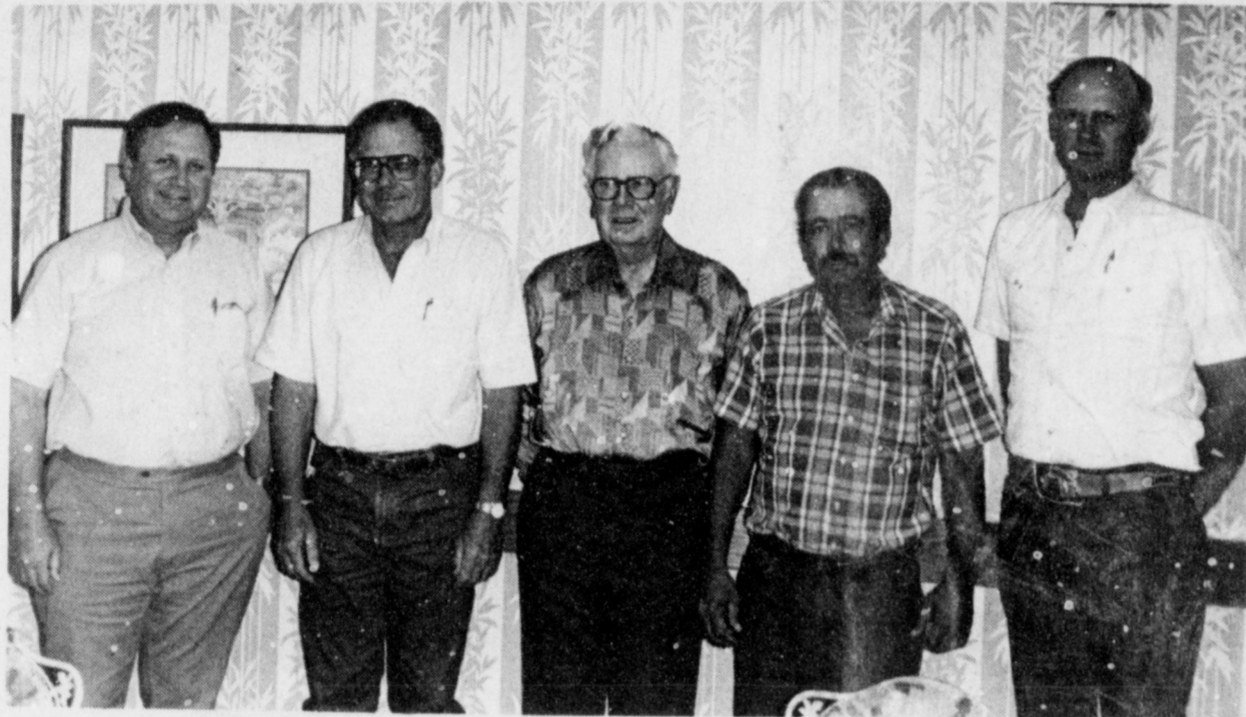

Hospital Board Takes Oath

The Muleshoe Hospital Board met Thursday, May 23 in the dining room of the hospital. Minutes of the last meeting were approved as read.

The first item of business on the agenda was the canvassing of votes in the recent election. Members of the hospital board include: Bob Finny, Tim Campbell, Vance Wagnon, Raul Trevino, and Darrell Jennings.

Marilyn Cox, County Judge, met with the board and administered the oath of office to the board members.

Election of officers was held: Tim Campbell was re-elected to president. Other officers include: Darrell Jennings, vice president and Bob Finny, secretary.

Richard Murphy, administrator, stated that he had employed a collector, who has 10 years experience in this line of work. She is from Seminole.

He also stated that the hospital is now on Electronic Billing with Medicare. The electric billing is designed to turn money over quicker.

The group also discussed Workman's Comp.

Murphy also informed the group that "everything is free and clear of the IRS lean. He also stated that FmHA will fund money for existing outstanding debts, to catch up to date, and will release all leans. The hospital attorney paid the filing fee.

The group voted to purchase

counter for the lab and lease Microbiology equipment for the lab. The board voted to take bids on a birthing bed for the OB room.

Another item of business on the agenda was sick leave. They voted to pay sick leave on the first day instead of the third day as was previously done.

Murphy stated that as of January 1992, to be licensed, the hospital must be smoke free and he recommended adopting a smoke free policy by July 1.

