His name is Jesus. You can trust Him, and seek Him out; if you want to.



Abruptly, with a jolting thwack, a wall of clutter and silt within the smoky whitewaters smashed us, as than specks of dust. At that time - for sure we became victims of the turbulent Pecos River. 
