

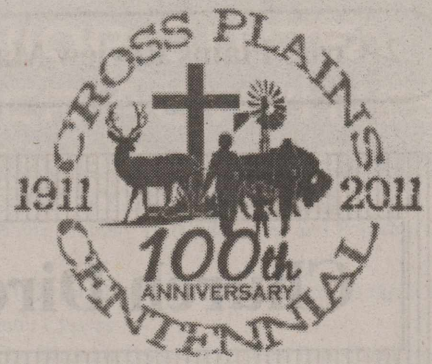

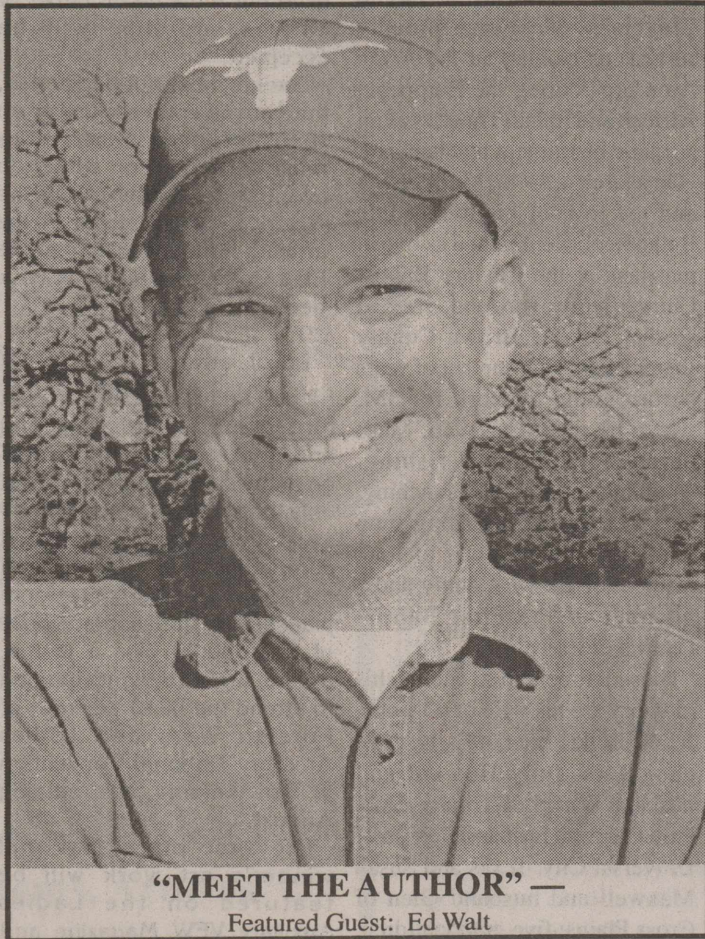
"Meet the Author" Features Pioneer Resident Ed Walt

Cross Plains Public Library is excited to have retired Dallas police captain and Pioneer resident Ed Walt as the next featured guest of their "Meet the Author" series to be held on Tuesday, March 15, 2011, at 7:00 p.m. in the library's conference room.

Walt is a sixth generation Texan who was born in Fannin County and grew up on the family farm there. He joined the Dallas Police Department in 1967 and began a thirty-three year career where he obtained the rank of Captain and commanded divisions in Vice, Narcotics, Tactical, Intelligence, Special Investigations and General Investigations. He graduated from the University of Texas at Arlington, the FBI National Academy, the Southwestern Law Enforcement Institute and the U.S. Secret Service School of Dignitary Protection.

In 2000 he retired from the police department and his wife, Carol, retired from a 32-year career with Child Protective Services. Upon retirement, they purchased a ranch in the Pioneer area where they now write and raise cattle. Carol is the author of six books ranging from novels and short stories to a children's book.

The Hall Street Shoot-Out: A True Story of the Dallas Police Department's Biggest Gun Battle is Ed Walt's first book and is an account of an incident which occurred when he was a

twenty-four-year-old patrolman. He responded to a fellow officer's call for help, and became involved in a gun battle that would grow to involve over a hundred officers and result in the shooting of ten people, including a TV reporter and four officers. It was, in terms of duration, number of combatants involved, shots fired and persons shot, the biggest gun battle in the department's 130-year history. Mark your calendars and join us

for an exciting evening. Copies of his book are available for purchase at the library and Walt will be glad to autograph them that evening. Refreshments will be served afterward.

