# Economy Injury Disaster Loans Available From SBA

Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers in 27 Texas counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL) from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster.

Excessive rain, hail, wind and flash flooding which occurred between May 1 and June 30, 1992 and continuing caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program

but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies.

Walter Fronstin, district director, said that 21 of these counties are located in the area serviced by the Lubbock SBA Office.

Businesses located in the following West Texas counties have until May 11, 1993 to file an application, Fronstin said.

Andrews, Armstrong, Borden, Briscoe, Castro, Crosby Dawson, Dickens, Floyd, Gains, Garza, Hale, Howard, Kent, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Montley, Randall, Swisher and Terry.

To obtain an application or receive additional information,

interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

Due to the adverse weather, many producers experienced crop losses and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. To the extent these problems have caused the business difficulty in meeting its normal obligations, these loans may be of assistance.

The loan can help a business meet installments on long-term debt, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the disaster not occurred. Refinancing of long-term debt, however, is not eligible under this program.

The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disaster-related needs and is intended to supplement monies the business owner can provide from other sources.

Loan may be approved for up to \$500,000 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are four percent (4%) and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To qualify, businesses must be small by SBA's size standard. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.

## Army Helps Wipe Out College Debt

Thirty students in New Mexico and West Texas took advantage of the Army's loan repayment program during the fiscal year ending in September as the way to erase their college debt.

"The Army will pay off up to one-third or \$1500, whichever is greater, of the recruits' outstanding student loan balance at the end of each year they serve," according to Lt. Col. Brand M. Beasley, commander of Army recruiting in New Mexico, West Texas, and the western edge of Kansas and Oklahoma. "After three years, the slate is clean."

The repayment program, limited to a maximum of \$55,000 in loans, is for qualified active-duty service members with one of seven specific federally-insured student loans. These include the popular Stafford Loans, Perkins Loans, and Federally-Insured Student Loans.

The unpaid principal balance will be paid by the Army for loans made before enlistment, but no payments will be made for delinquent charges or interest that may have accrued.

Army Reservists may also qualify for their own separate repayment program for student loans made before or during their enlistment. Their benefit is 15 percent or a \$500 repayment of the loan for each year of successful service.

"New Army recruits with 30 or more semester hours of college also qualify to start at a higher rank and pay grade," Beasley said. "Taking advantage of these Army loan repayment programs could be the smartest move you've made since college."

## Inspect Heating Equipment To Help Prevent Fires

National Fire Prevention Week was October 4-10, and was a good time for Texans to start inspecting their home equipment.

Heating equipment is the second leading cause of home fires in the United States, accounting for 619 deaths and 84,600 fires in 1990, the latest year for which statistics are available from the non-profit National Fire Protection Association. Cooking is the number one cause of fires in the home.

Portable and space heaters accounted for nearly two-thirds of home heating fire deaths and half of the 2,078 injuries in 1990. Human error is involved in most heating fires, the association found.

"Fires can be avoided by doing a thorough check of heating equipment in your home, but even before you do this make sure you install smoke detectors," said Dr. Susan Quiring, with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. "Smoke detectors should be placed on each floor of your home outside of each bedroom, and checked weekly to see if they are working."

Heating equipment should be used and maintained properly, she said. Keep all flammable material away from heating equipment and never leave heaters unattended.

\* Space heaters should be placed at least 36 inches away from anything that's combustible, including wallpaper, bedding, clothing. Never leave space heaters operating when you are not in the room, or when you go to bed. Don't leave children or pets unattended. Electric space heaters should be checked each season for fraying or splitting wires and over heating.

\* Use only the fuel recommended by the manufacturer for liquid fuel powered space heaters. Never use gasoline or any other substitute fuel. Always turn off the heater and wait until it cools down before adding fuel. Check with the local fire department before purchasing a kerosene heater to find out if it is legal in your community. Store the kerosene away from heat in a container approved by the fire department and be sure it is clearly marked with the fuel name.

\* Fireplaces- have chimneys inspected and cleaned if necessary by a professional prior to the start of every heating season. Creosote, a chemical substance that forms when wood burns, builds up in

chimneys and can cause a chimney fire if not properly cleaned. Always use a sturdy screen in front of the fireplace. Remember to burn only wood-never burn paper or pine boughs, which can float up the chimney and ignite a neighboring home. Never use flammable liquids in a fireplace. If you are purchasing a factory built fireplace, select one listed by testing laboratory and have it installed according to the codes.

\* Wood stoves or coal stoves must bear the label of a recognized testing laboratory and meet local fire codes. Follow manufacturers' recommendations for proper use and maintenance.
