High temperatures concern local healthcare providers

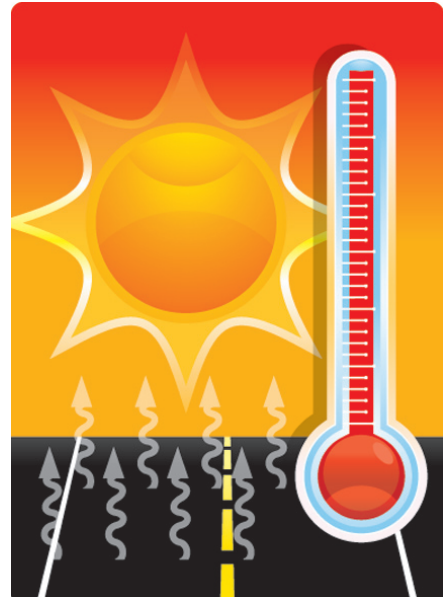

With the report of an area man succumbing to weather-related illness, local healthcare providers are wary about what

it means for Bailey County residents.

"I am very concerned," Margaret Heathington, RN, director of Nursing Services at Muleshoe Area Medical Center, said Tuesday. "We will be having cases of heatstroke and heat exhaustion."

According to Heathington, the hospital receives several such cases every summer with the seasonal temperature increase, the affects of which could be lessened if area residents would take precautions, stay hydrated and become aware of the symptoms and signs of the two



the following information concerning heat or sunstroke and heat exhaustion:

The signs of heat exhaustion include dizziness, fatigue, faintness and headache. The skin becomes pale and clammy, and the pulse is rapid and weak. The sufferer's breathing is fast and shallow, and he or she may experience muscle cramps and an intense thirst.

The symptoms of heatstroke often follow those of heat exhaustion. However, at this point, the skin is hot, dry and flushed, and the sufferer has stopped perspiring, has a high temperature and a rapid heartbeat. He or she may become confused or lose consciousness.

In both instances, the sufferer should seek immediate medical attention. In other words... call 911. These conditions may be serious, and possibly fatal.

According to the information provided by Heathington, heat exhaustion is the result of insufficient hydration or water consumption, or salt intake and the loss of the body's ability to cool by perspiring (sweating).

Heatstroke is the

weather-related illnesses.

"We need to be aware of our neighbors," she said also, noting that families — especially the elderly, without the simple relief of a house fan are at increased risk, and encourages area residents to check on their neighbors' condition on days in which the temperatures approach and pass the 100 degree mark.

"If they're perspiring, a fan should be enough to keep them safe," she said.

Heathington also said it isn't uncommon for summer activities, such as mowing the lawn or jogging to conceal the heat-related symptoms because the sufferers are expecting to feel fatigue, unaware that insufficient hydration is compounding their problems.

'Relay for Life' deemed a success

The change of venue for the 2010 Bailey County Relay for Life worked well, according to local Relay officials, allowing the various groups participating in the annual fund raising event some respite from the heat and still allowing more than \$37,000 to be raised.

Previously, the annual event has been held at the

Muleshoe Independent School District's Benny Douglas Stadium; however, this year — due in large part to the resurfacing currently under way at the MISD track and gridiron, the event was moved to the Bailey County Coliseum, on West American Blvd.

Next year's event will also be held at the coliseum, according to event organizers.

"With the extreme heat on Friday, being able to have the 'Survivor Reception' and other activities inside was great," Relay chairwoman Rhonda Myers said, noting that the survivors were able to enjoy their celebratory cupcakes and punch in the much cooler conditions of the

coliseum.

While the \$37,000 raised at this year's event didn't meet the goal that had been set, it was still a huge success, Myers said, and more donations are expected.

Ten teams from area business, organizations and families joined to raise money for the American Cancer Society at the Relay for Life.

Each team held fund raisers during the past months including movie nights, Crispy Creme Donuts™ sales, Fancy Nancy parties, garage sales.

Each team also had a booth at the Relay with opportunities to add to the donations already received.

A m o n g t h e

entertainment at this year's Relay was a lip sync contest — including a synchronized swimmers, rock and rollers and the Hee Haw™ gang, and the annual "Miss Relay" contest.

Donations received during this portion of the event exceeded expectations.

Shondee Nichols Meeks, the daughter of the late Sherri Nichols, was the special speaker for the event.

Meeks told of her mother's battle with cancer.

Luminaries in honor of the loved ones lost to cancer were placed around the lighted track that began in the coliseum and went around building.

Stopping the leak

Seven score, and nine years ago — give or take a month, actions of our forefathers launched this country into a great civil war with the firing upon South Carolina's Ft. Sumter by Confederate military forces.

