FIGHTING FILIPINOS. GLOBE CLEANING.

Duke of York in Seoul.
Gen. Brabant returned. Delatigny.
The Prussian house of lords will reconvene May 8.
Many prominent Venezuelans are leaving that country.
Honolulu advices of April 2 say the Japanese vessels reported 230 natives assembled three miles from the town and Gen. Bell sent three detachments of the forty fifth regiment with two machine guns to surround the Filipinos, the majority of whom were armed with bolos and were carabao hide helmets, coats and shields. The Filipinos were quick to fight leaving the field strewn with arms. Their rifles were unable to shoot straight and the bolos never got near enough to the Americans to require execution. Therefore none of the Americans were wounded.
Lieut. Balch, with twenty cavalrymen from the second regiment, encountered fifty bolomen in a river and shot every one of them, the bodies floating away. One soldier had his hand cut off with a bolo.
Gen. Bell's two regiments are hard worked in clearing the country. They meet with many squads of bolomen and a total of 152. A cavalry squadron of the eleventh cavalry is about leaving Manila on board the transport Lennox to reinforce them. The Philippine news from the province in a state of terror and a weakling force of natives who trade with the Americans, burning many villages, in the populous town of San Fernando.
Gen. Bell has issued a proclamation declaring that he will retaliate relentlessly unless this hostile warfare ceases and that he will burn every village which harbors guerrillas.
In a fight at Sorogan, Alabay province, on April 16, three companies of the United States Cavalry, under Gen. commanding, routed a large force of the Filipinos, killing 100 and capturing 500.

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IN THE CANADIAN CITY OF HULL.

Causing a Property Loss Probably Exceeding a Half Million Dollars—Narrow Escape of Ottawa.

Ottawa, Ont., April 27.—Five square miles of territory burned over, more than 200 dwellings, factories, mills, schools and other buildings destroyed, installing a loss estimated to reach \$1,000,000 and between 12,000 and 15,000 men, women and children homeless, is a summing up of the havoc wrought by the fire which raged at Hull and in Ottawa, commencing at 11 o'clock Thursday morning.
Most of the lumber piles in Ottawa and Hull have disappeared and there are now heaps of charred wood and shavings. Half a dozen churches and schools, a number of mills, the Hull waterworks, the Hull concert hall and all, the postoffice, the convent—almost every business place and about 1000 dwellings and shops in Hull have been destroyed. Indeed, practically nothing of Hull is left but a church and a few houses beyond it.
The disaster originated through a dirty chimney, and the high wind caused the flames to spread rapidly in the direction of the lumber piles and the houses of Ottawa and Hull. The fire was started by a small fire in a boiler house at Hull, the fire had got a good hold of main street, and the entire street, with dozens of cross streets, was burned. About this time the fire made a jump to Hull, and it was estimated that the fire had covered a large area of the city. It was in flames and the fifty mile an hour gale which was blowing drove a high column of black smoke and white steam up to the Eddy paper mill and the other buildings of the city.
The fire at this time also swept across the Ottawa river and caught and held in the rear of the Mackay Milling company on Victoria island, and in five minutes the entire island, including the Mackay and Chandler islands, one of the power houses of the Ottawa Electric company, the Victoria foundry and half the buildings on the two islands were in flames. In the city it is estimated that besides the mills, factories, etc., burned, 1000 residences were destroyed. The total loss is estimated at \$1,000,000 and insurance at \$1,500,000.
The casualties so far reported are: Capt. Cook, an old comrade who was killed in his death in his house at Hull. His name was found on the Canadian Pacific railroad track, and James Evans and James McFarland, reported fatally injured by falling timber. The government supplied blankets and did all in its power for the comfort of the sufferers.
On the Ottawa side of the river the loss is great. There are in ashes the Bronson & Weston Lumber company's mills, the K-Y Milling company, the Ottawa Electric railway power house, the Mackay and Chandler mills. The fire also swept over the Ottawa river bank near Christ church and St. John's-Episcopal church on Hochberg street, which was the only thing which saved the whole city of Ottawa from being a prey to the flames.

By an act of the special session of the Legislature just adjourned, the State will on May 23, 1900, put upon the market for sale over 4,000,000 acres of school land at \$1 per acre for grazing and \$1.50 per acre for agricultural land, with only one-fourth of the purchase money cash, the balance on 40 years' time at 3 per cent on the unpaid interest. One person can buy from 80 acres up to four sections. Upon receipt of 50 cents will mail a copy of the new law, a map of the State and a book giving the counties in which those lands are located, including those recovered from the railroads, and all the laws and forms used in the sale, purchase and lease of all the State school lands, with full instructions how to buy or lease any part of same.