And plan now to attend our next "Meet the Author" on Tuesday, April 12, at 7:00 p.m. with Christian and author Karen Witemeyer.

Centennial Corner

Aren't we fortunate that our local Genealogy Society secured the *Review* on microfilm and placed the wonderful resource in our local Public Library a few years ago?

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Life with the Robys

Ray Alderman and Charles Cave of the Blackwell-Winters area heard of E.G. Roby and hired him to manage the W.T. McClure Ranch at Cross Plains. The Alderman, Cave team was leasing the ranch at the time.

In 1962 E.G. and Alice and family moved to the 4,200 acre ranch. It was stocked with black Angus cattle and sheep. There was lots of wildlife and the varmint hunting was a lot of fun for the kids. There were plenty of good fishing tanks, too.

The ranch and the long-lasting friendships with W.T. and Ben McClure and the Alderman and Cave families were enjoyed by the Robys during those years.

On Sunday evening lots of people came out to relax and ride horses. There were lots of trail rides and fellowship.

E.G. didn't have a belly button, as he was gored by a steer when he was steer wrestling. He just had a smooth indenture there where his belly button was suppose to be. This was a great conversation piece for the Roby kids to tell their friends. Just think how the conversation could start, "You know my father never was shot by the Indian. He doesn't have a belly button."

E.G. and Alice began their life together in the country. A great inherited love for ranches and stock was in their hearts and lives. E.G. was raised in the country tending to horses and livestock. Alice was raised on the Kennedy Ranch at Sabinal, Texas.

In the early years E.G. had a trucking business and hauled cattle, sheep and goats. He was also an auctioneer and worked stock sales at Hico, Junction, Uvalde, Leahey, Goldthwaite, Kerrville and Hondo.

The Robys worked on the very rugged Harp, Gibson Ranch at Sweetwater that had many huge canyons on its 10,000 acres. It

was stocked with cattle and goats. The owner had a big bay horse named Possum. A woman didn't get in the lot with this horse, not even a cowboy with a long coat or slicker was accepted. It wasn't known why Possum disliked women, but he did.

It was a known fact that E.G. hated rattlesnakes and lots of rattlesnakes were killed on the ranches he managed. The rattlers were cut off and counted. You wouldn't want to rattle one when walking behind E.G., as there was likely to be a run away.

All the children had gone their own way by the time E.G. and Alice moved to the Circle Cross Ranch in Cloudcroft, New Mexico. It was a 12,000 acre cow/calf operation. E.G. killed his first bear while living there.

The couple lived on the second floor of the three story house. Once while eating the noon meal at the kitchen table, E.G. knocked over his glass of tea. Some of the liquid ran into Alice's lap. E.G. picked up the glass and threw the remainder on her stating, "No use in halfway doing a job." He liked to finish what he started.

The Robys found themselves back in Texas in 1972 on the Weldon Edwards Ranch at Spur. It was 19,500 acres of grassland that was home to a herd of registered Hereford cattle.

E.G. died in 1972 and the Edwards asked Alice to stay on and manage the ranch. She remained there for 16 years. She took a class on artificial insemination at the age of 52 and was efficient at the job.

Someone asked Alice if she had any trouble getting good cowboys to work for her. "Of course not, I'm a good cook and they know it," she responded.

Alice was recognized as a Yellow Rose of Texas in 1988. When she retired she moved back to Cross Plains where she currently lives.

The Cross Plains Public Library is the recipient of additional books from the Will James Society Book Gifting Program in Payson, AZ. The titles "Cowboys North and South (1923), The Cowhorse (1926) available in adult AND children's versions, Lone Cowboy: My Life Story (1930), Uncle Bill: A Tale of Two Kids and a Cowboy (1932), The Three Mustangers (1933), Home Range (1935), Young Cowboy (1935), Cowboy in the Making (1937), Look-See With Uncle Bill (1938), Flint Spears, Cowboy Rodeo Contestant (1938) and My First Horse (1940).

Born in a covered wagon near Great Falls, Montana, and an orphan at the age of three, James was born Joseph Ernest Nephtali Dufault, June 6, 1892 in Quebec Province, Canada. It was during his creative years everyone grew

to know him as Will James. He was adopted by a French Canadian trapper and prospector.

