Recipients In Comanche, Eastland, Callahan and Coleman Counties Benefit From Almost \$900,000 of USDA Rural Development Funding

Temple, Texas, September 6, 2011 — USDA Rural Development State Director, Paco Valentin, with Area Director John Powell, today presented ceremonial checks totaling almost \$900,000 to four benefactors in Comanche, Callahan, Coleman and Eastland counties.

"These funding presentations represent the diversity of assistance USDA Rural Development can provide to communities to increase the quality of life for residents and businesses in rural Texas," said Valentin. "From water system improvements to new emergency response vehicles and hospital equipment, Rural Development is pleased to assist these recipients by providing the needed funding to their communities."

The City of Comanche was awarded \$750,000 in loans and grants through Rural Development's Water and Waste Disposal Program. The city plans to use the funding to install a .273 MG standpipe, and approximately

6,100 linear feet of PVC water line. The new water line will increase pressure demands as well as increasing the disinfection residuals throughout the entire city, providing improved services to almost 5,000 residents.

Rising Star will benefit from a \$34,729 grant to purchase a new police car. The funds, made available through Rural Development's Community Facility Program, will be used to replace an aging police car used to protect 835 rural residents in the city. The City of Cross Plains will also use Rural Development funds to purchase a new patrol vehicle. The city was awarded \$33,981 to purchase a new reliable patrol car to protect its 1,068 residents.

Lastly, the Coleman County Medical District received \$25,000 grant to purchase a new electronic medical records system. The new electronic system will maintain more efficient and accurate collection, storage, analysis, and distribution of data than current

manual operations. The Coleman County Medical Center serves a population of almost 10,000 rural residents in Coleman County.

USDA, through its Rural Development mission area, administers and manages housing, business and community infrastructure and facility programs through a national network of state and local offices. Rural Development has an existing portfolio of more than \$155 billion in loans and loan guarantees. These programs are designed to improve the economic stability of rural communities, businesses, residents, farmers and ranchers and improve the quality of life in rural America.

Propmaster Ginny Hoskins has been collecting "stay" stuffed dogs for the play and afterward the dogs will be looking for good homes. So, our dogs (with collar decorated by the children during last week's ASAP program) will be available for "adoption by audience members for a donation to "Our Best Friends—Full Bowls".

"Our Best Friends—Full Bowls" was organized in 2006. A group of concerned citizens came together to organize the effort to

help the seniors/disabled feed their furry friends. They started out in connection with the Meals on Wheels program, bagging food for clients for the week and delivering them with their meals—the volunteers at the center were doing the deliveries. But when the center started cooking on-site they had to move their dog/cat food operation, and now buy the food and deliver the bags to the homes themselves.

They deliver every other month now unless someone runs out and then they make a delivery as needed. At this time there are about 20 clients receiving food for their pets at a cost of about \$200 per month for the program.

"Our Best Friends-Full Bowls" appreciates any and all contributions and memorials and honorariums. They have several monthly contributors and some random. It is a good cause and they are glad to be able to help

the seniors, not only financially, but by eliminating the need for them to lift any heavy food bags. 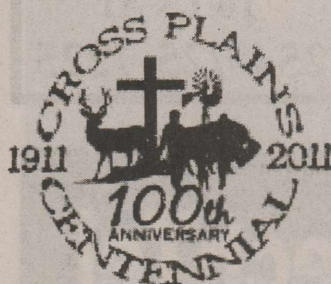

After a somewhat romantic fling with another local writer, Robert Howard, that went nowhere; Ms. Price turned her dedication to her students. November 1936 found her directing a local play, "The Whole Town is Talking" in which Billie Ruth Loving played a part. In later years, Billie Ruth became an English teacher while Ms. Price wrote the story of her relationship with Howard, which was turned into a successful movie. Title of the movie? "The Whole Wide World." Well, of course, the whole town was soon talking about "The Whole Wide World." And now, the filming locale of the movie in the Bastrop area has been horribly scorched by the raging fires.

