## More Photos of the Flooding Inside Rains Flood Cross Plains; **County Declared Disaster Area; Residents Deal with Cleanup**

The rains late Wednesday sustained damage from the bridges, culverts and low water night and early Thursday morning took at toll on homes

and local businesses. Residents found themselves heading flood warnings and tearing out carpet and moving furnishings on Thursday



Grading Wool

Messrs. Wright & Seay's wool house is now almost full of wool and still they pile in more. They

sent out an order for a bailing press yesterday and as soon as it arrives they will bale and ship the wool to market. Their plan is to rip open each sack, assort the wool into three different grades, so that each grade can be sold upon its own merit, and this we think is a good plan. Wool growers make a great mistake in bagging wool by putting in the good, bad and indifferent, thinking that the good will aid in selling the inferior, when the truth is, that the bad condemns and diminishes the value of the wool, thus wool if sold by the lot brings from thirteen to fifteen cents per pound instead of, say a few sacks, being sold at twelve and a half cents and the remainder at twenty-one cents. Grade your wool into several lots, tie up your fleeces well, being sure that no trash or tag locks are put in and you will find that it pays in the end; besides it will make you a reputation which will be worth more than you can compute. Try it.



The Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts estimates shoppers will save an estimated \$8.7 million in state and local sales tax during the Memorial Day Weekend sales tax

holidays. "Anyone who has lived through a Texas summer knows that this is the time of year when our state is hit by peak demands for both water and electricity," said Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar. "These two sales tax holidays, both set for Memorial Day weekend, give Texans the opportunity to save some

homes and businesses with energy-efficient appliances and water-conserving products."

The Water-Efficient Products Sales Tax Holiday is new this year, having been approved by the Texas Legislature in holidays. Both take place 2015. Products that display a WaterSense® label or logo can be purchased tax free for personal or business use. These include showerheads, bathroom sink faucets and accessories, toilets, urinals and landscape irrigation controls.

The sales tax holiday also applies to water-conserving products used or planted for conserving or retaining groundwater, recharging water tables or decreasing ambient air temperature to limit water evaporation. Items that qualify for the exemption include soaker or drip-irrigation hoses; a moisture control for a sprinkler or irrigation system; mulch; and

plants, trees and grasses. These items can only be purchased tax free for personal use.

## Clyde Lake restocked with 15,986 Largemouth Bass


Clyde Lake was stocked on Thursday, May 5th by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department with 15,986 Florida Largemouth Bass. The Largemouth Bass were produced at the TPWD Athens hatchery. On average, the stocked Largemouth Bass were about 1.8 inches in length.

According to Natural Resources Specialist Natalie Goldstrohm, "TPWD Inland Fisheries is hoping to restore fisheries to Lake Clyde in the shortest time possible, but it will take some time for these fish to grow and become a catchable size. It may take two to three years for sport fish to grow to legal size."

Goldstrohm said the legal size to keep is 14 inches. A valid Texas fishing license is required to fish all public waters in Texas. She said along with the Largemouth Bass, some minnows were also stocked into Clyde Lake.

Goldstrohm said anyone fishing in Clyde Lake should not remove fish from one body of water to another. Moving fish from one body of water to another public water body is illegal and requires special permission and permits from TPWD

Goldstrohm said the TPWD will also be stocking some





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## Wild About Texas Sponsored by:

As a west Texas naturalist, the majority of my summer field hours take place while most people are snug in their comforts of their beds. Sometimes during these evening jaunts, something will catch my eye that will cause me to do a double-take. One particular evening in the late 1990's, I saw something cross the road in front of me while I was driving from Alpine to Ft. Stockton, and it wasn't until the next day that I was able to identify my sighting. Lo and behold, I had the opportunity to observe a hoofed mammal that had once been a common sight in the Trans-Pecos before being hunted to extinction in this state, and that mammal was the impressive Elk.

