






Barbarian Festival to be Held on Saturday, June 10th





Valentine's Banquet at the First Baptist Church Fun for All Who Attended


Festive red and pink hearts and decorations filled the First Baptist Church for the Annual Valentine's Banquet, last Wednesday, February 8th.

Last Saturday morning, Gary and Paula Whitaker took advantage of the good weather and drove out from Haltom City to see the Museum. Both are recently retired; Gary from Lockheed Martin and Paula from the Haltom City Public Schools.

ATTENTION PROPERTY OWNERS

Property owners have certain rights that may reduce their property tax burden.

HOMEOWNERS

Persons who own their residence on January 1, 2017. may claim their home as a residential homestead. The filing of this document is only necessary if the homeowner has changed homesteads since January 1, 2016, or has become eligible for additional exemptions since last year. Homeowners may also defer the portion of the tax on their residence homestead if the value of the home was raised more than 5% above the previous year. Although the taxes collection is deferred, interest continues to run on the unpaid portion of tax at a rate of 8% per annum and the deferred tax remains a lien on the property. To apply for the deferral, the owner should contact the appraisal district which appraised the property in question and complete an application.

DISABLED PERSONS

Person who are disabled under Social Security law are entitled to additional exemption on their residential homestead. Disable applicants must apply with the appraisal district and furnish a determination letter from Social Security. Disabled persons now receive all benefits on their home that are available to over 65 persons (see below).

PERSONS WHO ARE **OVER 65 YEARS OF AGE-EXEMPTIONS AND DEFERRAL**

Persons who are over 65 years of age or disabled persons may file for additional exemptions and a ceiling on school taxes for their residential homestead if they become 65 during 2016 or will be 65 during 2017. Over-65 persons should apple for this exemption at the appraisal district office in their county.

eligible to defer paying the tax on their residential homestead if they wish. The taxes continue to accrue during the deferral along with an interest rate of 8% annually, but no attempt will be made to force payment during the deferral. Details and an application may be obtained from any appraisal district or the State Comptroller.

DISABLED VETERANS

Persons who have been declared disabled by the Veteran's Administration are eligible for additional exemptions on property they own. The declaration letter from VA is mailed annually, but the appraisal district only needs a copy in the first year of eligibility or if the percentage of disability changes. In certain situations where the disabled vet is 100% disabled and unemployable, their homestead can be completely exempt. An annual reapplication for the 100% exemptions may be required by the Chief Appraiser.

FARM AND RANCH **OWNERS**

Farmers and ranchers may be entitled to receive an alternate method of appraisal determined by the farm income to the property. This method is available to farms and ranches commercially raising crops or livestock or which are used as a wildlife habitat under State guidelines. An application for agricultural use value and additional information is available from your appraisal district. Re-filing is only necessary if requested to do so by the Chief Appraiser.

EXEMPTION **APPLICATIONS**

Exemption applications for all property tax exemptions including total exemptions for charitable, religious, and other total exemptions may be obtained from an appraisal district nearest you or

BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY OWNERS

State law now requires the filing of a rendition declaring what types of business personal property that a person or company owns. Failure to file the rendition will result in a 10% penalty. If a fraudulent rendition is filing, a 50% penalty is mandated. A rendition can be obtained from the appraisal district office where the property is located. Deadline-April 15. A 30 day filing extension is available by written request.

Callahan County Business reminded to render taxable property by April 15th

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, you must file a rendition with the Callahan County Appraisal District by April 15th, 2017.

A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property a person owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. Tax laws require all businesses to pay property tax based on the value of the assets used in the business to generate income. These assets include inventory, furniture, fixtures, machinery, equipment and vehicles. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or agriculture producers' equipment used for farming, unless specifically requested from the Chief Appraiser. By April 15th of each year, business owners must provide the appraisal district with a listing of those assets. Your business should have received a Confidential Business Personal Rendition from the appraisal district. If you have not received this form please call at 325/854-5865. If you own multiple business locations, you will need to complete the rendition form for

each location. The Appraisal District

Over-65 person are also through the State http://www. may use the information submitted in the rendition to set property values as well as field inspections of businesses. You can also file a report of decreased value to notify the district of significant deprecation of your property. For example, if your property was damaged by a storm, flood, or fire last year, you should file a report of decreased value. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2017.

> The last day to file a rendition or report of decreased value is April 15, 2017. If a rendition is filed late or incomplete or not at all a 10 percent penalty will be imposed, if a fraudulent rendition is filing, a 50 percent penalty is mandated. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request for an extension with the chief appraiser on or before April 15, 2017 to receive an automatic extension to May 15th or the next business day if it falls on a holiday or weekend. For more information about rendering property, deadline extensions, penalties and rendition forms, taxpayers may contact the Callahan County Appraisal District, 132 w. 4th St., Baird, TX 79504 or by phone at 325/854-5865.

AVAILABILITY OF ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS

Taxpayers may receive certain notices required by law from the local appraisal district in electronic format. Written agreements with the county appraisal district must be entered firs,t ensuring what electronic means of delivery are acceptable. If you are interested in receiving communications in electronic format, you should contact your local appraisal district to receive a form requesting electronic communication and how that communication should be transmitted.