"I have sent in a grant application" added Murphy. "This is a three year grant of 50,000 a year totaling 150,000, of course there is no guarantee will get it," he added. We should know by the end of August or the first of September. "The grant comes from the Health Care Financing Administration and is to be used to become a Rural Health Care Clinic."

With no further general business, the group went into executive session.

Tailwater Concerns Water Conservation

Approximately 1,444 tailwater return pits and 1,289 modified playa basins are currently being used to capture irrigation tailwater and rainfall runoff for reuse within the 5.5 million acre High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area, according to a recent District inventory.

Deaf Smith County leads the Water District with 451 tailwater return pits, followed by Parmer County with 338 and Castro County with 309.

There are approximately 300 modified playa basins in Floyd County. Castro County follows with 263 modified playas and Parmer County with 186.

Excess irrigation water, or "tailwater," running off the end of a field has been a serious concern of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 since its creation in 1951. The primary cause of tailwater where furrow runs in excess of about one-half mile which required large flow rates to literally "push" the water through the furrows.

In the mid-1960s, the Water District constructed V-notch weirs and placed them in county bar ditches to measure actual tailwater losses. Flood gauges

installed in front of the weirs measured the height of the water flowing through the weir. Signs showing the conversion of the inches of water passing through the weirs into gallons per minute were placed beside each installation.

The District's study concluded that as much as 20 percent of the volume of water pumped by an irrigator could be lost as irrigation tailwater. In addition, it was discovered that tailwater waste encouraged soil erosion.

Since then, The District has actively promoted the use of tailwater return systems to stop accumulation of silt in bar ditches, flooding of county roads, damage to neighboring fields, and to conserve precious groundwater resources.

The Water District designed and constructed several tailwater return demonstration systems in the 1960s. Public tours of these demonstration systems was one method used by the District to promote the adoption of this water conservation technique. The positive results obtained from these first tailwater return pit installations convinced many irrigators to





KENW TV To Hold Tele-Auction

More than 1,300 items will be featured this year on KENW-TV's Tele-Auction. The annual Public Television fundraiser will be broadcast live June 2-8 from Channel 3's studios in Portales and is expected to generate approximately \$50,000.

Although station representatives report the Auction will "sell something for everyone," the seven-day event will also feature a number of deluxe items that range from a cellular phone to eight days in Miami, Fla. Other Auction merchandise includes a fur coat, three-piece

wicker china cabinet, Winchester 101 shotgun, diamond ring and 24 gift certificates to Cattle Baron Restaurant. In addition to general merchandise, approximately 100 pieces of art and 67 vacation packages have also been donated.

In past years, artwork has been included as part of the general merchandise and featured throughout Auction Week. Due, however, to suggestions from local art collectors that all Auction art be sold at the same time, Auction '91 will feature a special art sale on Sunday, June

2, from 1-5 p.m. The Auction will continue throughout the week, airing weeknights from 7-11 p.m. Saturday's Auction hours will be from 5-11 p.m.

