Funeral services for Cloyce Efton McBride, 87, of Rising Star were held Saturday, January 8, 2011 at 2 p.m. at the May United Methodist Church. Burial was in the May Cemetery.

Cloyce passed away Wednesday, January 5, 2011, at his residence in Rising Star.







A Forever Friendship Through **Big Brothers Big Sisters**

Bu U.S. Sen. John Cornyn "Have you looked at the moon through a telescope lately? Driven a go-kart? Fished with worms? Talked openly about your fears?"

who mentor young Texans each year. In Texas, as of October 2010, Big Brothers Big Sisters has helped more than 18,000 young people through mentorships. Members of the Texas State Association of Big Brothers Big Sisters include: Amarillo-Panhandle, Lone Star, Austin-Central Texas, El Paso, Galveston-Gulf Coast, Hereford, Lubbock, Midland and San Antonio-South Texas.

I had the privilege of serving as the Honorary Chair for BBBS of Texas from April 2007 to October 2010. In October I passed the chairmanship reins to rodeo champion Ty Murray and his wife, singer-songwriter Jewel, who have already begun promoting the good work of BBBS and raising awareness about the need for more volunteer mentors.

This month, BBBS members across the country will be working to sign up volunteers in honor of National Mentoring Month. BBBS goes to great lengths to find the best match for every participating young

Big Brothers and Big Sisters person. They conduct background checks to ensure every match is safe for the child, and they work to find pairs that are well suited for each other and have lasting potential. BBBS offers training and tips to help volunteers develop a solid, positive relationship. Independent research indicates that Big Brothers Big Sisters has a farreaching, positive impact on the lives of the young people it serves. A nationwide study found that participating Little Brothers and Little Sisters were 46 percent less likely to begin using drugs, 27 percent less likely to begin using alcohol, and 52 percent less likely to skip school, among other positive trends.

During National Mentoring Month, I encourage Texans looking for a positive way to make a difference to consider becoming a Big Brother or Big Sister. Your investment in the life of an at-risk child will have a lasting impact. Most importantly, you will gain a friend for life.

For Steve Blow, that friendship was cemented when his Little Brother tested the waters and told him, "My mom says we're going to be friends for life." Blow didn't hesitate with his response: "Forever."





Austin - The Texas FFA Association announced that it added its 80,000th member last month, an all-time high mark for any state FFA association in the organization's 82-year history.

FFA, formerly known as Future Farmers of America, is a student organization that is integrated into the secondary education agriculture, food and natural resources curriculum. Texas FFA is a sanctioning organization for competitive events, scholarships and leadership development events.

Quardrie Lavan of the Houston-area North Forest chapter, became the Texas FFA's 80,000th member when he was submitted into the organization's roster system at 11:52 a.m. on Thursday, December 2, 2010. Lavan, a senior at North Forest High School, is a first-year member and is raising a pig to show later this spring. Lavan also played as a linebacker for North Forest's varsity football team and is interested in pursuing a career in the culinary arts.

The record membership

member level is part of a recent membership surge in Texas. Texas FFA gained 11,319 members between 2008-09 and 2009-10, the single greatest one-year membership increase in the association's history and followed it with a 5,288-student gain in fall.

The bulge in the state's membership rolls is the result of a program through which chapters can affiliate with the state and national organization on the basis of enrollment in the agricultural education instructional program instead of students paying individual membership dues. This is similar to how schools affiliate with the state's University Interscholastic League which

governs extracurricular athletic, music and literary activities.

Texas FFA has evolved from an organization focusing encompassing organization that addresses the needs and interests of students in urban and suburban schools in addition to the rural communities from which FFA rose in 1929. FFA gives students the opportunity to apply practical classroom knowledge to real world experiences through local, and national competitions.
