Have A Bountiful Thanksgiving

County Burn Ban reinstated for another 90 days

The Callahan County Commissioners voted to reinstate the countywide outdoor burn ban for another 90 days effective immediately.

The commissioners' court took the action Monday, November 21st during the commissioners' court meeting held at the County Courthouse in Baird.

The county outdoor burn ban information follows:

The Burn Ban order follows:

CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 240.906 of the Local Government Code, the Callahan County Commissioners Court had found that dry conditions in the unincorporated areas of Callahan County create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and, whereas, such a finding authorizes the issuance of an order which prohibits or restricts outdoor burning.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED that the following regulations are hereby established for all unincorporated areas of Callahan County, Texas.

(1) Action prohibited:

A. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly burns any combustible material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, or orders such burning by others.

B. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly engages in any activity outdoors which could allow flames or sparks that could result in a fire, or orders such activities by others.

(2) Enforcement:

A. A violation of this order is a Class C Misdemeanor. B. This order may be enforced by any

duly commissioned peace officer in Callahan County

(3) This order is effective and enforceable for 90 days after the date of adoption which is indicated below.

(4) This order does not apply to outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission for firefighter training; public utility, natural gas pipeline, or mining operations, or, harvesting of agriculture crops.

(5) Further, a person is not in violation if prior to the setting of any outdoor fire, he or she first obtains the permission of the appropriate volunteer Fire Chief. In this instance the Fire Chief will have the authority to set the conditions, restrictions, and/or precautions which must be observed.

(6) See Attachment A for welding precautions and Attachment B for grilling precautions.

ATTACHMENT A

Due to high fire danger and dry foliage these restrictions were put in place for the protection of the Citizens and their property in Callahan County. It was not in-

tended to take away a person's livelihood.

WELDING WILL BE PERMITTED IF THE PROPER PRECAUTIONS ARE BEING TAKEN.

1. The individual welding must have a spotter.

2. Two wet fire extinguishers must be available.

3. Must have sufficient supply of water on hand at all times.

4. Must have water sprayer available for use.

5. Must wet down sufficient area (and re-wet as often as necessary).

These safety precautions must be taken and also, please use common sense and good judgement if the conditions are windy. If the job is not an emergency put it off until another date.

Violations will be punishable by a penalty of a fine of up to \$1,000.00 or confinement in jail for a term not exceeding 180 days. An individual, or individuals, could be liable for damages, if fire occurs. If there is a fatality, one could face possible felony charges.

ATTACHMENT B

OUTDOOR GRILLING WILL BE PERMITTED IF THESE PRECAUTIONS ARE TAKEN.

1. Individuals grilling must attend the grill at all times.

2. Must have sufficient supply of water on hand at all times.

3. Cooking must be done in an enclosed cooker.

Violations will be punishable by a penalty of a fine of up to \$1,000.00 or confinement in jail for a term not exceeding 180 days. An individual, or individuals, could be liable for damages, if fire occurs. If there is a fatality, one could face possible felony charges.

Big Country Crop Risk Management Workshop set for December 1st

A one day workshop focusing on Crop Risk Management will be held on Thursday, December 1, 2011 at the Taylor County AgriLife Extension office located on the grounds of the Taylor County Expo Center in Abilene from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The workshop will focus on incorporating crop market outlooks, with crop insurance, and price risk management tools to help improve overall farm risk management.

The workshop will be conducted by Extension Grain Marketing Specialist Dr. Mark Welch and AgriLife Extension Economist Bill Thompson. A new software tool will be demonstrated that will evaluate risk implications with various insurance alternatives. The software will be made

available to all workshop participants. A market outlook for feed grains will be given with implications for planting and marketing decisions. The workshop will conclude with a hands-on decision exercise where participants will choose crops, insurance products, pre-harvest market strategies and post-harvest marketing strategies. This exercise is a realistic learning activity designed to integrate the discussion about crop mix, production costs, insurance, marketing, and risk.

Registration fee is \$10 per participant which includes lunch and workshop materials. Pre-registration is required as space is limited so make your reservations early by contacting the Taylor County Extension Office at 325-672-6048 by November 30th.

Visitation was Tuesday, November 22, 2011 at the funeral home in Cross Plains from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m.

