Five missionaries of the Foreign, Home, and State Conventions will be speaking at the First Baptist Church; Trinity Baptist Church, and Progress Baptist Church.

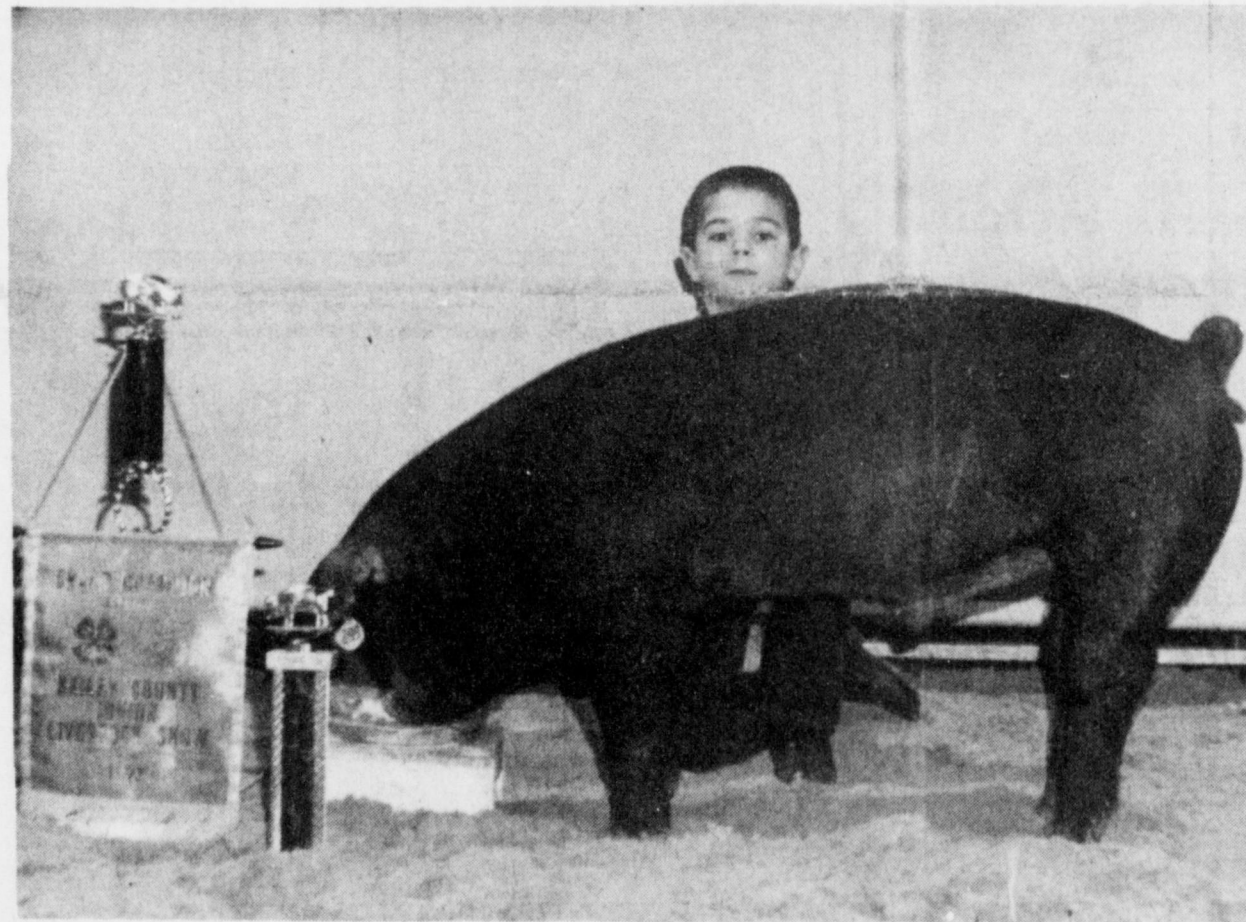

City Dads Adopt One-Half Cent Sales Tax Increase

The Muleshoe City Council passed a resolution declaring adoption of a Sales and Use Tax within the city of Muleshoe for the promotion and development of new and expanded business enterprises at

the rate of one-half of one percent, during Tuesday morning's City Council meeting.