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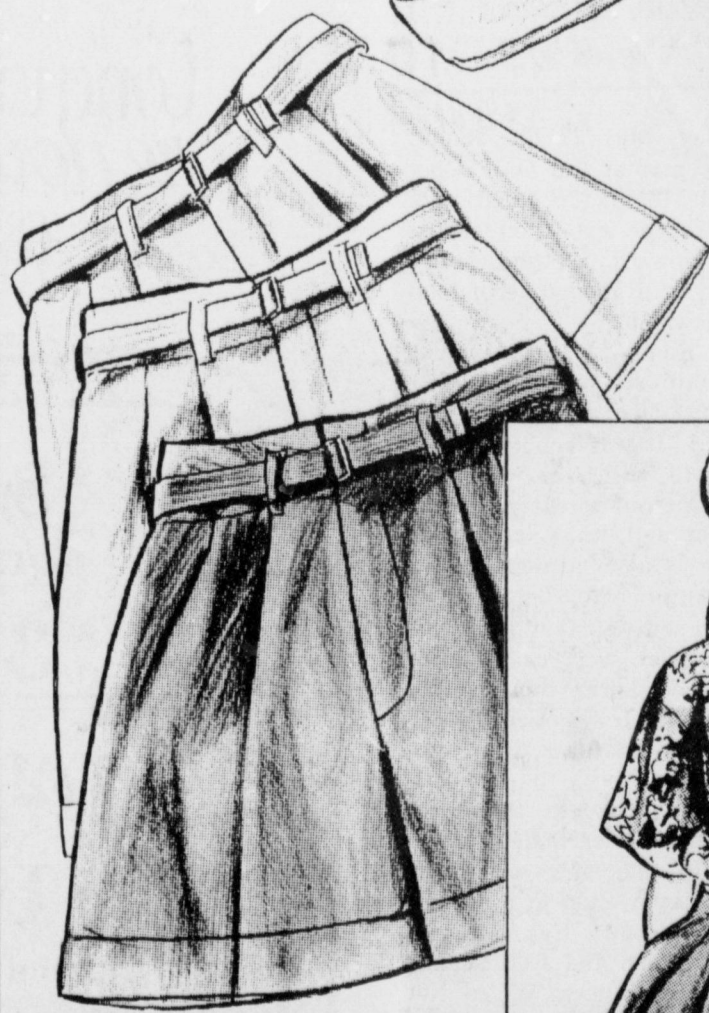
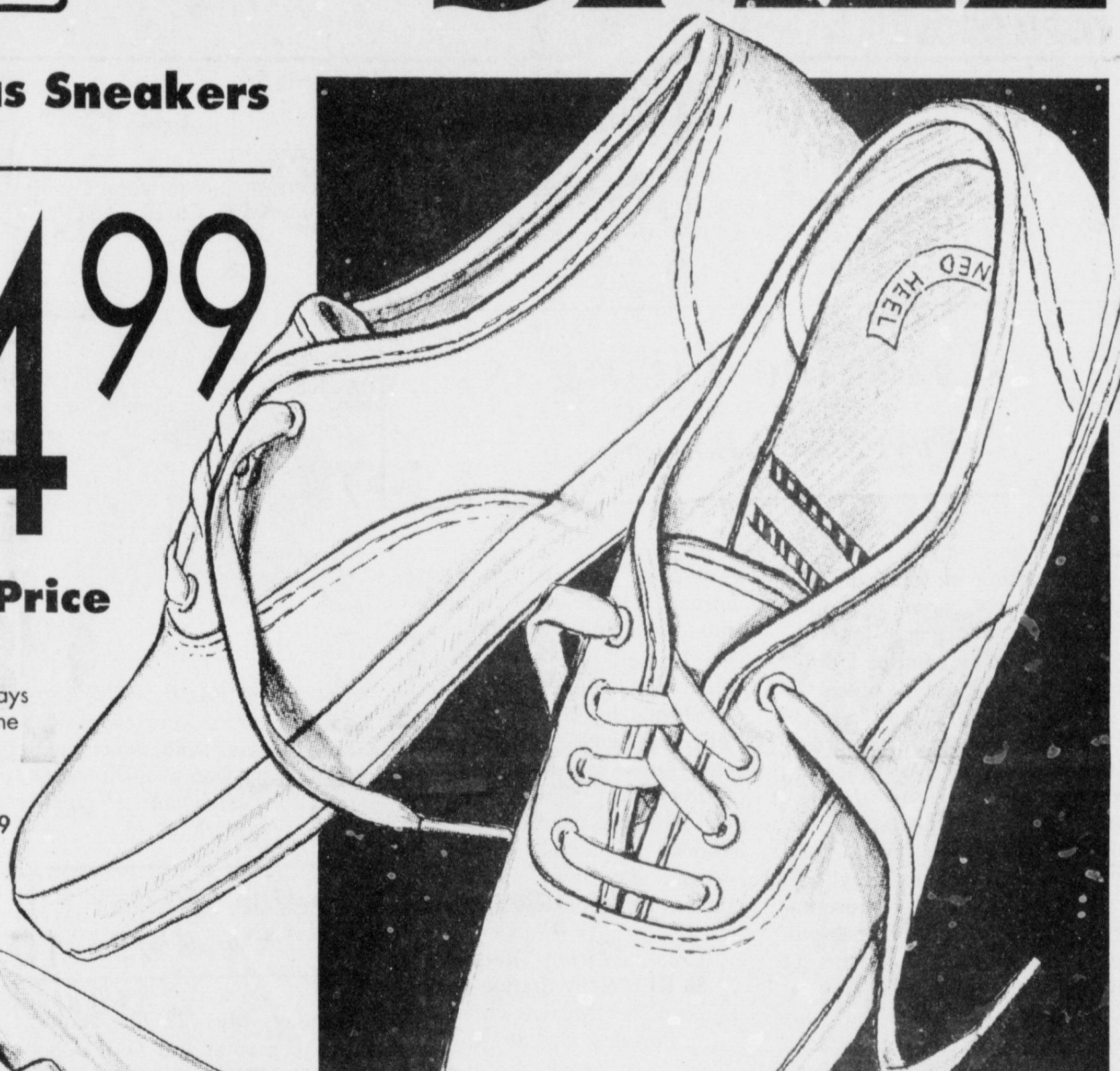

