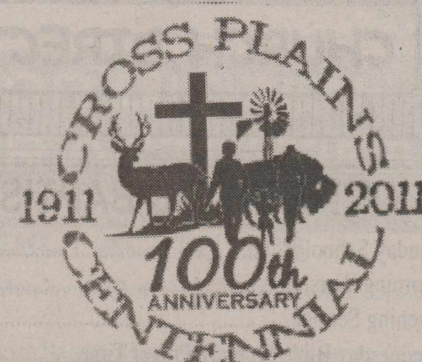

DEMAND for BLOOD GROWING Bloodmobile in Cross Plains on Tuesday, May 3rd

The Meek Blood Center bloodmobile will be at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains on Tuesday, May 3 from 2:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. The bloodmobile comes to Cross Plains every eight weeks, which is how often blood can be donated.

Donors who give blood every eight weeks, help prevent blood shortages. The demand for blood continues to grow, and Meek Blood Center must collect a minimum of 60 pints of blood each day to make blood transfusions possible at 15 area hospitals.

Each pint of blood saves two lives, because each unit is split into red blood cells and plasma. The shelf life of red blood cells is 42 days. Plasma can be frozen for up / 1 year . There are many different medical conditions that require blood or plasma transfusions. This includes cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy, accident or trauma victims, surgical patients, premature babies and those with chronic anemia. All of these patients depend on volunteer donors to supply them with lifesaving blood products.

Donors must be at least 17 years old (age 16 with signed parental consent), weigh a minimum of 120 pounds and in general good health. All donors must present a photo ID. Those who have eligibility questions may call Meek Blood center at 325-670-2798 or visit the website at www.meekbloodcenter.org.

Last Rites for a True American Hero Junior Ivy

A memorial service for Jon (Junior) Ted Ivy will be held in the New Cottonwood Cemetery in Cottonwood on Saturday, April 30, 2011, at 3:00 p.m. "Junior" Ivy, as he was known locally by his Cottonwood friends, passed away on November 28, 2011 and will receive his last rites with full Military Honors on the afore mentioned date.

Ted Ivy was captured by the Japanese in July 1942 and spent a little over three years in a Japanese Prisoner of War Camp. He was captured on Corregidor, and suffered the deepest experiences of capture at the hands of the Japanese.

"Death was as close as your next door neighbor," he told a Marine Corp Public Affairs Officer, in Okinawa, upon his release from captivity, "But you learned to ignore it most of the time." Ivy told his interviewing officer,

"There was the usual hard work, poor food, lack of medical attention and beatings."

Ivy always celebrated August 14 as HIS Thanksgiving Day. "You can pick any day in November you choose," he said, "but, I will take August 14th as my day. That is the day we first realized the war was over and we got to see the Stars and Stripes hit the top of the flag pole again."

Junior is survived by Cheryl Dee Ivy, his wife of Lake Havasu City, Arizona; two nephews, John Ivy and wife Pat and children of Kerrville and Rod and wife Debbi and two daughters of Coleman.

He was preceded in death by two brothers, Shorty and Morris Ivy; his father and mother, Jon and Trisha "Nordyke" Ivy of Penwell, Texas.

Young farmers needed to succeed retiring seniors, meet increasing demand for food

Texas Department of Agriculture seeks young farmers, and ranchers starting or expanding operations

AUSTIN—Texans and Americans alike enjoy the safest, most abundant and most affordable food supply in the world, but as aging farmers and ranchers retire, a new generation of food producers is needed. In an effort to continue meeting an increasing demand for food, Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples today announced the availability of \$150,000 in grants for young farmers to create or expand an agricultural operation in Texas. The funds are made possible through the Texas Department of Agriculture's Young Farmer Grant Program created in 2009 and funded entirely by Texas farmers and ranchers. The deadline to apply for these grants is Friday, May 6, 2011.

According to the 2007 Census of Agriculture, the average age of Texas farmers is 59, with only 6 percent of the state's farm operators under 35.

"Our nation's food security is tied to domestic agricultural production," Commissioner Staples said. "With many farmers and ranchers close to retirement, we must encourage new talent to ensure we meet the food demands of a growing population."