With no formal schooling or lessons in drawing, "he was a cowboy until a bucking horse threw him into writing," as Tim magazine once said of him. He looked more like an Irish scholar than a cowpuncher, but he wrote as he talked...in a natural, easy-going way.

His early years were shared with his family. He started drawing at the age of four on the kitchen floor. At a young age he traveled to the United States.

During the next several years, Will drifted, worked at several jobs, served in the army and began selling his sketches. He married Alice Conratt in 1920 and in 1922 sold his first writing, "Bucking Horse Riders." That started the sales of several books.

In 1926 he came out with his most famous book, Smoky. In all, he wrote and illustrated 23 books.

His later years were spent on his ranch at Pryor Creek, Montana and at his Billings, Montana home on Smoky Lane. Will witnessed movies made from his books and his fame grew. He died in 1942 only to leave memories in the form of his artwork and books which people will cherish forever.

Last fall, we received titles for our Will James' collection from Fraser West of Iona, CA, which are displayed in our showcase. These newest books have been added to the collection and are ready for check-out at the library. (Biography from The Will James Art Company—www.willjames.com)

Honor Texas' Heroins During Women's History Month

AUSTIN, Texas—From an influential stateswoman to a fearless West Texas rancher, the women who helped shape the Lone Star State's real stories are recognized during Women's History Month. March has been designated to honor women like Houston's Barbara Jordan, an African American politician and educator who altered the political landscape in Texas. Atlanta's Bessie Coleman also challenged boundaries by becoming the world's first licensed African American pilot. Both Jordan and Coleman are featured in the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) newest booklet, African

Americans in Texas: A Lasting Legacy.

Other innovative Texas women include Alpine's Hallie Stillwell, whose contributions are noted in the THC's Texas Mountain Trail Region travel guide. Stillwell rode with the cowboys and fought to preserve West Texas' ranching life following her husband's death. She lectured on life as a Texas woman rancher and wrote a column for the Alpine Avalanche. She was inducted into the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame in 1992.

The THC's thematic guide Texas in World War II highlights Col. Oveta Culp Hobby. A Killeen native,

Hobby became the first commanding officer of the Women's Army Corps. In 1953, Hobby was appointed the first female secretary of the newly developed Department of Health, Education, and Welfare under President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The THC's travel guides are a component of the agency's heritage tourism program which includes the nationally recognized Texas Heritage Trails Program (THTP), along with several thematic guides. The award-winning THTP encourages people to venture out and rediscover Texas' historic and cultural marvels.

Direct & Counter-Cyclical Payment signup ends June 1st

(Baird, TX), March 4, 2011 - Robert Frost, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Callahan County reminds producers that the deadline to sign up for the 2011 Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment (DCP) program is June 1, 2011.

Payments are calculated using base acres and payment yields established for each farm. Eligible producers receive direct payments at rates established by statute regardless of market prices. Advance payments of 22 percent on the 2011 DCP program will be available starting December 1, 2010. The remaining 78 percent of the DCP payment will be issued after October 1, 2011.

Counter-cyclical payments vary depending on market prices, and are issued only when the effective price for a commodity is below its target price (which takes into

account the direct payment rate, market price and loan rate).

"It is important that producers submit their DCP contracts before June 1, 2011 because applications will not be approved after this date," said Frost.

Producers can fill out a DCP contract at any USDA Service Center or online. To access the online service, producers must have an active USDA eAuthentication Level 2 account. To get a Level 2 account, producers must complete an online registration form at <http://www.eauth.egov.usda.gov> and then visit the local USDA Service Center to verify their identity.

Cross Plains Chapter of "Make Way Partners" Trip to Sudan

Three members of the Cross Plains Chapter of Make Way Partners (MWP) traveled to Sudan recently. Judy Luter and Clay Richardson left from Dallas-Ft. Worth Airport on January 26 and arrived in Nairobi, Kenya on the evening of January 27 where they met Matt McGowen and 7 others. Josh King, of Cross Plains, joined them the following week.

The next morning the team flew to Torit, Sudan. They were met by 32 beautiful very young children from the newly formed Hope for Sudan (HFS) orphanage near the Uganda border.

Sunday the team attended an outdoor church with a word from Matt McGowen and songs from children. Monday through Friday mornings, they met with the orphans and a group of local church children for bible lessons, crafts and recreational activities. The children were so excited to see the crayons, paper with pictures and yarn for bracelets. These were prized possessions for children with no toys. A washing station was built and lessons were given about the importance of hygiene.

