### Schools Out -April 16 and May 4

#### A LONG-AWAITED RENDEZVOUS

Aftermy seventh-grade schoolyear, I was privileged to attend a unique boys camp on the Nueces River north of Uvalde, just south of Camp Wood. It was called Camp Nueces. The most unique things about it were that it had a small enrollment and was a working ranch.

Small enrollment meant we could pile in several station wagons and make short side trips. We visited Mexico once and bought gifts for our parents (with their money). I bought my mother perfume and a bottle of something with a bat on the label. We also went to another ranch that had the most beautiful swimming hole I have ever seen. It looked like a Hollywood set. We got to visit Devil's Sink Hole and see real bats. And, it being a ranch, I learned to love fresh beef stew.

On the way to Mexico, we passed a place called "Camp Chalk Bluff". The name came from a sheer limestone bluff caught. It probably weighed extending hundreds of feet up a mountain. I yearned to go there. It was a resort-type camp - not one just for young boys.

To celebrate my birthday this past March, my kids let me pick the place. We usually go where we can fish. I chose Chalk Bluff, now known as Chalk Bluff River Resort.

The Nueces is crystal clear, shallow in many places, but with occasional riffles and deep holes. Eddies just downstream from the riffles, the deep holes, shaded areas along the bluff, and rare grass beds are where you find the fish.

The river is full of big, aggressive sunfish, and I caught plenty during the summers at Camp Nueces. I became a counselor after a couple of years and had time to fish after my duties with the kids were over.

The clear-running Nueces River at Chalk Bluff River Resort is a delightful venue for fishing, kayaking, playing in the water or just sitting in the shade and watching the river flow by at this southwestern Hill Country hideaway. Photo by John Jefferson. One evening after supper, I took

my rod and reel and headed downstream, fishing every likely spot along the way. Mesmerized by the clear, running water, the solitude, and the prospect of catching a nice fish, I guess I lost track of time. I also hadn't realized how far downstream I had trudged.

The sun had set behind the mountain when I made my "first last cast". I was using my favorite lure, a Heddon River Runt Spook Sinker. A violent jerk on the end of the line declared "Fish On!" My heart was beating violently in response. I landed the largest bass that 14-year old had ever

three pounds -- a trophy in that time before Texas had lakes, and was bigger than most river bass, which run small. It seems like just yesterday.

Finally getting to Chalk Bluff and back to the Nueces recently brought back memories of times on the river. My life had changed seeing that country, the river, and my first deer and turkeys. And catching that fish.

Chalk Bluff isn't fancy, but I'll be back. Aaron Riggins (830-486-5629) guides float trips on the Nueces and other Hill Country rivers.

Careful, though, that could change your life. JJ



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

# **Texas educator, philosopher** and diplomat Sidney Mezes

tive time for education in Texas. Sidney Mezes, a one-time president of the University of Texas, rose to the forefront to serve as such a leader as well as a diplomat and a thinker. In the process, the son of a pioneer gold prospector in California became one of the most respected philosophers in the nation and a leader in Texas education.

in September 1863 in Belmont. California, then a tiny village nestled between San Francisco and San Jose in the years after the Gold Rush. His parents were City College of New York. He returned to California; and having arrived from Spain and He left the university on good when his health permitted, he his mother from Italy. His father, Simon M. Mezes, was an attorney who arrived with the early wave of gold prospectors and other fortune-seekers and co-founded what is now Redwood City. Mezes graduated from what was then the University of California in 1884 (now the University of California at Berkeley) with a degree in engineering. After his father's death that year, Mezes took a different path and began studying philosophy. He enrolled at Harvard University in 1889, receiving a second bachelors degree in 1890 and a masters degree in philosophy in 1891. While he was completing his doctorate, he spent the 1892-93 school year teaching philosophy at Bryn Mawr College in Pennsylvania. After finishing his Ph.D. in 1893, he spent a year teaching at the University of Chicago. He was offered an adjunct teaching position at the University of Texas in 1894. In 1898, he wrote about ideas and perceptions of God with The Conception of God: He took on questions of spirituality and the existence of God. At the same time, he touched on ideas of time, memory, and reality. Mezes argued that God lives in an eternal state of the present, with all things happening in one everlasting moment and that time as mortal men understand it, is meaningless to God. "Time is no reality; things seem past and future, and, in a sense, non-existent to us, but in fact are just as genuinely real as the present is," Mezes wrote. "Every reality is eternally real, pastness and futurity are merely illusions." He became a full-time professor in 1898. In 1901, he wrote an influential work on ethics, titled Ethics, Descriptive and Explanatory. He earned a promotion to dean in 1902, serving as a philosophy professor simultaneously

The university remembered his many contributions and dedicated a new building in his memory in 1953. Mezes Hall today is a multi-use classroom building used by various departments and organizations on campus, including the Texas Politics Project, the Spanish Department, the Government Department, and the European Studies Department.