Elk (Cervus elaphus) belong to a family known as Cervidae that is distributed worldwide and comprised of 43 species, of which 3 are native to Texas. Elk is by far the largest cervid that calls Texas its home with adult males attaining a body length of over 6 feet in length (with a relatively small - 6 ¼ inch - tail) and a weight of over 600 pounds. Females are significantly smaller than mature males.

Historically, Elk could be observed throughout the Trans-Pecos and western Panhandle regions of Texas with the Guadalupe Mountains boasting the largest population densities. However, it was regrettably hunted to extinction in this state by the turn of the 20th century. However, in the late 1920's, Judge J.C. Hunter transported more than 40 Elk from North Dakota and subsequently released them into the Guadalupe Mountains. 

House was born in Houston in 1858, the youngest of seven US Rep. Albert Burleson as postchildren. His father, Thomas W. master general, attorney James House, an English immigrant, had made a fortune in banking, international trade, and real estate. As a youth, he traveled as Secretary of the Treasury. to Europe and across the nation often. He enrolled in Cornell University in New York in 1877. health forced him to return to care for him.

married in 1881 and continued to travel extensively to tend to the family's many business interests. He moved to Austin in 1885, where he expanded his real estate holdings and cotton plantations. While in Austin, he inent Texas figures, including Gov. James S. Hogg.

In 1892, Hogg turned to House for help with his re-election campaign. House traveled the state extensively, persuading prominent individuals and influential groups to back the governor. The hard work paid off, and Hogg won re-election. Though House had no military experience, a grateful Hogg rewarded him for his service with the honorary title of lieutenant colonel in the Texas National Guard. Before long, he simply became known as "Col. House" to reporters and politicians alike. Over the next several years, House continued to play an important role in Texas politics, helping the election of governors and acting as an advisor on all aspects of their administration.

In 1911, he met New Jersey Gov. Woodrow Wilson, and the two formed an immediate friendship as Wilson prepared a run for the presidency. He advised Wilson on his campaign strategies and helped him secure the needed delegates and endorsements needed to secure the nomination. Wilson won easily in the 1912 election, defeating former President Theodore



After Wilson left office, House continued to lobby Congress to ratify the Treaty of Versailles and for American membership in the League of Nations. He continued to be active in Democratic Party politics, supporting the nomination of Franklin D. Roosevelt, another early supporter of the League of Nations, as president in 1932. However, by the 1930s, House steadily scaled back his role in politics. He died in New York in 1938 at the age of 79.

Groundwater is defined as water beneath the surface of the land. Most groundwater is found in aquifers, which are underground layers of rock, sand, and gravel that collect and transfer water. Because groundwater is an important water supply for many Texans, it is critical for Texans to understand this water resource.

Our agency continues to develop new ways to study groundwater, and we've recently updated the Water Data Interactive website with the new Groundwater Data Viewer. This application displays groundwater data sets with enhanced navigation tools for viewing and downloading all our available groundwater data.

The Groundwater Data Viewer allows users to access a number of groundwaterrelated databases that our agency maintains including the Groundwater Database (GWDB), the Brackish Resources Aquifer Characterization System (BRACS) Database, and the Submitted Drillers Reports (SDR) Database. Users can choose just one of the database sets or a combination depending on the scope.

The GWDB collects and stores data to help identify the natural properties of the aquifers and can be used for water planning from a local or regional perspective. This database has information on selected water wells, springs, oil/gas tests,

water levels, and water quality. well and geology information to help characterize the brackish



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
students. If you are interested in

groundwater resources of Texas and is compiled from existing water well records, geophysical well logs, and geologic reports.

The SDR Database was created in cooperation with the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) Water Well Drillers and Pump Installers Program, It contains water well reports submitted to TDLR from February 2001 to present.

The Groundwater Data Viewer allows users to choose from several base maps, including Google imagery and topographicmaps, and provides the ability to turn on additional geologic and geographic layers such as major/minor aquifers and groundwater management areas. Data layers can be The BRACS Database stores further sorted and identified through the use of groundwater filters and labels.