Cross Plains' 2017 retail sales up 8% from 2016

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, February 8th.

Cross Plains' 2017 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$39,633.80, which is 8.20 percent higher than the \$36,626.85 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2016.

The payment to the city for February 2017 was \$20,468.99, which is 8.65 percent higher than the \$18,839.34 payment made to the city in February

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today, Wednesday, February 8th, he will send cities, counties, transit systems taxinfo/allocsum/compsum. and special purpose taxing html. districts \$858.6 million in local sales tax allocations for February, 1 percent less than in February 2016. These allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2016 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

"The cities of Houston, Midland and San Antonio saw noticeable decreases in sales tax allocations," Hegar said. "The cities of Round Rock, Frisco and Irving saw noticeable increases in sales tax allocations."

Hegar sent Texas cities \$563.8 million in February 2017, which is lower by 0.9 percent compared to February 2016 and higher by 1.5 percent year-to-date.

He reported \$47.8 million in February 2017 allocations to Texas counties, which is lower by 6.3 percent compared to February 2016 and lower by 2.3 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$193.8 million in February 2017 sales tax allocations, which is 0.9 percent lower than February 2016 and higher by 1.0 percent year-to-date.




Spotted Salamander

Most folks are very familiar with the 2 most common types of amphibians that reside in this state. Nearly everyone has heard a frog calling, or seen a toad in their own backyard. Yet most people are not aware of 4-legged and tailed amphibian that dwells here as well, and that is the Spotted Salamander.

The Spotted Salamander (Ambystoma maculatum) belongs to a genus of salamanders that are categorized as Mole Salamanders. This genus has 5 representatives in Texas, and this particular species arguably has the smallest range of the faction. This plain, but pretty species occurs in the easternmost portions of the state. It is in this eco-region that it resides almost exclusively underground in woodlands and forested areas, almost always near an ephemeral body of water. Outside of Texas it may be observed eastward to Georgia and then northward to Canada. It happens to be the state amphibian of both Ohio

and South Carolina. As the family name implies, this group of salamanders is well suited to living life underground, much akin to moles. It rarely makes an appearance above ground save for just a few days annually. Being a cold-tolerant species, its above-ground activity is generally induced by a warm front during the winter and early spring that stabilizes the temperatures enough to encourage emergence.

While the old adage "everything is bigger in Texas" holds true with this species close relative, the Tiger Salamander, this particular variety is not nearly as long or "beefy" as it aforementioned cousin. Adults can range in size from 5 ½ to 7 inches, although 8 inch-long individuals are not uncommon.

States sales tax revenue totaled \$2.5 billion in January

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said today that state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.45 billion in January, 0.7 percent less than in January 2016.

"Sales tax collections reflect tepid spending by both businesses and consumers," Hegar said. "Receipts from the information sector were up, but declines were seen in receipts from the construction and mining sectors, as well as retail trade.'

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in January 2017 was up by 0.3 percent compared with the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections in fiscal 2016. Motor vehicle sales and rental

taxes, motor fuel taxes and oil and natural gas production taxes also are large revenue sources for the state.

In January 2017, Texas collected the following revenue from those taxes:

* motor vehicle sales and rental taxes - \$406.9 million, up 6.9 percent from January

* motor fuels taxes — \$295.7 million, up 1.4 percent from January 2016; *oiland natural gas production

taxes - \$248.4 million, up 28.4 percent from January 2016;

* total tax collections — \$3.71 billion, up 2.2 percent from January 2016.

The history of Texas soft drink Dr. Pepper

Dr. Pepper was the creation of a young pharmacist names Charles Alderton. Alderton was born in Brooklyn, New York, in 1857 and traveled extensively as a youth. He received much of his education in Great Britain, but he eventually made his way to Texas where he attended medical school. Afterward, he worked as a pharmacist with business partner Wade Morrison at Morrison's Old Corner Drug Store in Waco.

According to one story, Alderton experimented with several different drinks to try to attract customers before perfecting the Dr. Pepper formula. The drink was first introduced in Waco in 1885, making it one of the oldest continuously bottled soft drinks in the United States.

The drink quickly became a hit with people all across Waco. Within a few years, it became synonymous with the city, and Alderton and Morrison were receiving requests from customers well outside the city asking for a "Waco" or "Doc Alderton's Drink." Eventually, it came simply to be known as "Dr. Pepper."

Where the name of the drink originated, no one is entirely certain. Several stories have circulated, but some individuals have suggested it was named after a former girlfriend or even a friend of Alderton or Wade. However, many colas across the nation were being created at that time in small drugstores. A number of these local colas, including future rival Coca-Cola, were marketed as health drinks.

By 1891, so many requests and orders for the drink had come into the pharmacy that they could no longer keep up with demand. Morrison was excited by the possibilities and wanted to expand, but Alderton decided to pursue medicine instead and sold the rights to Morrison. Alderton died in 1941.

Morrison brought in another partner, Robert Lazenby, and formed the Artesian Manufacturing and Bottling Co. in Waco

selling franchise arrangements with bottlers across the state to produce and distribute Dr. Pepper in their area. As a result, the success of the company grew even more rapidly.

