





## Moses Led with 87 Votes in the City Election

The City Council election was held on Saturday with a total of 318 votes (including early voters) determining the councilmen for the next 2 years.

Colby Walker had 79. Returning to their positions. Homer Parson came in with 33 votes, Ron Bell with 19 votes and James Nichols with 14 votes.

## Pushing The Limits At The Local Library May 23rd

The Cross Plains Public Library's fourth and final event for Pushing the Limits, a pilot project to explore ways for all of us to push the limits using science and technology, will be Thursday, May 23rd. We will meet at the Senior Citizens Center at 6:30 for a light supper and start the book discussion at 7:00. Participants have been reading the book *The Land of Painted Caves* by Jean Auel, author of the best seller *Earth's Children* series. Auel has spent more than thirty years in consultation with experts around the world, visiting numerous sites, and has done her own research for her long time love between the Neanderthal and Cro-Magnon during the Paleolithic era.

Join us, even if you have not read the book, for an interesting discussion on the subject of Knowledge. There will be a human-interest video shown that will make a great conversation also.

This four-part pilot program the library has been hosting on Nature, Survival, Connection, and Knowledge, has been funded by the National Science Foundation. The program was developed by a team of library professionals, scientist, and filmmakers. Their organizations include Dartmouth College, the Association for Rural and Small Libraries, the Califa Group, Dawson Media Group and Oregon State University.


## Senior Center to Honor Veterans





### Donald Douglas Stephens

Donald Douglas Stephens age 81 of Snyder, Texas, died Friday, May 10, 2013 at Covenant Medical Center in Lubbock.

Services for Donald Stephens were held on Wednesday, May 15, 2013 at 2:00 PM at Colonial Hill Baptist Church with Dr. Tommy Culwell officiating. Interment followed at Hillside Memorial Gardens under the direction of Bell-Cypert-Seale Funeral Home.





## Maximize your harvest this season despite limited time, space and energy

Increase your garden's productivity even when space, time and energy are limited. Just follow these six simple planting, maintenance and harvesting techniques for a more bountiful harvest.

Maximize your planting space with wide rows. Leave just enough room for plants to reach their maximum size. Make wide rows, 4 to 5 feet wide, so you can reach all plants for maintenance and harvest. Minimizing walkways means more planting space.

Try interplanting. Grow short season crops like lettuce and radishes between long season crops like cabbage, tomatoes and peppers. The short season crops will be ready to harvest when the long season crops are reaching mature size. You'll double your harvest and grow more vegetables, not weeds between your longer season plants.

Grow more plants per row with succession planting. Start the season with cool season vegetables like lettuce and spinach. Once these are harvested and temperatures warm replace with beans and onions. Harvest these and plant a fall crop of radishes or lettuce.

When you use these intensive

planting techniques, be sure to incorporate a low nitrogen slow release fertilizer, like Milorganite, at the start of the season. Then add a mid-season nutrient boost if needed. The slow release nitrogen won't burn even during the hot dry weather of summer. Plus, it won't interfere with flowering or fruiting.

Go vertical. Train vine crops up decorative or functional trellises and supports. You'll not only save space, but you will also reduce disease problems and increase the harvest. Growing cucumbers and melons increase light penetration and air flow, reducing the risk of fungal diseases. Pole beans are much easier to harvest and produce an additional picking. Secure large fruited vegetables like melons to the trellis with a cloth sling.

Be sure to plant vegetables in containers if in-ground space is limited. A 5-gallon bucket or comparable size container is perfect for a tomato. Peppers and eggplants will thrive in a bit smaller pot. Grow vine crops in containers and allow them to crawl over the deck or patio instead of valuable gardening space. Mix flowers and herbs in with your vegetables. You'll

increase the beauty while adding additional fragrance to the pot.

Harvest often and at the proper time. Zucchini and other summer squash should be picked when 6 to 8 inches long or in the case of patty pan squash it reaches 3 inches in diameter. The flavor is better than those baseball bat size zucchini and you'll have plenty to eat and share. Harvest your head of cabbage when firm and full size. Leave the bottom leaves and roots intact. Soon you will have 4 or 5 smaller heads to harvest and enjoy.