In the almost 145 years since those first shots were fired, the argument continues about the reason for the hostilities. While northern liberals, under Abraham Lincoln of the Free Republicans, took control of this nation's executive office and Congress, with shouts of emancipation, southern forces gathered under the banner of "States' rights."

And a line was drawn in the sand that many on both sides felt could only be wiped out by blood.

To this day, this same argument continues, with the latest shot being fired by Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer, as she signed new immigration statutes into law for the Grand Canyon State.

As is the case with the American Civil War, which side prevails will undoubtedly determine which argument wins out; after all, in most instances the winner writes the history.

Of course, many of the Arizona law's supporters undoubtedly hold that the first shot fired was actually a shot left unfired, referring to the position that the law was necessary in response to Washington, DC's abandonment of actual immigration control, and border security.

In the days following the Sept. 11 attacks in New York City, and the Sept. 19 attack in Oklahoma City, tough new laws were enacted to protect this nation against the possibility of attack. In some instances, laws were pushed through that all to closely resembled the restrictions of the Alien and Sedition Acts of 1798.

Continued from page 1 result of overexposure to heat and a breakdown in the body's ability to regulate its temperature. As has been reported in the case with the individual from Littlefield, the body's

temperature can reach 107 degrees.

Among the factors that increase the possibilities of either condition are aging, alcohol or substance abuse, diabetes or disease related to an individual's circulatory

system, or some other type of chronic illness.

Other factors that need to be taken into consideration are recent illnesses that involve the loss of bodily fluids — such as vomiting or diarrhea, weather

conditions, physical exertion, and clothing.

Preventative measures include wearing light, loose clothing, and drinking lots of water (Don't wait until you're thirsty) especially if you are perspiring heavily.

It is also suggested that individuals watch the amount of urine they out put, increasing the amount of water consumed if it decreases.

Also, do what you can to increase the evaporation of your perspiration (Sit under a fan or air conditioner) and condition yourself to the hot temperatures.

Individuals, especially the elderly and the disabled, without the means of "promoting sweat evaporation," should contact the Bailey County Office on Aging at 806-272-3647, which

has funds available to provide a fan for residents who meet qualification requirements.

Individuals suffering from the symptoms of heat exhaustion or heatstroke, who are hot but not perspiring should be cooled rapidly.

Remove their clothing, a cold water bath or wrap them in wet sheets, and get them to a hospital for treatment.

If the person is faint, but perspiring, have them lie down in a cool place and give them something cool to drink. In all but mild cases, get them to a hospital as well.

Don't forget to let your balloon go!

Not even close to everybody who nods off in church is grinchy, but I can imagine a situation where ol' Brother Grinch

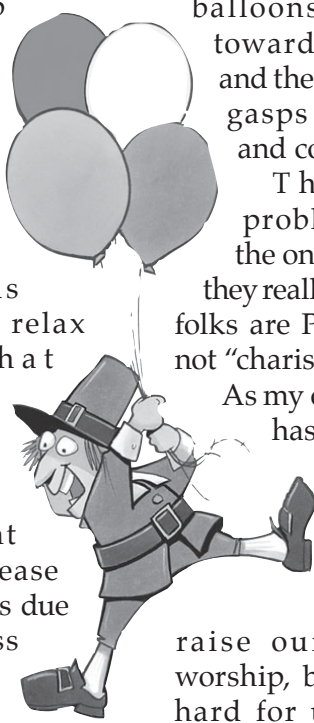

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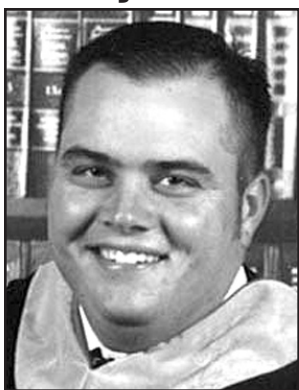

He loved camping, wood work and working on lawn mowers, and especially loved his children and

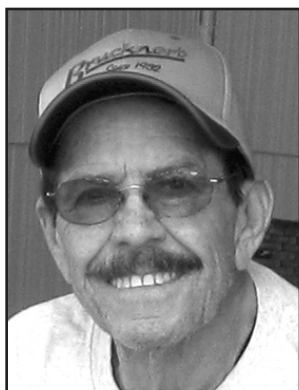
grandchildren.

"We had our ups and downs during the season and worked our way into a three way tie for second place," he added.

