Free adult education classes are being offered at Watson Junior High School from 7 to 9:30 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday nights in rooms 15 and 17.

Many subjects are being offered, such as reading, math, writing, English, science and government. Also, computer classes, family finance and English - as - a - second language classes are being taught.

Tom Boutell, adult education instructor, said, "The most important thing about these classes is that we work with each student on an individual level, they do what they can and come to class at their convenience."

Classes are on a continuous basis. Students can sign up anytime and work at their own speed and on an individual level. If classes are missed, students are allowed to pick up where they left off.

The purchase of class supplies are not necessary. Books and workbooks are provided for students.

This program is designed to offer more than just an achievement of a certificate of high school equivalency in English or Spanish, it is designed to improve a student's self confidence. The program helps a student qualify for a job promotion and become a more efficient consumer and more active citizen.

"We are here to help in all subjects. We can help people with driver's tests, college entry exams and anything else that a person might need help with," Boutell said.

Toast To Texas And Patriotic Salute Solemn, Impressive

Cold, dusty wind forced the Second Annual 'Toast To Texas' and first 'Patriotic Salute' indoors Saturday, but a large crowd attended the ceremonies at the Muleshoe High School auditorium.

From the youngest Cub Scout to the white-haired grandparents present, it was an awe-inspiring and solemn ceremony.

Robert Montgomery, president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, acted as master of ceremonies.

He welcomed the people to the celebration, and asked the audience to stand, while four Air Force men from Cannon Air Force Base, conducted a precision drill as they posted the colors -- the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

Rev. Gerald Gladden, pastor of Richland Hills Baptist Church gave the invocation before Hugh Young, VFW, led the pledge to the American Flag and to the Texas Flag.

Muleshoe Mayor Darrell Turner lifted a cup of water high as he led the Toast To Texas Independence.

A brief history of Texas was given by Nancy Kidd, manager

of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

An exuberant group of second graders from Dillman Elementary School, led by Jo Jinks, gave renditions of *Texas, Our Texas, Come To Texas* and *I'm a Texan*.

Closing out the Toast To Texas was Mary Ann Ramirez, president of the Jennyslippers.

Robert Montgomery then led the second portion of the program, *A Patriotic Salute To Our Armed Forces*.

This time, Rev. Dale Berry, pastor of the Trinity Baptist Church, gave the invocation.

Hugh Young again led the pledge to the American Flag, as members of both the Muleshoe Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts stood in front of the stage.

You're A Grand Old Flag, Battle Hymn of the Republic and America were performed by the second grade choir, followed by a heart-rending presentation of *God Bless the U.S.A.* by Dawn Branscum.

Following an impressive list of accomplishments in an introduction by Montgomery, guest speaker was Lt. Col. Mark F.

Richardson, Commander, 428th Tactical Fighter Training Squadron, Cannon AFB, Clovis.

Col. Richardson said, "As the world watched, the United Coalition took an overwhelming victory over Iraq in the Persian Gulf. Our men and women served with pride. Events of this past week have shown the great ability of the United States.

"Iraq was unable to see this wisdom, and paid very dearly for this miscalculation."

He added, "Freedom!! A word that embodies the very soul of this nation. It is the single attribute most associated with America.

"Freedom doesn't come cheap, but comes with blood and tears, nourished with pride and commitment."

Col. Richardson said, "We have pride in our country and in our freedom. The commitment of those in uniform shows their dedication to duty and to their country. We all take great pride in our military personnel.

Trustees Recognize Two High School Teachers

Leigh Mires of Region XVII Education Service Center, met with trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District on Monday night to discuss a new program being implemented by the Service Center.

This program would enhance current programs on "Drug Abuse" now being conducted in the MISD. She said the Muleshoe Schools are currently involved on different levels of the program, as she explained the new program.

It is called *Preparing for the Drug Free Years* -- and is a program especially designed for parents.

Ms. Mires explained that the proposed program would be "A program to reduce the family risk factors for drug abuse, and strengthen family bonds."

It would involve training at least two people in the MISD to teach parents how to identify risk factors for drug abuse, while becoming closer, and bonding with their children.

Connie Kenmore of DeShazo School is local coordinator for the new program. At this time, the program has been implemented at Crosbyton, Matador, Seminole, Spur, Tahoka and Post. Muleshoe will be among the six different communities to be expanded during the 1991-92 school year.

She said, "The *Preparing for the Drug [Free] Years* program is targeted to parents of upper elementary school students.

"Each school district will serve as the lead agency for implementation of the program in their respective communities. Two parent educators will be selected from each community, who will be responsible for coordination, recruitment, and teaching of the actual workshop sessions.

"The parent educators will be compensated monetarily for the training they receive as well as for the workshop sessions they teach."