A special election was held Saturday, January 16 on the proposition to adopt a sales and use tax within the City of Muleshoe.

It was reported that there were a total of 403 valid and legal votes cast, with 226 being cast for the proposition and 177 against.

The council men canvased the votes and the sales tax referendum was passed. The effective date, for the tax to show up on the cash register, will be announced at a later date.

Mayor Robert Montgomery called the regular council meeting to order and the minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read.

Hubert Kidd and Hugh Young, from Five Area Telephone, met with the council. Kidd stated that they were not at the meeting to ask anything of the council members only to re-establish good will.

Kidd expressed Five Area's desire to work with the council as well as other unities around Muleshoe for the betterment of the community.

He stated that Five Area Telephone serves 1500 customers and employs 22 people. "We purchase everything we can in

Muleshoe," Kidd said.

A discussion was held on Solid Waste Disposal options. Montgomery told of a meeting he attended in Lubbock Wednesday.

Dave Marr, City Manager, spoke on Landfill Operations and gave an update on Landfills. He also passed out information for the council men to review.

Montgomery reported that he had made a proposal to SPAG, concerning paving of some city streets.

Muleshoe voters approved a one half-cent sales tax Saturday, with the money going to economic development.

It was a very light turnout at the polls, with a total of 403 of the approximate 2275 registered voters in the city of Muleshoe casting their vote.

Jay Messenger, vice chairman of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation, said that the money generated by the tax will be used to create jobs in the area, emphasizing Bailey County's agriculture industry and promote growth in agriculture related products.

Residents of Muleshoe should not expect immediate results. It will take time for enough funds to be generated to create more jobs.

The General Educational Development (GED) test will be given in Muleshoe on Friday, January 22, and Saturday, January 23, at Muleshoe High School.

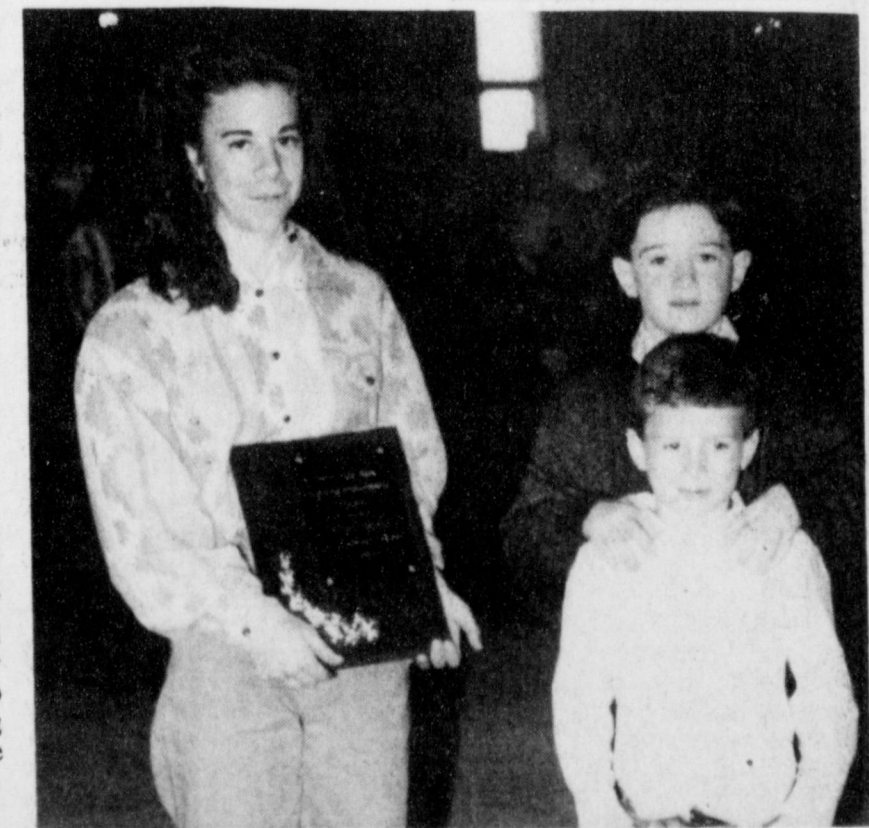
Individuals interested in testing for a certificate of high school equivalency will need to be present at both sessions to take the required five (5) tests.

