Receiving the Danforth "I Dare You" award which is the second highest award a 4-H member can receive were Courtney Tanksley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Tanksley and Marianne Toombs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Toombs.

A very special award was presented to a person who has always been interested in the growth and development of young people.

Her first career was as a Home Economics teacher. She moved to Muleshoe with her husband in 1945, just after the war. She has worked with her husband over the years as an active supporter in whatever he was doing.

He personally attributes her with representing Bailey County for many years in 4-H work and in gathering individual items for the people of the county and taking them to show in the Tri-State Fair at Amarillo and the South Plains Fair at Lubbock.

She has worked with 4-H'ers in many projects over the years, and has prepared the annual 4-H banquet meals for Bailey County for the past 20 plus years, but because of a back condition, which has set her back for awhile, she has retired for the present from this job.

Teachers, Students Talk About School News Change

Change is inevitable - even in Muleshoe.

On September 23, 1966, Muleshoe High's student news

publication "*The Mules Tale*" made its first appearance in the *Bailey County Journal*. On May 4, 1989, it made its last appearance.

"*The Mule's Tale*" page offered the community stories about the school, the teachers and the students. These stories were written by students of Muleshoe High School.

This page offered spotlights on the clubs, athletic teams, new teachers and special events. It also gave a calendar of events which listed upcoming high school events.

Mrs. Hellen Adrian and Mrs. Pat Watson, sponsors of the annual staff which wrote the stories, said the page was ended so that all of the Muleshoe media could receive the same news in the same format on the same day.

They said the decision to end the "*Mule's Tale*" page was approved by former principal Wayland Ethridge in the spring, and then again by new principal, Dr. David Wyer before school started.

"The hour we have 'annual' was neither convenient for the radio or TV station," Mrs.

Watson said. "The best thing we could do to make it fair for all media-was to send our news in outline form to all media the same day."

Mrs. Adrian said, "By going to all of the media, we have broader coverage of school events."

Reactions of the teachers were mixed.

Mrs. Barbara Milburn, high school librarian, said, "I have enjoyed reading it, but it's only fair to all news media to have equal news."

Mrs. Johanna Wrinkle, vocabulary and senior English teacher, said, "I feel that since we have two newspapers, a radio station and a TV station, it is only fair that the same news be given to all."

Foreign language and speech teacher, Jonn Gulley, said, "I can understand why the school did this because if you don't give all the news media the same news, you're accused of playing favorites. I don't think doing away with it was the best option. The four media should communicate with each other and the school."

Kerry Moore, theater and English teacher, said, "A news-

paper which has carried the page for 23 years should not be penalized because of other media. We are denying our

students a journalistic chance to write and communicate."

Pecan Seminar Set At Midland

The seventh annual Permian Basin Pecan Seminar and Trade Show will be held at Midland College October 28, 1989. This seminar is cooperatively sponsored by the Ector and Midland County Pecan Committees and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The seminar will feature speakers from across the state

and will deal with the everyday problems facing people who are growing pecans. There will be concurrent sessions. One session will deal with orchard management for the small and large commercial grower. The other session will address the things a homeowner or gardener with a tree or two needs to know to maintain a healthy shade tree and produce good quality pecans. Topics will include pecan grading, basic tree management, pecan marketing, stretching your irrigation water and other timely subjects.

There will be a \$12.00 preregistration fee per family with a \$5.00 fee for each additional family member, or a \$15.00 late registration fee. Registration is included at the barbecue lunch to be served at the college. Contact your local County Agents for further details on this seminar.

