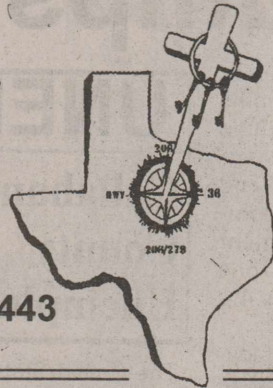

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Chamber of Commerce Banquet to be held on Thursday, July 28th

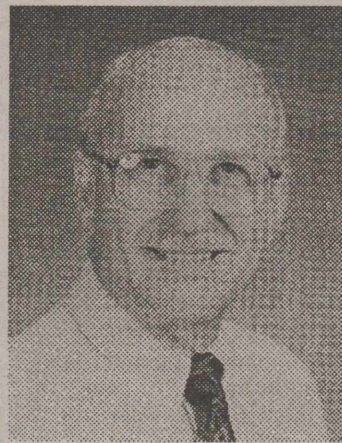

The Cross Plains FFA was well represented last week at the 88th Annual Texas State FFA Convention in Dallas. Cross Plains members that attended

There are over 115,000 FFA members statewide, and more than 11,000 members and guest were present at the 88th State FFA Convention.

Mackenzie Byrd, Hannah Cowan, Kersey Wyatt, and Grace Goode all received their Lone Star Farmer Degrees at the Stars night award ceremony on Wednesday night. The Lone Star Farmer Degree is the highest degree bestowed by the Texas FFA. They were four among 2,500 members that received the degree this year on stage in Dallas.

Katy Jo Morgan was awarded the State Poultry Proficiency Award. This award provides recognition to FFA members for exceptional accomplishments

and excellence in their Supervised Agricultural Experience programs. She was recognized and received her plaque on stage also during the Stars Night session on Wednesday night.

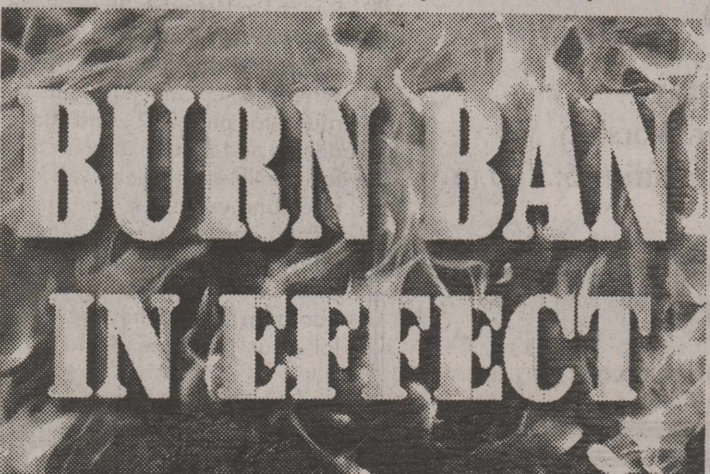
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Brush Pick Up Restricted

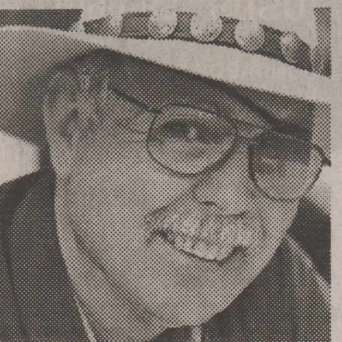
Breckenridge Art Show Features Works by Ken Brown Pioneer; Reception on Saturday, July 30th

On Saturday, July 30th, reception will be held at 6 p.m. allowing an opportunity to meet the artists who make the show happen.

