'Be the Match' will be at Cross Plains Cancer Walk, Saturday, October 15th

Representatives from the National Marrow Donor Program will be at the Cross Plains Cancer Walk again this year, conducting tests for anyone interested in joining the national registry as a bone marrow donor for the National Marrow Donor "Be The Match" Program.

It is a simple mouth swab, but it can save a life! The kits are expensive but, they are supplied by the National Marrow Donor program, all that is asked of donors is that you make a small donation in any amount to the program. The funds raised by the National Marrow Donor Program go towards the expenses donors may incur when a match is made, for

example, lab fees and travel expenses.

Lana Manley of Rowden will be one of the representatives present at the Cross Plains Cancer Walk, this Saturday, October the 15th, helping to get donors registered and she had this to say about the program.

"This program has saved my son's life, (Lana's son Colton Manley had a bone marrow transplant earlier this year and is doing great) and the lives of many others. Having spent many months recently at MD Anderson Cancer Hospital in Houston, Tx. I saw first hand how many people are in need of bone marrow transplants. People, who are simply

waiting on a donor match. In the meantime the majority of these patients are having to stay on Chemo and/or participate in clinical trials just to stay in remission and stay alive, until a match can be found."

"How sad is it to meet a 27 year old mother of two who cannot find a donor? The matching of bone marrow for transplants is very specific, therefore donors must be added daily to the registry in order to keep making matches.

Be the one to save a life, just like someone did to save my son Colton's life."

> Safety Fire **Tips for Kids Presented for**

Parents Play Big Role in Improving Teen Driving **National Teen Driver Safety** Week is October 16th-22nd

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teens. Statistics show that teens are most likely to have a crash during the first six months after getting their license, which is primarily due to their inexperience. Research shows that parents play an important role in increasing their teen's driving skills as they have the have the greatest influence over their teen's behavior. In fact, leading experts believe parents play a key role in preventing teen car crashes and deaths.

A study conducted by the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia shows that teens whose parents set rules, monitor their driving, and are supportive are half as likely to crash and twice as likely to use seat belts as teens with less involved parents. Parents can help by talking with their teens about safe driving practices. Spending as much time driving with your teen in many different driving situations can significantly impact your teen's future driving practices. Driver's License Law provides parents with the controls to help keep their teen drivers safe. However, many parents are not aware of the provisions of this law. The law is divided into two phases. During phase one, the teen driver must always be accompanied by a person at least 21 years of age. During phase two, teens cannot operate a motor vehicle with more than one passenger who is younger than 21 unless the additional passengers are also family members. Driving is prohibited between midnight and 5 a.m. unless the teen is driving to attend work or a school-related activity, or responding to an emergency situation. Cell phone use is also prohibited during this second phase. Making sure your teen follows the Graduated Driver's License Law can help get a teen safely through the most critical time when driver inexperience can lead to crashes.

Martha Alice Spraberry, Texas AgriLife Extension agent for Taylor County reminds parents to follow these tips to The Texas Graduated keep teens driving safely:

· Practice driving with your teen as often as possible.

• Discuss your rules of the road, and create a Parent-Teen Driving Agreement.

 Model good driving behavior for your teen by always using seat belts and never using a cell phone while driving.

• Share your rules with other parents and teens.

Parents can take advantage of the National Teen Driver Safety Week to talk to their teens about staying safe on the road.



New sales tax exemption registration required for agriculture & timber operators

(AUSTIN) -Beginning January 1, 2012, farm, ranch and timber operators who produce agricultural and timber products for sale will need a special registration number to claim a sales tax exemption on taxable products used in those businesses.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced they can get a registration number through either a mail-in application or an online application . Registration begins October 3, 2011.

Registration is required by House Bill 268 passed in the recent legislative session and supported by retailers and agriculture groups.

"Beginning January 1, 2012, anyone who wants to claim the agriculture or timber sales tax exemptions for qualifying products will need a registration number to show retailers, instead of simply signing an exemption certificate at the time of purchase," Combs said. "The new registration process takes the burden off retailers to verify whether a purchaser is eligible for exemption. And it narrows the pool of purchasers claiming the sales tax exemption to those actually involved in production of agriculture and timber products for sale."

The new legislation requires a registration number to claim tax exemptions when buying items such as machinery and fertilizers; equipment; irrigation insecticides: equipment; and off-road motor vehicles used for farming and timber production. Those entitled to make tax-free purchases of taxable qualifying products include groups such as: farmers and ranchers who raise agricultural products to sell to others; fish farmers and bee keepers who sell the products they raise; custom harvesters; crop dusters; commercial nurseries engaged in fostering growth of plants for sale; and timber

producers, including contract lumberjacks.

Products such as feed for livestock and wildlife, seeds and annual plants are always tax-exempt and would not require a registration number. The primary owner or operator of a farm, ranch or timber operation may obtain one registration number that can be used by anyone authorized by the registrant; including family members or employees, to make tax exempt purchases of qualifying products for the business.

