Some \$20,000 went for right of way and fencing from Silverton to the Cap The balance went into bond discounts and the payment of highpowered engineers, who among other things posessed a talent for "getting the money". The question now seems to be: What to do with the remainder.

The Star believes that it voices the sentiments of a majority of the tax payers of Briscoe county when it advocates the following policy: Cancel the contract with Mc-Clung Cons. Co. if it can be done legally. Tell state and Federal aid to jump in the most convenient lake. Forget "hard surfacing" and build a system of real Plains, dirt roads all over precincts 1 and 2 This program should include a good dirt road over the new right-of way toward Quitaque, Total estimated cost including the Cap; \$5.000, exclusive of culverts. We have spent thousands here and are entitled to something. Grade the road west to the Swisher county line. Grade the road east to connect with the Schott Cap road. These people are spending thousands of dollars and are entitled to a road to Silverton. Grade a road south from Rock-Creek. Grade a road to connect Quitaque with Plainview. Lockney and a few other important main roads, Open a road on an air line southwest toward Plainview. All of this can be done and still have money left and the plan would save the money we have spent for high priced right-of-ways, releace the road and bridge money of the entire county (now tied up to main tain the big Federal aid proj ect) for use in the precinctswhere it belongs and give us a system of roads good enough for either fliver or Packard al so doing much to cure an unfortunate feeiing at "the forks of the creeks" that "those town guys have been trying to put something over us".

# ASK ANOTHER CONFERENCE

Turke Suggest Resumption of Parleys in Europe, Preferably at Constantinople.

Constantinople .- Turkey has handed the allies her Near Eastern peace proposals.

The note, drawn up by the Turkish National Assembly at Angora, which rejected the pact which was drafted by the allies at Lausanne, was delivered to the allied high commissioners recently.

The communiaction, which contained counter- proposals for final peace conditions, agrees to a year's postponement of settlement of the Mosul question, but demands that the economic clauses must be settled in accordance with the national pact safeguarding Turkish independence. The demand is also made that Constantinople be evacuated as soon as peace is signed.


Constantinople .- The Turkish Government's reply to the allied peace proposals arrived here by courier from Angora and was handed to the British. French and Italian High Commissioners. Copies will also be delivered to the American and Japanese representatives.

The whole note is couched in most moderate languages and suggests resumption of the negotiations in some European town, preferably Constantinople. The note comprises 115 pages.

The note says there are no fundamental modifications proposed in the political clauses of the draft treaty. Turkey, however, desires sovereignty of Casteloritza (off the southern coast of Asia Minor) and the small islands dependent upon Tenedos Island (off the west coast of Asia Minor). She also suggests the Maritza River "Thalweg" (lowest points of the valley) as the frontier of Thrace, rather than the right bank of the river.

Regarding the economic clauses of the draft treaty, the note proposes that clauses 71 to 117, upon which agreement has not been reached, should be disjoined from the draft and subsequently discussed.

Part 4 of the draft treaty, dealing with communications and sanitary questions. is accepted with slight modification. Part 5, dealing with prisoners of war, is integrally ao cepted.


