The First National Bank of Ar tesia has been designated the argest depository for excess publie funds in Eddy County, L. B. Feather, vice - president of the bank, said today.

The American Bank of Carlsbad is the designated depository for active county funds, but inactive funds are divided among the other banks in the county on the bass of the bank's capital and sur-

The First National, with a captal and surplus of \$600,000 is to eccive the lion's share of these unds, or 37.5 per cent of the toal, as a result of a visit here yesterday by the county treasurer Feather said.

The First National Bank ranks bout fifth or sixth in the state as a depository for public funds, based on the bank's capital and sur-

The second highest depository in Eddy County is the Carlsbad National Bank, with a capital and surplus of \$500,000, and recipient of 31.25 per cent of the excess ounty funds.

The administration leaders who have watched Mr. Eisenhower presiding over Cabinet and National Security Council meetings at Camp David, Md., are increasingly hopeful that the President will be both willing and able to announce that he will accept re-nomination. This optimism is based on Ike's evident vitality, buoyancy and incisive grasp of the problems which, in ever-growing number, are being taken to him for executive decisions.

• RETIREMENT-Regardless of the actual results next November, a far-reaching shakeup of Congress is already in sight. Five legislators already have announced their intention of retiring from politicsan unusually high number this far in advance of the balloting.

Two highly influential House veterans are bowing out. They are James P. Richards (D), South Carolina, foreign affairs committee chairman, and Rep. Clifford Hope (R), Kansas, senior GOP member and former chairman of the agriculture committee.

In addition, two promising younger members are quitting. Rep. Oliver Bolton (R), Ohio, who suffered a heart attack last spring, and Rep. Sherman Crumpacker (R), Indiana, have announced they will not seek re-election.

Thus far, one senator has announced he is leaving the political arena. He is Alan Bible (D), Nevada, who was elected to fill the vacancy created by the death of Pat McCarran. Bible's decision to retire came as a surprise, and is expected to set off a scramble for the job.







It Is Not Too Early

NEXT YEAR'S political campaign in our state is now under-way:

Not only have several candidates already announced they will seek the nomination from their party but several other. have indicated they might run or they would like to run.

In some instances those who have announced are the choice of their party leaders, although in theory the party is not supposed to have any candidates until after the primary election is held.

In other cases the candidates have announced because they desire to seek the office or because their friends have urged them to seek a public office.

As we have pointed out many times the taxpayers and the voters are not only going to elect these candidates. are successful, to office but they are going to pay their salaries they are going to provide the funds for the operation of their offices; and they are going to be the people for whom the public official is going to work.

It is definitely the right and privilege of the citizens, th taxpayers and the voters in every section of this state have a choice in the candidates seeking public office. The fact is it would be far better for us as a state and as a nation if the public officials were the choice of the people rather than the choice of the political parties

Parties are interested in winning. That means they are not always as interested as they should be in the best qualified individual being elected to public office.

But for years we have let the political parties pick the candidates. In some instances these plans are worked out over three or four years and the party has plans over a considerable period of time as to just which one of their numbers is to run for such and such an office.


We as citizens, voters and taxpayers should take a greater interest in the candidates who announce for office; we should take a greater interest in the primary elections and the nominees named; and in the general elections and the nominees elected.

There will be a better qualified public official elected to office to serve the people when the people take a sincere and genuine interest in the elections, in politics and in governmental affairs.