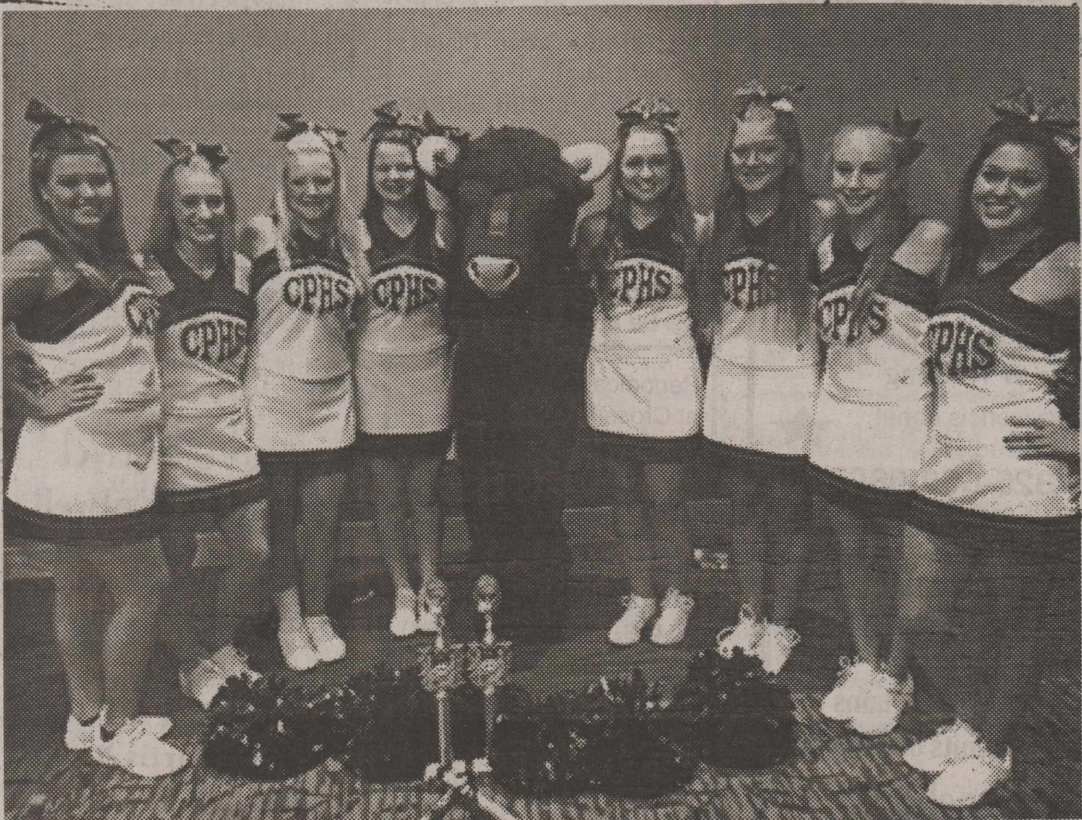
Ken Brown, who was raised in Pioneer (and signs his work Ken Brown Pioneer), attended Cross

Callahan County's jobless rate jumps to 4.4% in June

The unemployment rate in Callahan County rose five-tenths of one percent to 4.4% in June 2016, according to jobless figures released Friday, July 22nd by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in June 2015 was 4.0 percent.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 3.9% in May, 2016. Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 3.9% in April 2016, 4.3% in March, 4.2% in February, 4.2% in January 2016, 4.4% in December 2015, 4.4% in November, 4.3% in October, 4.2% in September 2015, 4.3% in August, and 4.4% in July, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for May 2016 include: Brown, 4.8%; Coleman, 6.4%; Eastland, 5.9%; Jones, 5.9%; Runnels, 4.4%; Shackelford, 4.4%; Stephens, 5.9%; and Taylor County, 4.0%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 4.2% in June, 2016, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 75,700. There were 72,500 employed during June 2016, while 3,200 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 4.2%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 75,500 in May, 2016. Total employment of 72,700 was reported in May 2016, while 2,700, or 3.6% were unemployed in May 2016.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for June, 2015 was 4.2%. The total workforce was reported at 75,500, with 72,300 employed and 3,200 or 4.2% unemployed in June, 2015.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of June, 2016 was 4.8 percent. The total Texas labor force was 13,338,800 in June 2016. The total number of Texans employed is 12,694,200. The total number of unemployed Texans was 644,700 in June 2016.

Last month's statewide unemployment rate was 4.2 percent in May 2016. The state's unemployment rate in June of 2015 was 4.7 percent.

The United States unemployment rate for June, 2016 was 5.1 percent. The nation's unemployment rate for the previous month of May, 2016 was 4.5%. The United States unemployment rate one year ago in June, 2015 was 5.5%.

Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas unemployment rate increased by six-tenths of a percentage point in June to 4.8 percent.

This was one-tenth of a percentage point higher than last year's June unemployment rate. Over the previous five years, the unemployment rate increased by an average of six-tenths of a percentage point between May and June. The national unemployment rate also increased by six-tenths of a percentage point to 5.1 percent. The Texas unemployment rate has remained below the national unemployment rate since December 2006.