The data viewer, along with other resources we offer such as monitoring groundwater levels and quality, conducting groundwater modeling, and maintaining water well records, all help support the study of groundwater and the water planning process. 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

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








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## Garden Clubs Visit Rolan Jones' Organic Farm

The Cross Plains Garden Club met in the Mozelle Richardson Room of the Texas Heritage Bank on Friday, May 13, 2016. Members present were Donna Clark, Carlene Howard, Judy Killgo, Diana Miller, Cher Ptacek and Julia Wheeler. During their regular business meeting, the club voted to award two \$500.00 scholarships to graduating students. The garden club is able to award two scholarships this year because of the tremendous support they received during their April 2016 Plant Sale. This is a wonderful reflection on Cross Plains and the surrounding communities. Officers for the 2016-2017 year were elected. New officers are as follows: President Diana Miller, Vice-President Carlene Howard, Treasurer Cher Ptacek and Secretary Judy Killgo.

Immediately following the meeting, the club convened to the gardens of Rolan Jones and were joined by members of the Abilene and Coleman Garden Clubs. Rolan prepared a delicious and unusual organic lunch for all to enjoy prior to the tour; ranging from mustard flowers to black chicken. As guests complimented Rolan on his tasty creations, Rolan explained the he gardens and farms with a purpose; every plant and animal must provide food, spices, organic herbicides, organic insecticides or have medicinal value.

Rolan walked us to his herb and vegetable garden where we were introduced to cardoon (a large Mediterranean plant cultivated for its edible stem). The next row included rue which was used during the middle ages to rid the body of lice, body order and fleas. We were shown burdock which is a natural food and blood cleanser. Rolan also grows tobacco which he dries and uses as an insecticide for his plants. Echinacea is part of Rolan's garden design and is grown to Friday, September 9, 2016.

combat flu and colds. Rolan introduced us to epazote which is a natural vermicide used to worm cattle. Moving on we saw his magnificent asparagus, corn, okra, leeks, goji berries, elderberries, grapes, fruit trees and more plants too numerous to mention. Rolan said he makes an extract from his elderberries that works better than Tamiflu. To make the extract, the berries are harvested in July, boiled adding honey and vodka. Rolan suggests that we pick the first blooms off strawberries to increase the size of the berry. We also toured Rolan's hot house (seedlings, tomatoes, squash) and lush green house filled with lettuce, mustard, tomatoes, lemon trees and lime trees as well as his sun filtered mushroom and raspberry garden.

Rolan encouraged us to mulch, mulch, mulch. He suggested that if no natural mulch is available for our personal use we can purchase oat straw or wheat straw and allow it to break down then add it to the soil. He also discussed the use of composting materials and mulching techniques to improve our soils. Leaves, for example, can fill a planting bed with mulching materials which will compost over time and reduce the need for watering. Wood ash from wood burning stoves will keep cut worms and other pests from devouring plants. An application of cedar dust will keep squash bugs away. A novel way to remove cucumber beetles, harlequin bugs and squash bugs is to suck them off the plants with a hand held vacuum cleaner.

Mr. Dixon obtained degrees in Engineering and Military Science from West Point in 1974. He was commissioned in the U.S. Army Field Artillery Branch and completed his Field Artillery Officer Basic Course in Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Mr. Dixon was then stationed in Hanau, Germany, with an 8 inch M110 Self-Propelled Howitzer artillery battalion. 



#### Summer season: peak time for grilling fires NFPA urges grillers to be mindful of safety

approaches, home chefs everywhere are reaching for their grills, eager to usher in the long-awaited barbecue season. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) recommends that grillers pay particular attention to safety in the spring and summer months when home fires involving grilling incidents occur most

often. Three out of five households own a gas grill, according to NFPA's latest "Home Grill Fires" report, which translates to a lot of tasty meals. But it also means there's an increased risk of home fires. In 2009 - 2013, an annual average of 8,900 home fires involved grills, hibachis or barbecues, and close to half of all injuries involving grills were due to thermal burns. While nearly half of the people who grill do so year-round, July is the peak month for grilling fires followed by May, June and

Although gas grills contribute to a higher number of home fires overall than their charcoal counterparts, NFPA reminds everyone that all types of grills pose a risk for fires and burn injuries. More than onequarter (27 percent) of home structure grill fires started on an exterior balcony or open porch, and another 27 percent started in a courtyard, terrace or patio. Eight percent began in the kitchen, according to the report.

