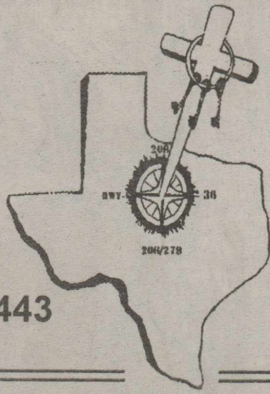

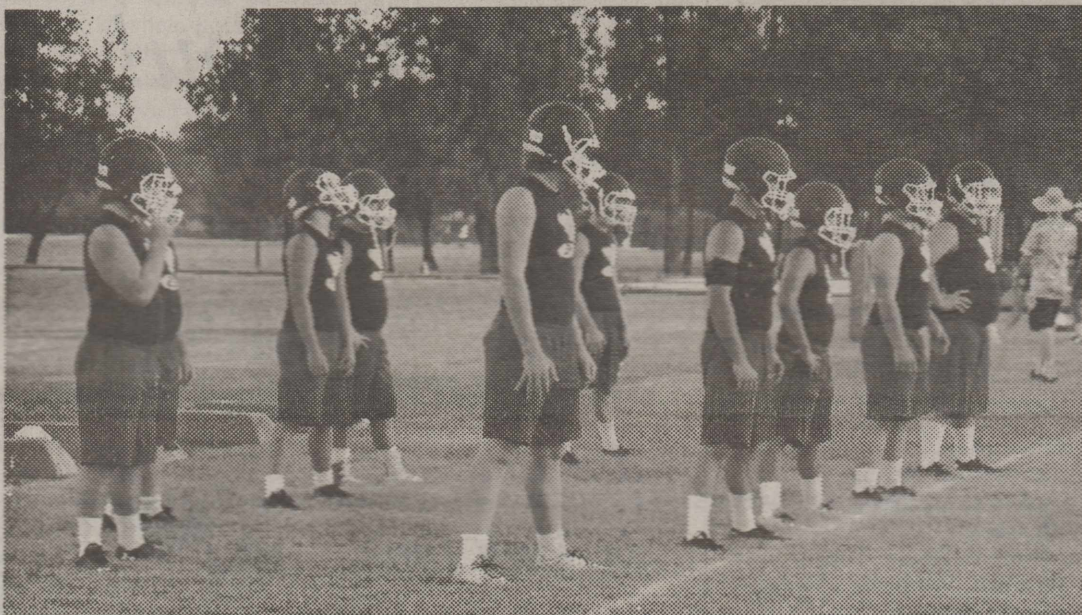
dog cart and be serving hot dogs.

## Texas Sales Tax Holiday this weekend August 5th-7th

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds shoppers the annual sales tax holiday is scheduled for this Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 5th-7th.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced for less than \$100 from sales tax, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend

during the weekend. Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the Comptroller's website at [TexasTaxHoliday.org](http://TexasTaxHoliday.org).

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$92 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday, which has been an annual event since 1999.

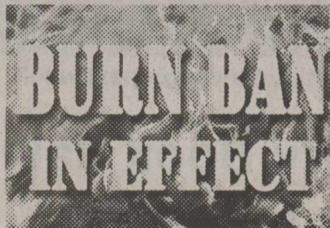

## Sheriff's Corner by Sheriff Terry Joy

### County Sheriff attends 138th Annual Training Conference

On the morning of July 4th I was in Hendrick Hospital having a pacemaker installed. The next day I was sent to Baylor hospital in Dallas for an ablation and some fine tuning. Dr. Wells did the ablation and the day I was discharged from Baylor, Dr. Wells told me I could go back to doing anything I had done before and live a normal life.

I feel very good and have a lot of energy. I felt good before I got the pacemaker but now my resting heart rate will never get below 70 beats per minute. This will keep me from feeling light headed or passing out. I was surprised to learn how many other people have pacemakers.

I want to thank all of you for your prayers, get well cards, and words of encouragement for me and my wife Lenora. I want to commend the professionalism of our Citizen's Emergency Medical Service. I want to say thanks to the Cross Plains Senior Citizens Center where I first leaned from a male nurse practitioner Donnie Dillard that my heart wasn't behaving itself.

Donnie is a very caring person and on certain days he is there checking and making sure everyone is healthy.

Lenora and I were at Baylor Hospital the night that the five Dallas police officers were shot and killed and others wounded.

The nurses told us that the hospital was on lock down and that the wounded were brought there. We watched it all in my room and on Fox News.

I got my pacemaker working perfectly and went back to work in time to attend the 138th Annual Sheriff's Training Conference and Expo, July 23-26, 2016 at the Gaylord Texas in Grapevine, Texas.

My wife Lenora and I arrived there Sunday afternoon, stayed 2 nights and returned to Baird late Tuesday evening. While there I attended several Texas Commission on Law Enforcement/TCOLE certified classes. I attended Classes on Mass Murder and Domestic Terrorism, Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Update, Courtroom Security, Motorcycle Gangs vs. Motorcycle Clubs and knowing the Difference, and Texas Commission on Jail Standards update. Actor Chuck Norris was there and presented a program called Using Karate to Teach Character and Promote Safer Schools. He and his wife were in the group picture with all the Texas Sheriffs. He shook hands with all the Sheriffs, told us we were doing a good job and had his backing and support. I was glad to see and visit with all the neighboring Sheriffs from Coleman, Rannels, Taylor, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens and Nolan counties.

