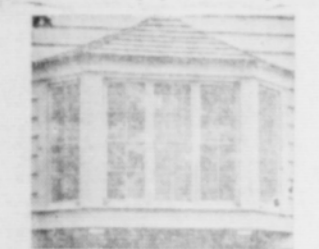

New York City — Few people, when they build a new home, seem to realize the importance of windows. Yet every home is built around them. This is literally true in two different ways. First, the frame of your house is actually built around its window openings. Take a look at a home under construction some time. Notice how the framing timbers around every window opening are doubled.

Windows Determine Wall Space

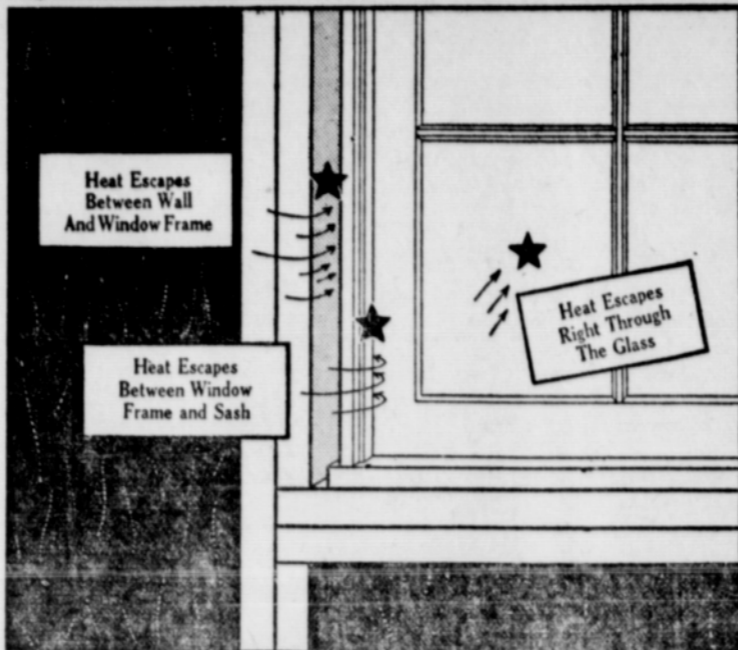
Second, the arrangement of your rooms, the arrangement of your furniture, is all done around the windows. Available wall space is largely determined by windows. On the outside the architectural harmony is largely determined by the placing or grouping of windows.

Thus you see how important windows are just from appearance alone. But appearance, important as it is, is only half of the story. Here are some of the other things that a good window should do:

Keep cold air out. Keep warm air in. Keep cool air in. Keep hot air out. Keep insects out. Keep dirt and dust out. Work freely under all conditions without rattling. Provide ventilation when open. Be watertight when closed. Let light in. Give clear vision out. Add beauty to your home. Harmonize with your style of architecture.

No other architectural feature in a house must perform so many functions.

WALLS IN HOME ONLY PART OF INSULATION PROBLEM

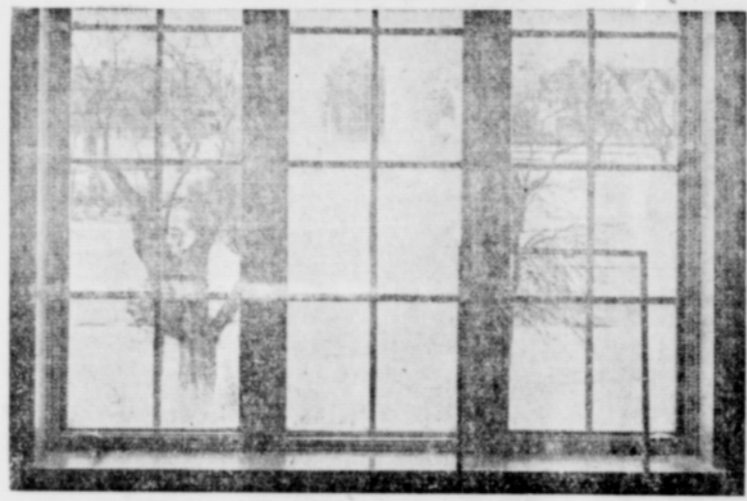


Many a home is being built today that is only half insulated. Yet the man who is spending his money to build the house doesn't know a thing about it. These people, when they build, won't hesitate to spend \$150 to \$200 to make their walls weather-tight. They will buy the best insulation, the best moisture barrier, and use the best construction methods, but they overlook completely the fact that the walls of their homes have from ten to thirty great big holes in them that are filled only with windows.

