



Summer work program aims to connect 2,000 Texas students with jobs

AUSTIN -- The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) today announced the kickoff of its 2018 Summer Earn Learn program that provides students with disabilities, aged 16-22, with work readiness training and paid work experience. The program is a partnership between TWC, Texas Workforce Solutions Offices and Texas Workforce Solutions-Vocational Rehabilitation Services (TWS-VRS).

Last year, more than 1,500 students participated in Summer Earn and Learn and worked in positions as design graphics assistants, customer service representatives, peer counselors and others. Small and large businesses who participated in the program include Alamo College in San Antonio, the Clements Boys & Girls Club in Killeen and CVS, HEB, and Verizon locations throughout the state.

"The Summer Earn and Learn program provides valuable opportunities for Texas students with disabilities to learn about the exciting careers available to them in the Texas workforce," said TWC Chairman Andres Alcantar. "We encourage students and parents to contact their local Workforce Solutions office to learn more about these paid internship positions available this summer."

LocalWorkforceDevelopment Boards, who oversee the Workforce Solutions Offices, will collaborate with local TWS-VRS staff to promote the program and identify students and businesses who are interested in participating. Students will receive work readiness training and connect with a local employer, where they will have the opportunity to do hands-on work for five weeks or more. The students will learn about the employer's industry and develop skills and work experience that will prepare them for successful transition to postsecondary education and employment.

"Employers who sign on to Summer Earn and Learn are committed to the professional development of workers in their industries and developing potentially longterm employees," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Ruth R. Hughs. "The program provides employers with direct access to their local workforce, which consists of students who are eager to learn and work."

"Through Summer Earn and Learn, our youth are viewing firsthand the day-today responsibilities associated with careers they might chose for their future," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Julian Alvarez. National Park Service Archaeologists Jeffrey Shanks, Heather Young, and Thadra Stanton addressed 23 people during the "meet and greet" session last Monday evening at Jean's.

The three scientists are in town to excavate an old cellar on the grounds of the Robert E. Howard Museum. For Shanks, who has been an archaeologist for two decades, the opportunity to lead his team in this dig comes with an added bonus. He is also a popular culture scholar who specializes in pulp writers like Robert E. Howard, so this makes him uniquely qualified to head up this project.

The team explained in detail how the artifacts will be located using a Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR). To demonstrate, Stanton walked among the audience, showing an example image that she had on her phone. Once found, the artifacts would be carefully cleaned and catalogued. Heather Young, an Archaeological and Museum Technician with a BA in Anthropology, will use this opportunity to help prepare for graduate studies in the fall.

There were several questions and much speculation about what might be uncovered. Stanton, who will coordinate the volunteers. is also an expert on late nineteenth and early twentieth century

domestic artifacts-exactly what the team hopes to find at the Howard House.

According to Shanks, the major days for activities will be Wednesday through Saturday, and anyone is welcome to watch. If you want to volunteer for the dig, he asked that you please bring your own gloves.

Sales Tax Holiday for Emergency Supplies, April 28th-30th

With the potential for severe weather approaching this spring, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds Texans they can purchase certain items tax-free during the state's sales tax holiday for emergency preparation supplies, from April 28th to April 30th.

"The severe weather we had last year - particularly Hurricane Harvey - was a stark reminder that Texans should be prepared for emergencies at all times," Hegar said. "This tax holiday allows people to save money while ensuring they have the supplies they need before an emergency situation occurs.

There's no limit on the number of qualifying items you can purchase. These include:

• batteries, fuel containers and flashlights priced at less than \$75;

hurricane shutters and

emergency ladders priced at less than \$300; and

• portable generators priced at less than \$3,000.

Purchases that do not qualify include:

 batteries for automobiles, boats and other motorized vehicles:

 camping stoves and camping supplies;

• chainsaws:

 plywood; extension ladders and

stepladders; and tents.

Alistofemergencypreparation supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the Comptroller's website.

The Comptroller's office estimates shoppers will save more than \$1.5 million in state and local sales taxes during the tax holiday, which was approved by lawmakers during the 2015 Texas Legislature.

Dr. Gideon Lincecum used Native American herbal cures

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at age 14 in a one-room schoolhouse, Though he admitted some embarrassment by sitting in a group that included sevenyear-olds who could read and write perfectly, he nevertheless mastered his literacy skills within the five-month term.