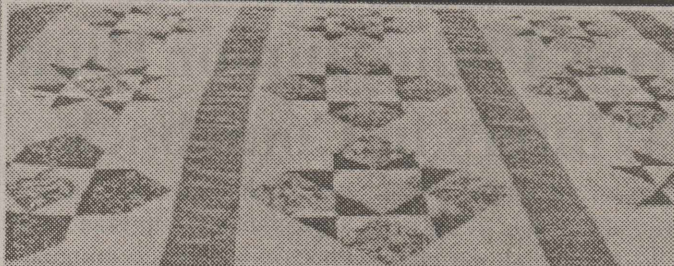

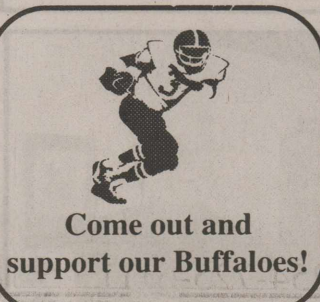

Cross Plains City Council Minutes

August 9, 2011

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members of the council present were Mayor Ray Purvis, Mayor Pro Tem Jerry Cassle, Randy Strickland, Colby Walker, Bob Kirkham and Lewis Fortune.

Employees present were Debbie Gosnell, Don Gosnell and Jan Yeager.

Citizens present were Dora Warlick, Connie Kirkham, Dannes Turner, Ron Rhodes and Era Lee Hanke.

Purvis called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

By general consent the minutes were approved as presented.

By general consent the police report was approved as presented.

By general consent the judge's report was approved as presented.

Kirkham moved to approve the bills as presented. Fortune seconded and motion carried.

Connie Kirkham met with the council and gave an update on the Chamber of Commerce. She advised the council that the office has moved to Trinity Liveoak temporarily while the board works to get an office to house the chamber full time. The Chamber likes having a presence on

Highway 36 so that travelers can stop and obtain information about the community. She advised the council that the board has hired Myleah McNutt as their part-time office staff and are excited about the changes the board is anticipating.

She discussed plans to have welcome bags for newcomers and also recognizing a "business of the month" campaign. They are looking forward to working on the website and attending training seminars and networking sessions with other communities to share ideas. Kirkham asked the council to consider allowing the chamber to keep the 8 percent motel tax that the City currently receives for renovations to Treadway Park. After length discussion, Cassle moved to allow the Chamber to keep the City's portion of the motel tax. Kirkham seconded and motion carried.

Dannes Turner, EDC President, met with the council to discuss two proposals that were received by the EDC Board. The first proposal was from Stacy Montgomery. In an effort to help Montgomery with some of his slow paying accounts, Turner

advised the council that the EDC Board had agreed to help Montgomery up to \$2K a month plus any invoices from his big accounts such as Windstream or AMA TechTel. Invoices must be paid back to the EDC within 60 days at a rate of 3 percent APT to continue to receive cash advances.

Fortune moved to approve Montgomery's proposal. Walker seconded and motion carried.

The second proposal was from Kelli and Franke Hyles. Hyles is renovating their building to house their movie store, tanning business, massage therapy, as well as adding a sandwich shop and bakery. She advised the council that the EDC board agreed to give Hyles a \$6,000.00 60 percent loan/40 percent grant with 3 percent interest re-payable in 24 months beginning October 1, 2011.

Kirkham moved to approve Hyles' proposal. Walker seconded and motion carried.

Fortune moved to adjourn. Kirkham seconded and motion carried.