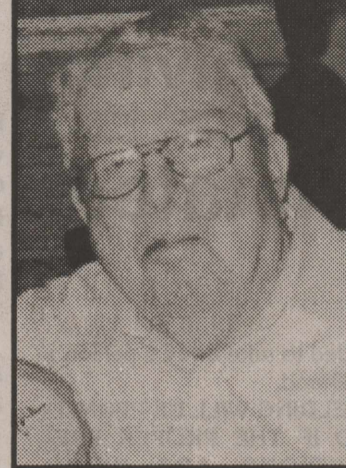

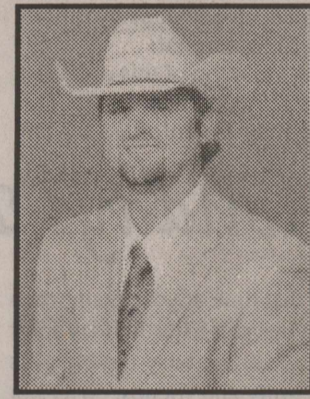

Travel Safely this Thanksgiving Holiday

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) would like to remind Thanksgiving travelers to be safe on the roads during the long holiday weekend.

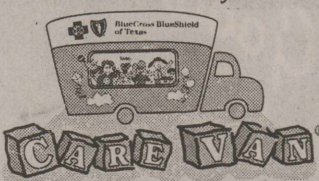
"Between distractions and the rush to get to holiday destinations, it's easy for drivers to lose focus on the road," said Assistant Director Luis Gonzalez, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol Division. "Practicing safe driving habits will help ensure everyone arrives at their Thanksgiving destination without incident."

Drivers are also reminded to slow down to 20 miles per hour below the speed limit for stopped emergency vehicles with emergency lights activated, or to vacate the lane closest to the vehicle if the road has multiple lanes traveling in the same direction. Effective September 1, 2011, this law applies to tow trucks in addition to law enforcement, fire and emergency medical vehicles.

DPS troopers, along with many law enforcement agencies, will be patrolling throughout the holiday weekend to promote safety. During the Thanksgiving weekend in 2010, DPS troopers arrested 376 individuals for driving while intoxicated, issued 9,025 speeding citations and issued more than 1,000 safety restraint citations.

DPS offers the following tips to ensure safe travels:

- Minimize distractions as much as possible. Don't text and drive and keep cell phone chatter to a minimum. Just drive.
- Don't travel fatigued. Switch drivers or find a safe location and take a break.
- Adjust speed for weather, traffic conditions and emergency vehicles.
- Don't drink and drive; designate a driver.
- Make sure everyone in the car is buckled up.
- Drive courteously.

Callahan County participating in 'Hog Out County Grants Program'

Callahan County is again participating in the Texas Department of Agriculture sponsored grant program designed to encourage counties across the State of Texas to make a concentrated and coordinated effort to reduce the feral hog population and the damage caused by these animals. The program will be from October, 2011 through December 31, 2011. Participating counties will be required to document the following results:

*Number of feral hogs taken in the county, as certified by the county. The county will receive five points per 10 hogs taken.

*Number of individuals participating in county-approved educational courses addressing feral hog abatement technologies.

The Callahan County Predator Association needs your help by reporting numbers to the Callahan County Extension Office, if

you have killed, trapped or otherwise caught feral hogs during this time period. Numbers must be reported by signing a certification form indicating date, location, etc. on form and returning to Extension office. Certification forms may be picked at Callahan County Farmers Coop Inc. in Baird, Clyde Farm and Ranch Supply in Clyde or the Extension office located in room 201 at the Callahan

County Courthouse. Ranchers may join this effort by becoming a member of the Callahan County Predator Association. One hundred percent of funds received from membership or participating grants will be used to control feral hogs in Callahan County. For further information please call 325-854-5835.

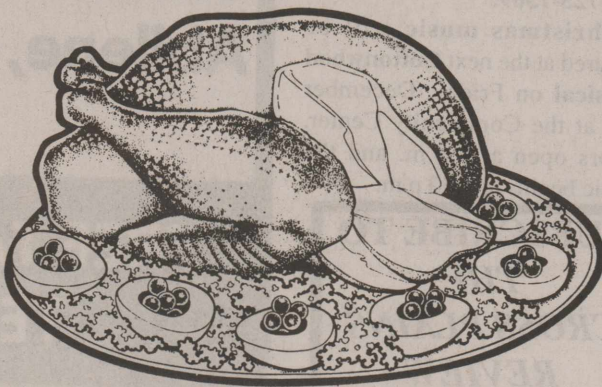

Texas AgriLife Extension Service is proud to announce that the 2011 Abilene Area Pecan Show will be held December 6, 2011. Residents of Callahan, Jones, Shackelford, Nolan, Fisher and Taylor Counties are invited to submit their pecans for competition and judging.

To enter the 2011 Abilene Area Pecan Show, submit 42 nuts of each pecan variety in a resealable, plastic bag to the Taylor County Extension Office. Entries will be accepted beginning Monday, November 28th; however, all entries are due to the Taylor County Extension Office by 5:00 p.m. on Friday, December 2nd.