With a bit of planning and creativity you can find ways to increase the enjoyment and harvest in any size garden.

## City of Cross Plains Council Minutes

March 12, 2013

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members of the council present were Mayor Ray Purvis, Jerry Cassle, Bob Kirkham and Randy Strickland.  
Members of the public meeting with the council were Randy with Air Evac Lifeteam.  
Employees present were Debbie Gosnell, Frankie Hyles, Dannes Turner and Don Gosnell.  
Ray Purvis called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.  
Turner gave the invocation.  
By general consent the minutes were approved as presented.  
By general consent the police report was approved as presented.  
By general consent the judge's report was approved as presented.  
Cassle moved to approve the bills as presented. Kirkham seconded and motion carried.  
Randy, with Air Evac, met with the council to discuss the possibility of the City joining a county-wide endeavor to pay a portion of the cost for each resident of the county to be covered for use of the medical transport, should the need arise. He stated that he had already met with the county and that the total cost for the entire county is \$72,000. The county asked him to meet with the cities within the county to see if the cities are willing to participate. He commented that he was on a fact finding mission to see if any of the cities are interested in participating. The council advised him that they would discuss the matter and talk with local citizens to see what the interest is and he can get on the agenda for the next regular meeting to get more information.  
Gosnell presented two bids for a Canon copier and a Toshiba copier. Both copiers were comparable in both price and functions, but the Canon copier was slightly cheaper. Since the City has been using the Canon copier and are familiar with how it works, by general consent the council agreed to accept the Canon bid.

Last month the Fire Department met with the council to ask them to consider closing that portion of Avenue G that runs through the property they purchased to build a new fire department building on. Kirkham moved to close that portion of Avenue G that runs between Block 55 and Block 56 of Central Addition between SW 2nd Street and SW 3rd Street and the alley way that runs through Block 55 of Central Addition, between SW 2nd Street and SW 3rd Street. Cassle seconded and motion carried.  
Gosnell presented the council with the proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2013 and ending March 1, 2014. The proposed budget includes a 50 cent increase in both the water and wastewater rates to the base charge as well as a 40 cents increase to the variable water usage rate. The budget does not reflect an increase in the tax revenue of .34888 cents per \$100 valuation. This year's budget includes improvements to several blocks of new water and sewer lines, eight blocks of new pavement to the street infrastructure, code enforcement expenditures for the removal of dilapidated structures as well as continued funding for the Fire Department, Senior Center, Library, Parks Departments and many other divisions of the overall operation of the City. Cassle moved to approve the budget as presented. Strickland seconded and motion carried.  
Kirkham moved to adopt Ordinance 2013-001 making appropriations for the support of the City of Cross Plains for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2013 and ending March 31, 2014. Cassle seconded and motion carried.  
Turner gave the council an update on the Senior Citizens Center. She commented that 80 meals per day during the month of February were served. She also reminded the council that a bid of \$7,200 has been received to make the needed repairs to the roof. Once the roof is repaired, she has the carpet ordered and it will be

installed.  
Gosnell informed the council that the council that the Title Company needs verification that she has the authority to sign on behalf of the City to sell Lots 1,2,3,4, and the NE 1/4 of Lot 5; Block 52; Central Addition to Gary Moses on the Economic Development Corporation.  
Strickland moved to give Debbie Gosnell authority to sell the above mentioned lots to Gary Moses. Kirkham seconded and motion carried.  
Gosnell presented the council with pictures of junk and debris that is accumulating, not only on private property, but also on city property. She asked the council about pursuing the abatement of the debris and the council advised Gosnell to send a letter to the property owners advising them to clean up the debris and to remove all of the debris off of the City property within a 30 day time period.  
Hyles gave the council an update on various items taking place recently and upcoming events. He stated the City crew has completed the two blocks of new water line on NE 2nd Street from Avenue A to Beech Street and are in the process of hauling base material to begin getting the streets ready to pave in the summer. He also commented that five blocks of dirt roadway are being prepared to pave this summer, also. He informed the council that the restroom facilities at the pavilion at the Community Center had rotted out and a lot of damage had been done to the facilities. The city crew tore out the old restrooms and constructed small restrooms in their place. He advised the council that the new restrooms would be locked up and community would be able to use the facilities when they use the Community Center or by coming by the City Hall to get the key.  
Cassle moved to adjourn. Kirkham seconded and motion carried.