3. Must be officially withdrawn from school and must not have received a high school diploma from an accredited high school in the United States.

Testing will begin at 5:30 p.m. on Friday and continue at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday.

Firefighters will be hosted by veteran television and motion picture actor, Robert Langsing and is produced by Americom International Entertainment, Inc.

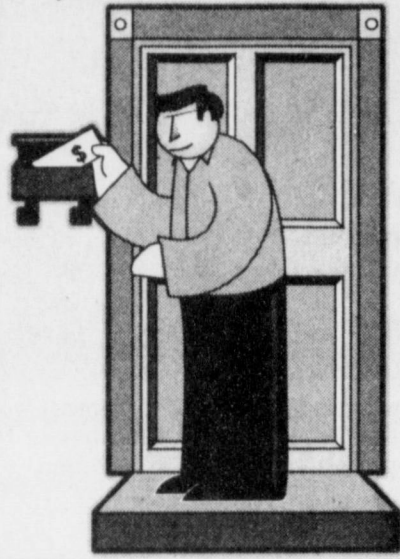

**Mail Fraud Alert-
The 2 Cent Scam**

The Postal Inspection is warning consumers today not to fall prey to a nationwide mail order scam that is encouraging the underpayment of first-class postage. Promoters of the mail order scam are selling information package at a cost ranging from \$5 to \$100 that describes how to mail first-class letters for 2 cents, rather than the current rate of 29 cents. The scheme is designed to bilk the postal customer out of their money using inaccurate and out-of-date information, says Inspector in Charge D.C. Strader.

The information packages cite Title 39, United States Code, Section 4253, as a legal basis for the 2 cent first class rate. Inspector Strader advises that this section was eliminated in August 1970 under the postal Reorganization Act. The current first-class rate is 29 cents for the first ounce or fraction of an ounce.

Unfortunately, some letters bearing only a 2 cent stamp have been delivered without collection of the deficient postage, and that has given credence to the claims made by the promoters of this fraudulent

scheme. This is because most mail is processed through automated equipment, and not because it is legal to mail at the 2 cent rate. Postal Inspectors investigating this scheme have failed administrative and criminal complaints against promoters. It is our goal to protect the Postal Service from loss of revenue and to stop this fraudulent promotion, says Inspector Strader.

Postal employees have been alerted to the scam and are being instructed to check first-class mail for appropriate postage. Any mail carrying less than 29 cents will be delivered with a charge for the amount due as required by postal regulations.

Inspector Strader advises postal customers not to fall victim to this illegal scam. The penalty for mail fraud is a fine of not more than

\$250,000 or imprisonment for not more than five years or both. Postal customers who receive this package are asked to forward all the material to their local postmaster or to the Postal Inspector in Charge, Fort Worth Division, P.O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, TX 76161-2929.