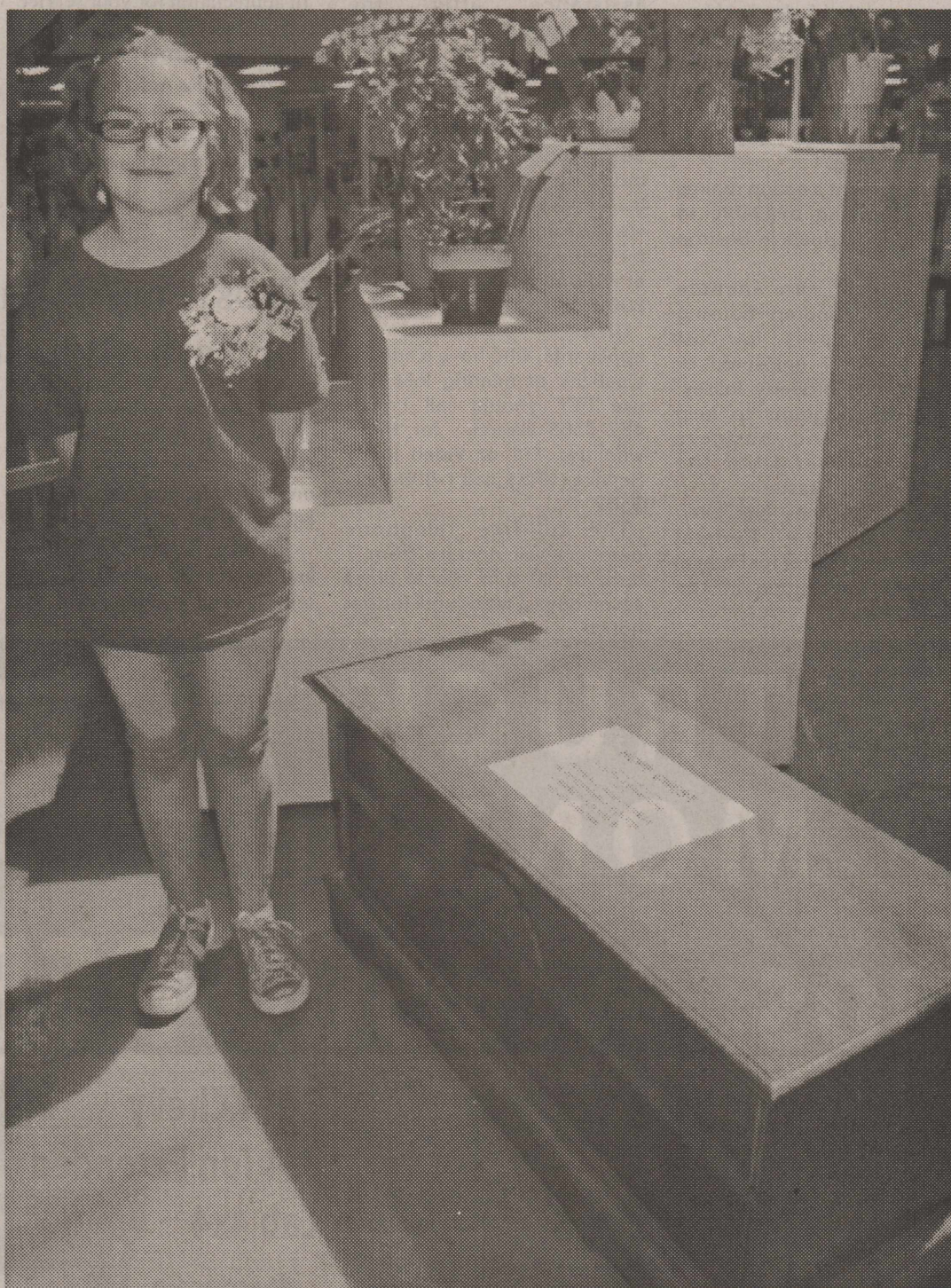

Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments Special Election November 8, 2011

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 14)
SJR 14 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran with an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the surviving spouse's residence homestead as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried, the property was the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the qualifying veteran died, and the property remains the residence homestead of the surviving spouse.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran."

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 4)
SJR 4 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for one or more accounts of the Texas Water Development Fund II, with the restriction that the total amount of bonds outstanding at any time does not exceed \$6 billion.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion at any time outstanding."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 50)
SJR 50 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successors to issue and sell general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for the purpose of financing educational loans for students, subject to certain constitutional restrictions, including a restriction as to the maximum principal amount of bonds outstanding at any one time.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas to finance educational loans to students."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 63)
HJR 63 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county, and to pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county for repayment of such bonds or notes. The amendment does not provide independent authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates.

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 26)
SJR 26 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow cities and counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities and counties without having to assess an ad valorem tax and set aside a specified amount of funds for the payment of costs under the interlocal contract.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to allow cities or counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities or counties without the imposition of a tax or the provision of a sinking fund."

Proposition Number 6 (HJR 109)
HJR 109 would amend the constitution to increase the amount of principal that is available for withdrawal from the permanent school fund each year and would also clarify certain references to that fund in the constitution. Increased access to the principal of the state public education trust fund would be based upon HJR 109 granting the authority to consider alternative market calculations when determining the amount of principal that is available for distribution to the available school fund. HJR 109 would also provide authority to distribute to the available school fund annual revenue from school fund land or other properties up to \$300 million per year.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment clarifying references to the permanent school fund, allowing the General Land Office to distribute revenue from permanent school fund land or other properties to the available school fund to provide additional funding for public education, and providing for an increase in the market value of the permanent school fund for the purpose of allowing increased distributions from the available school fund."