The HFS children had only been at the orphanage for 6-8 weeks. Many fathers in Sudan have been killed in attacks or are off fighting for Southern Sudan. Mothers often have been captured and taken as slaves, if not killed in attacks. Many Sudanese people die from bacterial infected water, lack of good medical care and just a plain hard life with extremely few opportunities to find food, much less make a living. Then there are those who are just corrupt or evil.

Little Emmanuel's father had killed his mother. Afraid that he would be killed next, Emmanuel ran away. After being sent by authorities HFS, it took 3 days before he stopped trying to go out of the gates to find something to fill his stomach from the bush. He just didn't understand that someone would give him something to eat.

Ibala was found alone and naked in a mountain village hours away. Romano, Hope for Sudan's indigenous director, went door to door looking for someone to ask about him. He found no one. Without authority to take the boy, he had to leave him there. On his third trip to the village, he finally found someone with the ability to give him permission to take Ibala, who had been abandoned after his mother's death. Ibala, very weak had almost starved to death.

These two boys have been rescued. How many are not heard of or found in time? Emmanuel, still thin, has gained weight and always has the biggest smile on his face. Ibala also smiles a lot. He is so full of energy that he wiggles all the time. There is so much joy in their faces even after all they have endured. These are just two examples from many such stories.

In the afternoons, the women on the MWP team met with ladies from the village. They talked about the differences and similarities of life in America and Sudan. Women when found alone or in small groups are often attacked by soldiers. It takes 7

women with official papers (uncommon) to be allowed to testify in court. No matter what country they live in, women's hearts are the same. The local ladies told of concerns over husbands and sons who were away fighting and of hurt beyond measure over sickness or death of their children.

At the end of the week tears were flowing at good-byes to children and adults alike. The MWP team wanted to sweep the children up and tuck them away in luggage and felt an ache at saying good-bye to the ladies.

On February 5, the MWP team was met at the Torit airstrip by 9 additional team members including Josh King and Dr. Mark Sivley, a dentist from Abilene. Again they were greeted by children of an orphanage sponsored by MWP. This time though, there were many more children of all ages. New Life Ministries (NLM) houses almost 550 orphans.

Monday through Friday were much like the previous week, with the addition of Judy and 3 others meeting with teenage girls of the orphanage and Josh, Clay and two others working with teenage boys.

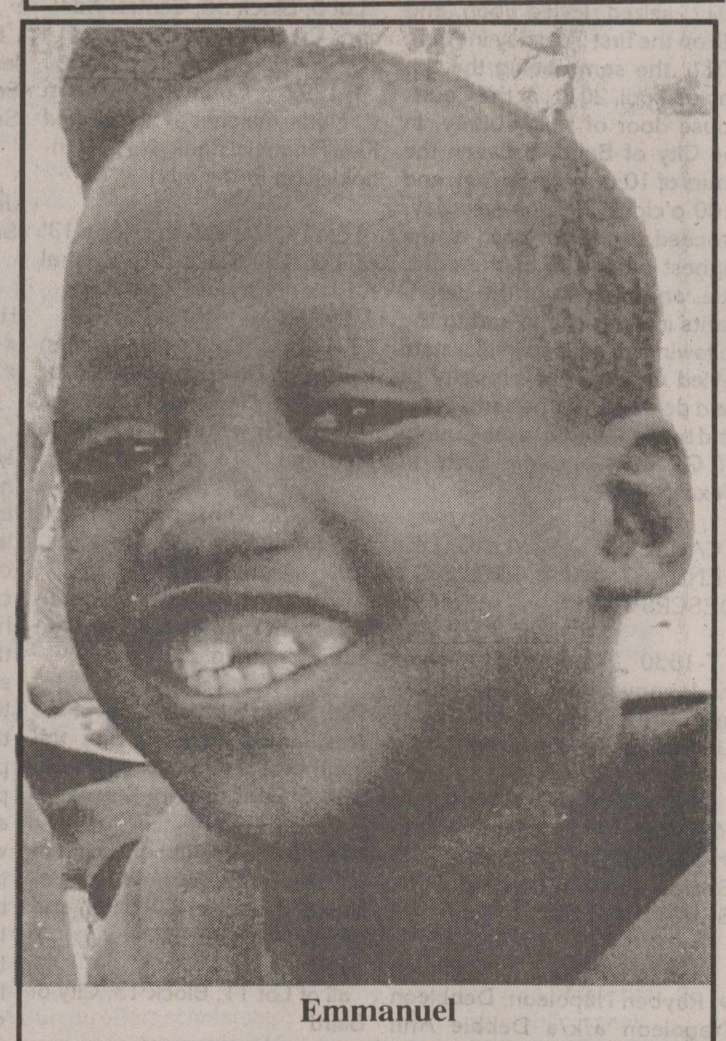
Make Way Partners also took a medical team. They were assisted by some of the older orphans who hope to become doctors one day. People from as far as 8 hours away came mostly by foot or donkey drawn cart to line up outside the gates. They received a variety of much needed treatment including tooth extraction and filling.