# Move it or lose it: 5 moves to put seniors back in the game

For Americans 65 and older, falling down can be the worst thing to happen to them, according to statistics from the National Council on Aging:

- One in three seniors experiences a significant fall each year.

- Every 18 seconds, a senior is admitted into an emergency room after losing balance and hitting the ground.

- Every 35 minutes, an elderly person dies from a fall — the leading cause of death for seniors.

"The projected cost in health-care expenses for 2020 due to fall-related injuries in the United States is \$55 billion," says Karen Peterson, a therapist with multiple certifications, and author of "Move With Balance: Healthy Aging Activities for Brain and Body," ([www.MoveWithBalance.org](http://www.MoveWithBalance.org)). She's also the founder and director of Giving Back, a nonprofit organization that grows and spreads programs that support senior health.

"It's important for seniors to keep moving and learning, that's what helps improve balance and coordination, and even helps build new neural pathways," says Peterson, who emphasizes the cognitive importance to her workout programs. "But if you're rather

frail, or just very fearful of falling, you're less likely to get up and move around." These activities benefit all seniors, from 55 to 105.

Peterson says a fun, social program of games and activities that include exercises specifically designed for seniors helps them address multiple issues, including those that tend to keep seniors sedentary — which only lessens their strength and balance.

Last year, her program was independently evaluated from Hawaii's Department of Health, which found a statistically significant reduction in falls from seniors — 38 percent. It also won the MindAlert Award from the American Society on Aging.

"Seniors of all ages need to continually work on improving their balance, coordination, strength, vision and cognitive skills. When they do, they're less likely to fall — and more able to enjoy life."

Peterson suggests these moves, which address many different areas of the body:

- **The cross-crawl:** After various light warm-ups, begin with the basic cross-crawl, which focuses on the fundamentals of balance. March in place, lifting the knees high. At the same time, reach across and touch the

lifted knee with the opposite hand or elbow; alternate and keep going. This can be done sitting, standing or lying down. Once any of these exercises are mastered, Peterson says, participants should continue to challenge themselves. For even greater balance work, and to exercise the vestibular system, close your eyes and count backwards from 100 by threes. "It's not fun if you're not conquering a challenge," she says. Her book includes several challenges for each exercise.

- **Forward toe-touch dancer:** To improve motor skills, physical coordination and cognition, there are many dance exercises that are appropriate for seniors. If needed, use a chair for assistance. Place your feet shoulder-width apart. Now, simultaneously extend your left foot and your right arm forward. Keep your left toes pointed down, touching the floor; or for more difficulty, maintain the toes a few inches off the floor. Repeat this move with your left arm and right foot. Hold each pose for several seconds, and increase holding time.

- **Sensory integration — the arrow chart:** Look at an arrow chart and call out the direction indicated by each individual

symbol. Then, thrust your arms in that direction; in other words, say and do what the arrow indicates. For an additional challenge, do the opposite of what the arrow indicates.

- **Side-step walk:** Walk sidestepping — bring your right foot across the left and step down three to five inches away from the left foot, ankles crossed. The closer the feet, the harder it is to balance. Alternate crossing the foot in front and then behind the other foot as you move along; repeat several times, then do the same with opposite feet. As a bonus challenge, try a reading exercise from a vision card, designed for stimulating the brain/visual system, while sidestepping.

- **The cat jump:** This activity is practice in case of a fall; the muscle memory of the movement will be etched in your body. Bend your knees in a squat. Jump a little off the ground with both feet, and land softly, like a cat, without jarring your body. Repeat until you are confident in your ability to prevent a spill.

"Research shows that most falls are preventable," Peterson says. "These and other exercises, performed regularly, are a great way to achieve safety and a revitalized lifestyle."