Don't worry if you are not sure of the pecan varieties that you have. All entries will be classified before they are judged. Pecans will be cracked and shelled on Monday, December 5th and then judged

on Tuesday, December 6th. Our judge for this year's competition is John Begnaud, retired Extension Horticulturalist from San Angelo, Texas.

All entries will then be on display at the Extension office on Tuesday, December 6th until 6:00 p.m. We will have a special Pecan Clinic and Awards Ceremony at 6:00 p.m. Topic of the seminar will be focused around pecan tree care and pecan nutrition. We will wrap up the clinic by recognizing the participants in the pecan show. All entries must be picked up from the Taylor County Extension Office following the clinic. USDA Reminds Producers of Dec. 1st Sales Closing Date for Noninsurable Crops

(BAIRD, TX) - November 17, 2011 - Callahan County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Robert Frost urges producers who want to purchase coverage through the Noninsurable Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) to do so before the sales closing date of December 1, 2011.

NAP provides financial assistance to producers of noninsurable crops when low yields/grazing loss, loss of inventory or prevented planting occur due to normal disasters.

The following crops have a NAP application closing date of Dec. 1, 2011: grazing and forage/hay on native and improved grass.

"Purchasing a crop insurance policy is an easy way for producers to practice risk management," said Frost. "The 2011 crop year has proved that natural disasters can directly affect the profitability and recovery of agricultural operations," he said.

In order to meet eligibility requirements for NAP, crops must be noninsurable, commercially-produced agricultural commodity crops for which the catastrophic risk protection level of crop insurance is not available.

In the event of a natural disaster, NAP covers the amount of loss greater than 50 percent of the expected production based on the approved yield and reported acreage.

Eligible producers can apply for coverage using form CCC-471, "Application for Coverage." Producers must file the application and service fee by the Dec. 1st deadline. The service fee is the lesser of \$250 per crop or \$750 per producer per administrative county, not to exceed a total of \$1,875 for a producer with farming interests in multiple counties.

The last building on the left as you left town on Highway 36 was Jim Baum's welding shop. Jim built the stock pens at the Locker Plant. There was a state meat inspector that kept noising around asking questions an aggravating him, and he had just finished cutting off a piece of flat iron when he spotted the inspector coming around the corner. Jim waited until he got to where he was working and asked the inspector very politely to hand him the piece of flat iron. You could hear the meat on that inspector's hand frying as he stated in an irritable voice, "Why didn't you tell me that was hot?" Jim, with a whisper of a grin, said, "I thought you State Boys knew everything!" He continued, "But I give you credit for one thing, it don't take you long to inspect a piece of hot iron." From then on the inspector got real scarce.

Jim had a sign on the back of welding truck that read "Always late", which was true most of the

time.

Jim and my dad, T.O. "Nick" Nichols were going to the creek fishing and my brother Larry and Vernon, one of Jim's boys, wanted to go so they could try out their new sling-shots. I was about four or five and they wanted Daddy to take me along so they could go and look after me. Daddy asked, "Who's going to look after y'all?"

I consider him my mentor/the greatest classroom teacher I have ever had/ and a patriotic solid citizen.

Very sadly and unfortunately, last week, Mr. Hundley was mugged in North Dallas and left for dead in a hotel parking lot. His wife, a fine educator in her time, drove to Baylor Medical to pick up the pieces and to care for Mr. Hundley.

Mr. Hundley currently lies in ICU with bleeding on the brain. After a brief conversation with Mrs. Hundley on Thursday, her frustration was high due to very little police and doctor communication. To make things

even worse, her bags were stolen from the hospital waiting room.

Now to my point....I picked up the phone and called long-time friend and C.P. School employee Lurene McNutt. I knew her son-in-law Roger worked for the Dallas P.D. In a few minutes I received a call from Officer Rudloff. He listened to my frustration and took immediate action.

I am most impressed that he went to Baylor Medical to check Mrs. Hundley!!! Nora, you did quite well in raising this young man! You have a lot to be proud of and you raised this young man quite right!

Roger, although I have only had maybe three conversations with you in person, I appreciate that you went above and beyond to help this family.

My late Father would always say about the people of Cross Plains, "Good people!" Roger, you have spread that goodness about three hours east!!

At this writing my friend is still in ICU, and the perpetrator is on the loose, but I am comforted and plain old excited about the passion and compassion of the actions of one C.P. graduate Roger Rudloff! Well done, young man!!!!

