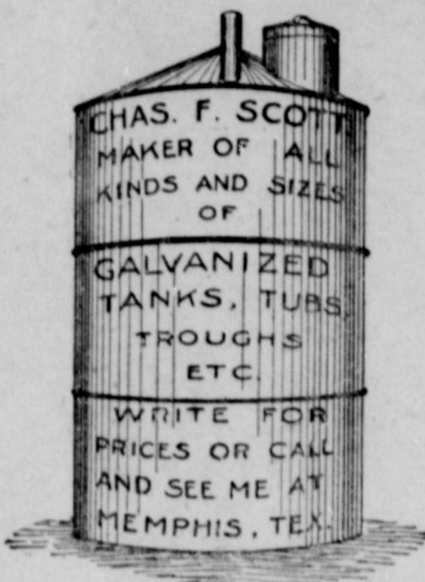

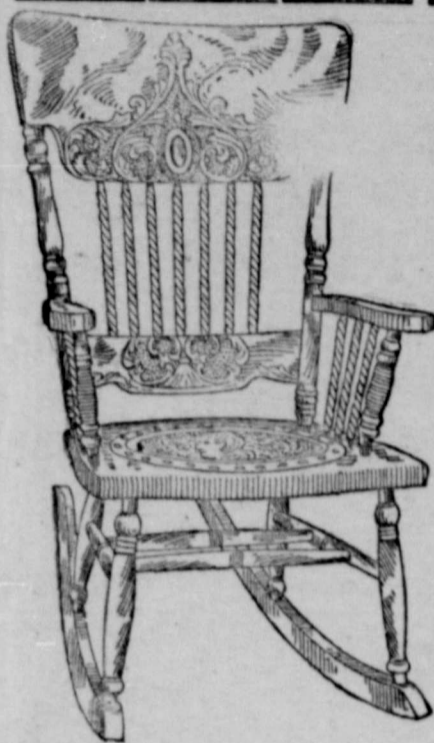

NO ONE CROP COUNTRY.

The "beautiful Southland" has been all work up over the slump in cotton, presumably caused by an increased acreage of that commodity, until the entire territory south of Mason and Dixon's line is in a pandemonium. In all probability, in some of the numerous bills now in contemplation before the state legislature, there will be a petition to limit the acreage. Cotton is being burned, and rain—not of the sugar variety—is being raised in great abundance. Meetings are being held throughout the cotton regions of the state and a great effort is being made to reduce the cotton acreage at least twenty-five per cent. From the hub-bub that is raised one would think that cotton was the only product of southern soil. There are other products equally as remunerative in value, just as sure, and that will not the entire membership of the family to cultivate and not keep the children out of school the greater part of the year. Kaffir corn and milo maize are products of Panhandle soil which have never been an entire failure. Land is cheap, and the climate is delightful and invigorating. Why don't some of those people who are eking out a mere existence raising cotton come west and engage in the production of a merchantable crop. If cotton has become unprofitable? We have heretofore through the columns of this paper spoken encouraging words to the cotton farmer and endeavored to show how cotton could be profitably raised in the Panhandle, and we do not intend to make a contradictory statement now. But conditions have changed and though we still hold that Panhandle soil is well adapted to the production of cotton, we do not think it profitable to raise cotton for fuel, although it may be nearly as cheap as the coal we have to buy; but thanks, we'll still hover around our stove filled with so called Canyon City coal, which, to be sure, doesn't burn so readily or so quickly;

but we would rather be a little chilly all the time than to be too hot for an instant and then freeze to death.

What we want to emphasize is that we don't have to raise cotton here. This is a place of varied industries. When we see one thing isn't paying, we can turn to another. Independent fortunes have been made here and the evidences of them are before us daily, there was a day when the most profitable occupation of this country was to obtain buffalo hides, which industry was often times varied with a contest between the hunter and the Red man as to which should become the possessor of the other's scalp. The days of the buffalo, the Indian, and indefinite range boundry are gone. The generous cowboy at whose belt hung the inevitable six shooter and from whose costly boot heels glittered the plated rowels now wears broad shoes, guides the "fast walker" and makes the soil that once resounded to the tread of immense herds, yielded up the richness of its silent bosom. Notwithstanding all these changes that have taken place almost within the existence of a single generation and wholly within the remembrance of many of our citizens, we have an increased population in the Panhandle and know of no other region within the boundaries of our glorious Union that will extend such a glad, hospitable hand or that will afford better opportunities, remunerative to the energetic man who is not afraid to work. We realize that the cattle industry is being ushered into the background, at least, in the manner in which it has been conducted, though we confess we look with no little reluctance on the receding remembrance of those generous, almost to a fault, class of people,

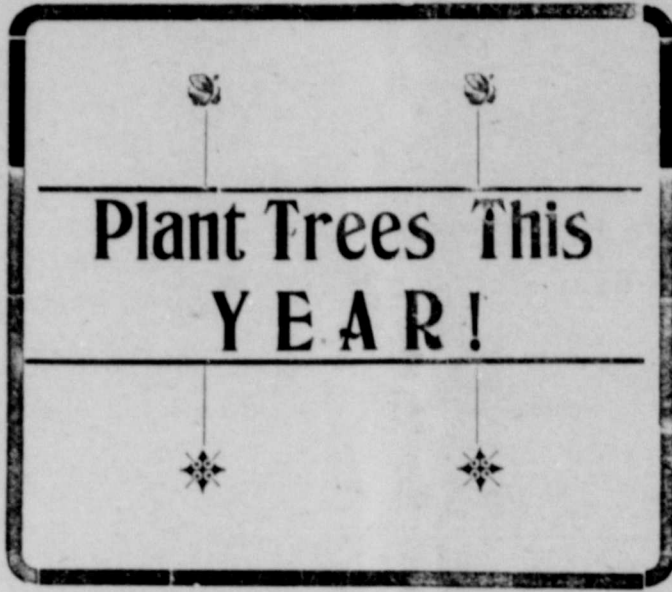