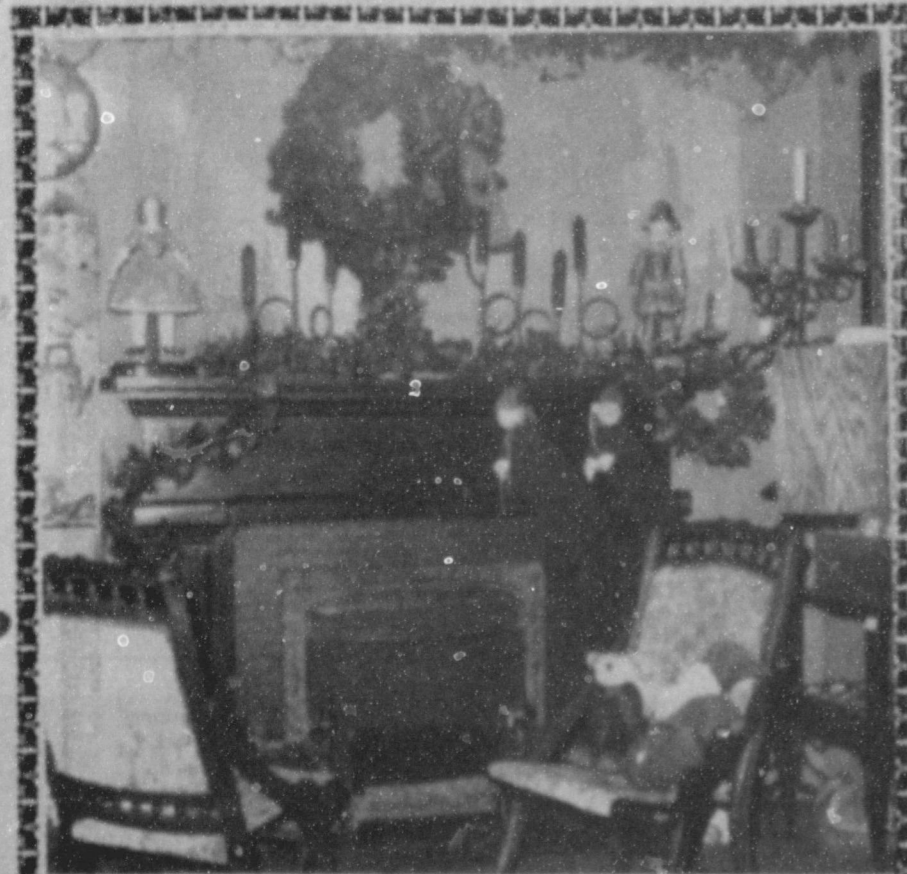

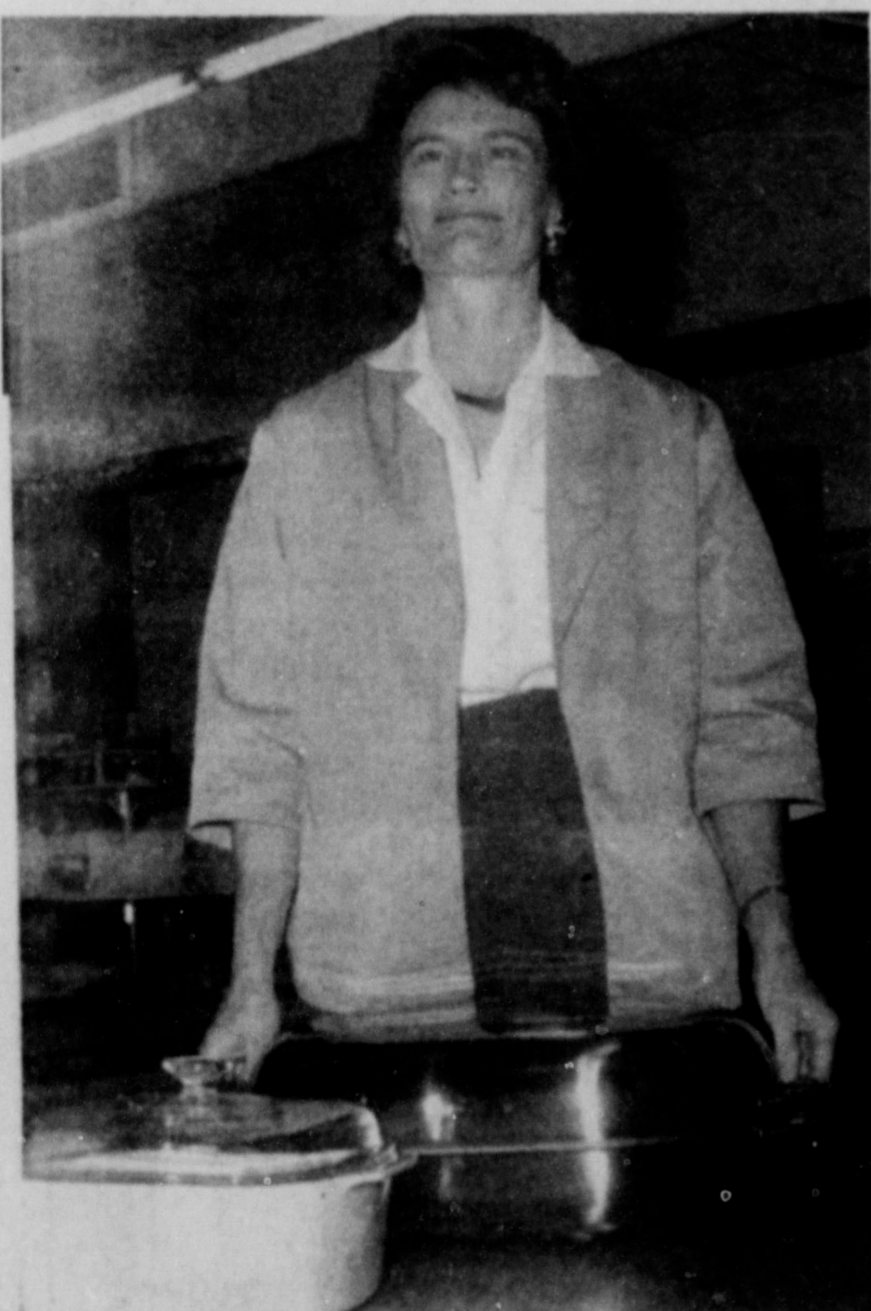

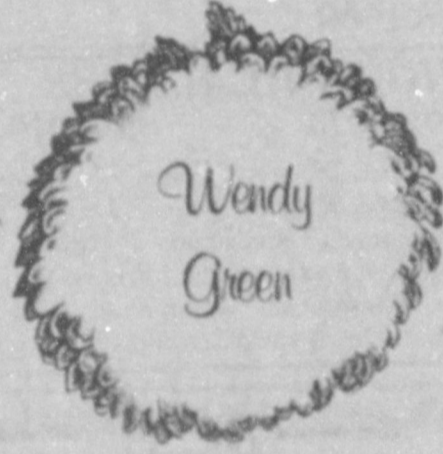