These holes must be filled with good windows—windows that do more than harmonize with the architecture of the home. For a window is not only an architectural feature. It is also a mechanical feature.

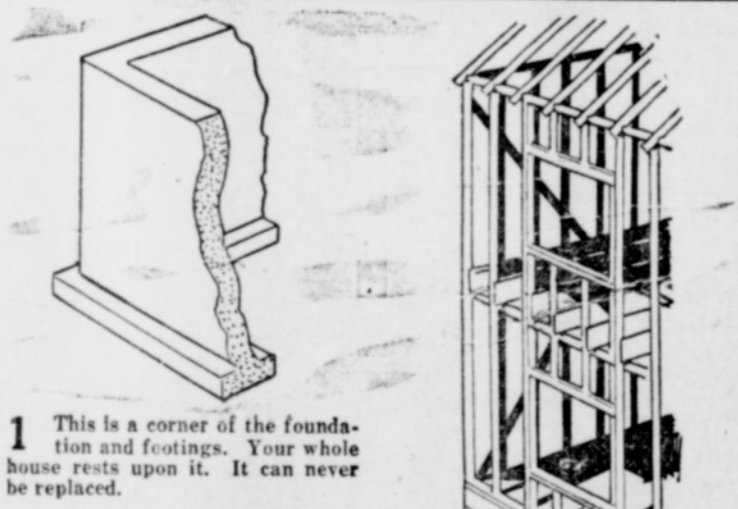
Windows are just as permanent a part of the wall as insulation. Just as it is wise to spend those extra dollars for insulation—so it is wise to spend a few extra dollars to see that a window frame makes a permanent weather-tight joint with the wall, that window sash are precision fitted to the frame, that an efficient job of weatherstripping is done, that storm sash or double glazing is provided, and that the operating equipment used will give a lifetime of trouble-free operation.

WINDOW FOGGING CONTROLLED BY DOUBLE GLASS



Here is one way to control that annoying fogging and condensation on the windows in your new home. Shown here are three casement windows. Notice that two of them are entirely clear because of inside double glazing. The other window has had the inside double glazing removed, with the result that it is fogged up almost immediately. When this picture was taken, the inside room temperature was 71 degrees, while outside, the thermometer stood at 15 degrees above zero.

DON'T NEGLECT FUNDAMENTALS IN YOUR NEW HOME



1 This is a corner of the foundation and footings. Your whole house rests upon it. It can never be replaced.

2 This is the same foundation with timber skeleton now in place. Again here is a part of your home that can never be replaced.

3 Here is a rough window opening from the inside. Notice how the framing members are doubled all around the opening. Dark shaded portions show insulation in place between the studs.

Are you building a house for the first time? Then chances are you are in kind of a daze. There are so many things to decide, so many things to buy, so many more things you just can't buy because there is just so much money. Now there's nothing less glamorous than the concrete footings and foundation. One doesn't show them off to one's friends, but if you skimp on either, you'll be busy for years to come trying to cover up cracked walls that all your friends will see.

Don't Skimp On Framework

Likewise the timber skeleton or frame of your house is going to be all covered up, but if you skimp on it you'll have sagging floors that squeak at every step.

And how about those great big holes in the wall, the rough window openings. You can buy win-

dows and window frames to fill these holes pretty cheap. And you'll pay for them for years to come in heat lost, drafty floors and wet walls. Or, you can buy carefully designed, precision built and factory fitted windows and window frames complete with weatherstrip that will be a joy and a comfort every year that you live in your house. Yes, and you'll find that the extra cost was money well spent because of heat bills, repair bills and redecorating bills saved.

Good windows are a permanent part of your walls. They protect your investment in insulation and quality construction. Any home without weathertight windows is only one-half insulated. So when you build, get down to fundamentals. Always remember—you can add the gadgets any time, but you can't replace footings or timbers or windows. They've got to be good right from the start.