After Morrison's death, Lazenby and his son-in-law, J. B. O'Hara, took the drink to the Missouri. It was such a success that Dr. Pepper began being sold across the country, marketed as the "King of Beverages."

By the 1920s, the "Drink a Dr. a popular slogan. Garden Club Learns 'All Things Bees'

met on Friday, February 10, 2017 in the Mozelle Richardson Room of the Texas Heritage Bank. Members welcomed guest speaker, J'Neena Swinney with a luncheon and light hearted conversation.

J'Neena provided an exceptional talk on "All Things Bee's", including their life cycle and reproduction, the benefits of bee's to nature, crops, honey producers and gardeners. She also provided extensive information about beekeeping and honey harvesting.

This time of year bee's are gathering pollen from Asian Jasmine, Dandelions, Flowering Quince, Henbit, Rosemary, Viburnum, Wild Mustards (non-native, invasive), Wild Plum Thickets and Winter Honeysuckle. Trees that provide February-March pollens are: Ash, Bradford Pear, Elm, Juniper, Oak, Peach, Plum (Fruit and Mexican) and Redbuds.

Worker bee's are female and are nurses to the larvae, housekeepers, scouts, gatherers and guards for the hive. The females make waxy

The Cross Plains Garden Club honey combs then store and cap the honey they produce in those combs. Male bee's are called drones, their purpose is fertilization of the queen's eggs. Females (with the exception of the queen) live 6 weeks. Males can live up to 12 weeks. During her 6 week life span the female will produce 1/12 teaspoon of honey. The queen bee is selected by her bees and is fed royal jelly which the female bee's excrete from their antennae and promotes her oversized development. The queen lays approximately 2,000 eggs a day from March through November and will live 5 years in the wild and 2-3 years in domestic hives.

Bee's communicate through both scent and dance. The dance of the scout bee's indicates to the others where to find the pollen source. Their warning scent smells like bananas, a lemon odor signals the bees are content.

J'Neenaprovidedafascinating program and we encourage our community to support our bee populations. Consider what life would become without bees.


Walk out backwards so I'll Sheriff's Corner-

Friday, February 10, 2017 a bail bondsman associate called the Sheriff's Office with information that Clifton Boyd Lindsey, a white male, 55 years old, 5'5" tall, and 127 pounds, brown hair and hazel eyes, was reported to be at a residence, living in a building, behind the residence. This house and building is located in the north east corner of Callahan County. It is the last house to the left on Highway 6 less than a mile from the Eastland County line. He had failed to comply with the bond agreement that allowed him to remain out of jail and was now a fugitive from justice. Chief Deputy Rick Jowers and I went to the residence and knocked on all the doors and called out but no one came to the door.

Saturday afternoon, the bondsman, who now had an assistant with him, called the Sheriff's Office again and said that they were shot at 3 times, with a pistol, by this same person that they were looking for. He said that the man, who he positively identified as Clifton Boyd Lindsey, turned and ran the other way which would be in the direction of Eastland County. Two Callahan County deputies, Chief Rick Jowers and Larry Lemon, and I hurried to the scene. Texas Highway Patrol from Callahan County and Eastland County came to the scene. A Department of Public Safety helicopter arrived and two Texas Rangers arrived on the scene. The SWAT team from Abilene Police Department, came and they brought an armored vehicle with them.

After dark the APD's armored vehicle moved through the gate from Highway 6 to the house. They had their spot lights on

and the DPS helicopter hovered over the house and flooded the area with lights. They called out with loud speakers but no one responded or came out of the house or outbuildings. They main power and equipment was available to break down the doors but the Texas Rangers who were in charge at this point made the decision to stand down and wait for another opportunity because it was not worth risking a life over, whether it was the suspect's life, some other person in the house, or one of the officer's life. I agreed that was a good decision.

The last time Clifton Boyd Lindsey was in our jail was July

10, 2016. People have called me and asked me if they should be worried about this man. My answer was is yes it is possible that he could be dangerous. If anyone sees a man fitting his description call 911 or the Sheriff's Office immediately and stay away from him. I am hoping that a family member or close friend will talk him into self-surrendering.

Monday morning the bail bondsman associate came to the Sheriff's Office and gave a written statement concerning the shots fired at him that Saturday afternoon. An offense report will be made and presented to the County

The Recipe Corner Fortgotten Jambalaya Prep Time: 35 Minutes Cook Time: 4 1/4 Hours

Ingredients:

1 can (14-1/2 ounces) diced tomatoes, undrained * 1 can (14-1/2 ounces) beef or chicken broth

1 can (6 ounces) tomato paste 3 celery ribs, chopped

^{*} 2 medium green peppers, chopped

1 medium onion, chopped * 5 garlic cloves, minced

* 3 teaspoons dried parsley flakes

* 2 teaspoons dried basil

* 1-1/2 teaspoons dried oregano 1-1/4 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper

* 1/2 teaspoon hot pepper sauce 1 pound boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch cubes

1 pound smoked sausage, halved and cut into 1/4-inch slices

* 1/2 pound uncooked medium shrimp, peeled and deveined

Directions