With a curious mind eager to absorb knowledge, he made the world his classroom and left home at 15. He soon found work as an assistant to a merchant where he also claimed to meet the famed early American writer Parson Mason Weems as he helped sell some of the writer's books.

Eventually, Lincecum married, and the couple had 13 children together. He arrived with his family in what is now Lowndes County, Mississippi, in 1821. He co-founded the city of Columbus, served as the first postmaster, and co-founded the first free public school in Mississippi, the Franklin School. Though he never had the opportunity himself, he made sure that others would.

After a prolonged illness in the 1820s, he began reading medical textbooks with a nearby doctor, an apprenticeship of sorts. He soon began practicing on his own as it was possible to become a doctor without attending medical school at that time. Medicine was still in a very primitive stage, and Lincecum developed a great frustration with the medicines often prescribed at that time, which included different acids, arsenic, and strychnine. He lived with the Choctaws for a time, learning their culture and history while studying the herbal cures their own healers had used for generations. He soon mastered the many medical treatments and folk remedies that the Chickasaws, Choctaws, and Creeks used for a variety of ailments which further spurred his interest in local plant life. As the nineteenth century progressed, there was an increasing







If bitten by any snake, get to a doctor quickly (but calmly), taking either the dead snake or a picture of it for identification. I don't harass non-poisonous snakes, but if bitten by one, I'd take identifying evidence for

Dr. Emi will be discussing ways to control rust and disease in your wheat. Many of the wheat farmers in Callahan County has had some issues with diseases or rust in field causing yield loss in the past. From there we will go to the Lions Club in Eula. Bill Thompson will discuss grain storage and old cotton base acres to seed cotton and/ or other covered commodities. Dr. Mark Welch will discuss the market situation and the commodity outlook for 2018. We will conclude with TDA Laws and Regulation. The program will be offering 3 CEU. One point is keeping brush/trees off your tank dams. Roots can cause fracture or channels for water to leak out of our ponds. Another point is to have Red Ear Bream (type of sunfish) in your pond. All ponds have snails which can cause parasite or grubs on the fish which could cause loss of fish in your pond or unhealthy fish. Red Ear Bream only eat snails which keep parasites down on your fish. At the end of the program, we did an on-site demonstration of electrofishing. This allow us to see what was in the pond and

the overall health of the pond. PRIVATE PESTICIDE **APPLICATOR TRAINING** APRIL 19TH IN BROWNWOOD

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Brown, Mills, and San Saba Counties are partnering together to conduct a Private Pesticide Applicator Training April 19th in Brownwood, Texas. The training will be at the Brown County Extension Office, 605 Fisk Avenue. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. The training will be from 9-noon. The training is specifically for those seeking a Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator license and is not a continuing education unit training.

The license is required to buy and apply restricted-use/ state limited use herbicides and pesticides. The Texas Department of Agriculture requires this training prior to being tested for a private applicator pesticide license, also issued through the agency. Individual registration is \$50, due upon arrival. The training is limited to the first 20 preregistered. NEW MEDICINE

AVAILABLE FOR CATTLE Merck Animal Health today introduced Banamine Transdermal (flunixin transdermal solution) - the first and only US Food & Drug Administration (FDA) wheat fields. SPRAY SCHEDULE FOR PECAN

NUT CASEBEARER Time is approaching to start

scouting for one of the most important nut-infesting insects of pecans. That is the pecan nut casebearer. The adult casebearer is a gray almost black moth about 1/3-inch long. The moths are active at night, when they lay eggs on pecan nuts. From research and working with producers we are confident that an egg lay will occur 7-10 days after. the first catch of the moths using pheromone traps. Eggs are oval, flat and tiny, just large enough to be seen with the unaided eye. Nut clusters with eggs can be tagged with a piece of ribbon and checked each day to determine an exact hatch date

Insecticides need to be applied 1-2 days after first egg is hatched. Proper scouting is suggested to determine the best time for insecticide applications. Malathion 50 % EC at 2 tablespoons per gallon or several of the BT products are labeled for use by homeowners for casebearer control. Before purchasing and applying any insecticide, always read the label to determine of the product is labeled for use on the target plant site. A local producer here in Callahan County has started scouting for the adult. He has not yet caught an adult moth in pheromone traps. It is still early but as it starts to warm up in next couple of weeks, I believe we should see signs of the moth. Last year, spraying for the pecan nut casebearer was toward the end of April. So be aware and be ready, it is just around the corner if you have

the past few decades. While this is bad news for the quail, and quail enthusiasts, it is part of a larger picture. Quail are the "canary in the coal mine" for a number of other species of Texas wildlife. Species as different as the Texas horned lizard, Eastern Meadowlark, and Northern Shrike have seen very similar population declines during the same period.

