



Texas Wildlife Association has teamed with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension to host a series of webinars covering a wide array of wildlife and land management topics. The webinar series provides sound, science-based wildlife management information delivered by experts to you in the comfort of your own home or office.

Traffic alert for June 27th on I-20 at the US 84 overpass

NOLAN COUNTY - A oneday closure for both main lanes of westbound I-20 at the US 84 overpass in Nolan County has been rescheduled for Thursday, June 27 for ongoing work to replace the bridge that was damaged after a collision in September 2012.

The closure was originally scheduled for Tuesday, June 18th, but is now planned for the following week due to an unavoidable delay from a material supplier.

Westbound I-20 will be closed early in the morning on June 27th to allow crews to place beams on the new structure. All interstate lanes are expected to be open by June 28th.

Traffic will be detoured to US 84 Business and routed around the overpass before being directed back to westbound I-20. Signs, cones and message boards will be in place to direct drivers.



INTERLOCAL CONTACT City of Baird and **Callahan County Precinct 3**

Pursuant to Texas Government Code 791.000, Interlocal Cooperation Act, The City of Baird and Callahan County, to maximize the capability of both organizations and to better serve the Citizens of Callahan County and the City of Baird enter into this Interlocal Contract. This contact shall be in effect until terminated by either party. The City of Baird expenditures are approved by the City Council through the annual budget.

Section 2.1 - Scheduling: This work shall be scheduled and conducted on times agreed upon by the City of Baird and Callahan County.

Section 2.2 - Cost Sharing: When conducting work for the City, the City of Baird agrees to pay fuel and other related costs of Callahan County while working within the City limits.

Section 2.3 - Preparation: The City of Baird will prepare all streets for paving by grading, rolling, crowning, and doing minor ditch work. All parties agree to share equipment for this process should it be necessary.

Section 2.4 - Traffic Control: traffic control by notifying the court meeting at 9:50 a.m.

The Callahan County commissioners' court approved an or- hibit: der prohibiting the use of certain fireworks in unincorporated areas of Callahan County during sives. the commissioners' court meeting held Friday, June 7th at the signed primarily to produce vis-County Courthouse in Baird.

On a motion by Commissioner Tom Windham and a second by Commissioner Bryan Farmer, the commissioners' court voted 5-0 to prohibit the use of certain fireworks for the Fourth of July holiday period.

On the 7th day of June, 2012, the Commissioners' Court of Callahan County adopted the following order effective immediately:

ORDER PROHIBITING USE **OF FIREWORKS IN UNINCORPORATED** AREAS OF CALLAHAN COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court has determined that during the fireworks season, the rural acreage in the county not under cultivation for a period of at least twelve months are determined to be extremely hazardous for the danger of fire because of high grass and dry vegetation and allows the Commissioners' Court of a county to prohibit the sale or use of restricted fireworks in specific areas in Callahan County; and

June, 2013, the Commissioners' Court of Callahan County cinct #2 Commissioner Bryan has determined that the normal Farmer, Precinct #3 Commisdanger of fire in the unincorporated areas of Callahan County is greatly enhanced by the extremely dry conditions now existing.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Commissioners' Court of Callahan County adopts this Order prohibiting the use of restricted fireeas of Callahan County.



Cross Plains' retail sales in 2013 are 4% higher

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2012 are higher by over four percent, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, June 12th.

Cross Plains' 2013 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$107,296.41, which is 4.85 percent higher than the \$102,329.92 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2012.

The payment to the city for May 2013 was \$15,470.87, which is 6.52 percent lower than in May 2012.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said today, Wednesday, compsum.html. June 12th, that state sales tax revenue in May was \$2.26 billion, up 7.9 percent compared to May 2012.

"Growth in state sales tax revenue was led by collections from the information services and construction sectors," Combs said. "Restaurants also showed notable growth, while oil and natural gas-related activity remains a major source of strength.'

Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their June local sales tax allocations totaling \$556.8 million, up 8.3 percent compared to June 2012.

Combs distributed \$365.3 million in June 2013 allocations to Texas cities, which is up 8.3 percent from June 2012 and higher by 6.6 percent year-todate.

She reported \$37.1 million in June 2013 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 8.3 percent compared to June 2012 and higher by 8.3 percent yearto-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$125.2 million in June 2013 sales tax allocations, which is 7.4 percent higher than June 2012 and up 7.2 percent yearto-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$29.2 million in June 2013 allocations, which is 13.3 percent higher than June 2012 and higher by 13.6 percent year-to-date.