# Wild About Texas

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## Rio Grande Gold Tarantula

Tarantulas are a large and diverse group of spiders that can be observed throughout the southwestern United States, Mexico, and South America. The most familiar and recognizable species to the laymen belong to the genus *Aphonopelma*.

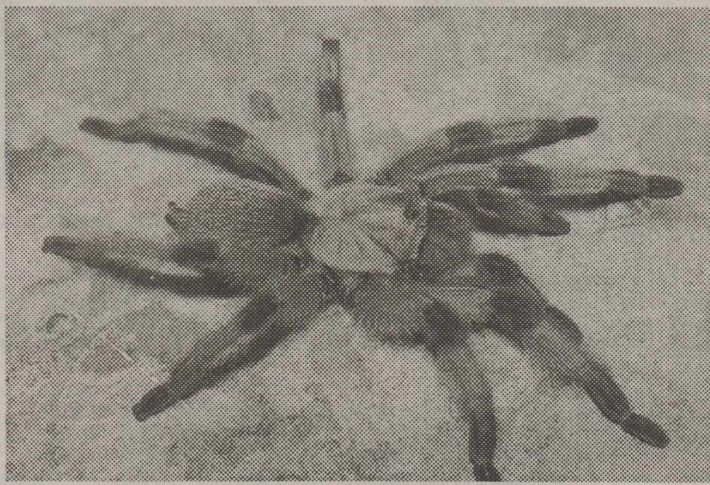
Most people would be surprised to know that this genus is represented in Texas by fourteen species, the most commonly observed being *Aphonopelma hentzi*, the Texas Brown Tarantula. However, there is a species that is far less common, yet much more beautiful that inhabits our great state, and that species is the Rio Grande Gold Tarantula.

Rio Grande Gold Tarantulas (*Aphonopelma moderatum*), like other species of arachnids, have a body that consists of two parts (the cephalothorax and the abdomen) as well as the customary eight legs. However, as the name second portion of the common name implies, the legs are colored a bright golden or blond, making this species the most colorful variety of Tarantula in the United States.

In most specimens, the dorsal coloration is primarily tan, although the intensity of the tan is directly correlated with the age and physical condition of the spider. The abdomen is also covered with long, coarse blond hairs that are known as urticating hairs.

The abdomen is generally one way to differentiate between males and females. The female's abdomen is as wide or wider than the cephalothorax, giving her an hour-glass or figure-eight shape. The male's abdomen is generally thinner than the cephalothorax. Tarantulas are among the biggest spiders of the New World, and this species is the largest in Texas. Females are slightly larger in size than males, reaching a total body length up to one and one-half inch and a leg span of almost four and one half inches.

"Goldies" inhabit a very specific habitat along a small portion of our state's southern border. This habitat is found along the

Rio Grande River from near Sanderson (Terrell county) eastward to near Del Rio (Val Verde county). This dry, gravelly soil on top of limestone is generally thought to be one of the harshest environments in our state. Surprisingly enough, this habitat, while extremely dry and harsh on the surface, can be quite moist beneath the surface in a myriad of cracks, crevices, and catacombs. These underground mazes provide sufficient humidity for this moisture-dependent species to thrive. In fact, the vast majority of their lives are spent in this humid underground lair. This is especially true for the females, who allow food to come to them, ambushing their prey as it passes by the entrance to her domain.

Prey items accepted by this species include just about any smaller invertebrate creature, including many harmful and nuisance species, but they have been known to feed on small mammals such as mice as well. Food is eaten in a very odd, if not disturbing, way. The fangs are inserted into the prey item, much like short, hollow straws, and the insides of the food are literally sucked from within. The exoskeleton that remains is discarded after the feeding. This is akin to a person drinking a milkshake. We drink the contents of the cup, (usually with just one straw) but then we throw away the inedible container.

Given their dastardly appearance, most Tarantulas are quite placid. However, they have several means in which they will defend themselves. The first is to try and run for cover. The second is the shedding of the urticating hairs on the abdomen, which can be very itchy and irritating when placed in the eyes, nostrils, or mouth of a would-be predator. The third defense is to raise the forebody to expose the 3/8 inch long fangs, and the fourth defense is to actually bite with said fangs. Although Tarantulas, like all spiders, are venomous, the bite is of no long-term consequence as the venom is rather weak.

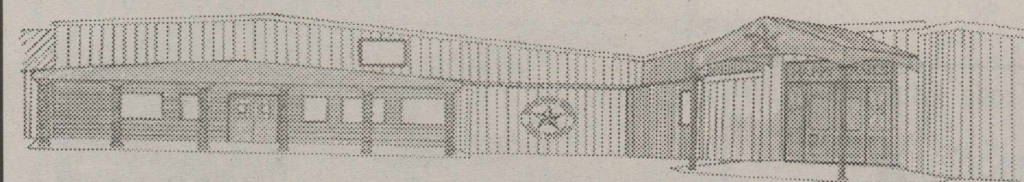
Due to their relatively passive nature, many Tarantulas are actually kept in captivity as pets, and this species is no exception. Many Tarantula breeders consider this species to be somewhat of a novelty due to its very limited range in Texas.

It has been documented that females can live up to thirty years, and many researchers are of the opinion that they might live longer than that. Males on the other hand generally survive only two to three years.