## TxDOT reminds drivers and passengers to Click it or Ticket to save lives

Awareness of seat belts and risks of not wearing them play critical role in saving lives

AUSTIN—Texans wear their seat belts with a certain Lone Star pride, but it's the buckles in their vehicles that could save their lives. More functional than fashionable, life-saving seat belts first debuted 45 years ago when Lyndon B. Johnson's National Traffic and Motor Vehicle Safety Act and The Highway Safety Act went into effect mandating that all automobiles have seat belts as a standard feature. To honor President Johnson's pioneering dedication to safety, the Texas Department of Transportation today launched its 12th annual Click It or Ticket campaign at the LBJ Library in Austin with a car show demonstrating the progression of seat belts through the ages.

"The cost of not wearing seat belts is far greater than a ticket or fine," said Phil Wilson, TxDOT executive director. "Simply put, a seat belt could save your life. Public awareness is working, but we still see some teenagers, pickup truck passengers and rural Texans who aren't buckling up."

Taking a cue from LBJ's leadership, Texas has made

seat belt safety a major priority and is proud to be one of the most buckled up states in the union. When the Click It or Ticket campaign began in 2002, only 76 percent of Texans buckled up. Today, 94 percent are wearing seat belts. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates the Click It or Ticket campaign has saved nearly 3,700 lives and prevented more than 50,000 serious injuries since its launch. The increase in seat belt usage also has saved an estimated \$10 billion in wages and productivity losses, medical expenses, insurance premiums, taxes and other costs.

Despite an increase in seat belt compliance, there is more work to be done with the lives of Texans at stake. Initial TxDOT data from 2012 indicates traffic-related fatalities in Texas are up by 11 percent. In 2012, there were 3,400 fatalities due to traffic crashes across the state.

Data also shows that only 82 percent of pickup passengers are buckled when riding compared to more than 91 percent of passengers riding in cars. Pickups also are more

likely than passenger cars to roll over or eject unrestrained occupants in a crash.

As part of the Click It or Ticket initiative, law enforcement officials across the state will be looking for and ticketing unbuckled drivers and passengers in an effort to raise safety awareness and prevent fatalities. By Texas law, all occupants of a vehicle, including back seat passengers, must wear a seat belt. Each unbuckled occupant faces a ticket and fines up to \$200, plus court costs. Last year, more than 21,200 seat belt citations were issued during the Click It or Ticket campaign.

This year's campaign enforcement period dates are May 20th-June 2nd.

## Cross Plains' retail sales in 2013 are 7% higher

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2012 are higher by over seven percent, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, May 8th.

Cross Plains' 2013 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$91,825.54, which is 7.04 percent higher than the \$85,778.88 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2012.

The payment to the city for April 2013 was \$19,640.51, which is 1.80 percent lower than the \$20,000.94 payment made in April 2012.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced today, Wednesday, May 8th, that state sales tax revenue in April was \$2.15 billion, up 3.9 percent compared to April 2012.

"Sales tax collections were up in a range of sectors from construction and manufacturing to restaurants," Combs said. "As expected, the rate of growth in state sales tax revenue is moderating compared to double digit growth rates we recently experienced."

Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their April local sales tax allocations totaling \$668.5 million, up 5.6 percent compared to April 2012.

Combs distributed \$441.8 million in April 2013 allocations to Texas cities, which is up 4.9 percent from April 2012 and higher by 6.3 percent year-to-date.

She reported \$42.5 million in April 2013 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 3.6 percent compared to April 2012 and higher by 8.3 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$150.0 million in April 2013 sales tax allocations, which is 6.4 percent higher than April 2012 and up 7.2 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$34.2 million in April 2013 allocations, which is 13.3 percent higher than April 2012 and higher by 13.6 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$668.5 million in April 2013, which is 5.6 percent higher than April 2012 and up 7.0 percent year-to-date.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in March as well as January, February and March sales by businesses that report tax quarterly.

Other Callahan County towns reporting sales tax payments include:

—The City of Baird reported that sales tax payments in 2013 started the year 2.43 percent higher than the 2012 payments. The city has received \$51,588.49 in 2013, while the 2012 tax payments to the city totalled \$50,360.55.