In 2009, Commissioner Staples requested and received authority from the 81st Texas Legislature to establish the Young Farmer Grant Program under the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority (TAFA). The program is made available to individuals, ages 18-45, who wish to start or expand their own agricultural business in Texas. The applicant must be able to make dollar-for-dollar matching expenditures to sustain, create or expand the proposed project. Individual grants may range from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

The deadline to apply for the current Young Farmer Grant Program funding is Friday, May 6th. Applications are available by calling 1-(877)-428-7848.

Additionally, three other programs housed under TAFA are designed for eligible applicants who wish to establish or enhance their farm or ranch operation, or establish an agriculture-related business.

Agricultural Loan Guarantee: TAFA provides financial assistance through loan guarantees to eligible applicants who wish to

establish or enhance their farm or ranch operation, or establish an agriculture-related business. The program provides guarantees based on a tiered structure, not to exceed \$750,000 or 70 percent of the loan amount, whichever is less. The program also provides an interest rebate up to \$5,000 to eligible borrowers as part of the guarantee process.

Interest Rate Reduction: TAFA can facilitate commercial lending that may result in below-market interest rates. Any person who proposes to use the proceeds under this program in a manner that will help accomplish the goal of fostering the creation and expansion of an agricultural business in Texas is eligible.

Young Farmer Interest Rate Reduction: Even more beneficial than the standard interest rate reduction program, the Young Farmer Interest Rate Reduction program offers young farmers greater rate reductions through TAFA. The program is open to individuals, ages 18-45, who propose to use the proceeds to create or expand an agricultural business in Texas.

How Did Feral Hogs Arrive Here?

In the 1700's or so when the Spanish explorers came through Texas, they brought tame hogs with them. These hogs were used mostly for meat and lard, and a few managed to escape and head to the rivers and creeks.

Then shortly after the Civil War when a large number of people started moving into the Indian territories, they also brought hogs with them for much the same reason.

When the Indian wars broke out and the settlers were forced to move to safer locations, only the smaller animals were taken with them. The large ones, like sows, were turned out to fend for themselves. Those hogs migrated to creeks and rivers where water and acorns were plentiful.

In the 1920's and 1930's Russian boars were imported for sport hunting and some of these managed to run off and find their way to the creek. This was the start of the feral hog as we know them today. The Russian boar had a long narrow snout and a narrowing back end.

Feral hogs come in many colors ranging from red to reddish browns, mixed whites, some with stripes, spots and blotches. All feral hogs can have two sets

of tusks that can be very sharp. When the old mature males reach the height of 3 feet and 300 plus pounds, they start roaming the countryside by themselves, stopping only when they find a sow in heat. These boar hogs are vicious fighters. Their shoulders are full of scar tissue and gristle that is referred to as their armor.

Feral hogs are easy to track. They leave a track that looks like a deer, except the toes are more rounded. They like shallow water holes where they can root and lay in the mud. They scratch on small trees, fence posts and poles. Generally, the higher the mud and hair marks, the bigger the hog.

There are more feral hogs in Texas than any other state. When it comes to the mega feral hog, 1,000 plus pounds, most people think they are hogs that escaped from feed lots. Probably not. In the fall of the year when hunters are feeding a lot of corn and ranchers are caking their cows these boar hogs get accustomed to their routine and clean up what they can. They can put quite a large number of pounds on in a short time, especially when eating 20 0/0 protein cubes, acorns and corn.

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Callahan County's jobless rate falls to 6.3% in March 2011

The unemployment rate in Callahan County fell six-tenths of one percent to 6.3% in March 2011, according to jobless figures released Friday, April 22, 2011 by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in March 2010 was 6.0 percent.

