


Local Community Claims National Degree Recipient - Indianapolis, IND. - Tiffany

Holland, a member of the Cross Plains FFA Chapter from Cross Plains, Tx. and daughter of Joe and Susan Holland, received the American FFA Degree. Earning the degree means Tiffany is one of a select group of individuals recognized for years of academic and professional excellence. The honor was presented on October 22, 2011 at the 84th National FFA Convention, held in Indianapolis, Ind. This degreee recognizes demonstrated leadership ability and outstanding achievements in agricultural business, production, processing or service programs. To be eligible, members must have earned and productively invested \$7,500 through a supervised agricultural experience (SAE) program in which they start, own or hold a professional position in an existing mission to demonstrate outstanding leadership abilities and community involvement. Each award recipient received a Gold American FFA Degree key, and a certificate in a blue leatherette frame. Of the 540,379 FFA members nationwide, Tiffany was one of only 3,241 to be recognized in 2011. The photo above is Tiffany and Mr. Richey at the convention in Indianapolis. This is Mr. Richey's only student in his 30 years to receive the highest degree. Randy Montgomery was the last to receive this award locally.
