

Inedible **Clay for Christmas** Ornaments

Mix well: 4 cups flour 5 tsp. powdered alum 1 cup salt 1 1/2 cups water

If the dough is too dry, work in another tablespoon of water with your hands. Roll out, cut ornaments with cookie cutters, puncture hole for hanging, or mold and let dry.

To roll: Roll dough 1/8" thick on lightly floured board. Dip cutters in flour, make hole for hanging with plastic straw dipped in flour (use dots from end of straw to make decorations).


To mold: Shape dough no more than 1/2" thick into figures such as flowers, fruits, etc. Insert fine wire for hanging.

Bake ornaments on ungreased cookie sheet for about 30 minutes in 250° oven. Turn and bake another 1 1/2 hours until hard and dry. Remove and cool. When done, sand slightly with fine sandpaper until smooth, paint with plastic-based poster, acrylic or markers. Paint both sides. Allow paint to dry and seal with shellac, spray plastic or clear nail polish.

Yield: About 5 dozen 2 1/2" ornaments.





You should have your weed and feed on your lawn by the middle to the end of February. March is the time to thin and transplant your fall blooming bulbs.


Field corn should be planted by the first day of March or shortly thereafter.



Texas AgriLife Extension Service to Offer Professional Food Mgr. Certification Training Course

Statistics indicate that valid for 5 years. foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 4 Americans will become sick, 1 in 1,000 will become hospitalized, and 5,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

If under the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) jurisdiction each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site.

Many of you have already received a letter from the Texas Department of State Health Services regarding this. Under these new rules, each food establishment permitted by the Texas Department of State Health Services must have one certified food manager. Food manager certificates will be

Texas AgriLife Extension

Service, Taylor and Jones Counties, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This program will be offered for \$110 on Monday, February 7 & 14 at the Taylor County Extension Office located on the grounds of the Taylor County Expo Center. Cost includes training, materials, and the State food, manager certification examination.

This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification examination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50 cents of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals

prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied. Foodborne illnesses are estimated to cost thousands of

dollars in lost wages, insurance, and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include:

 Increased customer satisfaction

• Improved relationships with health officials

• Prevention of bad publicity and law suits due to foodborne illness

By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn about:

identifying potentially

hazardous foods and common errors in food handling

and cross-contamination of food

personal hygiene for employees

with government regulations

equipment and surroundings controlling pests

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



These days our ears and eyes are bombarded with so much information on how to keep your heart healthy. There are so many things you can do, but the most important, is to create good habits that you know you can stick to and keep yourself accountable for the rest of your life even if it is something very small.

Drink water instead of sodas. This not only brings your sugar and calorie intake down, but keeps your body hydrated so your heart doesn't have to work as hard throughout the day

Caffeine laden drinks are really stressful on our hearts even though they help keep us more alert and focused. Start small. If you don't want to give up your sodas, at least drink 2 times the amount of water, as the soda you consume, to keep



Texas Discovers New Cattle Brucellosis Infected Herd

Austin –For the first time in over five years, a cattle herd in Texas has been diagnosed with bovine brucellosis (Bangs disease). According to Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) officials, a small beef herd in South Texas (Starr County) has been determined to be infected. Brucellosis is a bacterial disease of cattle that can cause abortions, weak calves and low milk production. Humans can also catch brucellosis (undulant fever), most commonly by consuming unpasteurized milk products, or handling contaminated birthing material when assisting with difficult calving situations in infected cows.

Routine surveillance (blood testing) at a livestock market led to the discovery of the infected herd. TAHC rules require all adult sexually intact cattle to be tested negative for the disease prior to change of ownership. "This herd may have been affected for some time and not detected due to lack of sales of adult test eligible cattle," stated Dr. Andy Schwartz, TAHC state epidemiologist. For that reason a full disease

"The discovery of this herd is a reminder of the value of continued surveillance efforts, and the importance of an effective system for tracing exposed animals," further added Dr. Schwartz.

The federal brucellosis eradication program began in earnest in 1959, with Texas being the last state to be declared "Free" of the disease in 2008. The good news is that Texas will not lose its Class Free status as designated by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). USDA issued an interim rule in 2010 that suspended the provision for possible reclassification of any Class Free State or area to a lower status, and instead encouraged a localized risk based disease management approach. Currently, the only known reservoir for bovine brucellosis in the (Inited States is in elk and bison in the Greater Yellowstone Area (GYA) located in parts of Montana, Idaho and Wyoming. The GYA is not considered the likely source of the newly detected Texas herd however, based upon the epidemiological information received to date. Producers desiring more

Though it has been five years since cattle brucellosis was last detected in Texas, there was on-going concern among industry and regulatory officials that goats, equine animals, and infected herds might still exist.