Thank God for "good people"

WHEREAS, on October 1, 2011, a legislative change to Section 11.253 of the Texas Tax Code (which provides a general exemption from property taxation for certain goods-in-transit personal property) takes effect and nullifies all previous local option actions taken by a Commissioners' Court to provide for the taxation of goods-in-transit; and

WHEREAS, the new statute also provides a local option for Commissioners' Court to opt out of the exemption provided it takes official action to tax the goods-in-transit after October 1, 2011 and before January 1st of the first tax year in which the Commissioners' Court proposes to tax goods-in-transit; and

WHEREAS, the Callahan County Commissioners' Court held a public hearing on the issue of taxing goods-in-transit on November 14, 2011; and

WHEREAS, the Callahan County Commissioners' Court finds that the goods-in-transit exemption as authorized by Section 11.253 of the Texas Tax Code is not in the best interest of Callahan County and further finds that more appropriate business incentives exist to encourage economic development and growth of business in Callahan County;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS, as permitted by the Texas Constitution and Section 11.253 of the Texas Tax Code, hereby provides for the taxation of goods-in-transit otherwise exempt from taxation by Section 11.253 of the Texas Tax Code.

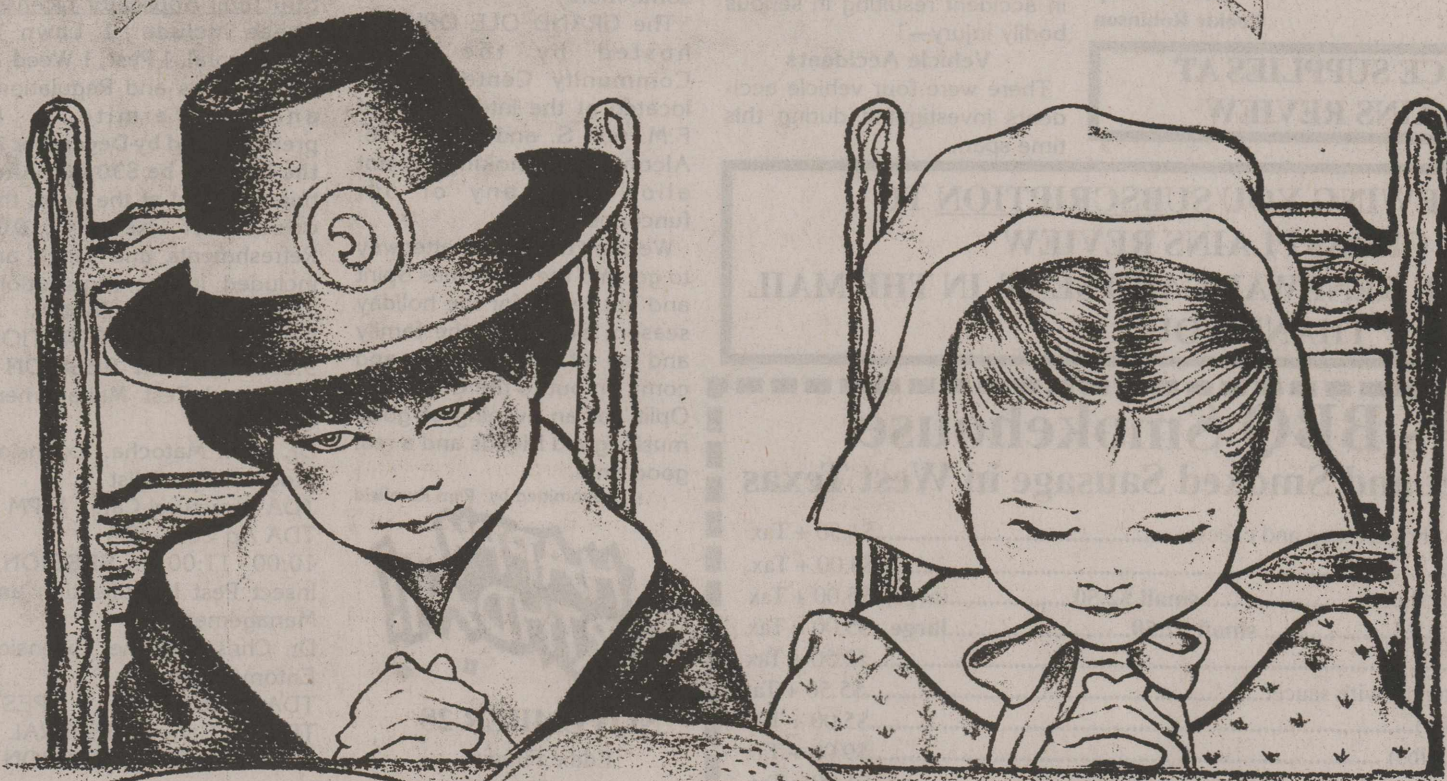

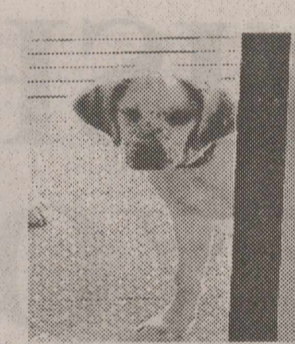