"As friends and families prepare for a fun grilling season together, be sure the grill is working properly and review safety tips," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of Outreach and Advocacy for NFPA. "Failing to properly clean the grill or having the grill too close to something

As Memorial Day weekend that could burn are the leading causes of fires. It's good practice to check for damage before using the grill for the first time each year, and to check the entire grill regularly."

When grilling, NFPA suggests the following:

 Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used

• The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.

· Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the arill area.

· Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grates and in the trays

· Never leave your grill unattended.

## Texas Historical Commission news briefs Who Butchered My Tree?

How would you feel if you returned home from work to find that the beautiful shade trees by the street in front of your house had been drastically pruned? Now, instead of a thick, symmetrical canopy of leaves, there is a gaping, V-shaped hole through the middle of the tree that reveals the overhead electrical conductors. "Why did this happen?" you would undoubtedly ask.

You may not be aware that while trees add significantly to the beauty of our communities, they are also responsible for costly property damage as well as dangerous power outages. In fact, tree failure is by far the leading cause of outages nationwide. The tree that grows into electrical conductors presents a potential hazard to you and others in the community if it becomes energized or wipes out a power line. This is why we see utility line clearance contractors in our

neighborhoods trimming trees. Some residents get irritated and feel that these trees are needlessly damaged. "The Tree Care Industry Association receives a lot of calls from homeowners complaining that their utility company 'drastically' cut trees near power lines," says Tchukki Andersen, CTSP, BCMA\* and staff arborist for the association.

"While utilities are required by law to trim trees, sometimes severely, it is, nevertheless, important for them to follow tree care standards of practice," adds Robert Rouse, TCIA's chief program officer. TCIA is

National Standards Institute a TCIA member company, A300 Standard, a national standard that covers tree pruning operations, including line clearance.

"When one is evaluating the quality of line clearance tree trimming, it's important to consider that the utility's primary objective is to prevent outages caused by trees as well as electrical hazards," explains Rouse. Minimally, the tree should be left in a healthy state, with at least some aesthetic value. If this cannot be accomplished, the utility may opt to remove the tree rather than create an eyesore and future problem.

Why the gaping hole in the canopy? First, the utility company specifies a certain amount of clearance around its wires, depending upon the voltage, the tree's growth rate and other characteristics. and the pruning cycle (how frequently it will be pruned). Furthermore, scientific research has proven that it is better from the standpoint of tree health if the trimming crew removes whole limbs with a relatively small number of large cuts versus making numerous small cuts and leaving stubbed off branches. Finally, utilities have found that removal of entire limbs helps to train the future growth of the tree away from the wires, keeping maintenance costs to a minimum while helping to insure that the tree needn't receive the same drastic pruning in the future.

Ranger College among institutions selected to participate in 'Next Generation' program

RANGER, Texas - Obtaining a college degree just became a whole lot easier for high school students - and their parents thanks to a new federal program aimed at helping students enroll in college-level classes while they are still enrolled in high school. The new program, which debuted on March 14. will enable high school students enrolled in specific institutions of high education to be eligible

for financial aid. Fortunately for Texas students, Ranger College was one of 44 institutions - and the only one in Texas - selected to participate in the new federal Next Generation High Schools program aimed at promoting college opportunities to high school students via dual credit enrollment.

"We are very excited about being selected to participate in the new dual credit experiment," said Ranger College President William J. Campion. "There are some very exciting things happening right now and we are thrilled that Ranger College is helping blaze a trail for all students.