On the last evening, the children sang a farewell song to "our visitors." They said they hope to meet again and that "we will pray for you day and night"...we will pray for you. Then they sang a song saying they were "happy to see you" and asking for a favor. "Remember us when you talking "praying" etc. Remember them? How could the team from Texas, Tennessee, Alabama, Nairobi and Australia possibly forget them?"

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Texas Landowners FIGHT for RIGHT to Groundwater

Farmers and ranchers in Callahan-Shackelford Counties are supporting a bill in the Texas Legislature, Senate Bill 332 (SB 332) by Sen. Troy Fraser, which protects landowners' right to the groundwater located beneath their property, said Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau President Phil Williams.

"Many area farmers and ranchers are only able to make a crop or maintain their herds by using

groundwater," Williams said. "That's a right that has gone unchallenged until recently."

While some groups and groundwater conservation districts are attempting to change the definition of ownership and how groundwater is managed, Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau believes landowners have a private property right to the groundwater beneath their land, Williams said.

SB 332 would strengthen landowners' property rights relating to groundwater. Under the bill, landowners have a vested ownership interest in the groundwater beneath their land.

"This means landowners have a property right to produce this water," Williams said. "It also means that a government body—particularly water districts—may regulate groundwater production for conservation purposes, but it must also consider a landowner's rights."

Texas landowners have claimed the right to the groundwater beneath their land for more than a century, Williams said.


Proceeds from this year's fish fry will go toward the upkeep of the Clyde Woman's Club building.

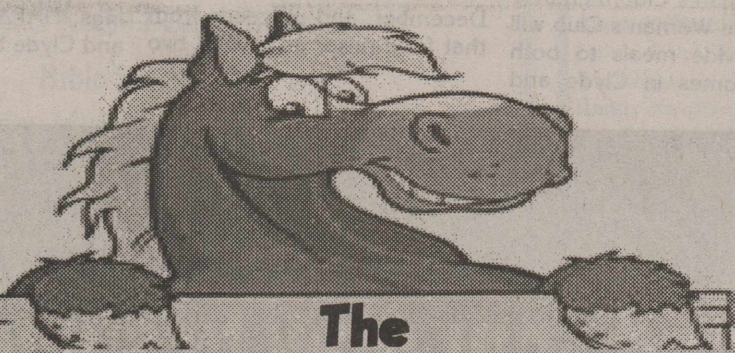

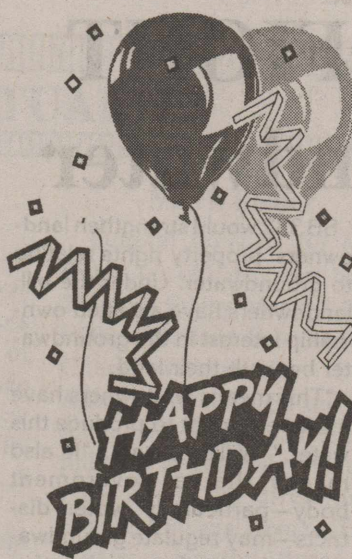

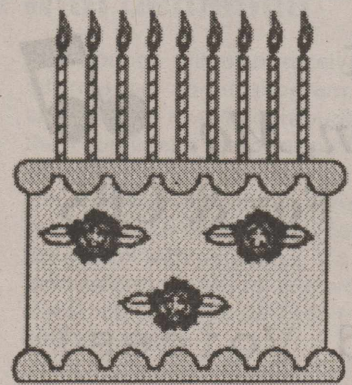