The Texas Civilian Labor Force increased in June by 57,700 to a total of 13,338,800 people. The past three months have shown a total increase in the labor force of 65,500 people. Over the year, the Texas labor force has increased by 211,700 people.

The number of employed Texans decreased by 28,100 over the month to a total of 12,694,200 people. Over the previous five years, the number of employed Texans decreased by an average of 15,780 people in the month of June. The number of jobholders has increased by 190,100 over the year.

The number of unemployed Texans increased in June by 85,900 to a total of 644,700 people. Over the previous five years, the number of unemployed people increased by an average of 81,540 in the month of June. Since June of last year, the number of unemployed

people has increased by 21,700 individuals.

Between May and June, the unemployment rate increased in all 25 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) in Texas. The rate in the Midland MSA had the smallest increase, rising three-tenths of a percentage point to 4.6 percent. Both the Amarillo MSA and the Austin-Round Rock MSA tied for the lowest unemployment rate at 3.3 percent.

HAPPENINGS AROUND THE STATE

Sealy Lands New Business
SEALY, TX (Sealy News)—The City of Sealy and Austin County announced earlier this month that SNC-Lavalin, based in Montreal, Canada, is opening a new facility in Sealy. "At peak employment, SNC-Lavalin expects the facility to have up to 250 employees," said City Manager Larry Kuciemba.

The company will be located on the I-10 frontage road in west Sealy, the former location of BAE Systems, which shut down in June 2014. The city and the Sealy Economic Development Corporation have worked on this deal since the beginning of 2016. Kuciemba added, "We are very excited about this announcement today, and the economic impact this project will have on Sealy, Austin County and the surrounding areas." The company is looking to employ engineers, accountants, project managers, warehouse attendants and general laborers.

California-Based Company Relocates HQ
FRISCO, TX (Dallas Morning News)—Another California company is moving to North Texas as their lease expires at the end of 2016. Retailer Jamba Inc. is moving its headquarters from the San Francisco Bay area to Frisco's Hall Office Park. The parent company of Jamba

Juice stores chose to locate near the Dallas North Tollway in Frisco, and will employ about 100 people. The deal to move the company to North Texas includes grants from both the City of Frisco and the Texas Enterprise Fund—which provided an \$800,000 grant. Jamba's new facility will include 19,000 square feet of office and meeting space, and a 6,000-square-foot test kitchen and store front.

Kohl's Hiring More in Local Center

SAN ANTONIO, TX (San Antonio Express News)—Kohl's plans to hire about 300 full-time permanent and seasonal employees to staff its customer services operations center in San Antonio ahead of the holiday shopping season. Kohl's opened the call center in 2010 after the city, county and state lured the company with incentives totaling more than \$1.2 million.

"We are looking for friendly, energetic individuals who share in Kohl's commitment to providing great customer service," spokeswoman Lyra O'Brien said. The Wisconsin-based retailer—which has 85 locations in Texas, four in San Antonio—currently employs 950 people in the customer service operations located on the city's far West Side, O'Brien said. Kohl's operates customer service operations centers in Dallas, Corsicana, and an e-commerce fulfillment center in DeSoto.

The Stewart Organization to Quadruple Area Employment
HOUSTON, TX (Houston Business Journal)—Irving-based The Stewart Organization plans to add more than 100 employees in the coming years after quadrupling its Houston footprint. Stewart opened an office in Houston to serve a large company, but as the firm transitioned from Alabama to Dallas, Houston represented a bigger opportunity, Steve Jarvis, professional print and solutions manager for The Stewart Organization said, "I've been here a year, we were around 20 employees. We've grown to 38. The growth has been phenomenal." The company expects to employ about 170 people in a few years.

Over The State
A cyclone did great damage to crops in Coryell county, on the 7th.

Greenville calculates on building twenty brick buildings this fall.

Fifty-six car loads of oats have been shipped from Moody this season.

Ninety-five thousand dollars was paid into the state treasury on Friday.

A very large and commodious college building is to be erected at Valley Mills.

Five frame buildings were burned in Texarkana, on Saturday morning.

Track-laying on the Gonzales tap road has been commenced at Harwood.

Daylight has dawned in one of the big tunnels of the Southern Pacific at Devil river.