As part of the new dual credit experiment, Ranger College joins 43 other postsecondary institutions across 23 states to be a part of an \$80 million competitive program recently passes by the Congress to help districts create innovative high school models to personalize teaching, promote active learning for students, and to provide deep ties to post-

doing, the federal government federal Pell grants to take dual is looking to high schools and districts to build rigorous and relevant educational programs for students The dual enrollment experiment, according to U.S. Under Secretary of Education Ted Mitchell., the program represents the next step in the work to rethink how high schools educate our students and prepare them for college and career through stronger partnerships between higher education and the K-12 space.

"Innovation is an important underpinning in our efforts to expand college access and increase college completion for our nation's students," said Mitchell. "We're thrilled these institutions have joined us in answering the call to reimagine the high school experience and create stronger linkages to college coursework."

As part of the Next Generation High Schools, Ranger College Dean of Administration Cherie Beltran noted students currently enrolled in high school could be eligible for federal Pell grants that could lessen the financial impact associated with taking college level classes.

"This is a great thing for students," she said. "We realize taking college classes can be expensive and a financial hardship for some students so we are thrilled to be a part of this.

As part of the program, an estimated 10,000 high enrollment courses provided by colleges and high schools throughout the nation. Nearly 80 percent of the selected sites are community colleges.

According to Mitchell, recent studies show dual enrollment the process in which students enroll in postsecondary coursework while also enrolled in high school - is a promising approach to improve academic outcomes for students, particularly those from lowincome backgrounds. Research suggests that participation in dual enrollment can lead to better grades in high school, increased enrollment in college following high school, higher rates of persistence in college, greater credit accumulation, and increased rates of credential attainment.

Mitchell noted that the program was designed so that selected sites are required to ensure Pell-eligible students are not responsible for any charges for postsecondary coursework after applying Pell Grants. public and institutional aid, and other sources of funding.

All Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico

coastal areas are subject to hurricanes or tropical storms. It is possible for a storm to severely impact our state, even prior to or without making direct landfall in Texas. Additionally, the rainbands associated with a tropical system have an extremely wide reach, so monitoring changing weather conditions during hurricane season is critically important for

Hurricanes can cause catastrophic damage to coastlines, and winds can vary from 74 to 157 miles per hour (or higher). In addition, hurricanes and tropical storms can also spawn tornadoes, create dangerous coastal water conditions including storm surges along the coast, and cause extensive damage from flooding.

Here are several measures residents can take now to prepare for potential storms:

Assemble an emergency kit that includes essential documents, supplies and

\* Review hurricane evacuation maps, and select a route for you and your family.

\* Plan how all family members and pets will evacuate safely.

\* Consider any special needs for individuals with disabilities

\* Stay informed about changing weather conditions in and around your area.

Sgt. William "Karl" Keesee, of Brownwood, died in the line of duty on Oct. 29, 2015, as a result of a traffic crash. Trooper Jeffrey Nichols, of Paris, Texas, died in a traffic crash March 26, 2016. In addition, Hutto Police Department Sgt. Christopher Kelley died in the line of duty on June 24, 2015, after being struck by a suspect evading

police in a motor vehicle. "A career in law enforcement carries with it considerable risks and responsibilities, and today we pay our respects to the brave men and women who willingly take on the duties of a peace officer," said Rep. Larry Phillips. "We are eternally grateful for the fallen officers who have given their all to protect their communities. On behalf of all Texans, we also express our tremendous appreciation to the families who have sacrificed so much for the safety of others."

Since 1823, 219 officers serving in the Texas Rangers and DPS have died in the line of duty. According to the Officer Down Memorial Page, three police officers have died while on duty in Texas this year, and in 2015, there were 12 line-ofduty deaths statewide.

Family members of the fallen DPS officers - including Darla Keesee and Merle Lemond, widow and mother of Sgt. Keesee; and Chrystal Smith and Brian Nichols, sister and brother of Trooper Nichols placed a memorial wreath during the ceremony.

"We are humbled by extraordinary men and women who devote their lives to protecting and serving their communities," said Public Safety Chair Cynthia Leon. "The fallen heroes, families and loved ones we honor today have given so much, and we cannot thank them enough for their sacrifice.

