Clyde, Cross Plains schools are Recognized, Baird and Eula Acceptable

Clyde CISD and Cross Plains ISD both received Recognized school district ratings, while Baird ISD and Eula ISD were given the Academically Acceptable rating, according to the Texas Educa-Friday, July 29th.

Clyde CISD and Cross Plains ISD were just two of 19 Big Country school districts which received the Recognized rating. There were just two Big Country school districts which received the Exemplary rating, which is the highest rating a school district can receive. Last year, 49 school districts in the Big Country received the Recognzied rat-

The ratings of Exemplary, Recognized, Academically Acceptable and Unacceptable are based on a formula that includes standardized tests, completion rates, and dropout rates. Statewide, the number of Exemplary schools fells from 2,637 last year to 1,224 in 2011. The number of Unacceptable districts number of Unacceptable schools rose from 104 to 569 this year, the agency reported.

The new lower scores statewide reflect tougher standards imposed this year. Scott said the TEA also raised Texas school ratings plum- also has increased the number involved in the school accountability program by providing special tests for those groups.

The number of Exemplary districts in Texas fell from 241 in 2010 to just 61 this year. The more than doubled from 37 to 88, or roughly 7.2 percent of the school districts in Texas.

Nationally, Texas students rank 49th in the nation on the verbal portion and 46th on the math section of the SAT college preparatory exam.

During the next two years, Texas schools will face a tougher time as they cope with a \$4.8 billion cut in state financing compared to previous years, the first cut in per-student funding in Texas since World War II.

The results announced Friday by the TEA will remain in effect for the next two years as Texas prepares for a new standardized testing system, known as the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness, or STAAR



Texas Sales Tax Free Holiday

Texas shoppers get a break from state and local sales taxes on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, August 19th, 20th and 21st, the state's annual tax holiday. Lay-away plans can be used again this year to take advantage of the sales tax

As in previous years, the law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend. Backpacks under \$100 and used by elementary and secondary students are also exempt. A backpack is a pack with straps one wears on the back. The exemption during the sales tax holiday includes backpacks with wheels, provided they can also be worn on the back like a traditional backpack, and messenger bags. The exemption does not include items that are reasonably defined as luggage, briefcases, athletic/duffle/gym bags, computer bags, purses or framed backpacks. Ten or fewer backpacks can be purchased tax-free at one time without providing an exemption certificate to the seller.

School Supplies The 81st Texas Legislature passed HB 1801 (2009) expanding the list of items qualifying for exemption from Texas state and local sales and use taxes during the annual sales tax holiday in August. In addition to clothes, footwear and some backpacks, Texas families also get a sales tax break on most school supplies priced at less than \$100 purchased for use by a student in an elementary or secondary school.

The following is an all-inclusive list of qualifying school supplies (if priced less than \$100):