Pearsall, on the International and Great Northern is in the midst of a business boom.

At the Waco folks fest six boys out of twenty climbed the greased pole, twenty feet high.

Blossom Prairie was visited by a destructive fire on the morning of the 8th, loss \$15,000.

The Basle Land company, of Switzerland, has closed a contract for \$25,000 worth of land in Wilson county.

Anderson, the largest agricultural implement dealer at Fort Worth, has failed. His liabilities are stated to be \$40,000.

Cotton worms have made their appearance around Eagle Lake, and the vicinity of Columbus, in the Brazos bottom.

Refreshing showers of rain fell in several sections of the state on the 3rd inst., doing great benefit to late corn and other crops.

One hundred laborers employed on the Palestine water works, at \$1.50 per day, struck for \$1.75. They paraded the streets.

Brenham Banner: Cotton is beginning to open in almost all parts of the county; picking will likely begin in about fifteen days.

The section hands of the Houston and Texas Central road have struck for an advance of wages of from \$1.15 to 1.50 per day.

The board of managers of the lunatic asylum have inspected the new building and report it as being well and substantially built.

Bonham Advocate: A cattle man named Worsham came to Texas six years ago, invested \$1,300 in cattle, and sold his interest last week for \$35,000.

Some alleged cow-boys got on a train at Muscogee, to go to Denison Sunday night. They presented six-shooters when asked for tickets. At Caddo the conductor ran them off the train with a shot gun. They were arrested there by the U. S. marshal.

Baird's most artistic artist, Mr. L. K. Dillard is improving the Clarendon building front by giving it a coat of paint.

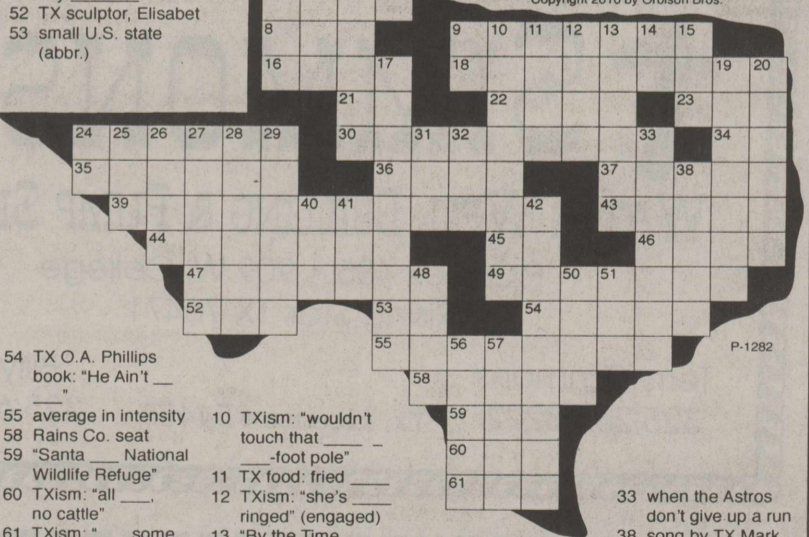

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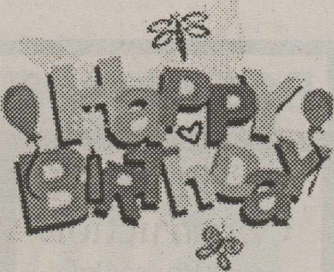
Summer Reading Program takes a look back into the past

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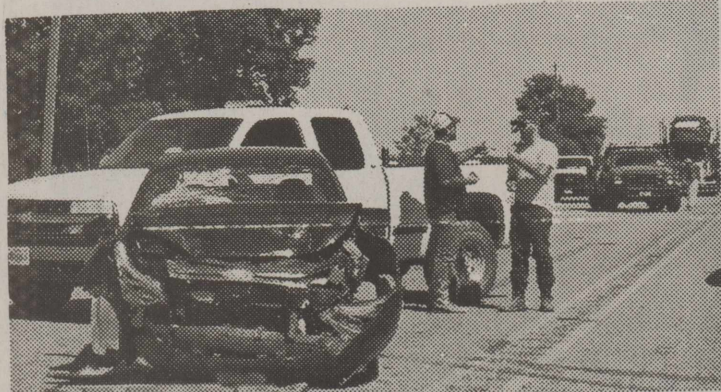

