

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Fort Griffin Living History Days

ALBANY, Texas -- The past will come to life at Fort Griffin State Historic Site on October 7-8, 2016, as over 100 living historians gather to portray life at the fort and nearby Wild West town as it was in the 1870s. This annual, two day living history event will last from 8 am to 5 pm both days for exciting demonstrations, education, and authentic frontier history.

There will be living history interpretations from various time periods to include artillery, infantry, and cavalry demonstrations, blacksmithing, Texas Rangers, 1800's children's games, live period music, the Official State of Texas longhorn herd, the Texas Camel Corps, the 12th Armored Division Memorial Museum, and various frontier living demonstrations. In addition to demonstrations, there will also be plenty of food available with several food trucks and a homemade ice cream stand on site.

To kick off the official opening of a new Buffalo Soldier Heritage Trail, which will begin at Fort Griffin State Historic Site, there will be a ribbon cutting ceremony on Saturday



afternoon at 2 pm. This year happens to be the 150th anniversary of the formation of Soldiers were African American regiments of the United States Army, first established through an Act of the United States Congress on July 28, 1866, and eventually comprised of the 9th & 10th Cavalry and 24th & 25th Infantry regiments.

For the basic cost of general admission to Fort Griffin State Historic Site, the entire family can have a truly memorable experience. General admission to the site is \$4 for adults, \$3 for students (ages 6 - 18), and

ages 5 and under are free. On Friday, all local area schools, including home schools, are the Buffalo Soldiers. The Buffalo invited to bring their students out for free admission to the site. In addition, teachers are encouraged to utilize a downloadable education packet, available on the Fort Griffin website, to help prepare students for the event.





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

Actor Fess Parker was raised in San Angelo

an Fess Parker. He became one of the most popular actors of families across the nation. the time, giving life to legendary American figures such as Davy Crockett and Daniel Boone in

his portravals. a young age, his family moved to a farm outside San Angelo where he grew up. His childhood was largely uneventful, but this soon changed. When World War II erupted, he enlisted in the navy. He was too tall to become a pilot as he had hoped, and he eventually served as a radio operator in the Marines.

After his discharge from the service, he enrolled at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene in 1946 through the G. I. Bill. His interest in acting developed, and he appeared in a number of student plays. The next year, he transferred to the University of Texas where he majored in history. He earned a history degree from UT in 1950 and transferred to the University of Southern California in Los Angeles to study theater history. He quickly found work as an actor, albeit a small role. In what became his first film role, he had an uncredited appearance in the classic 1950 comedy Harvey as a limousine driver.

Parker appeared in various student plays at USC while working on his outside acting career. He would ultimately appear in 40 films and television shows. He appeared in several westerns and television shows in the early 1950s. One movie included a role in the science-fiction film Them! (1954) about a race of mutated, Texas-sized ants.

In 1954, the Walt Disney Company offered him a film contract and signed him to play the legendary Texas hero Davy Crockett in a series of one-hour televised features. He appeared in all seven episodes between 1954 and 1956, forever making





Newton Boys Outlaw Gang Historical Marker Dedication in Cottonwood, October 22nd

The Callahan County Historical Commission will dedicate a new Callahan County Historical Marker at the old Cottonwood Bank and Post Office on Saturday, October 22 at 10:00 AM.

The marker titled "The Newton Boys - Outlaw Gang" tells of the birth of Willis, Joe, Jess, and "Doc" Newton "The Newton Boys" in Cottonwood, Texas. The boy's parents, Jim and Janetta Newton, moved in and out of the area as Jim took jobs working on farms and at cotton gins.

On June 12, 1924, after years of bank and train robberies, the four Newton boys along with other gang members stole three million dollars during the biggest train robbery in U.S. history - The Rondout Heist near Chicago, Illinois.

In 1980, Joe was Johnny Carson's guest on The Tonight Show. The brother's lives inspired the 1975 documentary The Newton Boys: Portrait of an Outlaw Gang; a 1994 book of the same title; and the 1998 hit movie, The Newton Boys starring Matthew McConaughey, Ethan Hawke, Vincent D'Onofrio and Skeet Ulrich as the brothers.

The Newton Boys Gang was known for their polite (mostly) dealings during their heists. The gang was proud of having never shot anyone. The Chicago Tribune stated the Newton Boys "were by far the most successful bank and train robbers in American history."



Congressman Mike Conaway visited Clyde on Monday, October 3rd for a Town Hall meeting at the Clyde Chamber of Commerce building.

Just under two dozen people attended the meeting to hear a legislative update from the Congressman. Among the topics discussed were welfare reform, a discussion on regulations for businesses, and mandates for entry level jobs/careers. 
Barn Owl

Many of us here in west Texas are familiar with the largest of the owls, the Great Horned Owl. Its "whoo-whoo" song resounds throughout the southwest evenings. Some of us have even observed one of the smaller owls, the Burrowing Owl, which we will learn more about at a later date. Both of these species, while exquisitely marked in their own right, are typically colored in shades of dark brown. However, there is another, less common species that lives here in west Texas that is colored quite a bit differently, and that species is the Barn Owl.

Barn Owls (Tyto alba) are medium sized birds of prey that have a body size maxing out at just under twenty inches in length. Their wingspan is quite impressive however, reaching just shy of four feet. Very distinctively colored, the Barn Owl is easily distinguishable from all other owls in this area. The first distinctive feature is the white, heart-shaped face that is set apart by a thin, tawny colored