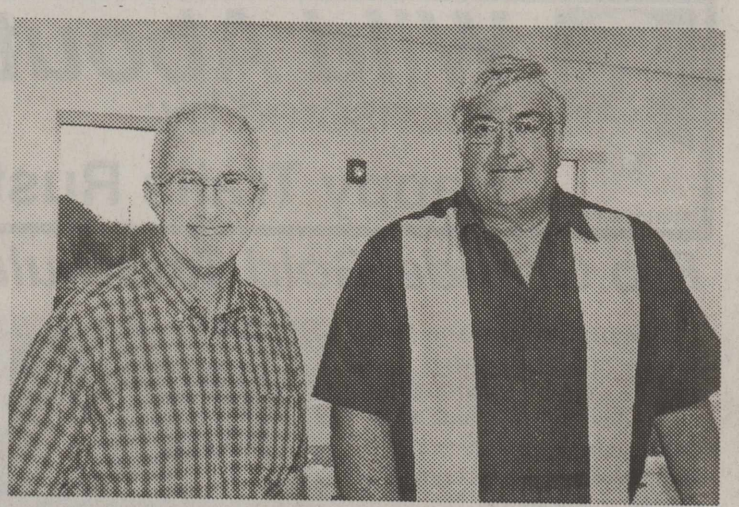

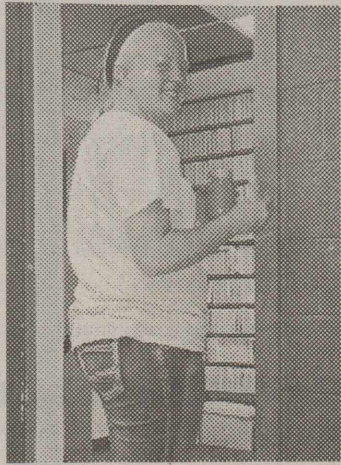
## Junior High and High School Students Give Band Hall a Fresh Coat of Paint

R., by the pump men on the line. It is a daisy costing \$180.26. The inscription engraved upon it is "Presented by the pumpers of the T. & P. R. R. to H. W. Smith."

The City Hotel property, as will be seen by advertisement elsewhere, is to be sold at trustee's sale on July 31st, at Belle Plain.

The weather during the past week has been cool with rains on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday which have place the ground in splendid condition for the growing crops. 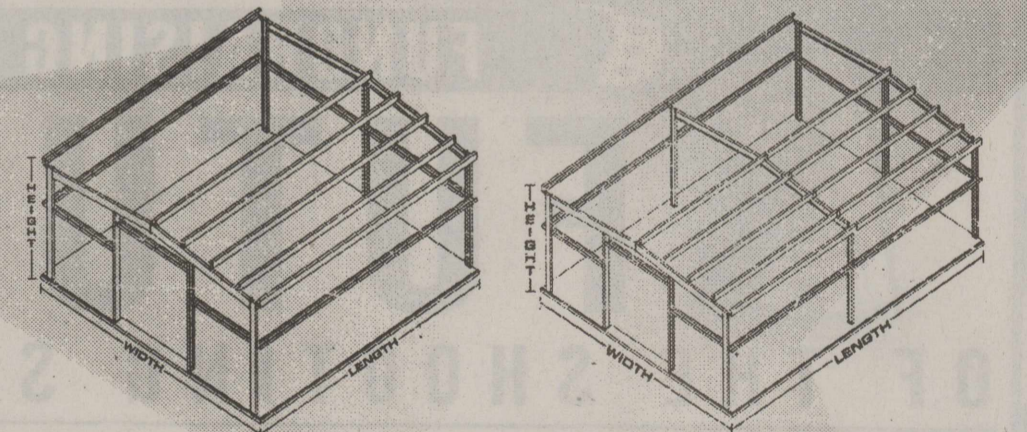

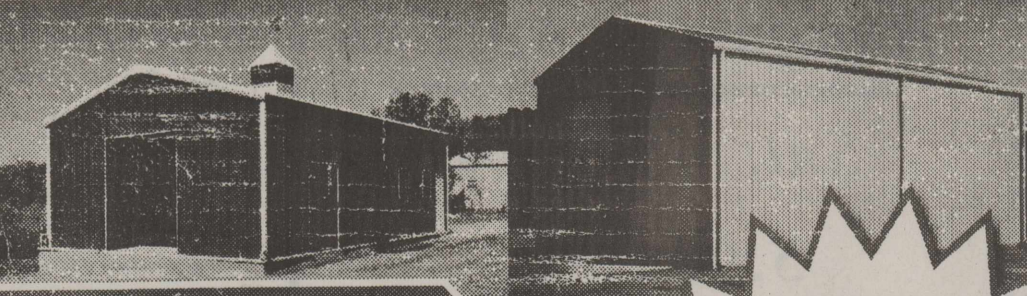

The air conditioner is being replaced at the Senior Citizen's Center.