The speaker also said all materials needed to teach the program will be provided free-of-charge by the service center. Funding for child care during the workshop sessions will also be provided.

Ms. Mires did say the program is not designed to help people whose families are already in a "crisis" situation.

Superintendent Bill Moore added, "This will give parents

the opportunity to work with their children."

Following some discussion, the board unanimously approved the new program.

Before the business portion of the meeting got underway, Superintendent Moore and the Board President Cindy Purdy, officially recognized Johanna Wrinkle and Pat Watson, educators from MHS.

Superintendent Moore said that for four years in a row, the two teachers have been chosen to present a workshop in Houston. He said that from over 200 proposals, they (Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Wrinkle) were chosen.

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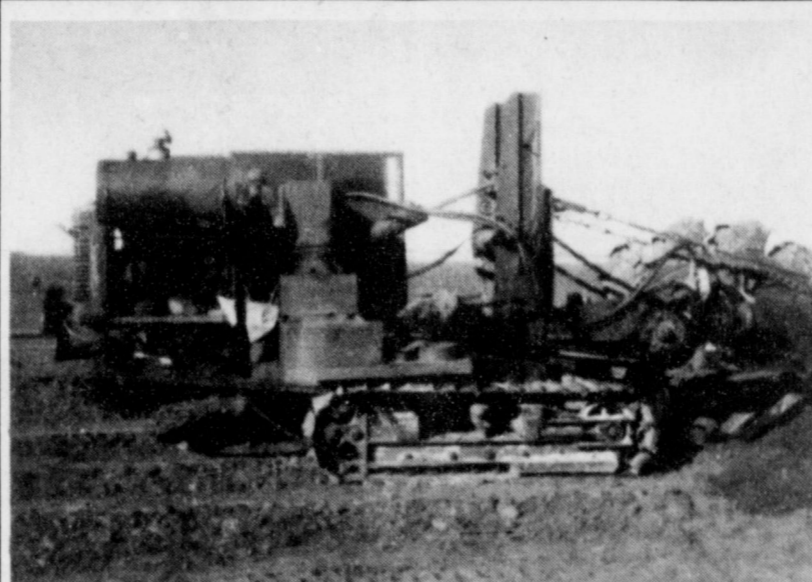

Two had birthdays, Eva Ashford and Sherman Inman.

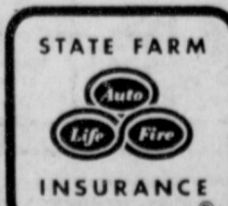

The weather man hung up another record here the past week. Rain actually fell in great quantities. Beginning before daylight Saturday morning, it rained all day to the amount of .94 of an inch. Meats, Fish, Frozen Foods Among Best March Buys

Texas consumers will find some supermarket discounts on meats, fish and frozen foods in March, but higher fuel costs stemming from the Persian Gulf War will continue to impact some food prices.

Dr. Dick Edwards, a food marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the fuel surcharge imposed by trucking companies several months ago means higher costs for imported and certain other foods at checkout counters.

But some new produce items, including strawberries, will be arriving at markets in March as a reminder that spring and its fresh fruits and vegetables are very near, Edwards said.

"March is National Frozen Food Month, and special sales with coupons will be in progress every week," Edwards said. "Some fish products will be discounted during Lent, and beef and pork prices will continue to favor consumers at the beginning of the month. Poultry prices also will remain attractive."

Frozen foods discounted in March will include desserts and toppings, vegetables, breads, pizza, juices and breakfast items, he said.

Orange juice prices continue to drop, driven by the California freeze that caused frozen fruit to be diverted into juice. Also, the price of imported concentrate from Brazil has been reduced, resulting in some chilled juice sales each week."

March marks the end of winter weather, and large numbers of strawberries will appear in produce sections, Edwards said.

"The Florida strawberry crop will be in full swing by mid-month, and large supplies mean that prices will be down around 39 to 49 cents a pint," he predicted.

A hint of better things to come, he said, will be arrival of first shipments of domestic cantaloupes and honeydew melons. Also making spring appearances will be pineapples, zucchini, yellow squash and green beans.

"Many winter produce items will continue to be advertised, with grapefruit the best buy," Edwards said. "Although the winter freeze reduced California's crop, the Florida crop is well above average both in quality and quantity."

Fresh vegetables that will be on sale, Edwards said, are broccoli, brussels sprouts, cucumbers, egg plant, bell peppers, tomatoes and green peas. Apples, pears and potatoes also will be marked down.

Consumers have been enjoying lower beef prices as a result of an oversupply of fed cattle during the past three months.

"But in March red meat prices will begin creeping upward, and pork prices traditionally follow," Edwards said. "Poultry prices, however, will moderate much of a rise in beef prices."

Turkeys will be heavily advertised as an alternative to ham and beef for Easter dinner, he said.