Mission Study A Success

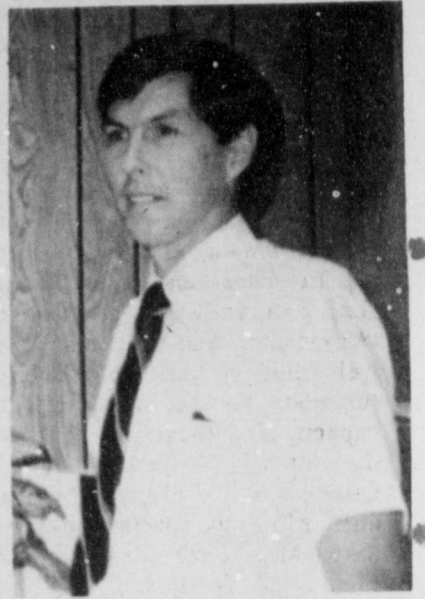

install and use tailwater return systems on their farms.

Throughout the years, these tailwater recovery systems have proven to be of great benefit to many High Plains producers. The collection and use of irrigation tailwater reduced the quantity of water to be pumped from the Ogallala Aquifer, which ultimately reduced pumping costs and helped conserve groundwater.

"Shorter row lengths, changes in irrigation application times, use of earthen borders, and improvements in irrigation technology, such as surge valves, have significantly reduced irrigation tailwater waste. However, it was the adoption of the tailwater return pit and modified playa basins which allowed irrigators to manage their tailwater for the first time. We commend our area irrigators for

implementing this water conservation practice," says A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District Manager.

Wyatt also noted that many tailwater return systems were not included in the District's recent survey. "The tailwater return systems that were not counted are located on farms where center pivot sprinkler systems have been installed. These return systems have served their initial purpose of recovering irrigation tailwater. Now that the more water-efficient center pivot sprinklers have been installed, these abandoned tailwater return pits are now being used to provide shelter and a source of water for wildlife," he said.