While a host of factors are probably involved, the fundamental reason for quail population decline is loss of habitat. Human development leads to habitat fragmentation, and isolated habitat fragments result in small, isolated quail populations. These small, isolated populations are unable to withstand bad times, and have a greater risk of becoming locally extinct.

Stabilizing quail populations, or reversing the decline, will take a coordinated, longterm effort to conserve Texas grasslands. The public must be informed about the plight of quail in Texas; private and public landowners must be provided with incentives and information to better manage their properties; and we need to band together in cooperatives and partnerships to manage areas of significant size. Management information is available at the AgriLife Bookstore as well as our Landowner Resources page.

Thanks to the Reversing the Quail Decline Initiative (RQDI), new research is being conducted to help determine why quail population in Texas are declining and what can be done about it. RQDI is a collaboration between Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department seeks to understand, address, and reverse the critical quail decline in Texas. Since its inception in September 2013, RQDI has funded 13 projects at several universities in Texas. In addition to research, this effort includes support of programs like Quail Masters.

Quail Appreciation Days and youth camps like Bobwhite Brigades.

Additionally, the Texas Quail Index (TQI), an effort piloted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service. TQI is designed to educate land managers, hunters and the general public about the population dynamics, habitat requirements and other factors affecting bodwnites in Texas. Currently, there are 35 counties and 7 Wildlife Management Areas involved in the project. TQI unites local County Extension Agents (CEA) with land managers and interested community members who work together to implement a variety of quail assessment techniques at a local ranch. Techniques include quail abundance, predator abundance and habitat quality. This type of one-on-one dialogue between local CEAs and community members offers hands-on experience that they can then



Texas is home to four species of quail, a claim that only three other states can make (Arizona, California, and New Mexico are the others). The Northern Bobwhite Quail is found in all but the western third of the state, and the scaled or "blue" quail is found in the western half. The Montezuma and Gambel's quail are much less common and are found in only a few areas due to their specific habitat needs.

The bobwhite quail (Colinus virginianus) is one of the most easily recognized wildlife species in Texas. The familiar "poor-bob-white" whistle of the male bobwhite can be heard during the spring and summer over most of the state. However, few Texans realize the tremendous impact this species has on our state. Recent data confirm that there are more than 175,000 quail hunters and an additional 400,000 people participating in watching, feeding, or photographing quail in Texas each year.



He spent most of the day with our Jail Administrator Julie Lemon going over all files, reports, equipment and all documentation concerning every aspect of the jail operations. At the end of the day he gave our 121 year old jail a passing grade.

The jail is operating as usual so Chief Deputy Rick Jowers, as shown in the picture above with enough meth and marijuana for a state jail felony charge of possession and all other Callahan County law enforcement officers can keep drug users and distributors incarcerated and out of circulation.

Monday morning, while writing this news report there was a total of 8 inmates in the Callahan County Jail, 2 in Taylor County, 9 in Shackelford County, 4 in Nolan County, and 1 on Jones County for a total of 24 inmates incarcerated by Callahan County Law Enforcement.

Four Lubbock men ranging in 2002 Chevrolet pickup because ages from 17-24 years old, were killed in a two vehicle accident originally reported by the Department of Public Safety on Monday, April 9th on Interstate 20, 2.3 miles east of Putnam in Callahan County.

the three passengers and driver were all ejected from the pickup truck.

The four pronounced dead at the scene were Johnathan Patrick Pena, 18, of Lubbock. Pena was the only occupant believed to be wearing a seatbelt. Also killed were Manual Martinez, 24, of Lubbock, Ruben Licon, 17, of Lubbock, and Treqweishium Keyondrick Williams, 19, of Lubbock.

All four bodies were taken to Abilene Professional Services. The driver of the Love's semitractor trailer was not injured.