# **Game Warden Field Notes**

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

#### A Game Show Host

A Zavala County game warden recently completed a year-long investigation involving a ranch manager who was selling hunts without the consent of the landowner. The ranch manager even brought in a camera crew from a wellknown outdoors television show to video the hunts. The unauthorized activities resulted in the illegal harvest of 11 whitetailed bucks off the property. The ranch manager was indicted on 11 state jail felony counts of hunting without landowner consent, along with multiple other charges.

### Alexa, Where Does the Game Warden Live?

An Ellis County game warden responded to a call from a ranch manager who had witnessed two subjects shooting out into his pasture from the county road. The ranch manager and another farmer chased the subject's vehicle down the highway, while the warden headed to their location from the opposite direction. The ranch manager advised the vehicle was turning into a driveway, which just happened to be the warden's private property. The warden arrived at his residence shortly and confronted the pair - a father and his 17-year-old son from Ft. Worth. The dad claimed they were just driving around, showing his son "how to load a gun, shoot in a safe direction . . . and you know, gun safety stuff." After the warden issued a citation for discharging a firearm from a public roadway, and provided a brief primer on firearms safety, the father asked, "Did I really pull into your driveway?" The warden nodded and smiled. "That was kinda convenient," replied the man.

Did You Lose Something?

An Ellis County game warden received a call from a landowner who had evidence of someone hunting on his property without consent. The landowner showed the warden an image from his game camera of a hog that was shot under a feeder. The image only captured the subject's backside. The warden did find a bloody knife that was left at the scene. During his investigation, the warden learned that several individuals had permission to hunt on a neighboring property, and photos of a couple of dead hogs had been posted to one of their social media accounts. The warden paid a visit to the residence of one of the teens who posted the images and spoke to his father, who confirmed his 17-yearold son and some friends had shot two pigs the previous weekend. The warden asked him if they cleaned the hogs at the house or on the property they hunted. The man replied it was out at the property, and unfortunately, his son said he lost his knife in the process. The warden told the father the reason for his visit, asked if this looked familiar, and showed

#### the boys gave a full confession. The cases are pending. Anti-Social Media Behavior Game wardens in Limestone and Leon counties recently completed a several month long investigation into an animal cruelty case. The suspect had used fireworks to torture a live, previously injured raccoon and posted the act on social media. The suspect was recently indicted by a Limestone County Grand Jury and warrants for his arrest were obtained. The suspect was arrested and placed in the Limestone County jail. The

Unintended Consequences On March 22, a Matagorda County game warden received a complaint about several sick and/or dead eagles and

buzzards on a local ranch. Upon arriving at the location, he observed a dead feral hog that the birds had obviously been eating. Three dead bald eagles and a few buzzards were located in the immediate area. Several more buzzards and a caracara that were too sick to fly were also observed. Suspecting the possibility that the pig may have been poisoned, and because of the bird species involved, the warden contacted a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service special agent and brought him in on the investigation. They made contact with a neighboring farmer, who admitted to soaking corn in a poison and putting it out to get rid of the feral hogs in the area. The federally-protected birds had ingested the poison. The violations were turned over to USFW for prosecution.

#### Snakes Alive!

At about 1 a.m. on March 25, game wardens were on patrol when they encountered a pickup truck traveling through a remote area of Zapata County. After conducting a traffic stop on the vehicle, it was found that the driver, a person with an extensive history of game and fish violations, was hunting rattlesnakes from the roadway. Two citations were issued, and two rattlesnakes were seized. After traveling to the violator's residence to retrieve other illegally harvested snakes, it was found the violator had picked up another rattlesnake on the roadway immediately after receiving citations and being released from the first contact that night. Additional citations were issued for hunting from the public roadway and 11 more rattlesnakes were seized from the residence. The cases are pending.

#### Tag Team

In early March, a Smith County game warden received a call from a Virginia game warden concerning some Texas deer confiscated from a

taxidermist in Virginia who was operating without a license. There were three sets of antlers, and two of the tags came back to Smith County. The third buck, a 10 point, had a name but no tag. The warden was able to obtain an identity and interviewed the man whose name was attached to the 10 point buck, and determined the deer was taken illegally. The subject was coyote hunting and saw a deer he couldn't pass up. The subject had no hunting license. The warden then interviewed a second subject, who had a blank tag on one of the other bucks seized. His deer was killed legally but he failed to fill out his tag, harvest log, and did not have the required hunter education certification. Cases and warnings were filed for no hunting license, untagged deer, improperly tagged deer, harvest log and hunter's education violations. Civil restitution is pending.

#### Couldn't Escape the Net

A Freestone County game warden had just checked and released a boat of Dallas area fishermen who were cast netting for tilapia and running jug lines on Lake Fairfield. Shortly after releasing the group, she discovered an illegal gill net near where she first made contact with the group. After hauling in the 500-foot net, the warden made her way back to the Dallas anglers to ask about the gill net. As she re-approached, the group quickly pulled up their jug lines and sped off toward the boat dock. The warden called a state park police officer for backup at the boat ramp, and after questioning, the suspects confessed to having placed the net out earlier in the day. Citations were issued for the illegal net and for taking game fish by illegal means/methods. Numerous largemouth bass and tilapia caught in the net were released back into the

## Texas receives \$5 billion grant from HUD for disaster recovery

AUSTIN- Governor Greg Abbott announced that Texas has been awarded \$5,035,260,000 from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for disasterrecovery from Hurricane Harvey and previous flood events. The grant funding isprovided through HUD's Community Development Block Grant - Disaster for the rebuilding of housing, businesses and infrastructure. This allocation comes as a result of the disaster supplemental recentlypassed by Congress, and is in addition to the \$5 billion in CDBG funding previously awarded to Texas by HUD late last year.