"With the tragic loss of these three courageous and selfless officers - and all those before them - we are solemnly

reminded that there is no greater devotion to duty than to serve and protect others at any and all costs," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Today we pause to show our immense gratitude for their service and supreme sacrifices. And we endeavor to bring some comfort to these heroic families. who have endured so much."

The DPS service is one of many ceremonies held across the United States to honor fallen law enforcement officers during National Police Week, May 15-21.

### **New study shows** trouble ahead for Texas nursing homes

(AUSTIN, Texas) - A new study estimates the Lone Star State short-changed Texas nursing homes about \$267 million last year.

"The ability to meet the needs and expectations of the growing elderly and disabled population should be a major cause for concern for everyone. As a result of the shortfall, as many as 80 percent of nursing homes in Texas are not having their costs for taking care of Medicaid patients met by the state," said Kevin Warren, president of the non-profit Texas Health Care Association. "Another shortfall on covering these costs is setting us up for trouble ahead for Texas nursing homes.'

The study, sponsored by the non-profit American Health Care Association, comes on the heels of recent news that nurses are fleeing Texas facilities at an unprecedented rate with nurse assistants often able to receive higher wages in the fast food industry. Registered nurses in Texas nursing homes have a 94-percent annual turnover

And as Texas nursing homes struggle with staffing issues, Texas' senior citizen population is set to explode. The U.S. Census Bureau estimates that more than 20 percent of Texas' population will be over age 60 by the year 2030, an increase of close to 25 percent from 2012.

Warren said the state's Medicaid reimbursement shortfall - about \$232,000

per home each year - not only forces down wages for front-line staff, but prohibits nursing home owners from buying much-needed medical equipment or updating aging facilities.

"Most nursing homes in Texas take care of Medicaid patients at rates that just don't cover their costs," Warren said. About 85-percent of residents in Texas nursing homes rely on Medicaid or Medicare.

"Buying a new ventilator or investing more for staff is tough when you aren't getting paid in full for providing care for a majority of your residents," Warren said. "Texas nursing homes are 100-percent dedicated to providing highquality, hands-on care every day. But when it comes time to pay the bills, the state is falling short - about 12-percent short to be exact, according to this

Texas lawmakers can avert a future nursing home crisis by fixing the funding shortfall next legislative session, said Dr. C. Bruce Davis, Deputy Speaker Pro Tem for the Texas Silver Haired Legislature. The issue is one of the group's top legislative priorities for the 85th Legislative Session, which starts in January.

"The low Medicaid reimbursement rate in Texas, 49th lowest in the nation, threatens the closure of many of our rural nursing facilities," Davis said.



## The Recipe Corner

Roasted Asparagus Lasagna Prep Time: 20 Minutes Bake Time: 45 Minutes + Standing

\* 2 pounds fresh asparagus, trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces

\* 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms \* 2 tablespoons olive oil, divided

\* 2 tablespoons butter

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour \* 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon white pepper Dash ground cloves

1-1/2 cups milk

\* 1 cup thinly sliced red onion

\* 2 garlic cloves, minced

\* 12 lasagna noodles, cooked and drained

\* 1-1/2 cups (6 ounces) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese

3/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

**Directions** 

1.Place asparagus and mushrooms in a shallow roasting pan. Drizzle with 1 tablespoon oil; toss to coat. Bake at 450° for 8-10 minutes or until vegetables are browned; set aside. Reduce heat to 350°.

2. In a large saucepan, melt butter. Stir in the flour, salt, pepper and cloves until smooth. Gradually stir in milk. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Set aside.

3. In a large skillet, saute onion in remaining oil until tender. Add garlic; cook 1 minute longer. Remove from the heat: add roasted asparagus and mushrooms.

4. In a 13-in. x 9-in. baking dish coated with cooking spray, layer four noodles, a third of the asparagus mixture, a third of the white sauce, 1/2 cup mozzarella cheese and 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese. Repeat layers

5. Cover and bake at 350° for 35 minutes. Uncover; bake 10-15 minutes longer or until heated through. Let stand for 15 minutes before cutting. Yield: 12 servings.