Of the 6,957 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 6,519 were employed during March 2011, and 438 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 6.3%.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 6.9% in February, 2011. Of the 7,129 civilian labor force in the county during February, 6,637 had jobs while 492 or 6.9% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 6.3% in January 2011, 5.8% in December 2010, 6.1% in November, 5.5% in October, 5.6% in September, 5.8% in August, 6.3% in July, 6.5% in June, 5.9% in May, and 6.0% in April, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for March 2011 include: Brown, 9.0%; Coleman, 7.6%; Eastland, 7.4%; Jones, 8.1%; Runnels, 8.2%; Shackelford, 4.5%; Stephens, 8.2%; and Taylor County, 6.4%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 6.5% in March, 2011, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. Abilene's Combined Labor Force is 81,300. There were 76,000 employed during March, 2011, while 5,300 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 6.5%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 83,100 in February, 2011, with total employment of 77,700 in February 2011, while 5,400, or 6.5% were unemployed in February 2011.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for March, 2010 was 6.4%, with the total workforce at 83,300, with 78,000 employed and 5,300 unemployed in March, 2010.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of March, 2011 was 8.1 percent. Last month's statewide unemployment rate was 8.2 percent. The state's unemployment rate in March of 2010 was 8.3 percent.

The United States unemployment rate for March, 2011 was 9.2 percent. The nation's unemployment rate for the previous month of February, 2011 was 9.5%. The United States unemployment rate one year ago in March, 2010 was 10.2%.

Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas unemployment rate moved down a tenth of a percentage point in March to 8.1 percent. The monthly change exhibited this year mirrored the movement seen in March 2010. Since January 2011, the unemployment rate declined by four-tenths of a percentage point. The national unemployment rate declined by three-tenths of a percentage point to 9.2 percent. The Texas unemployment rate has remained below the national unemployment rate for 45 consecutive months.

The Civilian Labor Force, estimated at 12,216,100 persons, was recorded as the highest level seen in this series. The Civilian Labor Force increased by 63,700 individuals, which was the largest February-to-March change seen since 1985. Over the year, the Civilian Labor Force grew by 141,500 Texans.

The expansion of the employed population by 71,400 Texans was the largest February-to-March change seen in this series since 1997. The estimated employment level for this month reached a new all-time high of 11,231,700 individuals. Since January 2011, Texas has added 116,600 persons into the employed population. The Texas unemployed population contracted by 7,700 individuals for an estimate of 984,400. Since the beginning of the year, the number of unemployed declined by 51,100 persons. From year-ago levels, the number of unemployed dropped by 13,500 individuals.

The number of recipients of unemployment benefits declined by 8,600 individuals for a count of 144,100 Texans. From year-ago levels, the number of Texans receiving unemployment benefits declined by 47,900 persons. In the Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), the number

of those continuing to seek unemployment benefits fell in all MSAs except for the Waco MSA. Claims for unemployment benefits in the San Angelo, the Tyler, and the Midland MSAs declined the most sharply among the MSAs by -17.2 percent, -11.9 percent, and -11.6 percent respectively.

The unemployment rate dropped in 21 MSAs while four MSAs remained constant. The Midland, the Amarillo, and the College Station-Bryan MSAs were the only MSAs with an unemployment rate below 6.0 percent. The Brownsville-Harlingen MSA unemployment rate was recorded as the highest among the MSAs with a rate of 12.0 percent.

"HAPPENINGS AROUND THE STATE"

Samsung Hiring Engineers and Technicians

AUSTIN, TX (Austin American-Statesman—Lori Hawkins)—Samsung Austin Semiconductor said it plans to hire 300 engineers and technicians in the first half of this year. The hires will bring Samsung's local employment to about 2,000—slightly ahead of where the company expected to be by the time the expanded factory moves to full production.

The company said it is seeking experienced and entry-level process and equipment engineers and technicians. Technicians should have an associate's degree in a technical field or experience in a related industry. Samsung said it hired more than 600 employees last year as part of its current expansion, bringing total employment in Austin to about 1,700. When the expansion is completed later this year, Austin will have one of the biggest manufacturing complexes in North America. The \$3.6 billion investment makes it the most expensive construction project in Austin history.

Trinity Industries to Hire More LONGVIEW, TX (Longview News-Journal—Mike Elswick)—Officials with at least one Longview-area manufacturing firm have an optimistic outlook for their local operations during the next couple of years. According to Longview Economic Development Corporation (LEDCO) executive director Susan Mazarakes-Gill, Trinity Industries expects to add several hundred jobs to its local employment level from 2010 levels.

"Last year, they averaged 520 employees. They're up to about 775 people now and expect to average 925 by the end of the year," she said. Trinity officials have told LEDCO they expect to average more than 1,000 workers during 2012. Trinity Industries has announced its Trinity Rail Group subsidiary entered into a supply agreement to deliver 12,500 rail cars during a five-year period. The company's three Longview plants are involved in the production of tank cars.