Baird's monthly payment for April 2013 was \$13,053.05, which is 1.00 percent below the \$13,185.45 payment made in April 2012.

—The 2013 sales tax payments in the City of Clyde are 14.88 percent higher than the payments made to the city in 2012. The sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$257,814.42 in 2013. The 2012 payments to the city during the same payment period were \$224,405.23.

The City of Clyde's monthly payment for April 2013 was \$65,978.13, which is 10.47 percent higher than the check in April 2012 of \$59,721.44.

—The City of Putnam reported the 2013 payments to the town totalled \$5,927.91, which is higher by 1.09 percent from the 2012 payments to the city in the amount of \$5,863.55.

Putnam's tax payment for the month of April 2012 was \$771.56, which is 46.14 percent lower than the \$1,432.58 payment made in April 2012.

—Countywide, sales tax payments for 2013 in Callahan County are higher by 11.12 percent compared to the 2012 payments in the county. Callahan County towns received sales tax payments in 2013

amounting to \$407,156.36 while the 2012 payments to the county towns totalled \$366,408.21.

The tax rebates in Callahan County for the month of April 2013 was \$99,443.25, which is 5.40 percent higher than the \$94,340.41 payments made in April 2012.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4% share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to the local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax.

Clyde businesses collect 2.00%, including one percent for the City of Clyde, one-half of one percent for the Clyde Economic Development Corporation and one half of one percent to reduce property taxes (Proceeds to benefit the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department).

Cross Plains collects 2.00% in local sales taxes, of which 1.00 percent is allocated to the city and 1.00% is allocated for economic development in the town.

Baird collects 2.00% in local sales tax of which 1.00% is allocated to the city, 0.50% is allocated to the community's economic development corporation and 0.50% of one percent to reduce property taxes.

Putnam collects 1.00% in local sales tax of which all 1.00 percent is allocated to the city.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, the Comptroller said. Some cities use up to an additional one percent of city sales tax to help fund local economic development and to reduce property taxes.

## DPS Urges Motorists to Use Caution Around Motorcyclists

### Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month kicks off

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding drivers on Texas roadways to use extra caution around motorcycles as part of Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month, which is observed during the month of May.

"Because of size and visibility, motorcyclists face unique challenges on the road that make them more vulnerable," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "We encourage all drivers — whether on two wheels or four — to actively watch out for each other and obey traffic laws. Motorcyclists can further protect themselves by wearing helmets; and other drivers can help by looking twice and giving extra space to motorcyclists."

Currently, there are more than 440,000 motorcycles and mopeds registered in Texas, and that number is expected to grow.

DPS recommends all drivers "Share the Road" and "Look Twice" for motorcycles, which are Texas Department of Transportation public

awareness campaigns that highlight motorcycle safety. Motorists should use caution, especially at intersections and when changing lanes — two common places where serious motorcycle collisions occur. Half of all fatal motorcycle crashes in Texas occur because a car or truck driver never saw the motorcyclist.

In 2012, 460 people in Texas died in motorcycle crashes — down from the 488 motorcyclists who died in 2011. However, those deaths accounted for approximately 13 percent of all traffic deaths in the state last year, and 89 percent of motorcycle crashes in Texas result in death or injury.

In addition to the annual awareness campaign, May 2013 also marks the 30th anniversary of the DPS Motorcycle Safety Unit. The unit coordinates training courses at more than 200 locations around the state for both basic and experienced riders. Motorcyclists must be properly licensed to operate a motorcycle in the State of

Drivers and motorcyclists can significantly reduce their chances of being involved in a serious or fatal crash by adhering to basic safety measures, including:

- Always allow a motorcyclist the full lane width — never try to share a lane.

- Perform a visual check for motorcycles by checking mirrors and blind spots before entering or exiting a lane of traffic, and at intersections.

- Always signal your intentions before changing lanes or merging with traffic.

- Allow more following distance — three or four seconds — when behind a motorcycle so the motorcyclist has enough time to maneuver or stop in an emergency.

- Never tailgate. In dry conditions, motorcycles can stop more quickly than cars.

- Never drive while distracted.