Wild About Texas
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Prairie Rattlesnake

Observing and studying animal behavior is just one of many facets to being a naturalist. Many times, animal behavior is at best misinterpreted or at worst greatly exaggerated. For example, the vast majority of animals that occur in this area are more afraid of humans than we are collectively of them, even ones that can pose serious injury to us. Some people respond to this statement with disbelief, ironically, based on fear. Animals, and humans too for that matter, respond to fear in a variety of ways. When confronted by a perceived threat, some animals will attempt to hide, others will flee, and others will resort to defensive aggression. These responses are all based on fear. We humans describe animal responses with words such as "evil" or "mean." For example, the defensive display of a Prairie Rattlesnake can be summed up as almost pure evil to most people, unless one considers the snakes response is based on fear. The Prairie Rattlesnake (*Crotalus viridis*) occurs from southern Canada southward through the Great Plains states to northern Mexico. It ranges further north of the equator than any other pit viper. In Texas, it is most frequently observed in the grassland areas of the Panhandle, less often in the Trans-Pecos and Edwards Plateau eco-regions. Unlike its close relative the Western Diamondback Rattlesnake, Prairie Rattlesnakes are habitat specialists, living primarily in the grasslands and prairies. This is a moderately large species of rattlesnake that can attain lengths of up to four feet, with the record size being a whopping sixty-four inches, although most adults average just under three feet in length. Prairie Rattlesnakes can best be described as rather drab animals. The background coloration varies from tan to brown to almost greenish. Along the spine are numerous well defined darker brown blotches that are occasionally edged with white. It also has two characteristic facial stripes, one that slants from between the eye and nostril to the mouth and one that runs from behind the eye to the corner of the mouth. Like other rattlesnakes, the head of this species is distinctly wider than the neck, giving this animal the famous "diamond-shaped" head. The pupils are elliptical, and the rattle is large and is capable of being heard from several yards away. A unique behavioral trait the Prairie Rattlesnake exhibits is the congregation of large numbers to overwinter together, known as denning. This practice typically takes place in prairie dog towns or rocky hillsides. The process of brumation, (not hibernation as the animal does not sleep through the winter, but rather just slows its heart rate and metabolism) generally takes place between late October to mid-March. Even in mid-winter, this species may make an appearance on exceptionally warm days to bask in the heating rays from the sun, particularly females that are carrying fertilized ova. Breeding usually takes place in the fall, with the female holding on to its mates sperm over the winter until spring, when ovulation actually takes place. Prairie rattlers are oviparous, which means they give birth to living young, and the nine inch-long neonates (which number from 4 to 21) are typically born in late summer and early fall. Other than having a "button" on the end of the tail, they are exact replicas of the adults and are fully capable of fending for themselves, including having fully functional fangs and venom apparatus'. This species is typically crepuscular (active at dawn and dusk) during the spring and fall when night-time temperatures begin to fall and are nocturnal (active at night) during the summer months when the daytime temperatures exceed intolerable highs. It uses its venom to obtain its prey, which is primarily made up of rodents of various sizes. Juveniles will occasionally add lizards to its diet. As a rule, Prairie Rattlesnakes are more high-strung and temperamental than the more common Western Diamondback Rattler, and their venom is estimated to be two to two and one-half as times more potent. However, the necrotic properties of this species venom are much less than the Diamondbacks, as is the venom yield. This does not make them any less dangerous, but because they live in areas that are generally inaccessible to the general public, they are not considered by most to be a serious threat to people or range animals. When participating in outdoor activities, the risk of encountering a Prairie Rattler is remarkably slim, although it can and does happen occasionally. If such an encounter occurs, remember that this animal, despite its harmful capability, is more afraid of you than you are of it and it would prefer to be left alone. The best course of action is to walk, don't run, in the opposite direction.