Software Firm to Add Jobs ABILENE, TX (Abilene Reporter-News)—Software support, testing and development company Genesis Network Solutions plans to hire more than 200 workers, with most expected to make more than \$50,000 yearly. The company also will be eligible to receive advances totaling up to \$2.4 million this year from the Development Corporation of Abilene (DCOA), as the board unanimously approved a revision to financial incentives now tied to the expected hires. Genesis Network Solutions currently has 117 employees according to DCOA. The DCOA first inked a deal with Genesis in 2006, not long after the company was formed.

Medical Company Moving HQ to North Dallas

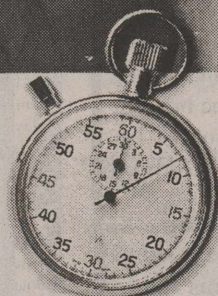
DALLAS, TX (Dallas City Biz) AccentCare Inc. of Irvine, California plans to move its company headquarters to North Dallas. The move to Briar Grove Place in far north Dallas should be completed by the first of May, its scheduled opening. The relocation will create more than 100 local jobs. AccentCare specializes in home healthcare. The company has operations in Arizona, New York, Ohio, Colorado, Oregon, and Washington in addition to California. The 33,000-square-foot class A office lease was secured by Dallas-based Crown Sterling, owner of the building at 17855 N. Dallas Parkway. AccentCare is the four-story building's second headquarters tenant.



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CROSS PLAINS CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

March 8, 2011

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members of the council present were Mayor Ray Purvis, Mayor Pro Tem Jerry Cassle, Lewis Fortune, Bob Kirkham, Colby Walker and Peg Terrell.

Employees present were Debbie Gosnell, Teresa Kennedy, Doug Dugger, Jarrod Potter and Don Gosnell.

Citizens present were Greg Henson, CEO of the Shackelford County Community ResourceCare Center, EDC President Dannes Turner, EDC Board Members Era Lee Hanke and Mark Norris, Kala Stout, Alex Stout and John David Foller. Ray Purvis called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

Greg Henson, CEO of the Shackelford County Community ResourceCare Center, met with the council to update them on the status of the building of the Cross Plains Medical Clinic and to provide information pertaining to how the center is doing. Henson provided a slide show reacquainting the council and citizens with how and when the Center came to Cross Plains.

He explained that the center is a designated FQHC (Federally Qualified Health Center). The center here in Cross Plains opened in November 2007. In 2008 the clinic served 938 patients. He reported that in 2010 the clinic saw 1,622 patients. In 2008 there were 2,224 patient visits and 6,669 in 2010.

Henson stated that the health care demand is driving the need for the growth and expansion. He commented that the Cross Plains clinic is the fastest growing clinic of the four towns currently being served. He stated that the construction of the Cross Plains Medical Facility will be underway in March and completed in August 2011. The facility has been custom designed by CTA, touts a superb layout and will be a great addition to the Cross Plains community.

Henson presented the council with a drawing of the layout and what the finished project will look like. He stated that because of the cost of fuel, concrete is almost as economical as paving and therefore they have elected to concrete the parking lot to avoid future maintenance. He also discussed the landscaping and that the landscaping will make a nice finishing touch to the structure. Mr. Henson thanked the council for the positive support they have received from both the Council and the EDC and from the community as a whole. The council thanked Mr. Henson for coming and for the update.

By general consent the minutes were approved as presented.

By general consent the Police Report was approved as presented. Gosnell stated that he has received the new patrol vehicle. He informed the council that he is scheduled to have everything installed next week.

By general consent the Judge's Report was approved as presented.

Bob Kirkham moved to approve the bills as presented. Lewis Fortune seconded and motion carried.

Jerry Cassle moved to pay Gosnell for 131 comp hours. Peg Terrell seconded and motion carried.

Debbie Gosnell presented the council with an updated Ordinance for the emergency management program and increasing the amount of fines for anyone violating the ordinance. Cassle moved to approve the Ordinance with the changes as presented, Walker seconded and motion carried.