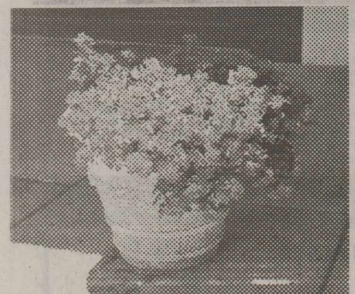





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





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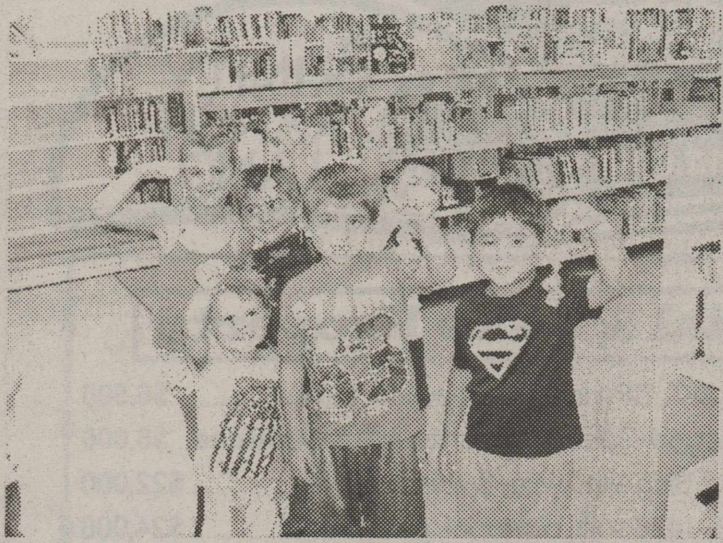
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## Cross Plains Remembered Books Available

The first book, Volume 1, has a little bit of everything in it: school photos, street scenes, gas station photos, family histories, and many other photographs.

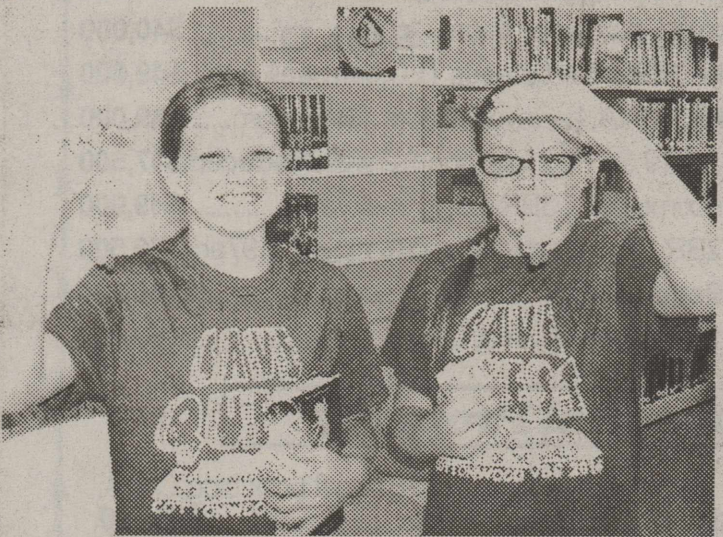
Volume 2, has many family histories and family photographs, as well as, a little bit of everything else. And, many, many photos.