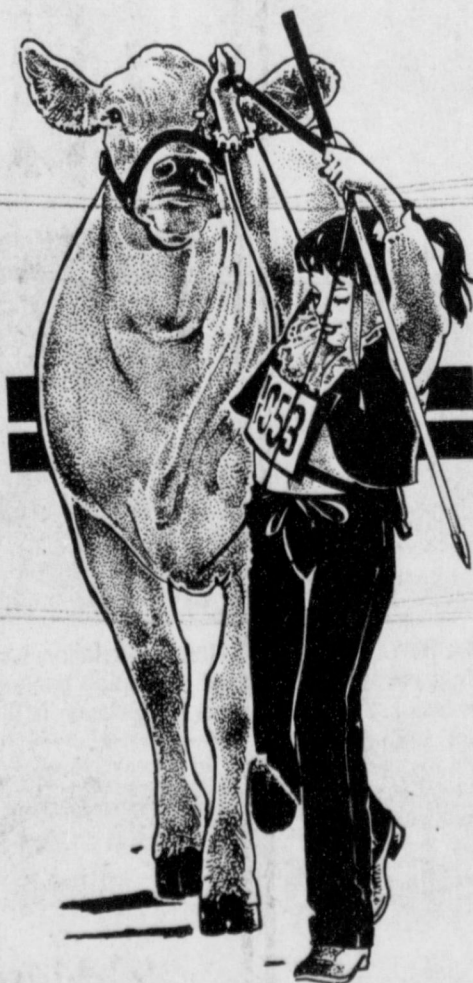

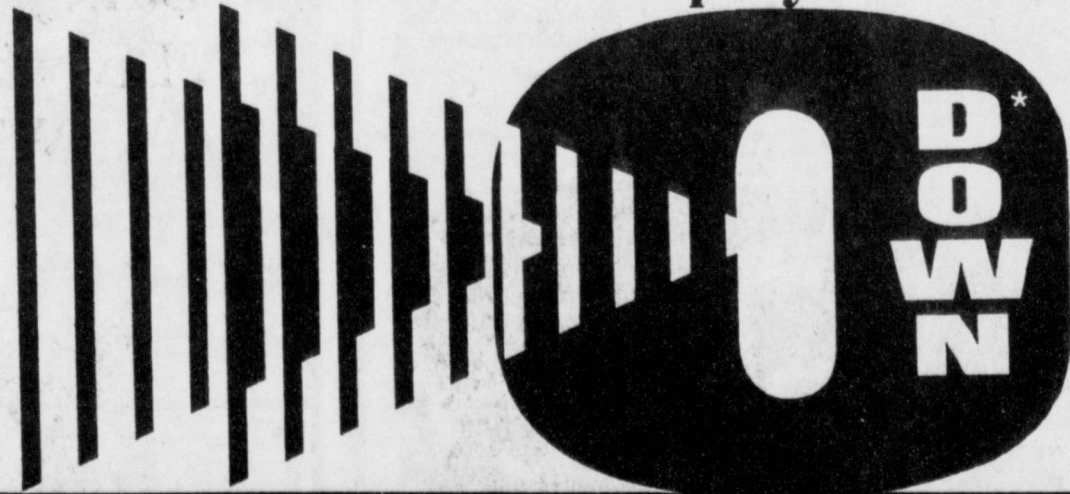

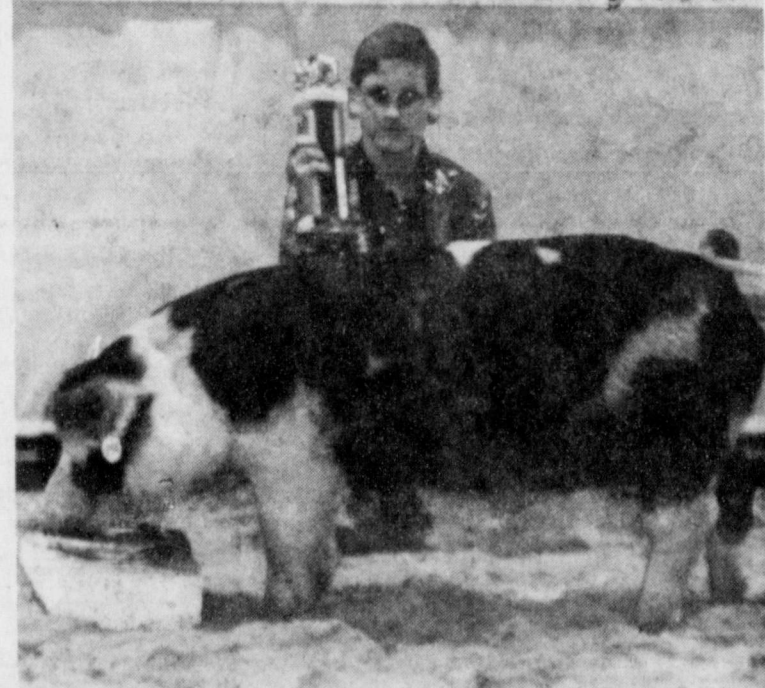

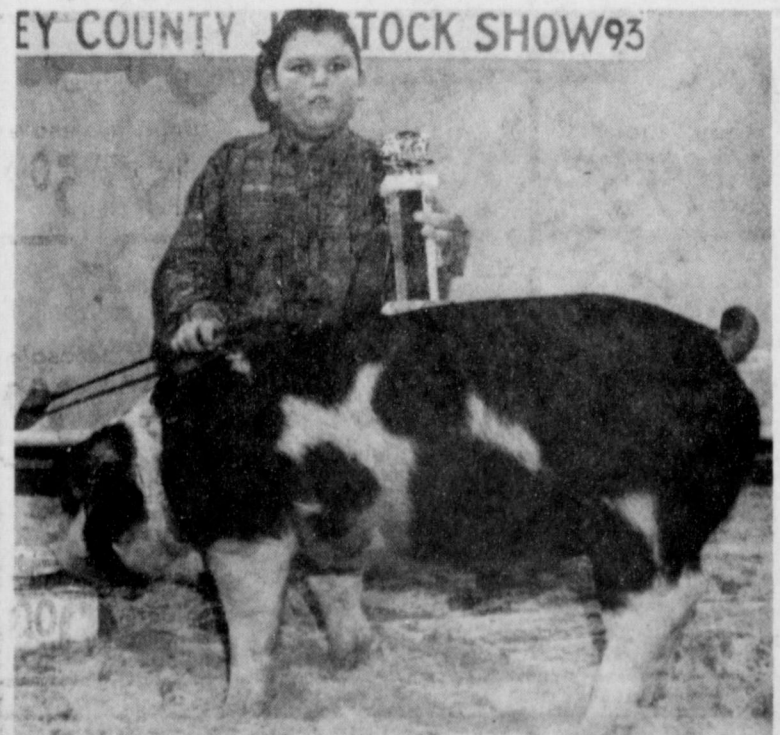

Aquaculture Gives Palacios Students Hands On Experience

Redfish, tilapia and catfish provide more than just good eating for students at the Palacios Independent School District.

At the school district's Marine Education Center, students in kindergarten through the 12th grade learn about their surrounding coastal environment, as well as how to apply subjects such as mathematics and science to real-life situations.

"It's fun and exciting, but at the same time students are learning and putting into action the topics they have been studying in chemistry, math, biology, and even English and social studies," says Erwin Janszen, agricultural science and aquaculture instructor at the center.

In fact, school officials believe that the hands-on lessons at the marine center have contributed to an improvement in students' math and science skills.

The center was established in 1987-88 as a cooperative project of the Palacios ISD, Matagorda County Navigation District No. 1 and the Palacios Seawall Commission, and has received \$30,000 in grants from the Texas Department of Agriculture's Texas Agricultural Diversification Matching Grant Program.

"The marine education center is

an excellent example of using agriculture to enliven what might otherwise be dry theory in the classroom," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry says. "Aquaculture is one of the fastest growing agricultural sectors in the nation, and the more Texas students know about it, the better prepared our future leaders will be to enter this expanding field."

The facility, located about one-half miles out of Palacios, has 12 outdoor ponds, a research and training laboratory, indoor tank systems, classrooms, saltwater and freshwater capabilities and support equipment to conduct in-depth study. Proffer said centers that cannot pay above-average wages may be at risk of losing employees to those that do.