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 28)
SJR 28 would amend the constitution by adding El Paso County to the list of counties authorized to create conservation and reclamation districts to develop parks and recreational facilities financed by taxes.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit conservation and reclamation districts in El Paso County to issue bonds supported by ad valorem taxes to fund the development and maintenance of parks and recreational facilities."

Proposition Number 8 (SJR 16)
SJR 16 would amend the constitution by requiring the legislature to provide for taxation of open space land devoted to water stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of open space land devoted to water-stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity."

Proposition Number 9 (SJR 9)
SJR 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the governor, on the written recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, to grant a pardon, reprieve, or commutation of punishment to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the governor to grant a pardon to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervision."

Proposition Number 10 (SJR 37)
SJR 37 would amend the constitution by extending the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain local elected officeholders if they announce candidacy or become candidates for another office from one year to one year and 30 days.
The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain elected county or district officeholders if they become candidates for another office."

The Coyote

The coyote (*Canis Latrans*), also known as the American Jackal or the prairie wolf, is a species of canine found throughout North and Central America, ranging from Panama in the south, north through Mexico, the United States, as far north as Alaska and all but the northern portion of Canada.

There are currently 19 recognized sub-species, with 16 in Canada, Mexico and the United States with 3 in Central America. Unlike the wolf, the coyote ranges have expanded in the wake of human civilization, and coyotes readily reproduce in metropolitan areas.

Male coyotes on average weigh from 15 to 45 pounds, with an

overall length with tail 40 to 60 inches long and stand 15 to 20 inches tall at the shoulders. The female tends to be four-fifths as large as the male.

Mating season last from January to March with a gestation period of 58 to 65 days, with an average of six pups per year.

The coyote is a nocturnal animal and is most active at night, but will hunt during the day if need be.

The Latin name is *Censi Latrines* meaning (barking dog) and was named by Thomas Say in 1833. The coyote can gallop at 40 kilometers per hour and is able to reach speeds up to 64 kilometers per hour.

President declares disaster due to Texas wildfires

WASHINGTON— The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced that federal aid has been made available to the State of Texas to supplement state and local recovery efforts in the area affected by wildfires beginning on August 30, 2011, and continuing.

The President's action makes federal funding available to affected individuals in Bastrop County.

Assistance can include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured or underinsured property losses, and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the effects of the disaster.

Kevin L. Hannes has been named as the Federal Coordinating Officer for Federal recovery operations in the affected area.

Hannes said that damage surveys are continuing in other areas, and additional counties may be designated for assistance after the assessments are fully completed.

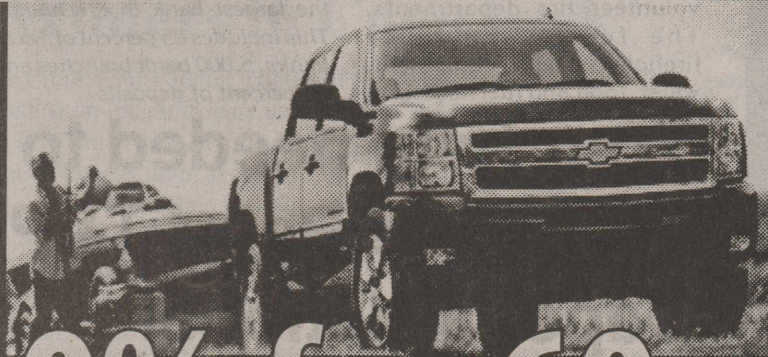

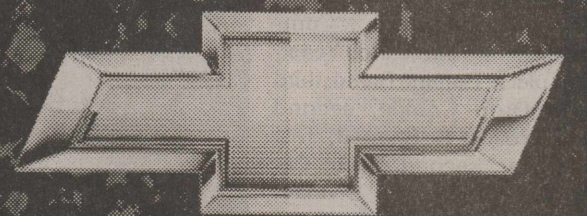

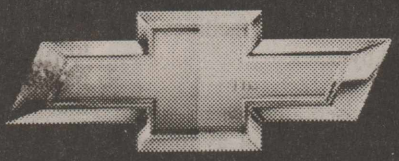

USDA Outlines SURE Eligibility Requirements for 2011 and 2012 Crops

Baird, TX), September 13, 2011 - Callahan County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Robert Frost, announced that legislative authority for the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) program ends on September 30, 2011. Producers must meet specific eligibility requirements to receive SURE assistance for disasters that occur on or before September 30, 2011, and affect fall 2011 and 2012 crops.