Dannes Turner, EDC President, met with the council to go over the 2010-2011 Accomplishments, goals for 2012, recommended board member appointments, and the 2011-2012 Annual Budget. Turner commented that the EDC is proud of the accomplishments that were made during the last year, some of which were the completion of the restroom facilities at Treadway Park; beginning the bridge that will connect the two parks; working with the Roping Club to renovate the roping arena; as well as working with the Little League Baseball/Softball clubs to update and renovate the fields for the youth programs. She also advised the council that the EDC contributed to several of the other organizations in town who promote tourism such as the Annual Firework display put on by the City of Cross Plains, the Annual Barbarian Festival and the Annual Robert E. Howard Days.

Turner advised the council that some of the goals for the coming year are to work with the clinic to finalize the completion of the new facilities for Cross Plains and to continue to work with and seek to obtain a pharmacy for Cross Plains. She advised the council that EDC Director Debbie Gosnell has had a couple interested in putting in a pharmacy and they will continue to work to achieve this goal and to finalize the exchange of property with TxDot to enlarge the Treadway Park area. Other goals are to continue to work with the existing organizations in the promotion and development of Cross Plains.

Turner went over the board

members and advised the council that all board members are willing to be reappointed. She also presented the council with the 2011-12 Annual Budget. She thanked the council for their time and consideration and asked for approval of all items as presented.

Kala Stout met with the council to discuss her rental property on Main Street that has been condemned. She explained to the council that she has been working on the house to fix it up so that she can rent it. She stated that they are replacing the roof now and are taking the shingles off and replacing it with tin that will need to be painted, but they can do that at a later date.

John David Foller asked what it hurt for the doors; and windows to stand open and if you couldn't own a home that no one lived in.

The council explained that the house is a health safety and fire hazard and she must make the needed repairs to keep it from being demolished. The council asked that she present them with a list of things that she anticipates doing to correct the situation, along with a time frame as to when it will be completed and to meet with them again at the April meeting to discuss the planned repairs and to see how much she has accomplished during March. Ms. Stout agreed to meet again in April.

Doug Dugger reported to the council that the surveyors were in town to survey the sewer line in Texas Highway 36 that will be replaced in the spring or early summer.

By general consent the council agreed to look over applications for the maintenance position on March 14, 2011 at 6:00 p.m.

By general consent the council agreed to hold the Public Hearing for the purpose of adopting the 2011-2012 Annual Budget on March 28, 2011 at 6:00 p.m.



Callahan Commissioners, voting precincts remain unchanged after 2010 Census

Despite the new 2010 Census showing continued growth in the western portion of Callahan County, the Callahan County Commissioners voted not to redistrict the county commissioner precincts and voting precincts.

The Callahan County Commissioners took the action Monday, April 25th at the regular commissioners' court meeting held at the County Courthouse in Baird.

The commissioners reconvened the meeting at 1:00 p.m. with County Judge Roger Corn, Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Commissioner Tom Windham, and Commissioner Cliff Kirkham present, while Commissioner Hicks was not present for this portion of the meeting.

Cathy Fryer with Bickerstaff, Heath, Delgado, Acosta LLP gave a slide presentation and held discussion on the following items concerning redistricting.

1. Initial assessment regarding the need to redistrict the County Commissioner Precincts based on recently issued 2010 Census data.

2. Traditional redistricting criteria and possible adoption of criteria to be utilized by the County for the 2011 redistricting process.

3. Possible action to adopt redistricting guidelines which set standards for public participation for the 2011 redistricting.

After the firm's initial assessment and review of the recently released 2010 Census population and demographic data for the County, the County's commissioner precincts are in population balance and are not required to redistrict in order to comply with one person-one vote requirements.

There was further discussion after the presentation. Also present for the discussion was Precinct #4 resident, Mike Konzack.

Commissioner Windham made a motion not to redistrict. Commissioner Farmer seconded the motion. The motion carried with a 4-0 vote.

Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court included:

—Callahan County Judge Roger Corn called the commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:31 a.m. with Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tom Windham, and Precinct #4 Commissioner Cliff Kirkham present. Also present at the meeting were Donna Bell, County Clerk, and County Treasurer Dianne Gunter.

—There was no public comment.

