


Buffaloes Guard Creed Goode was named No, 3 the Abilene Reporter-News' Big Country

The First United Methodist Church will be holding an Ash Wednesday Service on Wednesday, Feb. 14 at 6:00 p.m. The public is warmly invited to share in this service where we recognize our mortality, repent of our sins before our loving God. We recognize life as a precious gift from God and re - turn our lives towards Jesus Christ. We may make resolutions and commit to change our lives over the next forty days so that we might be more like Christ. In an Ash Wednesday service, usually the minister will make the sign of the cross on a person's forehead with ashes. The sign of the cross reminds us of the resurrection of Christ.

In Western Christianity, Ash day, or the start of the season of Lent. Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on

Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent excludes Sundays because every Sunday is like a little Easter. The season is a preparation for celebrating Easter. Judy Porter Retires as Director of Local **Food Pantry**

a lot of hard work at the Food Pantry, Judy Porter is stepping down as the director. Thanks to the great job she has done, the Cross Plains Food Pantry has grown into an awesome ministry that is sponsored by the First United Methodist Church. Judy will be greatly missed in many ways.

Roughly 20 years ago, the church embarked on a special mission to provide food for local residents who needed such help. Betty Edwards led the fledging project which was located in the small closet that was inside the American Legion Hall. Distributing food from the commodity program run by the government was an interesting combination of raisins, big hunks of cheese, rice, dried beans and some canned vegetables and fruits.

In 2003, Mary Ann Chaffin was instrumental in obtaining a grant from the Dodge Jones Foundation to purchase a portable building that was located just east of the school bus maintenance building on NE 9th Street. The land is provided by the City for one dollar per year for rent. Allan Bland built the sturdy shelving that is still in use in this building. After the 2005 fire, one of the surviving portable buildings from the church was moved over and attached to the Food Pantry building. As an Eagle Scout project, Ben Schaefer built the shelving for that

growing base of volunteers enabled the program to grow from an average of 15 families served per month to the current 60 served. Initially there were two distribution dates per month with the clients being assigned to one or the other. As the program continued to grow, it became easier to coordinate everything on just one day, so the monthly distribution of one week of food is now on the last Wednesday morning

In 2013 there were a lot of NFL fans in the church family and the idea came up to show the Super Bowl game on the big screen in the Fellowship Hall. A natural idea for the January fellowship meal was to proclaim it as "Souper Bowl Sunday" and everybody was encouraged to bring soup to eat and canned soup for the Food Pantry. Eight-five cans were collected that day and the "Souper Bowl Sunday" has continued with an average of 168 cans being collected annually over the

Groups around town have gotten involved in collecting soup for the Pantry; the US Postal Service collects cans from the routes, the first through fifth grades have collected canned foods as part of their math studies, (this past December, they collected 1,072 cans), the Library collects food for fines on overdue books, the Weight Warriors bring canned goods each month and the Hunters for the Hungry Program

in Coleman has provided free meat in the past. In addition, the winners of BUNCO often designate the Pantry to receive the money collected each month from the players. Other churches and organizations around the area also support the Food Pantry financially.

Over the years, a crew of dedicated volunteers are always available to help with the distribution process each month and many of these are not even members of FUMC, they just like to help a worthy

Cher Ptacek has volunteered to head up the Food Pantry with the goal of continuing the success of the Ministry as exemplified by Judy over her many years of leadership.

Statistics indicate that not only prepare foodservice foodborne illness continues managers to pass the to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 6 Americans will become sick, 128,000 will become hospitalized, and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

Texas Food Establishment Rules state that each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Taylor, Jones and Haskell Counties, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This two day program will be offered for \$125.00 on March 26 and March 27 at the Taylor County Extension Office. ATTENTION PROPERTY OWNERS

Property owners have certain rights that may reduce their property tax burden.

HOMEOWNERS

Persons who own their residence on January 1, 2018, may claim their home as a residential homestead. The filing of this document is only necessary if the homeowner has changed homesteads since January 1, 2017, or has become eligible for additional exemptions since last year. Homeowners may also defer the portion of the tax on their residence homestead if the value of the home was raised more than 5% above the previous year. Although the taxes collection is deferred, interest continues to run on the unpaid portion of tax at a rate of 8% per annum and the deferred tax remains a lien on the property. To apply for the deferral, the owner should contact the appraisal district which appraised the property in question and complete an application.

