

"For years, twenty or thirty, there has been a steady drift of people from the country to the cities, until today, the cities and towns are crowded with families, the heads of which make the living, and a bare one at that, the year round, and the wife and mother, in many instances, and the children, as soon as they are able to earn a salary, are forced to join the ranks of the bread winners to make both ends meet and keep up the expenses of the family.

"For years the country population, or many of them, bave viewed the lot of their city broth. ers, with envy. They seemed to take life easy, and enjoy all the conveniences of life, and as soon as the children have grown up, they have been educated in the towns and cities where they have eventually found employment, while the family ultimately drifts to town, where they invest their earnings on the farm, in some class of business, and in nine cases out of ten, lose it, making a failure of a business they are not familiar with, and the rest of the days of the old people are either cared for by the children, or they live on odd jobs, from hand