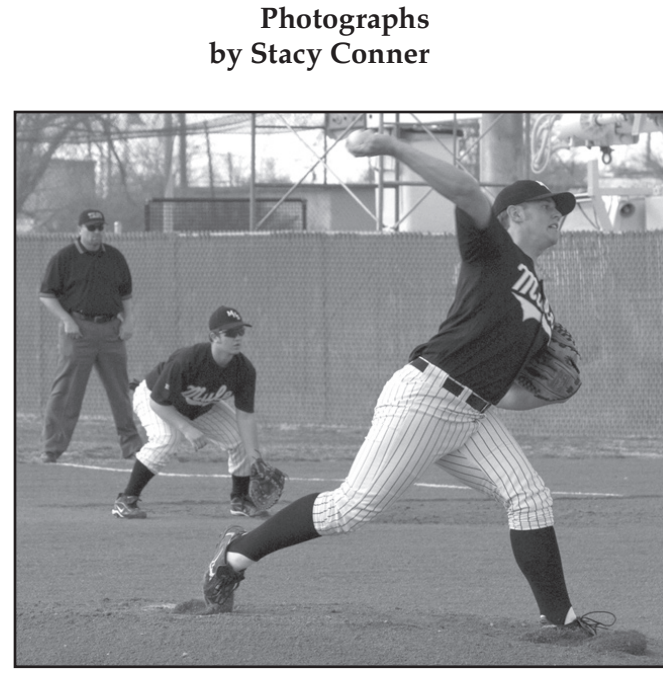
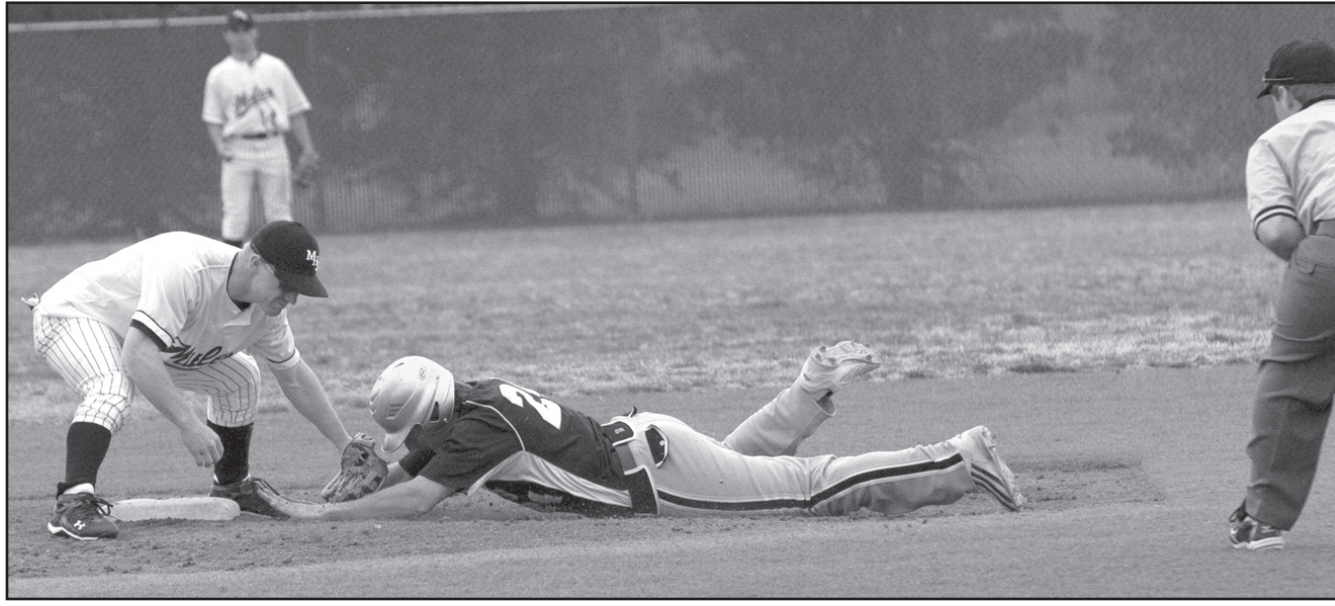
"We did not make the playoffs but we are looking forward to next season already. There were a lot of young guys really coming on late in the season and I think

we will make some noise next season."

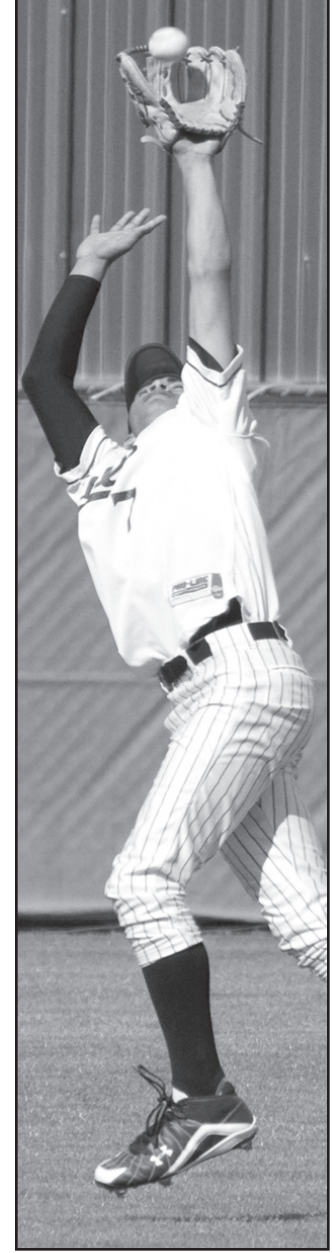
"We will miss our seniors but there are a lot of young guys eager to try to fill their shoes," concluded Fletcher.