The application for a registration number should take less than 10 minutes to complete. Online registration begins October 3, 2011 at www.GetReadyTexas.org. Online applicants will receive a registration number immediately.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas-With Texas still mired in a record-breaking drought and no real relief in sight, hunters and other outdoorsmen must be especially careful when heading out to take part in their favorite pastimes.

Dangerous wildfire conditions are expected through the fall and into the winter, which means a wildfire easily could be ignited by just one spark from an unattended campfire, lit cigarette, muzzle of a gun or even a hot exhaust pipe on a car left running - or parked - on the side of the road.

"You should always take wildfire conditions into consideration when you're doing anything outside that could cause a spark especially with vegetation as critically dry as it is right now," said Justice Jones, coordinator for the Wildland Urban Interface and Fire Prevention programs. "If you start an accidental wildfire, the camp you destroy may be your own.

should take precautions. All outdoorsmen should keep fire safety in mind as conditions remain ripe for massive, unwieldy wildfires.

"Roughly 90 percent of fires in Texas are started accidentally by people," Jones said. "That means they're preventable. And that's just what we want people to do prevent them."

If you're heading outside, keep in mind the following wildfire safety tips:

• Obey outdoor burning bans. Don't build a fire during dry or windy conditions.

• Drive only on designated trails. Don't park or idle vehicles in dry grass, which can be ignited by contact with a hot muffler.

• When shooting close to the ground, be sure there is no dry grass or tinder in front of your muzzle. Though rare, it's not impossible for a shot to janite

• Use caution with cigarettes

Where Hope Is Born: Celebrating **125 Years Of The Gladney Center**

By U.S. Sen. John Cornyn Lured by advertisements painting a "land of milk and money" and promises of "free land," thousands of European families immigrated to the United States in the 1800s. Sadly, overcrowding in

northeastern port cities led to unsanitary conditions and diseases that claimed the lives of many overworked parents. This resulted in a growing population of homeless orphans. In 1853, philanthropist Charles Loring Brace, founder of the Children's Aid Society, began an unconventional experiment aimed at finding well-rounded homes for the orphans of New York City.

Brace's social experiment, the Orphan Train Movement, would come to be widely recognized as the beginning of the foster care concept in the U.S. From the 1850s through the early 1900s, the Orphan Train Movement placed more than 120,000 orphans in homes throughout the country. Brace's intention was for the orphans, many of whom lived in the slums or on city streets, to find shelter and a healthy upbringing in farm homes in the West. Children would be placed in homes at no cost but with the promise of providing extra help with daily chores on the farm or in the house.

As the trains made their way west, the stronger, healthier children had better chances of being adopted first. Many of the remaining children made it as far west as Fort Worth, where Methodist minister I.Z.T. Morris provided them with

shelter as he worked to find adoptive families. Morris established the Texas Children's Home and Aid Society in Fort Worth in 1887. His conditions were clear children would only be placed with parents and families that were appropriate for them, not just the first parties to show interest and meet eligibility requirements. The home was chartered by the state of Texas on January 25, 1904. Morris' wife Isabella and social worker Edna Gladney ran the home. Following the death of Morris in 1914 and his wife in 1925, Gladney, from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, took over as

superintendent of the home. Over the next 33 years, Gladney would leave a lasting impression on the center, the families and children it served, and also on society's perception of orphans and unwed mothers. Gladney oversaw the expansion of the center to include a maternity facility, where expectant mothers could receive prenatal care, as well as a Baby Home, where infants received specialized care until they were adopted. Gladney also led the fight to enact two major pieces of legislation improving the adoption process. The first bill, which passed the Texas Legislature in 1936, required the word "illegitimate" to be removed from birth certificates. Gladney also successfully lobbied the State to allow adopted children to have the same inheritance rights as biological children. This resulted in Texas issuing second birth certificates for children in the name of their

adoptive parents.

By the 1960s, the newly renamed Edna Gladney Home, now under the direction of Ruby Lee Piester, had expanded further to include an on-campus middle and high school, a counseling department, dormitory, and living center for older women. Over the next several decades, the home would also expand to offer adoption services for children with special needs.

Today, the Gladney Center, renamed in 1986, is the nation's oldest, largest, most comprehensive maternity and adoption agency. Since it was founded by I.Z.T. Morris in 1887, the Gladney Center has placed nearly 30,000 children and helped more than 37,000 birthparents. This past month, the Gladney Center began a year-long celebration of the institution's 125th Anniversary themed "Where Hope is Born." All Texans can be proud of this first-rate center and the fine work it has been doing for 125 years to make a positive difference in the lives of children, birthmothers and adoptive parents.

Cross Plains' retail sales in 2011 are 4% higher

The City of Cross Plains' two percent city sales tax payments in 2011 are up by over four percent, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Friday, September 9th.

Cross Plains' 2011 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$153,091.26, which is 4.34 percent higher than the \$146,701.38 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2010.

The payment to the city for September 2011 was \$17,434.46, which is 10.18 per-September 2010 of \$15,823.43.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said today, Friday, September 9th, that state sales tax revenue in August was \$1.98 billon, up 11.9 percent compared to August 2010.