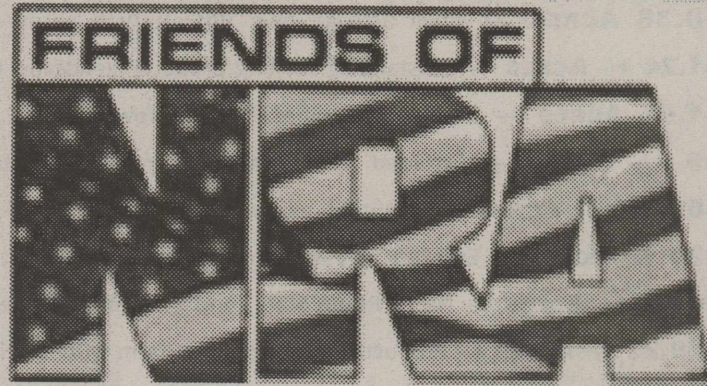

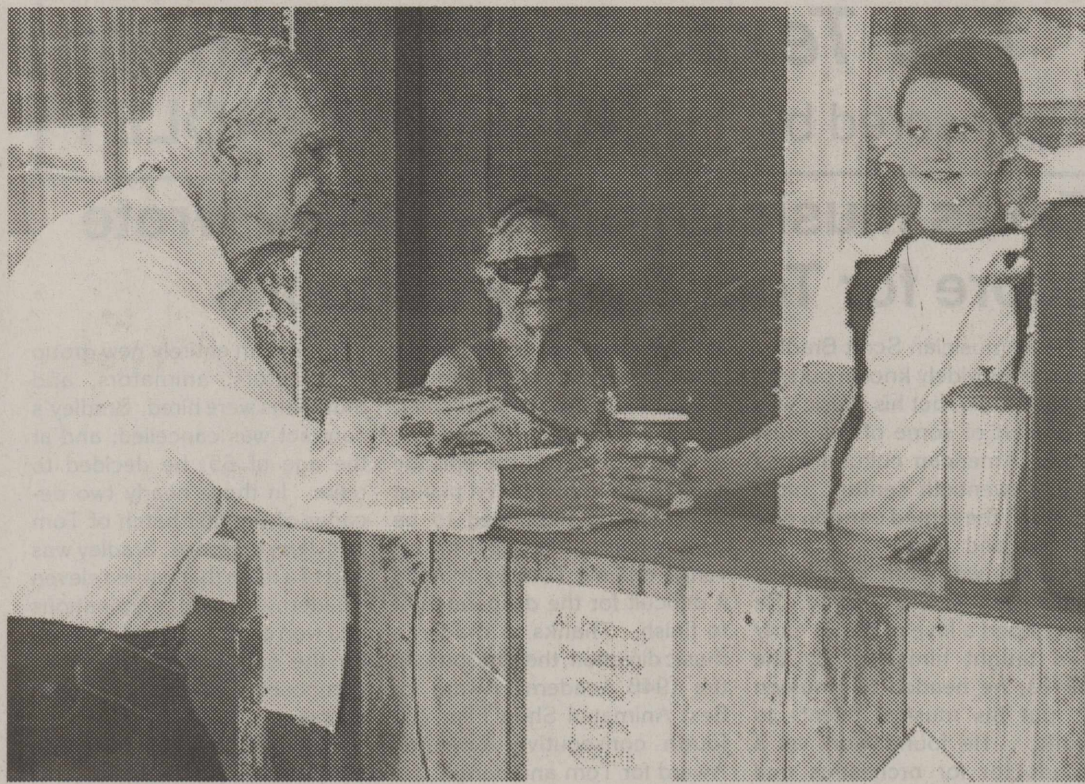

According to Hannah, the Cross Plains Senior Center is a big part of the community and it is important to keep it going. Not only does Hannah help

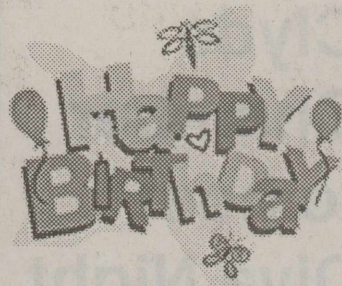
package and serve meals, she plays dominoes, shoots pool and plays the guitar. She can do it all, and the seniors know how blessed they are to have someone so special spend time with them.

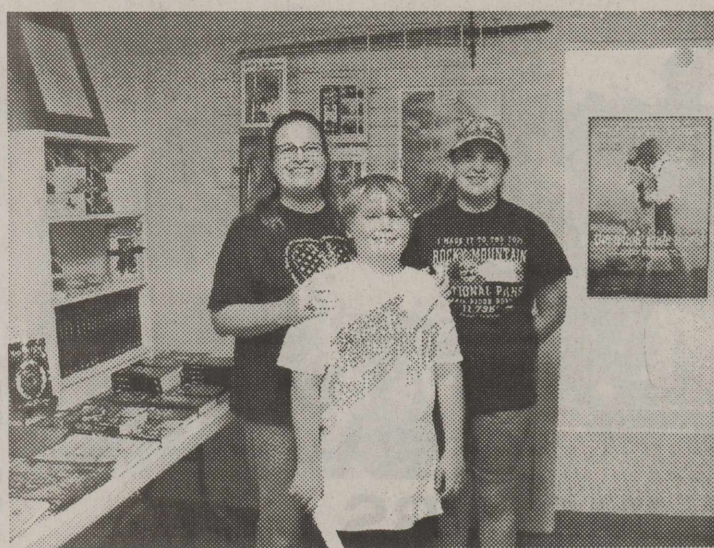

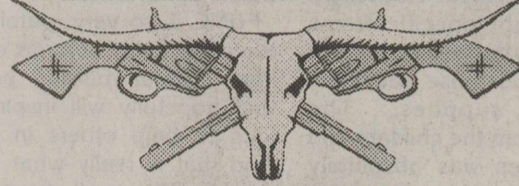
## Local visitors tour Museum

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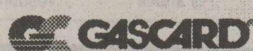
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## FUMC, VBS and MISSIONS

## The Texas History Minute

## Texas musician Scott Bradley wrote score for Tom & Jerry cartoons

Texas musician Scott Bradley was never widely known outside of the studio, but his music was the heart of some of the most iconic American cultural icons of the twentieth century, most notably, the famed cartoon duo of Tom and Jerry.

Bradley was born in Russellville, Arkansas, in 1891. He developed a love of music early and taught himself. By the 1910s, he headed to Houston to put his musical talents to work. He found work as a conductor for orchestras and theaters throughout Southeast Texas as well as radio stations. At the same time, he continued to write his own music. Though he was a successful musician, Bradley still took lessons from more experienced musicians to fine-tune his own craft.

By the early 1920s, California was rapidly becoming the heart of the entertainment world. Bradley left Texas in 1926 to become a conductor for a Los Angeles radio station. In 1929, he was hired by The Walt Disney Studio as a staff musician. However, Walt Disney had a falling out with some of his staff in 1930. One of Disney's chief animators went to form his own cartoon studio for which Bradley worked for several years.

By the 1930s, the cartoon short feature had become a staple part of the moviegoing experience. Seeing the success of Disney and others with the growing popularity of animation, Metro-Goldwyn-Meyer Studios decided to form its own cartoon studio in 1937 to compete. Bradley was quickly hired to help provide the music.

In 1940, MGM animators William Hanna and Joseph Barbera created the Tom and Jerry cartoon, though they were originally named Jasper and Jinx. Bradley went on to write and conduct the large orchestras for the music in the 114 original cartoons made between 1940 and 1957.

Since Tom and Jerry almost never spoke, most of the stories relied on Bradley's music to set up and underline the different jokes, playful tensions, and transitions from one scene to the next. The physical humor and lack of dialogue helped make the cartoons immensely popular

around the world as Bradley's music needed no translations.

One 1947 cartoon in particular, "The Cat Concerto," placed music at the center of the episode as Tom played a concert pianist whose piano happened to be Jerry's home. Jerry got his revenge against Tom by making it difficult for the desperate cat to finish. Thanks to Bradley's music direction, the cartoon won the 1948 Academy Award for Best Animated Short Film, the fourth consecutive Academy Award for Tom and Jerry.