"The SURE program compensates producers for production and/or quality losses during times of disaster," said Frost. Producers can apply for a 2011 or 2012 SURE payment if a crop of economic significance located in a primary or contiguous disaster county under a Secretarial Disaster Designation suffered

at least a 10 percent loss because of disaster occurring on or before September 30, 2011.

Crops are not required to be harvested on or before September 30, 2011, to maintain SURE eligibility. A loss claim will only trigger after FSA determines that the loss was because of disaster occurring on or before September 30, 2011. Losses that result from disasters that occur after September 30, 2011, will not be eligible for SURE benefits.

Producers with 2011 and 2012 crops that suffer losses caused by disasters that occur on or before September 30, 2011, must also meet the following criteria:

- For insured crops, the insurance policy defines the coverage period as beginning on or before September 30,

2011

- For Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) crops, the coverage period begins on or before September 30, 2011

- The final planting date according to RMA and FSA (NAP crops only) occur on or before September 30, 2011.

Frost points out that, "If the crop is planted prior to September 30, 2011, but the final planting date is after September 30, 2011, the crop will not be eligible for SURE benefits."

The sign-up period for 2011 and 2012 SURE will be announced at a later date, after the national average market prices are determined for each respective crop year. For questions regarding the SURE program, please contact the Callahan County FSA office at (325) 854-1049 ext 2.

Poster contest helps students fall for trees

COLLEGE STATION, Texas—Fourth and fifth grade teachers tasked with educating their students about trees and the benefits they provide have a tool to help live up their lessons - the 2011-12 Texas Arbor Day Poster Contest.

Learning to identify tree species - specifically our national tree, the oak - is the focus of this year's state poster contest.

Sponsored by Texas Forest Service and open to both fourth and fifth grade students, the contest carries the theme *Trees are Terrific from Acorn to Oak!* Designed to boost environmental stewardship by teaching students how to identify different types of trees, lessons prompt students to create an identification key as well as a leaf and acorn collection.

The contest - and included environmental lessons - are correlated to the state curriculum for science and art, said Contest Coordinator Gretchen Riley.

"It's just a fun way to educate students about the trees that surround us," Riley said. "It's not about forests somewhere else; it's about trees where we live, trees that we see every day. Hopefully, the lesson will

instill in them an environmental ethic that they can carry forward."

Rules

- Both fourth and fifth grade students are eligible to participate.

- Posters may be no larger than 11 inches by 17 inches.

- The deadline for each school to submit its winning poster to Texas Forest Service is Dec. 16, 2011.

Prizes

- The winning student will receive a \$500 savings bond and a year-long family pass for Texas state parks, as well as a framed copy of his or her poster and an invitation to the Texas Arbor Day ceremony in April 2012.

- The winning teacher will receive a personal iPad and \$250 to go toward classroom supplies.

- The winning school will receive \$250 for environmental books or supplies and a tree planted on the campus as part of an Arbor Day celebration.

New Texas traffic, criminal laws set to go into effect

Below is a list of selected changes to traffic and criminal statutes. Unless otherwise listed, all laws below take effect September 1, 2011. Please note that this is not a comprehensive list of all new laws passed by the Texas Legislature.

Criminal Laws

Certain synthetic compounds deceptively labeled as "bath salts" and synthetic marijuana products (K2 or spice) have been added to Penalty Group 2 of the Texas Controlled Substances Act. (HB 2118, SB 331). Bath salts contain dangerous stimulants, and K2 mimics the effects of marijuana. Both have been sold in convenience stores and head shops, and have side effects that can be harmful and long-lasting.

