#### POTENTIAL RECREATION SPOT AT OUR DOOR

Artesia-and the whole Pecos Valley, as far as that goes-has overlooked for a number of years one of the greatest recreation spots readily available

Lake McMillan, except for those who fished there and the few who had boats, might as well have been many miles away. It serves the one purpose-irrigation-but it can just as well serve two.

In a desert country where water in any quantity is quite a rarity, a lake the size of McMillan is appreciated. But just having it and knowing it is there is quite different from enjoying it to the greatest

Although more attention has been given McMillan the last year or two, the formation of the Pecos Valley Boat Club in recent weeks a. has made the people of the valley lake-conscious. Many persons were there Sunday to see the races who never before had been to the lake.

Anyone mingling with the crowd Sunday was sure to hear many remarks about the potentialities of McMillan as a recreation spot, and people who never before had taken any interest wondered why someone had not "done something about it."

Attempts have been made before, but all failed.

Now, with the current start by the boat enthusiasts and those who

have become interested, it would be a shame to let the thing be for-

Already there is one boating pier there, built a few weeks ago by members of the embryo club. We know of another improvement, 8 p. m. which will be of great public interest-or should be-to be made in the near future. But we are not at liberty to disclose it as yet. And 8 p. m. others are talking about more piers, a sandy beach for swimming and the possibility of building cabins. Then too there is talk of planting trees for shade and providing picnic places.

All of these things will come to be if the general public, those desert people who love picnics, will follow up on what already has been started.

#### FOR FAIR REPRESENTATION

There is a peculiar situation in the nineteenth district of the State House of Representatives, which calls for consideration of all voters evening, 7:30 p. m. who wish to be fair.

In the district are Eddy and Lea Counties, from which two repreatives are to be elected at large.

As the counties compare favorably in size, there is quite a possibility that one each Democratic candidate will be nominated from

each county, but there is no such assurance. In the present campaign there are two Democratic candidates from Eddy County and two from Lea County and voters will vote for two, using their own judgment if they are versed on what they are doing. But if they are like so many electors, they will vote for the two study, Wednesday, 7:30 p. m. candidates residing in their own counties without further thought, nor considering the respective qualifications of the men whose names will days.

We are certain the average citizen of either county wishes to be fair and see to it that each county has representation. Prior to the primary system the county central committees of the two counties nominated a candidate each to represent the Democratic party at the general election. But now it is up to the party members from the two counties to name two. And just as likely as not both could live in the same county-either Eddy or Lea.

We believe that if electors will choose between the two candidates in Eddy County and vote for one and then choose between the two from Lea County and again vote for one, this district will have strong representation with both counties having a resident in the House. For surely by everyone doing that, the weaker candidate from each county will be eliminated and both Lea and Eddv will have a man on the party's ticket in November.

## WHAT HIGHWAY 83 TO WEST MEANS

Soon all of Southeast New Mexico will have a good outlet across and knowledge to them that know the mountains, thanks to the promise of Governor Miles-who keeps his promises-and the mountain people and those beyond will have an equally good outlet to Southeast New Mexico and to the East.

The news that the governor has sanctioned the improvement of Highway 83 for twenty-three miles, starting at Hope and continuing west, is of great interest.