"Prices ranging from 59 to 69 cents a pound can be expected for turkeys," Edwards said. Steaks--sirloin, round and cubed--will be discounted. Pork sales will be on loins, chops and sausage.

Expect sales on domestic catfish and the more expensive orange roughy, Edwards said.

Many supermarkets are planning promotional sales around three March observances: St. Patrick's Day on March 17, Passover on March 30 and Easter, March 31.

Products on sale for St. Patrick's Day will include cabbage, split pea soup and the fixings for Reuben sandwiches: corned beef, sauerkraut, rye bread and swiss cheese. To compete with Irish beers at this time, American brewers will have green cans and discounted prices.

"Easter promotions all month will feature such Lenten items as seafood, pasta and cheeses," Edwards said.

Retailers will provide discounts on several food items for Passover, including wines, matzos, herring in sour cream, gefilte fish and a host of other kosher products.

Convention delegates also were treated to a "Dancing Through the Decades" dinner and dance, which featured songs and costumes from 1900 to 1990.

All payments will be paid in cash. ASCS hopes to have all payments made within the next three weeks.

CRP SIGNUP

Signup for the 10th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) began March 4, 1991, and will continue through March 15, 1991. Bailey County will be accepting bids for windbreaks and shelterbelts (Trees only). In addition with this signup for trees, owners must give an easement for a period of 30 years. If you are interested in this practice, please contact the ASCS office by no later than March 15, 1991.

PERSON DETERMINATION/ ACTIVELY ENGAGED

All operators and owners must have a "Person Determination" and "Actively Engaged in Farming" determination on file each year to be eligible for program payments.

To be determined "Actively Engaged in Farming" a producer must contribute in two separate ways.

On one hand, they must contribute capital, equipment, or land; on the other hand, they must contribute labor and/or management.

Landowners only are exempt from this provision.

Change: For 1991, a spouse may be considered a separate person for payment limitation purposes if all requirements for a separate person are met and neither the husband or wife has an interest in any other operation (10 percent or more) earning payments.

This provision does not mean a spouse will automatically qualify. Please contact the ASCS office for further information. The final status date for all person determinations is May 1, 1991.

INTEREST RATE

The loan interest rate for March is 6.375 percent.

PRICE SUPPORT

The final date for obtaining price support loans on 1990 crops are as follows: Wheat, Barley, Oats, and Rye - March 31, 1991; Corn, Gr. Sorg., Soybeans and Cotton - May 31, 1991.

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Area People Have Unclaimed

Money, Property

State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison held a Capitol press conference on Friday, March 1, to announce that 110,000 Texans have \$90 million in lost or forgotten money that she hopes to return to the rightful owners.

The 110,000 names are printed in the 1991 version of the Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund list that was published statewide on Sunday, March 3 in 30 Texas newspapers, including both the *Lubbock Avalanche-Journal* and the *Amarillo Daily News*.

"It's the time of year when I can deliver good news to thousands of people across our great state," said Mrs. Hutchison, Texas' chief investments and financial officer.

Mrs. Hutchison, who took office on Jan. 2, said one of the highest priorities of her administration "is to reunite as many Texans as possible with their unclaimed or abandoned property."

The Treasury uses the statewide publication, a public service television campaign and other promotional methods to locate owners of unclaimed money and property.

The list includes the names of people owed \$50 or more with the largest account this year being about \$240,000. The owners of unclaimed safe deposit boxes and stock are listed regardless of value. Over the years, the Treasury has helped reunite more than 170,000 owners or heirs with unclaimed, lost or abandoned property.

The toll-free line opened at noon on Sunday, March 3 and will remain open until 8 p.m. that day. From Monday, March 4 through Friday, April 5, the telephone hours will be from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. Beginning Monday, April 8, the hours will be from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m.

"The Treasury staff stands ready, willing and able to help you submit a claim," Mrs. Hutchison said. "It's important to emphasize, though, that there is no deadline to make a claim on these accounts. Your money or property will be waiting for you whenever you claim it."

During the first few weeks after the list is published, the toll-free line often is tied up with phone calls, said Sarah Marlow, director of the Treasury's Unclaimed Property division.

"If the line is busy, please try again. If you are asked to hold, please be patient," Mrs. Marlow said. "A telephone operator will answer your call as soon as possible. The important thing to remember is that it is never too late to claim your money."

Accounts on the unclaimed property list range from checking and savings accounts to utility deposits, from oil royalties to stocks, Mrs. Hutchison said. Most accounts must be dormant from three to five years before they are turned over to the state. The Treasury acts as custodian until the unclaimed property is claimed by the rightful owner or heir.

Money that is not claimed by owners is used by the state for education and general state

services such as highways and law enforcement. Last year, for example, about \$55 million in revenue was turned over to the Foundation School Fund and the General Revenue Fund.