The electronic transmission or possession of visual material depicting a minor engaging in sexual conduct ("sexting") has been added as an offense in the Penal Code. The penalty can range from a Class C misdemeanor to Class A misdemeanor, depending on the circumstances. This does not apply to minors involved in a dating relationship or spouses. (SB 407)

The possession or use of tire deflation devices, commonly known as caltrops, for any purpose other than law enforcement use or as an antique or curio is prohibited. Criminal organizations have increasingly used caltrops as they attempt to evade apprehension, resulting in damage to patrol vehicles and innocent vehicles on the road. (SB 1416)

Traffic Laws

Tow trucks have now been added to the slow down or move over laws, which require drivers to slow down 20 miles per hour below the speed limit, or to vacate the lane closest to the stopped emergency vehicle that has emergency lights activated if the road has multiple lanes traveling in the same direction. (HB 378)

Speed limits will now be the same during night and day driving, and separate speed limits for trucks have been eliminated. The maximum speed limit on state highways may be raised to 75 miles per hour if approved after a finding by TxDOT that the increased

speed would be reasonable and safe—following an engineering and traffic investigation. (HB 1353)

A driver may not allow a child under 18 to ride in a watercraft while it is being towed on a street or highway. This does not include watercraft being towed on a beach or in a parade. (HB 2981)

Driver License

Hardship driver licenses will be suspended if the holder is convicted of two or more moving violations during a 12-month period. DPS may no longer waive the driver education requirement to issue a 60-day hardship license. (HB 90)

Drivers subject to the Driver Responsibility Program will be able to pay the entire three-year amount of surcharges owed for a violation in advance, rather than paying across all three years. (HB 588)

Veterans will be exempt from the fee for a personal identification certificate if they can show honorable discharge and at least 60 percent service-related disability. Disabled veterans are exempted from driver license fees under current law. (HB 1148)

A veteran designation will be displayed on a driver license for applicants who provide proof of military service and honorable discharge. (HB 1514)

The Sunset Commission has been charged with reviewing the current oversight structure of driver education and driver safety schools, which are currently overseen by the Texas Education Agency, and determine if another state agency should have oversight. Providers of driver education courses, including DPS for the purposes of parent taught driver education, will be able to provide certificates of completion directly to those who have completed driver education courses. (HB 2678)

DPS will establish a deferral program for surcharges assessed under the Driver Responsibility Program to military personnel actively deployed outside the U.S. for the duration of the individual's deployment. (HB 2851)

Voters will be required to present a driver license, personal identification

certificate, military identification, election identification certificate, United States citizenship certificate passport, or concealed handgun license to participate in an election. DPS must create an election identification certificate to be issued by DPS for registered voters who do not have any of the other acceptable forms of photo identification. The election identification certificate will be distinguishable from a driver license or personal identification certificate, and will be issued free of charge to persons only if they do not hold any other acceptable form of identification, as listed in Election Code 63.0101. These forms of identification include a driver license, personal identification certificate, military identification, a United States citizenship certificate, passport, or concealed handgun license. (SB 14)

A four-hour driving safety course was approved for drivers under 25 years old. Drivers under 25 who are cited for a moving violation may be required to take this course. (SB 1330)

Applicants for a driver license or identification certificate must provide proof that the applicant is lawfully present in the United States. Applicants who are not U.S. citizens, legal permanent residents, or admitted to the U.S. as refugees or asylees are considered temporary visitors. Driver license and identification certificates issued to temporary visitors expire concurrent with the end of the applicant's lawful presence, or after one year if the legal stay is indefinite. Driver license and identification certificates issued to temporary visitors are to be in the same format and contain the same information as those issued to U.S. citizens and legal permanent residents. (SB 1, 82nd 1st Called Session, effective September 28, 2011)

Weapons

A person may carry a handgun, knife, or club in a watercraft under the person's ownership or control. The handgun, knife, or club may not be in plain view, used while engaging in criminal activity, or carried by a member of a

criminal street gang. (HB 25)

Employers may not prohibit employees with a concealed handgun license from having firearms or ammunition in their personal cars in the employer's parking lot. This does not apply to employees of public, private or charter schools, or employees of chemical manufacturers or oil and gas refiners. (SB 321)

Crime Labs

Crime laboratories are required to preserve biological evidence used in the investigation or prosecution of a felony for at least 40 years, or until the applicable statute of limitations has expired if there is an un-apprehended actor associated with the offense. (SB 1616, effective June 17, 2011)

