AUSTIN-Today, (Thursday, January 17th) State Representative Jim Keffer proudly jointauthored a bill reaffirming and protecting each citizen's right to bear arms. The "Second Amendment Preservation Act" was filed in response to potential federal Executive Orders that would unconstitutionally restrict the right

The proposed legislation nullifies all federal acts in violation of the Second Amendment and prohibits the enforcement of any federal law or regulation that attempts to confiscate or ban any firearm, limits the size of a Brown, Callahan, Coleman, magazine or the amount of ammunition that may be pur- Shackelford, and Stephens chased for any firearm, or imposes a tax or registration re-

quirement on any firearm or ammunition.

"Texans believe in gun safety, responsible ownership, and we certainly stand against those who abuse such privileges," said State Representative Jim Keffer, "but we also stand firm that our right to bear arms should not be infringed upon by the federal government. In these trying times, we refer to our Constitution for guidance and there we confirm our natural right of self-preser-

Congressman Mike Conaway will be in Clyde on Wednesday, January 30th at the Clyde Chamber of Commerce office meeting with constituents.





HUD-VASH program offers housing assistance to homeless Veterans

The HUD-VASH Program is a partnership between the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the Department of Veterans affairs (VA) designed to provide case management and supportive services along with subsidized housing vouchers for eligible homeless Veterans and their families.

The HUD-VASH program allows eligible Veteran families to obtain safe, affordable, accessible, permanent housing in a location of their choice.

The primary goal of the program is to help move Veterans and their families out of homelessness and provide support to sustain these Veteran families residing in the community.

The "Housing Choice" vouchers are adminstered through a local Public Housing Authority (PHA). Ongoing case management is provided as needed by qualified staff affiliated with the local VA medical facility.

Case managemennt is central to the HUD-VASH program and is a requirement for continuing participation, even after the Veteren is housed.

Veterans must follow the rules of the PHA and the landlord to sustain their housing.

Where can the Voucher be used?

HUD-VASH Vouchers can be used to subsidize rental unity from any landlord willing to accept a Section-8 housing voucher and work with the partnering Public Housing Authority. Vouchers are also portable, within specific limitations.

What does the case manager

Case managers work in partnership with Veteran participants to provide support ans assistance to promote housing, stability, permanence, and recovery. Case management will last as long as it is needed by the The case manager can assist

with things such as: Obtaining PHA required

documentation Resolving credit problems

Support during the PHA

Locating an apartment

 Connecting with the community

Supporting Recovery

The case manager will work with the Veteran to establish recovery and housing goals. The case manager will meet with the Veteran individually in the office, as well as the Veteran's home. Group meetings may be offered as well to provide pier support and

develop community. What cost is involved?

Veterans must pay a portion of the monthly rent directly to the landlord. This is equal to 30-40% of their gross monthly income, with a minimum rent of \$50./month. The housing authority pays the remaining portion of the rent.

Security Deposits, along with other up front fees are the responsibility of the Veteran. Some community resources may be available to help with these expenses.

What do I need to get started? Most PHAs require the following documents for all family members:

• Photo ID for all Adults • Birth Certificate for children

Who is eligible to participate? HUD-VASH is designed to support eligible homeless Veterans who need ongoing case management in order to be sucessful with independent

community living. In order to participate in the program, HUD-VASH

candidates must be VA health care eligible Veterans, homeless and have a clinical need for and willingness to participate in management. Veterans in transitional housing or residential treatment programs who were homeless prior to entering those programs are also eligible.

HUD requirements prevent vouchers being issued to the Veteran family if the household income exceeds certain limits or if anyone living in the Veteran's household is required by register on a Lifetime Sex Offender Registry.

The voucher can only be issued to the Veteran, but is designed to allow the Veteran to live with family members.

Any VA clinician or community service provider may refer Veterans for the program. Veterans may also refer themselves. Veterans will be screened for the program, to ensure eligibility and clinical need.

Homeless Veterans not currently working with a VA clinician should contact the Health Care for Homeless Veterans Outrach Secialist or a Social worker at the VA Medical Center to discuss available housing support options, including the HUD-VASH program.

Texas' Biennial Revenue Estimate Proves the Success of the Texas Model

By Talmadge Heflin

Conservatives have long-held that Texas' model of low taxes, limited government, and a fair legal system is the best approach to governing, and now this view has gotten a major boost from a new revenue report.