—Ron Sheffield, Callahan County's Loss Control Representative from the Texas Association of Counties, discussed with the commissioners' court the Loss Control Services that TAC offers to the counties. Some of those services include safety training for law enforcement, heavy equipment operators, volunteer fire departments and other departments. Also offered are safety surveys of the commissioners' precincts. No action was taken.

—Jim Paylor, Clyde Economic Development Corporation Executive Director presented to the commissioners' court information on the off-road motocross course project north of Clyde. Commissioner Hicks made a motion to approve the project. Commissioner Windham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a unanimous 5-0 vote.

—Discussion was held by the commissioners' court on the Countywide Burn Ban, fires, and fire departments. No action was taken on the burn ban. The Countywide Burn Ban remains in effect.

In the discussion of the fire departments, Commissioner Farmer made a motion to purchase forty-two 900-20 tires with tubes at \$80.00 each, thirty 1100-20 tires with tubes at \$70.00 each, six 16" tires and 150' of red line hose to be distributed to the seven county fire departments where needed. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and the motion passed with a 4-0 vote.

The seven county fire departments provided the commission-

ers' court with their readiness state and immediate needs. They include:

Baird VFD: All trucks ready to roll. Could use 1100-20 tires.

Clyde VFD: All trucks ready to roll. Could use 1100-20 tires. May have to replace oil pan for Brush Truck, made temporary fix for now.

Cross Plains VFD: All trucks ready to roll.

Eula VFD: All trucks ready to roll. Could use 900-20 military tires. (3 spare on hand)

Putnam VFD: All trucks ready to roll. Could use 900-20 military tires and tubes and 900-20 heavy duty civilian tires for front of trucks. Looking for 150' of red line hose 1".

Cottonwood CFG: Has one truck needing head gasket repair, they have the gasket but do not have tools to make repairs. May be two weeks before repairs are made. Three trucks ready to roll.

Oplin VFD: All trucks ready to roll.

—County Agent Jerry Warren presented to the commissioners' court his report of the Callahan County Extension Service. Commissioner Windham made a motion to approve the report. Commissioner Hicks seconded the motion and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—Commissioner Farmer made a motion to pay the approved bills. Commissioner Windham made a second to the motion and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—The commissioners' court meeting recessed at 10:22 a.m. and resumed at 1:00 p.m.

—On a motion by Commissioner Farmer and a second by Commissioner Windham, the commissioners' court voted 4-0 to adjourn the commissioners' court meeting at 1:44 p.m.