Bradley also composed the musical score for the 28 Barney Bear cartoons made by MGM between 1939 and 1954. Bradley would also go on to provide the music for the 24 Droopy cartoons produced between 1943 and 1957 and the Screwly Squirrel cartoons made in the late 1940s.

In 1957, MGM closed its cartoon studio as part of a corporate restructuring effort. Though MGM would continue to produce cartoons, the large budgets were

gone and an entirely new group of directors, animators, and musicians were hired. Bradley's contract was cancelled; and at the age of 65, he decided to retire. In those nearly two decades of the first batch of Tom and Jerry cartoons, Bradley was part of a team that earned eleven Academy Award nominations and won eight Academy Awards for the cartoons. Overall, he composed 250 cartoon music scores.

Bradley died at his home in California in 1977 at the age of 85 as a new generation of youngsters discovered in television reruns the cartoons he helped bring to life. A compilation album of his musical scores from some of these cartoons was released in 2006. Today, these cartoons continue to be seen on television and on video daily in homes around the world.

## Texas home sales, prices continue strong gains in second quarter of 2016

Aug. 1, 2016 - AUSTIN, Texas - Texas home sales and prices experienced strong gains in the second quarter of 2016, according to the 2016-Q2 Texas Quarterly Housing Report released today by the Texas Association of Realtors.

Abilene home sales increased 3.8 percent in the second quarter of 2016 to 651 single-family home sales, while median price grew 8.4 percent to \$159,900 during the same time frame.

"The last few months have been one of the strongest starts to the summer selling season in the history of Texas real estate," said Leslie Rouda Smith, chairman of the Texas Association of Realtors. "Texas homes of all types and price classes are in high demand. This is especially true for homes priced under \$200,000, which are often preferred by first-time homebuyers but also in shortest supply across the state."

According to the report, 91,418 homes were sold in Texas in the second quarter of 2016, a 4.4 percent increase from 2015-Q2 and the highest volume of Texas home sales ever. More than 45 percent of homes sold in the second quarter were priced less than \$200,000, while nearly 47 percent were priced between \$200,000 and \$500,000.

Home prices continued to rise amidst strong population growth and low housing inventory throughout the state, with the median price for Texas homes increasing 7.5 percent

year-over-year to \$215,000 in 2016-Q2.

Housing inventory remained statistically unchanged from 2016-Q1 at 3.7 months, a level that indicates a seller's market. The Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University estimates that a monthly housing inventory between 6.0 and 6.5 months is a level at which the supply and demand for homes is balanced.

Jim Gaines, Ph.D., chief economist at the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University, added, "While some local markets are still being impacted by declines in the energy sector and housing affordability challenges, overall the Texas housing market continues to perform very well. Flattening declines in statewide housing inventory and an increasing number of homes on the market indicate that Texas could finally be moving towards a more balanced housing market, although it will take some time to do so."

Active listings rose 4.1 percent year-over-year in 2016-Q2 to 98,495 active listings. Texas homes also continued to spend less time on the market, averaging 54 days, which is one day less compared to the same quarter of 2015.

Chairman Smith concluded, "The Texas Association of Realtors continues to advocate for policies that make homeownership affordable, protect private-property rights, and promote public policies that benefit homeowners. Visit TexasRealEstate.com to learn more."

## Taxpayer restoration of historic Texas courthouses trudges on

The Texas Historical Commission has handed out more than \$265 million over 17 years in taxpayer money to rehabilitate and preserve county courthouses. But what was once a short-term response to an embarrassment is now a program heading into its tenth legislative session having not yet gotten a third of the way to the more than 200 counties asking for state help.

At the current rate of about \$20 million a biennium, it will take another 35 years for the commission to complete work on the roughly 140 county courthouses still on the list. As many as 40 more courthouses with historic designations have never made the list.

Other than scattered local coverage in mostly rural areas, not much was said when the commission announced late last week the award of eight matching grants totaling \$20.2 million.

Fannin, Karnes, Lynn, and San Saba counties have planned full restorations. Cameron, Kleberg, and Willacy counties won grants to address

emergency problems with their courthouses, and Hunt County got a grant to plan for its restoration.

The historic Karnes and Willacy courthouse buildings are vacant.

The amount of state grant money belies the need. More than two dozen counties asked the commission for nearly \$80 million for projects estimated to cost \$140 million.

The actions of the past four Legislatures suggest the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program can expect to get no more than a quarter of the amount counties are seeking.

This wasn't the case in 1999, when the Legislature approved \$50 million to launch the program. Lawmakers had been stung when the National Trust for Historic Preservation took the unusual step of placing all of the historic courthouses of Texas on its 1998 list of its 11 most endangered historic places.

After getting \$50 million and \$45 million in the next two sessions, the Legislature approved designating \$80 million in federal transportation money to courthouse

restoration. The Federal Highway Administration voided the designation and the program got nothing.

The Legislature followed that with \$62 million in bond funding in the next session and with two \$20 million biennial grants.

The Legislature's reward for having poured more than \$240 million into the program by the beginning of 2013 was the National Trust putting the historic courthouses back on its 11 most endangered list.

The Texas Historical Commission in that session asked for another \$20 million. The Legislature saw fit to grant \$4.2 million. In this past session, lawmakers restored the grant to \$20 million.

In 17 years, the commission has provided taxpayer money to match local funding to restore 63 courthouses and provide at least some funding for 28 emergency jobs, according to commission data.