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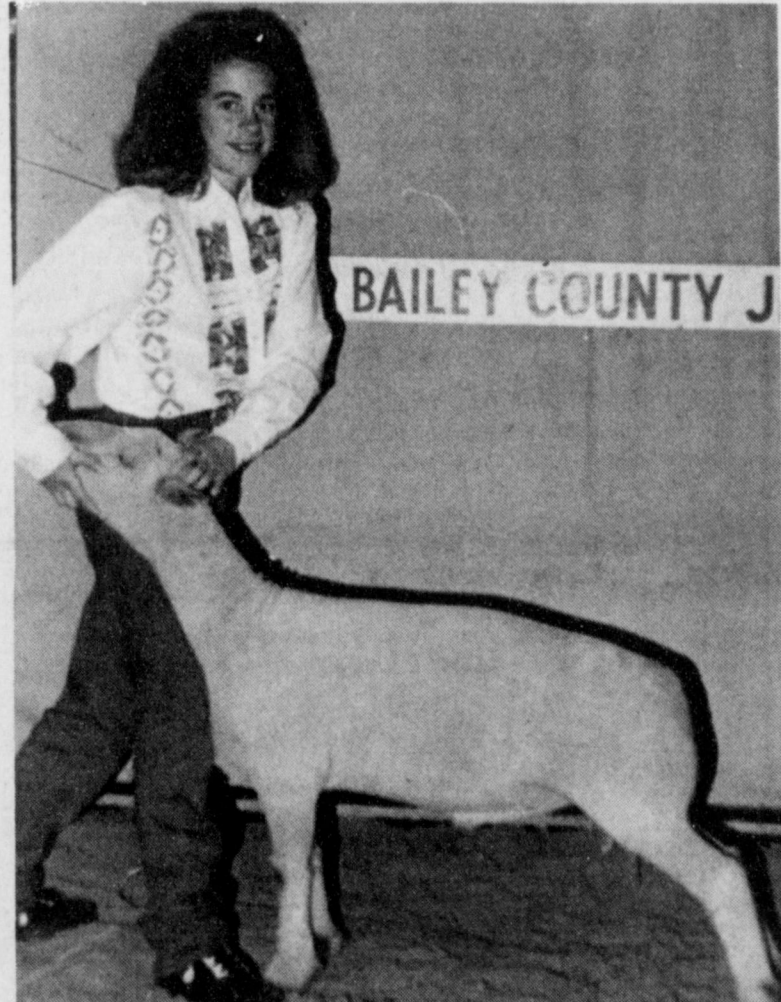

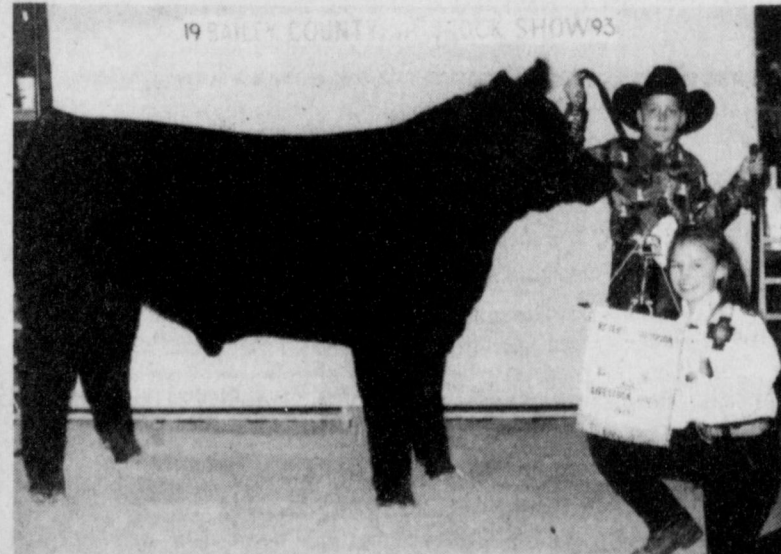

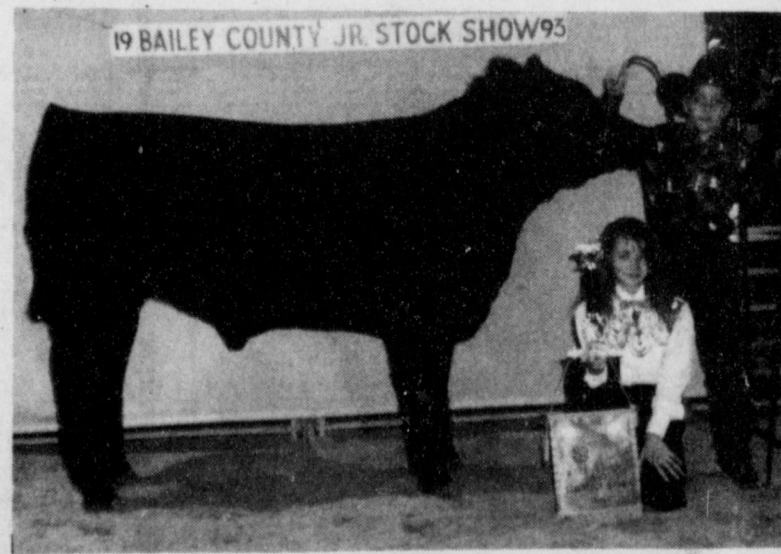
