

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Chihuahuan Raven

Anyone who has had the opportunity to drive on some of the hundreds of backroads in West Texas has undoubtedly observed the large, all-black birds atop the electrical poles. Rather than instilling fear, (anyone recall the 1963 Alfred Hitchcock flick titled The Birds?) this species should instead inspire the viewer to be willing to take risks. I can see the puzzlement on your face as you read this, but bear with me as we take a look at one of the most recognizable birds in West Texas, and that is the Chihuahuan Raven.

The Chihuahuan Raven (Corvus cryptoleucus) is one of five species of crows and ravens that call Texas home. It can be observed on a regular basis throughout the western portions of the state (west of an imaginary line extending from Wichita Falls to Brownsville) throughout the visitation on Thursday evening year, save for the uppermost portions of the Panhandle where it is a summer resident. It is in these regions that this large avian species finds its preferred habitats; grazed pasturelands, grasslands, and open desert.

The Chihuahuan Raven is the second-largest species of the genus Corvus with adults attaining a body length of just under 20 inches. The wingspan is significantly larger, reaching an impressive 38 inches across. Monotonous in coloration, males and females of this species are almost entirely black, save for a purple iridescence when sunlight strikes them just right. The feathers on the back of the neck and throat are adorned with white bases, but this diagnostic feature is only observed when the bird is either aggravated or in high winds. Keeping with the "goth-theme", the large eyes, the heavy bill, and the long, scaly

legs are also black. This boisterous species feeds upon a large variety of both plant and animal materials; nuts, corn, fruits, grains, cactus pads, insects, arachnids, crayfish, worms, snails, lizards, snakes, frogs, toads, small rodents, and even the young of other species of birds have been reported as food. Many will also readily

accept human table scraps as well, sometimes not even waiting for unsuspecting campers to be finished with them!

Like other members of the crow and raven family, the Chihuahuan Raven generally only produces one brood annually. Also, like other members of its clan, it is also monogamous. It is a colonial nester, and nests are constructed with twigs, sticks, and even old pieces of barbed wire and then lined with grass, hair, and paper products.

The height of the nest varies; some females will build their nests a mere 9 feet above the ground, while others may choose to construct theirs upwards of nearly 40 feet. Both sexes will incubate the 3-8 pale green eggs that are blotched with brown for about 3 weeks. will then be brooded by the female and fed by both sexes

for an additional month. Typically, by that time, the young have obtained their ability to fly and developed their ability to gather food on their own.

Studies have shown that Ravens apparently are quite intelligent, and although not as vocal as some South American parrots, many have been trained to mimic human words. In addition, other studies have shown that this species of bird is quite a risk-taker; there are several observations of individuals who will plunge into a "dust devil" and allow themselves to be taken on a spiraling upward ride. But rather than just writing this behavior off as an accidental incident, the same individuals would repeat the process over and over again!

The Cross Plains High School football team will take on Iraan on Saturday at 1 p.m. at San Angelo Stadium in San Angelo in the bi-district round of the Class 2A Division II playoffs.

The Buffaloes (6-4, 3-2) secured third place in the final District 6-2A Division II standings and a postseason berth with a 40-8 victory at Miles (2-8, 1-4) last Friday in the final game of the regular season. Cross Plains rolled up 329 yards rushing and 406 yards total offense.

A 3-yard run by Creed Goode and an 11-yard touchdown pass from Caleb Hernandez to Kaiden Petree gave the Buffaloes a 16-8 first-quarter lead. The Buffaloes added single touchdowns in each of the next three quarters while holding Miles scoreless for the rest of the game.

Ty Tipton returned an interception 40 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter. Hernandez had an 11-yard keeper for a score in the third period, and Goode, who led the Buffaloes with 170 yards rushing, raced 97 yards for Cross Plains' final touchdown

midway through the fourth quarter. Goode also ran for three two-point conversions, giving him 18 points scored in the game.

The Buffaloes' defense limited Miles to just 114 yards total offense. Petree led the Cross Plains defense with 19 tackles and an interception. Joe Crockett had 15 tackles, Theron Allen 11 stops and Lane Patterson 10 tackles and an interception.

Iraan, which finished second with a 4-1 record in District 5-2A Division II this season, is 6-4 overall, the same as Cross Plains. The Braves clobbered Irion County 61-7 in its regular-season finale last week.