Wife and I had known each other about seven years at the time we got married. So on our next anniversary we will have been married 72 years.

She is a quiet person and doesn't much like to participate in public affairs, and that's about all I have done since Pearl Harbor, Dec. 7, 1941. Even then I was already involved in school matters, selling war bonds and working in some of the farm programs.

Not very many people make it through this life without needing to

borrow money, and very few businesses operate except they do so "on the credit."

And neither farmers nor wage workers are exceptions. The business of the world is done on the credit. The year we started farming (wife and I) we farmed 448 acres and lived on \$400, that is until laying by time — then I needed a little help.

I had heard a good many expressions of disfavor and complaints about the local banker, Jess Osborn. But I went to see him anyway. I

needed to borrow \$25.

I was a little apprehensive when I first went in, and concerned about how I might be treated. So I didn't set down, I just stood there, and he asked "What can I do for you?"

I said, "I'd like to borrow \$25, if I might." Then he said that it's time now to be paying money back, not borrowing more."

But he wanted to know what I was going to do with it. I told him I wanted it to pay some cotton choppers.

Then he asked, "Can't you chop that cotton?"

By that time I didn't know what was going to happen, but I said, "Yes, I guess I can, but I don't want it chopped that

bad."

Then he said, "Well, I don't blame you, so have a seat and we will see what we can work out."

From that moment on he and I got along the finest kind, as long as he was in the banking business, and as long as he was in the State House.

In fact, as long as he lived, he stayed in touch with me and he was of tremendous assistance to me. He was "a friend indeed." And in every way I knew how I supported him.

Inez Bobo worked at the bank during those years, and she attended to my affairs a good bit of the time. She was a pleasant person to know, and to do business with... a friend indeed. And I enjoy knowing and visiting with personnel of the Muleshoe State Bank. That is the bank Mr. Osborn owned and operated.

In a year or two, I begin

to make pretty good crops and consequently I got some money on hand, and Jess told me that I ought to set some of my money aside and invest it in good safe investments, such as bonds, or certificates of deposit where it will be safe and earn a little interest, then compound that interest because you will need it some day.

My father had told me about the same thing, only he suggested buying land. In a small way I have done some little bit of both, but if I had an opportunity to do it over I would do a much better job of it.

However I know that is good advice. I love to talk about things like that, and teach it to others, the young folks in particular. But for the past six months I have been pretty well disabled and not able to get around as I would like. But I look forward to better days.

Sudan Economic Development Corporation meets

The Sudan Economic Development Corporation board of directors met on Thursday, June 3.

Those in attendance included Clay Carr, board president; Monty Edwards, treasurer, Bob Sisson, secretary, and Johnny King, vice president.

Norma Burnett, mayor pro-tem, Sam Miller, alderman, Richard Salazar, director of Public Works; and Douglas Ames, proprietor, were also in attendance.

comments.

Motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes of previous meeting. The motion carried.

Edwards discussed the signage for parking on the city's Hwy. 84 lot. He said Richard Salazar would provide the material for signage and that he would commission a sign graphics printer to produce the application. The information is to be presented at the next meeting.

Edwards also relayed the information that the Vet Clinic proprietors have come to a tentative agreement to accept 400 feet of highway frontage and a site depth of 800 feet at the pre-discussed location. The survey for property will be done by Don Douglas.

Carr introduced the new board members — Sam Miller and Norma Burnett, who hold the positions formerly held by of Marge Cardwell and Bobby Phillips.

Edwards introduced Doug Ames, who presented the board with business proposal packets indicating his intent to launch a family-style restaurant in the former "La-Te-Da" building located on Hwy. 84. His discussion and documentation covered many aspects of his plan including advertising, layout, aesthetics, and his personal experience in managing food service organizations.

Ames said that his menu line would not conflict with the pre-existing restaurant and that the menu would be unique for this area.

His intent is to open for business on June 26, and he asked the EDC for any assistance it may be able to provide.

Carr said the board cannot take action on this, but requested a called meeting to be held on June 10, at 7 a.m. to address Ames' request.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn meeting.