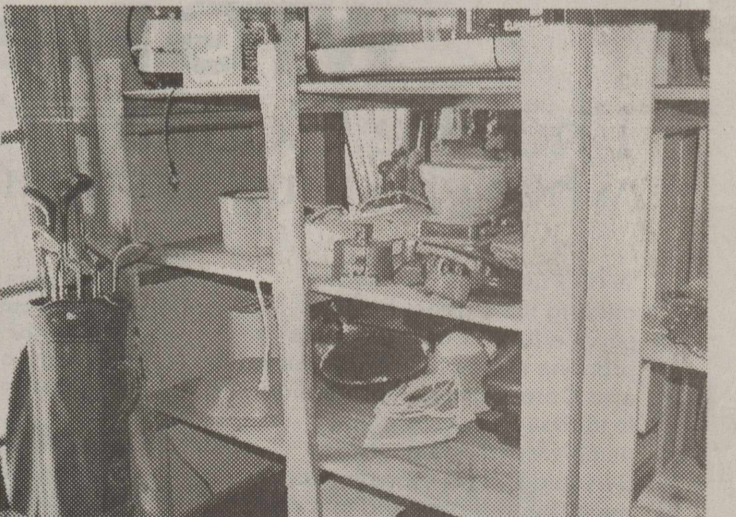

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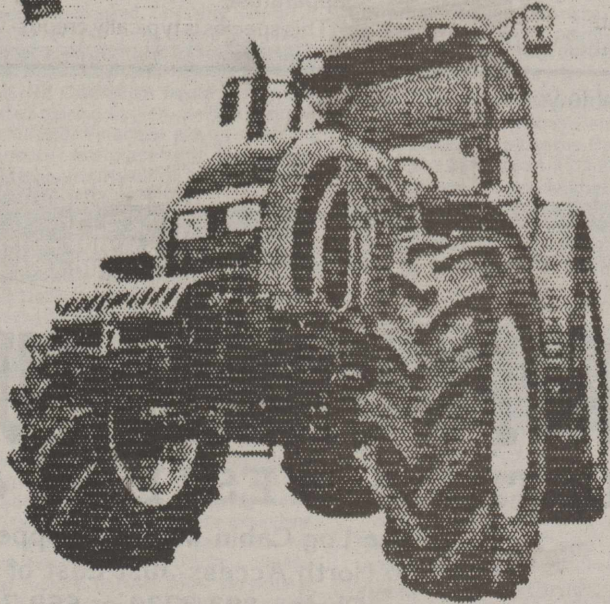

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The Texas History Minute

Legendary Lawman Pat Garrett spent quite a few years in Texas

Pat Garrett is another of the legendary figures of the Old West. He always had a taste for adventure and had a career as a distinguished law officer in a time when little law and order was to be found. Wherever Garrett went, trouble always seemed to follow.

Patrick Floyd Jarvis Garrett was born in Alabama in 1850 to a farming family. In 1853, they moved to northern Louisiana when his father bought a plantation there. However, everything fell apart after the Civil War. His father went bankrupt, his mother died in 1867, and his father died the following year. Barely 18 and with nothing left to hold him back, Garrett rode west into Texas.

For the next several years, Garrett made a modest living as a buffalo hunter in Texas before finding work on a ranch in Lincoln County in the center of the New Mexico Territory. He eventually came to own one of his own.

However, tensions between rival ranching factions exploded into the notorious Lincoln County War in 1878. A series of gunfights across the area left perhaps two dozen dead. The chaos thrust Garrett out of the shadows and into the middle of the bloodshed.

By 1880, residents enraged over the continuing violence thrust Sheriff George Kimball out of office in favor of Garrett by a nearly two-to-one margin. The chaos continued as Garrett and his posse captured William Bonney, more famously known as gunman Billy the Kid, in December after a shootout at Stinking Springs. Four months later, Billy the Kid escaped just after his conviction for murder. Garrett would encounter him again in July 1881, apparently killing him in a nighttime shootout. However, questions over the details persisted with some suggesting that Billy the Kid escaped and never died at all. Garrett, however, killed several men in gunfights throughout his life including his years as a lawman.

Nevertheless, this incident ended the Lincoln County War once and for all. Garrett became known across the country for his role. However, he stepped

down from his position as sheriff in 1882 and returned to Texas. While Billy the Kid grew into folk hero status, Garrett attempted to publicize his own version of events with *The Authentic Life of Billy, The Kid*, which became one of the most famous accounts.

Garrett continued his career in law enforcement. In 1884, Garrett was made a Texas Ranger but resigned his appointment a year later. He attempted an irrigation business, which failed miserably. By 1892, he settled in Uvalde on the Rio Grande to resume ranching.

In 1896, he was appointed sheriff of Dona Ana County in New Mexico after a prominent citizen and his son disappeared in the desert. Garrett pinpointed four men for murder, and he and his deputies killed two of the suspects in a blaze of gunfire in 1898. The remaining two surrendered several months later.

