January cattle on feed down from last year

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.68 million head on Jan. 1, down four percent from a year ago.

According to the Punch down and roll monthly report released three percent from the Dec. 1 level. Producers placed 350,000 head in commercial feedlots during December, down 14 percent from a year ago, and down 23 percent from the November 2009 total.

> Texas commercial feeders marketed 410,000 head during December, up one percent from both last year and last month.

On Jan. 1, there were 2.28 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the Northern High Plains, 85 percent of the state's total.

The number on feed across the area was down three percent from last year and down three percent from the December total.

December placements in the Northern High Plains totaled 292,000 head, down 24 percent from the November total. Marketings were up two percent from last month to 352,000 head.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United States in feedlots with a capacity of 1.000 head or more totaled 11.0 million head on Jan. 1, 2010. This inventory was two percent below Jan. 1, 2009.

Placements in feedlots during December totaled 1.55 million head, six percent below December 2008. December placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds totaled 430,000head; 600-699 pounds totaled 420,000 head; 700-799 pounds totaled 401,000 head; 800 pounds and greater totaled 295,000 head.






