American FFA Degree. Earning the degree means Tiffany is one American FFA Degree. Earning the degree means Tiffany is one
of a select group of individuals recognized for years of academic and professional excellence. The honor was presented on October 22, 2011 at the 84th National FFA Convention, held in Indianapolis, Ind. This degreee recognizes demonstrated leadership ability and nutstanding achievements in agricultural business, production, processing or service programs. To be eligible, members must have earned and productively invested $\$ 7,500$
through a supervised agricultural experience (SAE) program which they start, own or hold a professional position in an existing mission to demonstrate outstanding leadership abilities and community involvement. Each award recipient received a Gold American FFA Degree key, and a certificate in a blue leatherette frame.