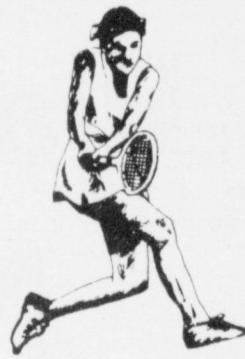

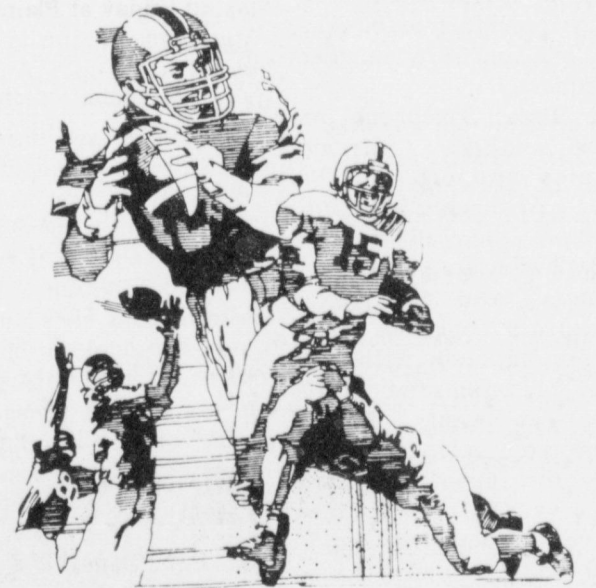

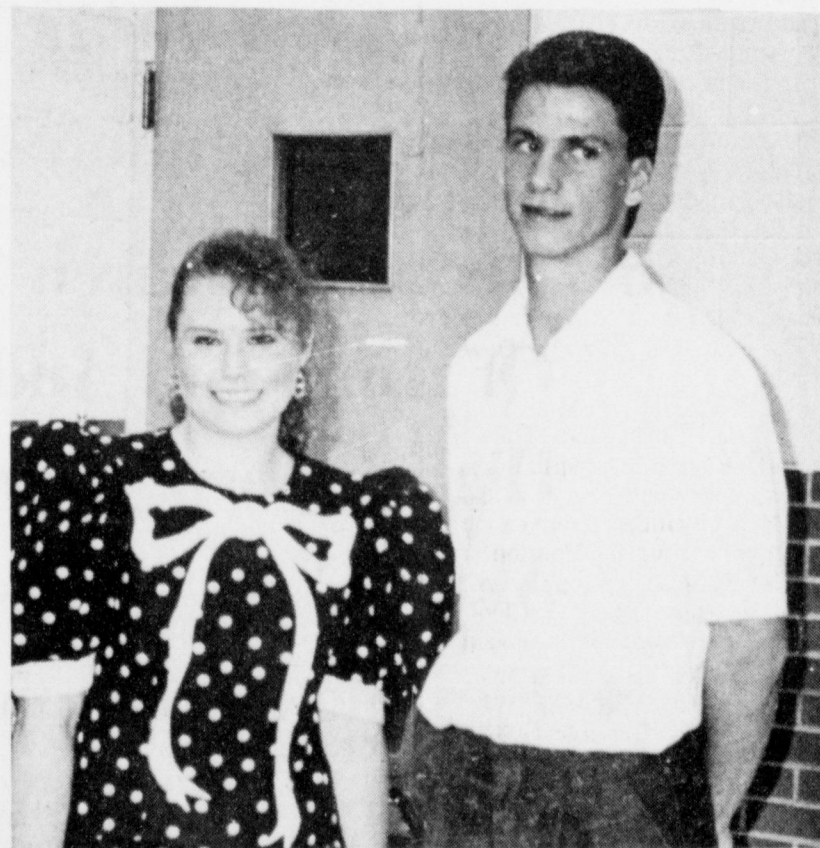

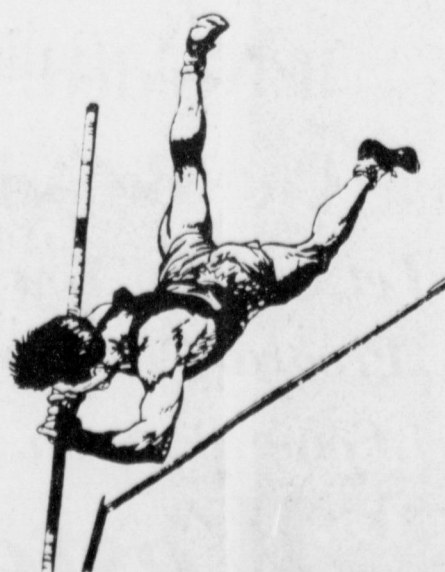

900/976 Call

Blocking

Available

Throughout the state, local telephone companies are offering their customers the option of blocking calls to 900 pay-per-call information services.

Protests from consumers about 900 pay-per-call services have made this issue one of the most pressing matters at both the state and national levels. On the state level, local telephone companies are responding positively to recent rules adopted by the Public Utility Commission, which requires local telephone companies to provide free blocking to all 900 and 976 numbers upon request.

"The Texas Telephone Association and its member companies support the 900 pay-per-call service blocking. We believe the call blocking option will alleviate some of the consumers' and the Texas Legislature's concerns about abuses connected with 900 service," commented TTA president Tim Raven.

Raven said telephone subscribers throughout the state will receive ballots in their telephone bills notifying them of the 900 and 976 call blocking option. To order the call blocking option, customers can return the ballot or contact their local telephone company.

A customer who chooses not order the call blocking option will have access to all 900 services, while those who request blocking will not have such access. The first request for call blocking will be at no charge, but a nonrecurring charge may be applied to subsequent blocking requests.

In areas where individual call blocking is not technically possible, access to 900 pay-per-call services will be blocked to all customers until the local telephone company's equipment is able to provide the selective blocking.

federal agency is now authorized to guarantee commercial loans to purchase single-family housing. "This expands our ability to provide financing for homes in rural areas," notes FmHA State Director Sox Johnson.