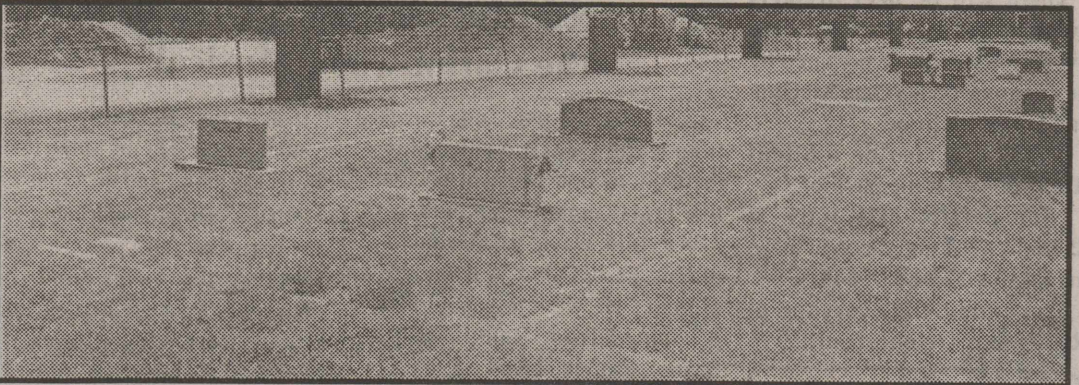
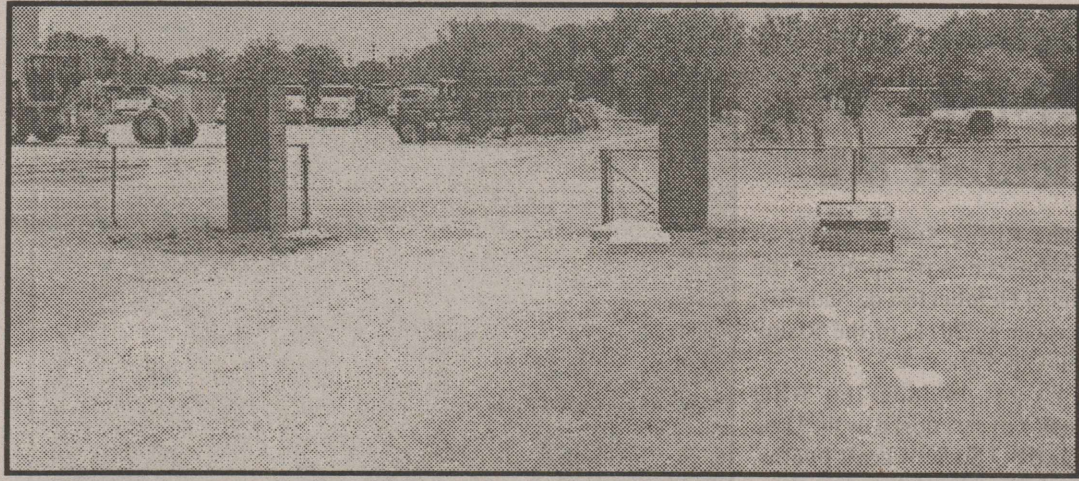
Law enforcement agencies are required to submit DNA evidence in active sexual assault cases to an accredited laboratory within 30 days of receipt. Once the evidence has been analyzed, the DNA must be compared by DPS to state and federal DNA databases. The bill requires law enforcement agencies to submit unanalyzed DNA evidence collected after September 1, 1996, to DPS for analysis. (SB 1636)

Miscellaneous

A new category of missing person alerts may now be issued for missing persons with intellectual disabilities. Activation of this alert includes a requirement of documentation of a qualifying intellectual disability. (HB 1075)

DPS must create a pass for expedited access to the state Capitol building. To be eligible, an applicant must meet the criteria to apply for a concealed handgun license, with the exception of handgun proficiency requirements. (HB 2131, effective May 30, 2011)

The Texas Fusion Center Policy Council was created to assist DPS in monitoring fusion center activities in Texas. The council is required to establish a privacy advisory group, recommend best practices for fusion centers in Texas and annually submit a report to the Governor and the Legislature regarding the council's progress. (HB 3324, effective June 17, 2011)

"In God We Trust?"

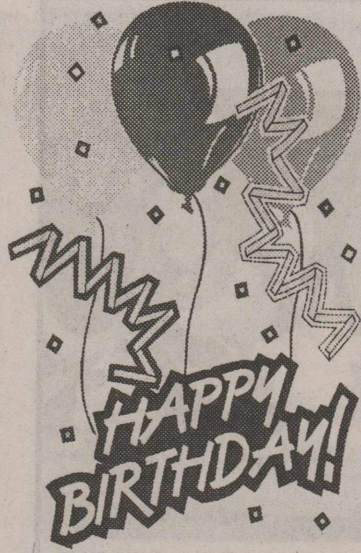
"Yes!"