"The additional Community Development Block Grant funds announced today will inject billions of dollarsthat are desperately needed to help restore our communities." said GovernorAbbott. "As the recovery process from Hurricane Harvey continues, the State of Texas is continuing to work as quickly as possible to ensure affected regionshave the resources they need to fully recover. I thank Secretary Carson, aswell as our federal partners, for their ongoing commitment and supportthroughout this process, and I look forward to continuing our work together tohelp communities rebuild.

"It's clear that a numberof communities are still struggling to recover from a variety of storms thatoccurred in the past three years," said HUD Secretary Ben Carson. Work Zone fatalities on the rise with majority being motorist As part of National Work Zone Awareness Week, TxDOT urges drivers to stay alert, move over or slow down

In recognition of National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 9-13, the Texas Department of Transportation reminds drivers that every day requires caution when driving through work zones. In 2017, work zone fatalities in Texas increased 9 percent over the previous year, resulting in 199 deaths and 813 serious injuries. With 4 percent of those fatalities being road crew workers, the remaining 96 percent was comprised of motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists.

"We always urge drivers to exercise great caution and obey traffic laws, especially in work zones," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "Doing so helps ensure everyone - motorists and work crews gets home safely to their loved ones. As the state's population continues to boom, the price of progress can mean more than 2,500 active TxDOT work zones at any given time. In 2017, there were 27,148 work zone crashes in Texas, an increase of 5 percent over 2016. The leading causes of statewide work zone crashes speeding and driver inattention are entirely preventable. Fines in work zones double when workers are present and can

cost up to \$2,000. "Roadside crews often work only a few feet from fast-moving traffic," Bass said. "Driver vigilance is paramount to ensuring the safety of everyone in the work zone. We urge anyone driving through a work zone to minimize distractions, give their full attention to the road and be prepared to slow down or stop on short notice." As part of its ongoing Work Zone Awareness campaign, TxDOT also reminds drivers of the Move Over/Slow Down law, which requires drivers to move over or slow down when approaching TxDOT crews, law enforcement, emergency vehicles or tow trucks stopped

Sheriff's Corner 4 dead following I-20 head-on collision Monday morning



Monday morning at 8:22 a.m. Callahan County Sheriff's Dispatch received numerous 911 calls reporting a major wreck at Interstate 20 mile marker 322 exit. A pickup occupied by four males traveling west bound crossed over into east bound traffic colliding head-on into a Love's fuel tanker truck traveling east bound and occupied by one male.

Callahan County Sheriff's Department, Department of Public Safety Troopers, Texas Department of Transportation, and Putnam and Baird Volunteer Fire Departments were immediately dispatched to the scene to direct and slow down traffic to avoid other crashes. There was a heavy mist falling at the time of the accident which in my opinion could have been a contributing factor.

Justice of Peace Steve Odom was dispatched to the scene to pronounced the 4 occupants of the pickup deceased. The driver and only occupant of the Love's tanker truck was not seriously injured. Texas Department of Public Safety troopers did a thorough investigation of the accident. A heavy duty wrecker arrived on the scene and by 1:36 p.m. the road was cleared of wreckage and the highway was fully open.







#### **Ingredients:**

\* 4 eggs

- \* 1 1/4 cups sugar, divided
- \* 4 cups whole milk
- \* 1/2 teaspoon salt
- \* 2 cans (14 ounces each) sweetened condensed milk
- \* 1 3/4 pounds fresh peaches, peeled and sliced



### Directions

\* In a large heavy saucepan, whisk eggs, 1 cup sugar and salt until blended; stir in milk. Cook over low heat until mixture is just thick enough to coat a spoon and a thermometer reads at least 160 degrees, stirring constantly. Do not allow to boil. Remove from heat immediately.

\* Quickly transfer to bowl; place bowl in a pan of ice water. Stir gently and occasionally for two minutes. Stir in sweetened condensed milk. Press plastic warp onto surface of custard. Refrigerate several hours or overnight.

\* When ready to freeze, in a small bowl, mash peaches with remaining sugar; let stand 30 minutes. Fill cylinder of ice cream freezer two-thirds full with custard, stirring in some of the peaches; freeze according to manufacturers' directions. Refrigerate remaining mixture until ready to freeze.

\* Transfer ice cream to freezer containers, allowing headspace for expansion. Freeze 2-4 hours or until firm. Repeat with remaining ice cream mixture and peaches.

Yield: 3 3/4 quarts; 30 servings.