Last week, Comptroller Susan Combs issued the state's 2014-15 Biennial Revenue Estimate (BRE), a report that tells lawmakers how much they'll have to spend in the 2013 legislative session, and the picture it paints of state's economy and revenue outlook is quite rosy. Over the next three years, according to the report, Texas' economy is expected to continue to post strong employment gains, forecast at 232,000 new jobs this fiscal year, 234,000 the following year, and 266,000 in 2015. Assuming these estimates hold, this sort of job creation would, again, make Texas one of the

nation's leading job creators. What's more, the report makes clear that Texas' economy will continue to expand at a brisk pace, easily outpacing the nation as a whole. For fiscal 2013, 2014, and 2015, the Comptroller expects real gross state product to grow by 3.4 percent, 3.4 percent, and 3.9 percent, respectively. By comparison, the U.S. economy is expected to grow just 1.7 percent in fiscal 2013, 2.6 percent in fiscal 2014, and 3.4 percent in fiscal 2015.

Texas' strong employment gains and economic growth mean that the state's revenue system, which is heavily dependent on consumption, is also makers to direct any "extra" performing well-above expectations. So much so, in fact, that by the end of the current budget

have an extra \$8.8 billion more rest back to taxpayers. general revenue than initially budget cycle "fiscal 2014-15" total state revenues are predicted to jump 5.6 percent to just over \$208 billion, largely fueled by rising tax collections (a 6.6 percent increase over 2012-13).

To top it all off, the state's Economic Stabilization Fund, or reach almost \$12 billion by the end of fiscal 2014-15, an alltime high.

The BRE leaves little doubt about the direction of Texas' economy or the movement of

state revenues: but the state's good fortunes do not come without a price. For conservatives at way to go about doing this is to least, the cost of a well-to-do economy is making sure that Texas does not become a victim of its own success.

With the state's coffers flush with cash and big pile of money socked away in the state's savings account, there will be immense pressure on lawmakers this Session to spend every last dime the state has on growing the size of government, the very kind of unforced error that would reverse a decade of limited government gains and put in jeop-

ardy Texas' bright future. By now, we're all familiar enough with California, Illinois, and New York to know Texas' fate should it go down the road of reckless spending, which makes it critical that the state keep a tight rein on spending. But persuading lawmakers from needlessly growing government is only part of the puzzle.

The other piece is getting lawmoney the state might have at the right places. Namely, those funds should go to making the cycle the state is projected to budget whole and returning the

If you remember, lawmakers projected. For the next two-year balanced the state's last 2012-13 budget using all manner of accounting tricks, underfunding Medicaid to the tune of \$4 billion, a \$2.3 billion payment delay to the Foundation School Program, and tapping one-time revenues. Unwinding and eliminating these savings account, is expected to costly gimmicks should be the first order of business for the state's unexpected windfall in order to make sure that the people's budget is honest and transparent.

The remaining money ought to be returned to taxpayers in the form of lower taxes. One reduce the margin tax burden by exempting a greater number of small businesses from it. Our estimates suggest that the Legislature could raise the tax's exemption threshold from \$1 million to \$10 million, thereby providing tax relief to many more businesses at a cost of only \$1.2 billion. Reforms like this would further reinforce the idea that Texas is an example of fiscal discipline.

Conservatives should take heart in the Comptroller's latest report because it signals that our small government policies are working to create some big economic and fiscal opportunities. But it's also critical that we stand guard against those who would turn our success against

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Texas Unemployment Rate Declines for Fourth Consecutive Month 2012 concludes with nearly 11 million jobs in Texas

AUSTIN-Texas' unemployment rate fell to 6.1 percent in December, down from 6.2 percent in November and from 7.4 percent a year ago. This marked the fourth straight month that the over-the-month expansion for unemployment rate in Texas has declined. Texas employers added 4,100 total nonfarm jobs in December for a total of 260,800 jobs added over the year. In December 2012, Texas employers reported 10,904,000 total nonfarm

"In December, we saw annual growth in 10 major industries, for an overall annual growth of 2.5 percent in Texas," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "With those positive strides and 11,800 private sector jobs added in the past month, 2012 was a strong year for Texas and my hope is that the Texas economy will build

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on that success in 2013." Six out of 11 major industries in Texas added jobs in December, led by 13,300 jobs

added in Professional and Business Services Nthe largest this industry since January

"I'm glad to see the unemployment rate has dropped by more than a full point over the course of the TWC vear." said Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "Positive economic growth is good news for the workers of Texas, and TWC is committed to helping those still looking to get back to work."

Manufacturing added 3,000 jobs between November and December, while another goods-producing industry, Mining and Logging, expanded by 1,600 jobs during this time.

Service-providing industries that also showed positive growth over the month included Education and Health Services, Other Services, and Trade, Transportation, and

"Private sector employers in 🗲 Texas added 257,400 jobs since December 2011 for an annual growth rate of 2.9 percent." said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Tom Pauken. "Texas is leading the way in helping to make the United States energy independent. Our robust energy sector not only is creating good paying jobs for many Texans in that industry but also is spurring job growth in many other industries."

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the December unemployment rate in the state at 3.1 percent. The Odessa MSA came in second at 3.7 percent, and the Amarillo MSA Whitney (Kirkham) Henderson third at 4.1 percent (not seasonally adjusted).