It estimates those projects have generated more than \$288 million of economic activity, or just slightly more than half of the state and local tax money spent on the projects.

Still, spokesman Chris Florance told Watchdog the commission is grateful for the ongoing support.

"With continued support from the Texas Legislature," Mark Wolfe, executive director of the commission, said in a news release, "we remain committed to restoring every historic courthouse, maximizing the significant economic benefits these iconic buildings provide."

## Waterfowl hunting blind site drawing dates for Possum Kingdom, Granbury and Limestone Lakes

WACO, Texas (July 27, 2016) - The Brazos River Authority has announced dates and times for lakeside waterfowl hunting blind location drawings for the 2016-2017 hunting season. The drawing gives hunters the opportunity to use a site to set up waterfowl hunting blinds on one of the BRA's three reservoirs: Lakes Limestone, Granbury and Possum Kingdom.

The drawing for Possum Kingdom Lake will be at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, Aug. 20 at the Possum Kingdom Lake Office, 301 Observation Point Road in Grafrod.

The drawing for Lake Granbury will be at 8:30 a.m. Friday, Aug. 26 at the Lake Granbury Office, 4552 Mambrino Highway in Granbury.

The drawing for Lake Limestone will be Friday, Aug. 26, 8:30 a.m. at the Lake Limestone Office, 20226 Sterling Robertson Dam Road in Thornton.

The BRA authorizes the hunting sites at each reservoir, but hunters must provide their own blinds. Hunting will be allowed only at these Brazos River Authority blind sites. Participants must stay within 20 feet of the marked area while hunting. Up to four people may share a blind area.

To be eligible for the drawing, each person must be at least

18 year of age and have a Texas Hunting license for the 2016-2017 season. The license must have a Texas Duck Stamp Endorsement as well as a current federal Waterfowl Stamp attached to the back.

Participants must be present at the drawing to claim their blind sites. Only one entry is allowed per person and one site per entry. A \$200 cash permit fee is required at the time of the drawing for those selected for a site. During the drawing, the first chosen will have first pick of sites followed by the others, drawn in order.

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### About the Brazos River Authority

The Brazos River Authority, with headquarters in Waco, is the oldest river authority in Texas. Created by the Texas Legislature in 1929, the Authority's 42,000 square-mile territory includes all or part of 70 counties; extending from the Texas-New Mexico border west of Lubbock to the Gulf of Mexico near Freeport.

The BRA built, owns, and operates three reservoirs (Lakes

Possum Kingdom, Granbury, and Limestone). In addition to these water supply reservoirs, the BRA contracts with the Corps of Engineers for the water supply storage space at eight federal multi-purpose flood control and water conservation reservoirs (Lakes Whitney, Belton, Proctor, Somerville, Stillhouse Hollow, Granger, Georgetown and Aquilla).

The Brazos River Authority operates a regional wastewater system for the cities of Temple, Belton and the Brushy Creek Regional Wastewater System for the City of Round Rock. The BRA also operates wastewater treatment plants for the cities of Clute-Richwood, Sugar Land, and Hutto. The BRA owns and operates the East Williamson County Regional Water System for the City of Taylor.

The BRA engages in water quality monitoring activities throughout the Brazos River basin. As a member of the Texas Clean River Program, the BRA samples and tests water from more than 100 locations throughout the basin on either a monthly, quarterly or annual basis. ## Biosecurity remains an essential part in keeping backyard flocks healthy

AUSTIN, TX - An ongoing Salmonella outbreak has sickened at least 611 people in 45 states, including Texas, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. The outbreak has been linked to live poultry in backyard flocks.

Texas is home to one of the largest backyard chicken flock populations in the U.S. To minimize the spread of Salmonella, the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) always emphasizes the use of good, proper biosecurity. Biosecurity is a set of preventative measures designed to reduce the risk of introduction and transmission of an infectious disease agent, such as Salmonella.

Even when they appear healthy and clean, live poultry may have Salmonella bacteria in their droppings and on their feathers, feet and beaks. The bacteria can also contaminate cages, coops, chick/poult boxes, bedding, plants and soil in the area where the birds live and roam.

Additionally, Salmonella bacteria can be found on the clothes, shoes and hands of anyone who handled the animals or played and worked near them. It is essential to wash your hands frequently when handling birds in order to limit your risk of exposure.

By following these simple guidelines you can help minimize the risk.

Keep Your Distance - Restrict access to your property and your poultry and post a sign.

Keep It Clean - Wear clean clothes, scrub your shoes/boots with disinfectant, and wash hands thoroughly.

Don't Haul Disease Home - If you have shown birds at a fair or exhibition or are bringing in new animals, keep them separated from the rest of your flock for 30 days after the event.

Don't Borrow Disease From Your Neighbor - Do not share equipment, tools, or other supplies with your neighbors or other livestock or poultry owners.

Look For Signs of Infectious Diseases - You should know what diseases are of concern to your flock and be on the lookout for unusual signs or behavior, severe illness and/or sudden deaths.

Report Sick Animals - Don't wait. Report serious or unusual animal health problems to your veterinarian, State or Federal animal health officials or local extension office.