DISABLED PERSONS

Person who are disabled under Social Security law are entitled to additional exemption on their residential homestead. Disable applicants must apply with the appraisal district and furnish a determination letter from Social Security. Disabled persons now receive all benefits on their home that are available to over 65 persons (see below).

PERSONS WHO ARE **OVER 65 YEARS OF** AGE-EXEMPTIONS AND **DEFERRAL**

Persons who are over 65 years of age or disabled persons may file for additional exemptions and a ceiling on school taxes for their residential homestead if they become 65 during 2017

or will be 65 during 2018. Over-65 persons should apple for this exemption at the appraisal district office in their county. Over-65 person are also eligible to defer paying the tax on their residential homestead if they wish. The taxes continue to accrue during the deferral along with an interest rate of 8% annually, but no attempt will be made to force payment during the deferral. Details and an application may be obtained from any appraisal district or the State Comptroller.

DISABLED VETERANS

Persons who have been declared disabled by the Veteran's Administration are eligible for additional exemptions on property they own. The declaration letter from VA is mailed annually, but the appraisal district only needs a copy in the first year of eligibility or if the percentage of disability changes. In certain situations where the disabled vet is 100% disabled and unemployable, their homestead can be completely exempt. An annual reapplication for the 100% exemptions may be required by the Chief Appraiser.

FARM AND RANCH **OWNERS**

Farmers and ranchers may be entitled to receive an alternate method of appraisal determined by the farm income to the property. This method is available to farms and ranches commercially raising crops or livestock or which are used as a wildlife habitat under State guidelines. An application for agricultural use value and additional information is available from your appraisal district. Re-filing is only necessary if requested to do so by the Chief Appraiser.

> EXEMPTION **APPLICATIONS**

Exemption applications for all property tax exemptions including total exemptions for charitable, religious, and other total exemptions may be obtained from an appraisal district nearest you or through the State Comptroller's Office at 1/800-252-9121 or from their website at: http://www. windowns.state.tx.us/taxinfo/ taxforms/02-forms.html.

BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY OWNERS

State law now requires the filing of a rendition declaring what types of business personal property that a person or company owns. Failure to file the rendition will result in a 10% penalty. If a fraudulent rendition is filing, a 50% penalty is mandated. A rendition can be obtained from the appraisal district office where the property is located. Deadline-April 15. A 30 day filing extension is available by written request.

Callahan County Business reminded to render taxable property by April 15th

If you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income, you must file a rendition with the Callahan County Appraisal District by April 15th, 2018.

A rendition is a report that lists all the taxable property a person owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. Tax laws require all businesses to pay property tax based on the value of the assets used in the business to generate income. These assets include inventory, furniture, fixtures, machinery, equipment and vehicles. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or agriculture producers' equipment used for farming, unless specifically requested from the Chief Appraiser. By April 15th of

each year, business owners must provide the appraisal district with a listing of those assets. Your business should have received a Confidential Business Personal Rendition from the appraisal district. If you have not received this form please call at 325/854-5865. If you own multiple business locations, you will need to complete the rendition form for each location.

The Appraisal District may use the information submitted in the rendition to set property values as well as field inspections of businesses. You can also file a report of decreased value to notify the district of significant deprecation of your property. For example, if your property was damaged by a storm, flood, or fire last year, you should file a report of decreased value. The district will look at your property before assigning

a value in 2017. The last day to file a rendition or report of decreased value is April 15, 2018. If a rendition is filed late or incomplete or not at all a 10 percent penalty will be imposed, if a fraudulent rendition is filing, a 50 percent penalty is mandated. Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request for an extension with the chief appraiser on or before April 15, 2018 to receive an automatic extension to May 15th or the next business day if

it falls on a holiday or weekend. For more information about rendering property, deadline extensions, penalties and rendition forms, taxpayers may contact the Callahan County Appraisal District, 132 w. 4th St., Baird, TX 79504 or by phone at 325/854-5865.