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
Veterans Honored With Lunch at Senior Center

The American Legion presented the Colors. Chaplain John Swift lead the prayer. Lunch was served by City employees.




























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

Their initial voyage in late 1941 proceeded with little incident. They docked briefly at Pearl Har-Hawaii while on the high seas. Army officials briefly considered recalling them to Hawaii, but the decision was made to send them onward. After spending Christmas 1941 in Australia, the men were then ordered to assist Australian, British, and Dutch troops in the Dutch East Indies (modern-day Indonesia) against Japan.

Pressure from Japanese forces mounted, and the Allies fell back into smaller and steadily less defensible corners. The USS Houston was sunk, with the loss of 700 American sailors. Morethan 300 survivors reached Allied lines. Cohesion soon broke down, and it was every force for itself. The Americans were cut off in the mix, unable to rally and unable to communicate with other units. On March 8, Java fell to Japan, and the Texans were captured, along with more than 32,000 other Allied troops.

The news stunned America, but the War Department had no idea what had happened to the troops of the Second Battalion or the Houston survivors. Communications simply ceased. Families and neighbors grieved, worried, and prayed, not knowing what fates awaited their loved ones half a world away. The 534 captured of the Second Battalion, along with the Houston, became known as the Lost Battalion and suffered in Japanese prison camps throughout the war.

The Geneva Convention of 1929 specified that prisoners were to be given proper shelter and medical care and not to be tortured. Nations were also supposed to inform each other of captives. Japan refused to ratify the treaty, and during



After some time back in Texas, families organized a welcome home celebration in October 1945. The men formed the Lost Battalion Association and met regularly in the ensuing years. In a brutal chapter from a war full of brutality, the men may have been lost for a time but were never forgotten.

Cross Plains' 2017 retail sales up 12% from 2016

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2017 are just over twelve percent higher than 2016, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, November 8th.

Cross Plains' 2017 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$232,827.68, which is 12.82 percent higher than the \$206,361.51 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2016.

The payment to the city for Nowhich is 2.96 percent higher than the \$23,006.14 payment made to the city in November

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today, Wednesday, November 8th, he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$774.9 million in local sales tax allocations for November, 5.00 percent more than in November 2016. These allocations are based on sales made in September by businesses that report tax monthly.

Hegar sent Texas cities \$507.5 million in November 2017, which is higher by 4.3 percent compared to November 2016 and higher by 3.1 percent year-

He reported \$45.9 million in November 2017 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 14.2 percent compared to November 2016 and higher by 5.9 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$169.5 million in November 2017 sales tax allocations, which is 2.5 percent higher than November 2016 and higher by 2.9 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$52.1 million in November 2017 allocations, which is 13.0 percent higher than November 2016 and higher by 11.9 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$774.9 million in November 2017, which is 5.0 percent higher than November 2016 and higher by 3.7 percent year-to-date.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in September by businesses that report tax monthly, and sales made in July, August and September by quarterly filers.

Duck Hunting Dangers A message from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) last week cautioned duck hunters to "Wear your life jacket." An accompanying illustration showed a man standing up while piloting a boat with another hunter and a retriever seated in the bow I've hunted ducks for years from High Island to Corpus and have never seen a duck hunter wearing a life jacket. That's good get to the stand, though. But the illustration almost encourages standing up in a boat. The chance that boaters might strike debris causing a boat to lurch should be enough to discourage standing.

on the Barrow Ranch near Port that danger, or what an Arthur, we had to boat across a narrow slip of water to get to our blinds. One of the other hunters, wearing waders, lost his balance getting in the boat, and took an unplanned dive into cold saltwater. He and his and shotgun went all the way under. Fortunately, the water was shallow, and he stood up and handed us his dripping shotgun. Unfortunately, it was mid-December, and cold, and the man had no extra clothing. Through chattering teeth, and with no small amount of embarrassment, he insisted he was fine, and ready to hunt.

So, I guess TPWD must tell some people to wear life jackets. A different kind of fall affected another early morning hunter. Four men sat in the dark in a sunken ground blind near the coast. It was close to shooting time (1/2 hour before sunrise to sunset), and one hunter decided to answer Nature's call. He weighed close to 300 pounds, and stood in front of the blind, facing away. As he stood there

heard a "splat", and the large man fell back onto them. He was unconscious, and bleeding from his forehead. In the dark, it apparently flew directly into the busy hunter's face. The hunter survived; the duck didn't.



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

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