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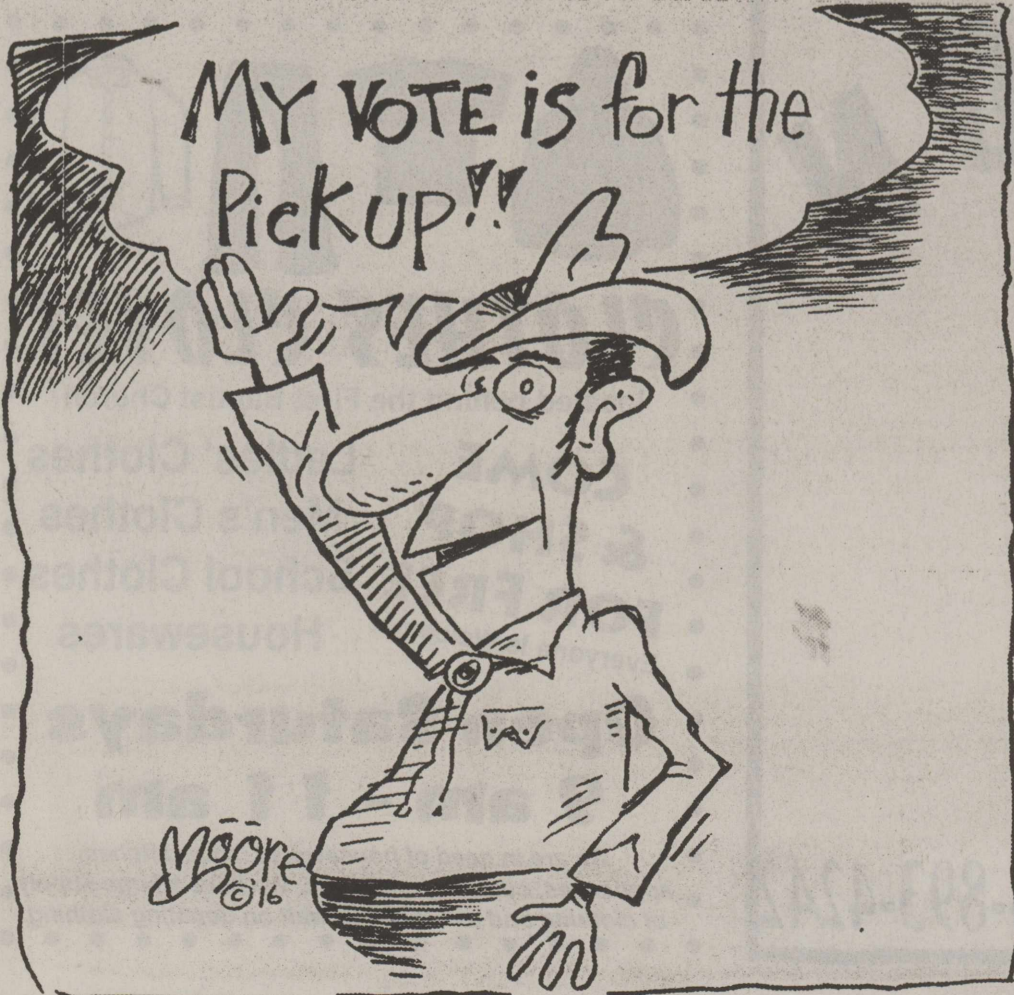

- \* 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- \* 1-1/2 cups (12 ounces) fat-free peach yogurt
- \* 1/8 teaspoon almond extract
- \* 1 carton (8 ounces) frozen reduced-fat whipped topping, thawed
- \* 2 prepared angel food cakes (8 to 10 ounces each), cut into 1-inch cubes (about 8 cups)
- \* 4 small peaches, peeled and sliced (about 2 cups)

**Directions**

1. In a large saucepan, mix raspberries and cornstarch until blended. Bring to a boil; cook and stir 1-2 minutes or until thickened. Strain seeds; cover and refrigerate.

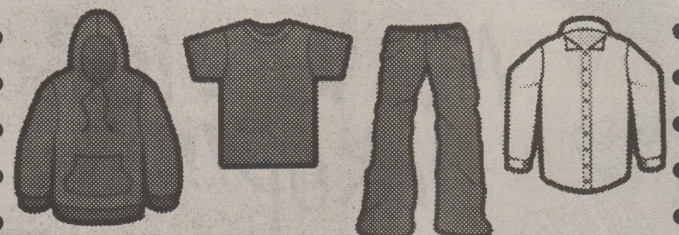

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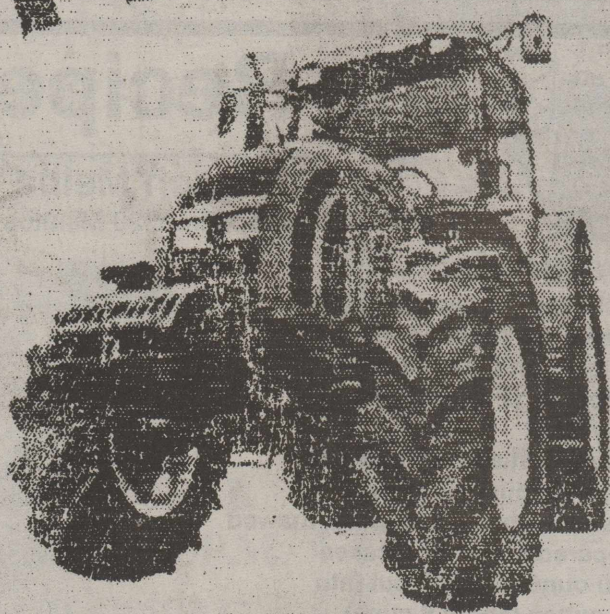
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
