

Many people may not realize that equipment like the "Jaws of Life" and the air tanks and breathing apparatus that the firemen use in house and structure fires need to be inspected and re-certified each

This inspection on the lifesaving equipment, plus major repairs to the firetrucks, has cost the Fire Department over \$10,000, just in the past month

This expenditure, plus insurance and other current expenses have left the department in a financial

Over the past year, the Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department responded to 69

fires that the department was able to contain and keep the damage to a minimum.

Some of the calls were for automobile wrecks, where the "Jaws of Life" and other instruments were used to extricate people from their

Other calls were for structure fires and automobile fires. CPVFD has been there on call,

ready to roll and put out the fire and work the wreck. Now, CPVFD needs you help.


Callahan County has reinstated the Countywide Burn Ban effective immediately.

Symptoms of flu arrive sharply about four days after the initial infection. Symptoms include high fever, headache, muscle aches, and fatigue. Symptoms can be very mild in some cases. Where the 1918-19 pandemic came from has been a subject of some contention, though many pathologists have concluded it originated in Asia. It came to be called the Spanish Flu when Spanish King Alfonso XIII contracted it in 1918, and absent repeat of the 1919 disaster. any wartime censorship there, his condition was followed by newspapers everywhere. As World War I raged, soldiers in close-knit camps contracted the sickness and quickly spread it from one unit to another and then to their home countries as troops went home. Because of the incubation period, patients never knew they were infected until symptoms appeared several days later. And by then, they had infected many others.

The first American appearance was at Fort Riley, Kansas, in March 1918. Soldiers suddenly started showing up at the infirmary in large numbers, with more than 400 falling ill before midday. The first outbreak faded but came back that August.

More than 4,500 people died in Philadelphia in one week that autumn, with another 3,000 perishing in Chicago. Many people died within twelve hours of the first symptoms appearing. Some communities passed laws prohibiting spitting on the sidewalk in response to the epidemic as well as imposing strict curfews and shutting down schools and churches.

In September, hundreds of cases suddenly appeared at Camp Logan, just outside Hous-



Flu outbreaks occur each year, usually from September in February. More than two thousand different strains exist, to be the most prevalent.

The 2017-18 flu outbreak of type H3N2 has created a much more severe outbreak than in previous years but still far from the Spanish Flu outbreak. Hospitalizations and deaths are up sharply, but vaccinations are still available and still the best way to prevent infection. Information is widely available from the Centers for Disease Control (cdc.gov), the Texas Department of State Health Services (http://dshs.texas.gov/flu/), and family doctors.

Though the flu is a serious disease, it is treatable and preventable. The majority of patients recover within a few days. Panic is always the true enemy in an epidemic. And with any illness, awareness and quick action mark the beginning of a cure. ###

came as well. There were many volunteer firemen braving the heat, smoke, and flames, risking their lives and health to extinguish this rapid burning







The third question for each candidate was "how do you resolve to maintain county properties with the least impact Abilene, served as moderator on taxes." Each candidate was


given two minutes to respond. The next question, "the County Jail came close to ceasing operation recently and what are your thoughts During the question and on the County Jail." Each of

Lent excludes Ash Wednesday Service on Wednesday, Feb. 14 at 6:00 p.m. The public is warmly invited to share in this service where we recognize our mortality, repent of our sins before our loving God. We recognize life as a precious gift from God and re - turn our lives towards Jesus Christ. We may make resolutions and commit to change our lives over the next forty days so that we might be more like Christ. In an Ash Wednesday service, usually the minister will make the sign of the cross on a person's forehead with ashes. The sign of the cross reminds us of the resurrection of Christ.

In Western Christianity, Ash Wednesday marks the first day, or the start of the season of Lent. Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on

The First United Methodist Ash Wednesday and ends on Sundays because every Sunday is like a little Easter. The season is a preparation for celebrating Easter. Historically, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts and then became a time for penance by all Christians.

> Also, at 12:00 on Ash Wednesday, the church will be having a short service of the Burning of the Palms in the prayer garden, if weather permits. Otherwise the service will be held in the Sanctuary. The dried palms to be burned were used on Palm Sunday last year which celebrated the glorious entry of Jesus into Jerusalem prior to his crucifixion. The ashes from this meaningful service will be used for making the cross on the foreheads during the evening

Cross Plains' 2018 retail sales up 12% from 2017

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2018 are just over twelve percent higher than 2017, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday,

February 7th. Cross Plains' 2018 sales tax payments for the year totaled \$44,633.70, which is 12.61 percent higher than the \$39,633.80 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2017.

The payment to the city for February 2018 was \$24,494.37, which is 19.66 percent ahead of the payment of \$20,468.99 in February 2017.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$911.9 million in local sales tax allocations for February, 6.2 percent more than in February 2017. These allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2017 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

Hegar sent Texas cities \$592.9 million in February 2018, which is higher by 5.1 percent compared to February 2017 and February 2018 was \$26,157.96, Cross Plains collects 2.00% in higher by 6.5 percent year-to-

He reported \$53.7 million in February 2018 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 12.4 percent compared to February 2017 and higher by 13.5 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$203.5 million in February 2018 sales tax allocations, The 2017 payments to the city to reduce property taxes. which is 5.0 percent higher than February 2017 and higher by 6.5 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$61.9 million in February 2018 allocations, which is 16.4 percent higher than February 2017 and higher by 17.9 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$911.9 million in February 2018, which is 6.2 percent higher than February 2017 and higher by 7.6 percent year-to-date.



DRONING ON

Drones have become more popular the past few years, and new uses are arising almost daily. Some might be legal; some might not. And, it's often get out of it.

One new legal use was Texas Parks and Wildlife Department legally the same as helicopters, deer with dogs is illegal, unless (TPWD) adding a drone to game wardens search and rescue operations.

That's a good. Think about it: A lot of search and rescue through rough surf. missions take place during inclement weather. Remember Hurricane Harvey? Game wardens were pressed into duty in southeast Texas before the storm subsided. Fixed-wing aircraft and helicopters were unable to fly during the turbulent

"During those times," game warden pilot Lt. Brandon Rose said, "this craft (drone) could be the difference maker in getting help and saving lives." An unmanned aircraft, just as in combat, can gather intelligence in remote and often dangerous locales without endangering

Wardens are also at high risk in swift water operations. Just a couple of years ago, a warden drowned in a flooded stream while searching for a body. A drone could have possibly done the searching and kept the warden off the water.

Another new use is having a drone take a baited fishhook and line out beyond the waves for a fisherman on the beach, and releasing it. Before drones came along, fishermen either paddled a small boat out to drop the line, or attempted an Olympic-length cast to reach calmer water. Many casts fell short. The drones do it quickly and safely.

A state and a federal warden I contacted both said the practice did not seem to violate state or federal laws.