"Monthly sales tax revenue has Friday, October 7th. now increased for 17 consecutive months," said Combs. "For the state's recently concluded 2011 fiscal year, sales tax revenue increased 9.4 percent from the pervious fiscal year. Sales tax revenue grew in major sectors especially the oil and gas industry and manufacturing as a result of increased business spending during the year. There was also growth in the retail and restaurant sectors. We will continue to monitor factors such as the job market, consumer spending and housing."

Combs will send September sales tax allocations totaling \$483.9 million to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 10 percent compared to September 2010.

Sales tax allocations to Texas cities totaled \$323.7 million in September 2011, up 8.6 percent compared to September ment 2010 and up 6.8 percent yearto-date.



USDA Agrees to Extend Deadline for Public Comments on New Animal ID Rule

Non-Profits Representing Farmers and Ranchers Applaud Decision

AUSTIN, TX (Oct. 7, 2011) - The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced that it is extending the deadline for public comments on its proposed rule for mandatory animal traceability, following a request by forty-nine organizations for a deadline extension.

The organizations had sent a letter to Secretary of Agriculture Vilsack requesting an extension to allow sufficient time for the people who will be affected to analyze the rule and submit comments.

"We have significant concerns about the substance of the rule, and we appreciate the USDA providing more time for public comment," stated Judith McGeary, Executive Director of the Farm and Ranch Freedom Alliance and vice-chair of the USDA Advisorv Secretary's Committee on Animal Health. "Our farmers are already struggling with the poor economy and terrible weather conditions in many parts of the country, and they need additional time to be able to provide comment to the agency about the impact this proposed rule will have."

While the USDA already has traceability requirements as part of existing animal disease control programs, the proposed rule goes much further to require animal tracking even absent clear and documented disease threats. The proposed rule has raised significant concerns among family farm and ranch advocates, who accuse the agency of pushing a program benefit corporate to agribusiness interests rather than animal health.

"The USDA keeps saying that this is an animal health program, but it has failed to provide valid animal health reasons for it," argued Bill Bullard, CEO of R-CALF USA. "The real push for this program comes from the giant meat packing corporations who want international standards to help their export markets." Farm advocates have suggested that meatpacking companies that wish to export meat should enhance the current voluntary programs that compensate farmers and ranchers for the extra paperwork and costs involved with complying.

The USDA draft rule greatly expands what animals must be identified, including young feeder cattle, which are processed at a young age and never enter the breeding herd. "While any animal can become sick, there is no evidence that tracking feeder cattle will do anything to address animal disease issues in this country," continued Ms. McGeary. "To the contrary, requiring the large numbers of feeder cattle to be tagged and accompanied by paperwork could actually harm our ability to respond to animal diseases by swamping the system with unnecessary stacks of paper." While expressing

"For the sake of all Americans, the USDA should put the interests of family farmers ahead of the meatpacking lobby," stated Mark A. Kastel, Senior Farm Policy Analyst at The Cornucopia Institute.





Lemon Fluff

Ingredients

1 can (12 ounces) evaporated milk 1 package (3 ounces) lemon gelatin 1 cup sugar

1-1/3 cups boiling water

1/4 cup lemon juice

1-3/4 cups graham cracker crumbs

5 tablespoons butter, melted

Directions

Pour milk into a small metal bowl; place mixer beaters in the bowl. Cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours.

Meanwhile, in a large bowl, dissolve gelatin and sugar in boiling water. Stir in lemon juice. Cover and refrigerate until syrupy, about 1-1/2 hours.

In a small bowl, combine crumbs and butter; set aside 2 tablespoons for garnish. Press remaining crumbs onto the bottom of a 13-in. x 9-in. dish. Beat chilled milk until soft peaks form. Beat gelatin until tiny bubbles form. Fold milk into gelatin. Pour over prepared crust. Sprinkle with reserved crumbs. Cover and refrigerate until set. Cut into squares. Yield: 12 servings.




Callahan County Homeowner Rehabilitation Assistance Program has Funds Available for Qualifying Applicants

Callahan County has been awarded a Homeowner **Rehabilitation** Assistance contract with the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA). This contract makes funds available to qualifying residences of the County for assistance in Rehabilitation, Reconstruction, or New Construction of single-family residences owned and occupied by low-income households that were affected by the windstorm on May 1, 2011.

Household Eligibility Factors - To be eligible to receive HRA assistance, the household and the property must comply with all eligibility factors, including but not limited to: Household income must be at or below 80% of HUD's Area Median Family Income; 2) Household must have a clear marketable title and provide evidence of ownership; 3) Must be current on taxes; 4) At completion, unit must meet applicable construction standards. HRA assistance is provided in the form of Deferred Forgivable Loan, Grant Agreement or Repayable Loan depending on eligibility factors.

Callahan County residents interested in applying for HRA assistance can pick up an application packet from the County Treasurer's Office at 100 W. 4th St, Ste. 100, Baird, Texas 79504. 