In 1901, President Theodore Roosevelt appointed Garrett as the US customs collector for El Paso. However, after a fistfight with one employee and a num-

ber of political missteps, he was replaced by 1906.

Garrett, however, had massive debts by this time and lost his Uvalde ranch. He and his son attempted to lease a ranch in New Mexico, but a dispute erupted with the owner, Jesse Brazel, and his partners about the terms. In March 1908, Garrett rode out to meet with Brazel to discuss the matter further when he was shot dead. Brazel confessed to the shooting but was acquitted of murder.

In the years after Garrett's death, his character appeared in many novels and movies, including the first *Billy the Kid* movie in 1925. Controversy and debate surrounding the life of Garrett only grew after his death. A small memorial marking the spot of his death near what is now US 70 was placed by his son in the 1930s.

GRAZE-OUT payments now available to Callahan County producers

Baird, Texas -- July 22, 2016— USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Callahan County Acting County Executive Director Dana Dimitri announced that FSA is now accepting applications for 2016 GRAZE-OUT payments for producers who elect to use their acreage planted to wheat, barley, oats, or triticale for grazing by livestock and agree to forgo any other harvesting of the commodity in 2016.

"Producers must request graze-out payments by farm and complete form CCC-633 GRAZING," said Dimitri. "If multiple producers share in the acreage, all signatures must be obtained before the request is considered complete."

The graze-out payment rate is determined by the amount the applicable commodity loan rate exceeds the CCC-determined value of the commodity for the county where the farm is located. This is referred to as the Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP) rate. The graze-out

payment will be based on the LDP rate in effect for the county on the date of request.

Producers may file an application for graze-out any time prior to March 31, 2017.

Dimitri emphasizes that acres identified on form CCC-633 GRAZING will NOT be eligible for an indemnity under the Federal Crop Insurance Act or Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP).

Graze-out payments are subject to the same basic eligibility requirements as commodity loans and LDPs including, but not limited to Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) provisions, beneficial interest, conservation compliance, foreign person, payment limitations for crop years 2014 through 2018, together with market loan gains and ARC/PLC.

Before MAL repayments with a market loan gain (MLG) or LDP disbursements can be made, producers must meet

the requirements of actively engaged in farming, cash rent tenant and member contribution. The 2014 Farm Bill also establishes payment limitations per individual or entity not to exceed \$125,000 annually on certain commodities for the following programs benefits: price loss coverage payments, agriculture risk coverage payments, MLGs and LDPs.

AGI provisions state that a producer whose total applicable three-year average AGI exceeds \$900,000 is not eligible to receive an MLG or LDP. Producers must have a valid CCC-941 on file to earn a market gain of LDP.

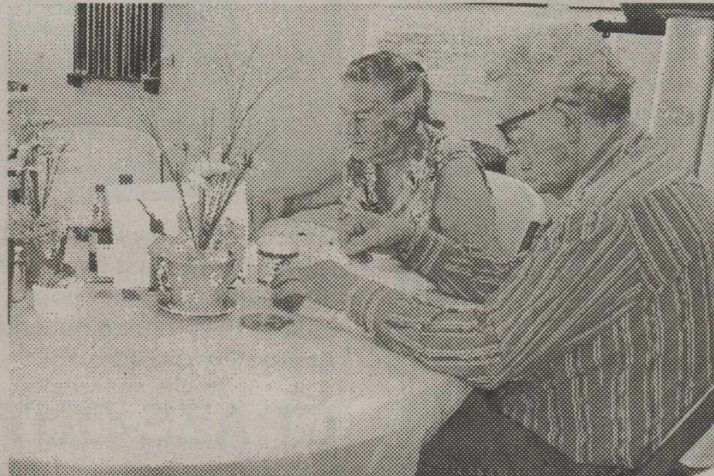

Texas Sales Tax Holiday is Aug. 5th-7th

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items priced for less than \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 5th-7th.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced below \$100 from sales tax, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"As families all over our state prepare to send their children back to school, we hope folks take advantage

of this opportunity to get the supplies they need and save some money in the process," Hegar said. "As the father of three young children, I know how these expenses can add up. This event provides Texas families with some relief from state and local sales taxes."

Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the Comptroller's website at TexasTaxHoliday.org.

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$92 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

The tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.