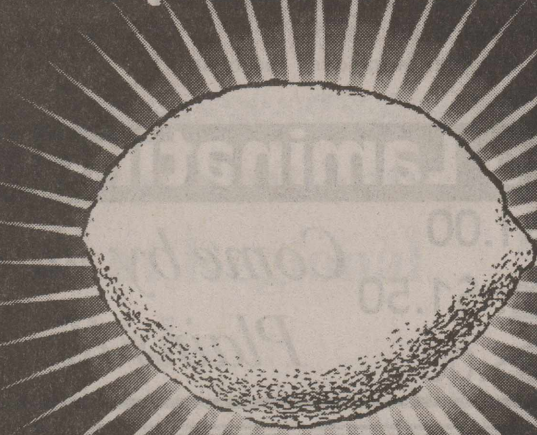

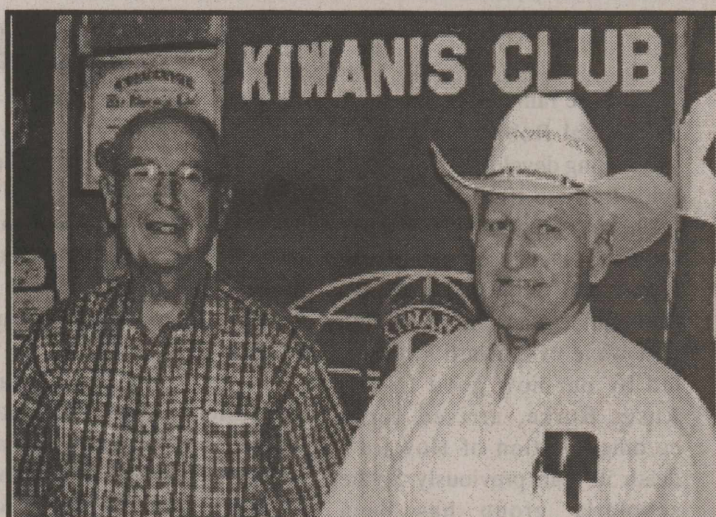

Guest Speaker Jerry Warren - Jerry Warren, Callahan County Agent, on the right was Charles Rodenberger's guest speaker to the Cross Plains Kiwanis on April 19th. Warren told about the many activities that his office has for kids including a unique shooting range that attracts students from as far away as Brazoria for shooting competitions. They also provide the stock show each year. Warren explained the feral hog control program where local ranchers sign-up for a fee plus ten cents per acre to fund a program using predator control agents to provide traps and helicopters to kill predators. This year they have already killed 246 coyotes, 505 feral hogs and one feral dog that was killing livestock. Most were taken using traps from the predator control offices in Brownwood, but helicopter flights were made before the trees put on leaves this Spring. Feral hogs are smart and hide under trees once they hear the helicopters. The Feral Hog program was formed by ranchers and has Tom Windham as President and Charles Payne as Vice-President and is active recruiting other land owners to support the program. They now have 122,000 acres but there are more than 500,000 in Callahan County. Ranchers and land-owners are encouraged to sign up to support the program.

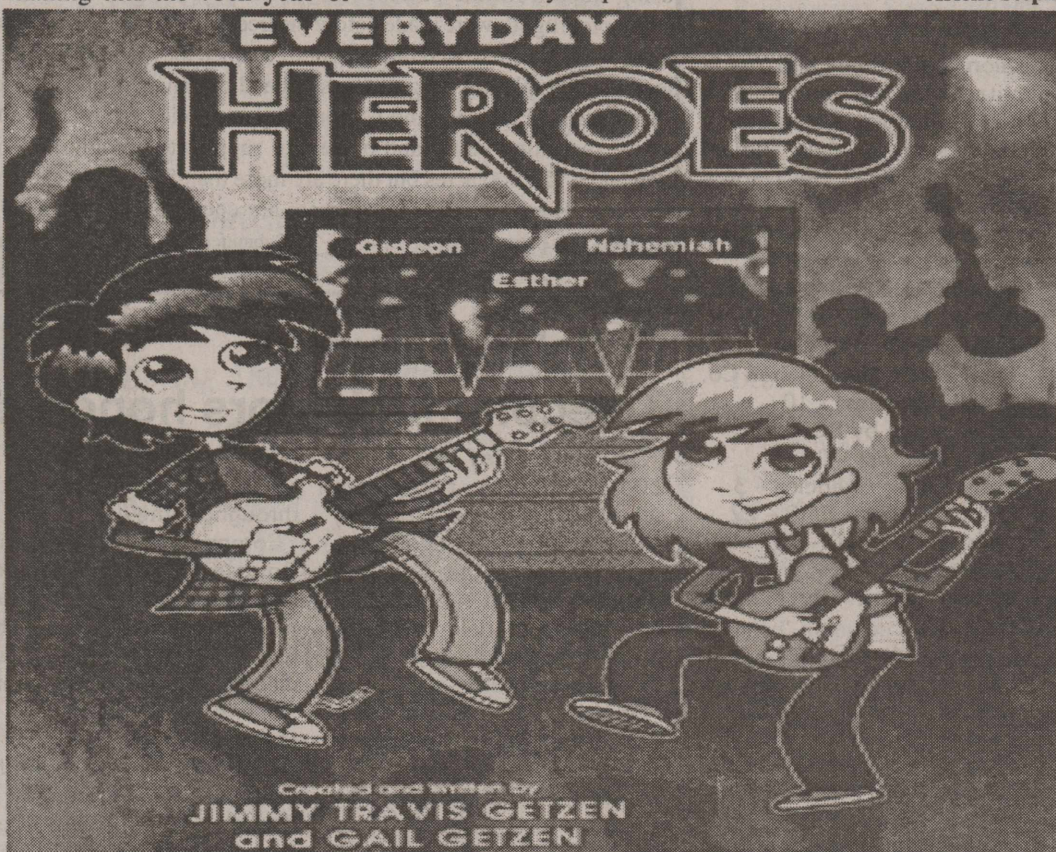