Under this new program, FmHA guarantees a loan made by a qualified lender against a percentage of possible loss. Loans may be made by any lender, including state housing agencies, which is approved as a mortgage for federal housing mortgage insurance. Additionally, lenders approved by FmHA, the Federal National Mortgage Association ("Fannie Mae"), or the Farm Credit System may qualify for the program.

FmHA is authorized to guarantee up to 100 million in loans for single-family homes during the current fiscal year. This assistance is available for new or existing rural housing, located on individual tracts or in subdivisions, according to the State Director.

May rural residents eligible for direct FmHA loan assistance may also qualify for the guaranteed loan program. Applicants with the low to moderate incomes may be eligible for loan guarantees, and low-income applicants may qualify for the agency's interest assistance program, which brings down the cost of the monthly payment.

Applicants must be without safe, decent and sanitary housing and unable to obtain a loan without the FmHA guarantees at rates and terms they can reasonably be expected to

repay. "Loans may be guaranteed for up to 100 percent of the cost of acquiring the house," said the state Director, who added that these are 30-year, fixed-rate mortgages.

Individuals interested in the new guaranteed loan program should contact their commercial lenders of the local Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor.

Mrs. Sanderson succeeds Charles M. McGilvary in the Vernon FmHA district position. McGilvary retired in November 1990 after serving as District Director for six years.

As FmHA District Director, Sanderson is responsible for agency loans for multi-family housing, rural water and sewer

systems and other essential community facilities. In addition, she coordinates FmHA guaranteed loans to lenders for business and industry in the district.

She also is responsible for supervising FmHA farmer programs and single family housing loans in fifteen (15) Rolling Plains counties. Offices for these counties are located in Vernon, Childress, Memphis, Paducah, Knowx City, Spur, Seymour, Graham and Wichita Falls.

U.S. Savings Bonds Program Turns 50

The U.S. Savings Bonds Program celebrated its 50th anniversary on May 1 with commemorative ceremonies across the nation and the release for general circulation of a new postage stamp honoring Savings Bonds.

It was on May 1, 1941, that Treasury Secretary Henry Morgenthau Jr. sold the first E "Defense" Savings Bond to President Franklin D. Roosevelt. What followed was the most popular savings program ever invented, with more than \$315 billion worth of Bonds sold to Americans. Today, \$130 billion worth of Bonds remain in the hands of the public, who continue to buy them through payroll savings plan where they work and through more than 40,000 financial institutions.

Through the five decades of its existence, the Bond Program has proven to be a stable source of funds for the Treasury, as well as an easy avenue to increased savings. The Program's most significant change offered on November 1, 1982, when interest rates were tied to market fluctuations--though with a guaranteed minimum rate to protect savers against severe declines. Rates change each May 1 and November 1, based on market performance during the preceding six months.

Today's change, reflecting the downward turn in rates since last Fall, is to a rate of 6.57 percent, which will remain in effect through October 31, 1991. The previous semiannual rate was 7.19 percent. The new rate is 85 percent of the average market yield on five-year Treasury marketable securities between November 1, 1990, and April 30, 1991, 7.73 percent.

Catalina V. Villalpando, Treasurer of the United States and National Director of the Savings Bonds Program, said "this golden anniversary is an important occasion for America's savers, and a tribute to the thousands of volunteers who contributed mightily to the success of the program since the beginning. I expect that the next 50 years will be marked by ever-growing demand."

For Bonds held at least five years, yields at redemption are the average of semiannual market-based rates during the time held, compounded semiannually, or a minimum rate is six percent. EE Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

The market-based rate program for U.S. Savings Bonds has been in effect since November 1, 1982, and has been responsible for a marked turnaround in the sale of Bonds during the past decade. Since 1982, when sales of \$3.1 billion marked the lowest ebb for the program since it was estab-

lished in 1941, the Bond program has seen sales increase more than 150 percent, to \$8.1 billion in 1990. During the same period, the value of Bonds held by Americans has increased by 80 percent, from \$68 billion in November 1982 to \$130 billion today.

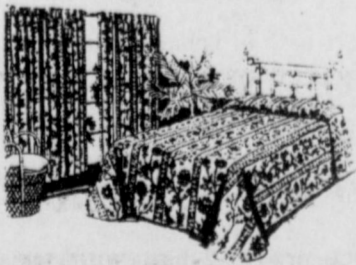
