Jim Reese Honored At Reception

Jim Reese, Republican candidate for the Congressional seat in the 19th District, was honored at a reception Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Joe Damron.

In speaking to several friends who attended the reception, he gave a brief background and commented, "The difference in the three Republican opponents for the seat to be vacated by George Mahon is that I have spent all my life in West Texas, and the other two candidates have spent a total of seven years of their adult life in this part of the country."

He also said, "Running against George Mahon was a combination of running against grandfather and Santa Claus." He was referring to his unsuccessful bid for the Congressional seat held by George Mahon during the last election.

However, Reese cited that he received 46 percent of the vote in that election, and believes he has a much better chance against his two opponents this time, as Mahon is retiring.

He deplored the failure of the farmers emergency relief bill and called the defeat of the bill "a mistake." He added, "The farmer doesn't want a government not only does not solve the problems, but in fact, creates most of the problems for the farmers and for the average taxpayer."

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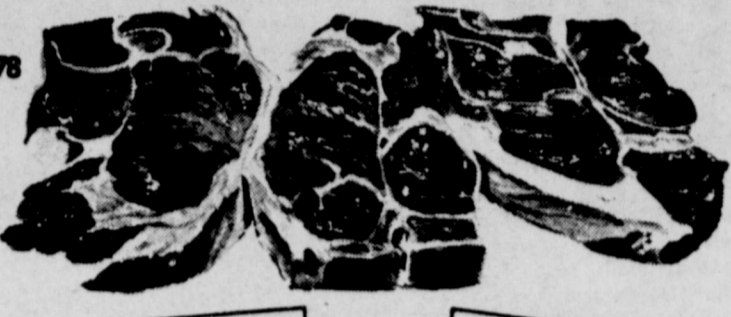

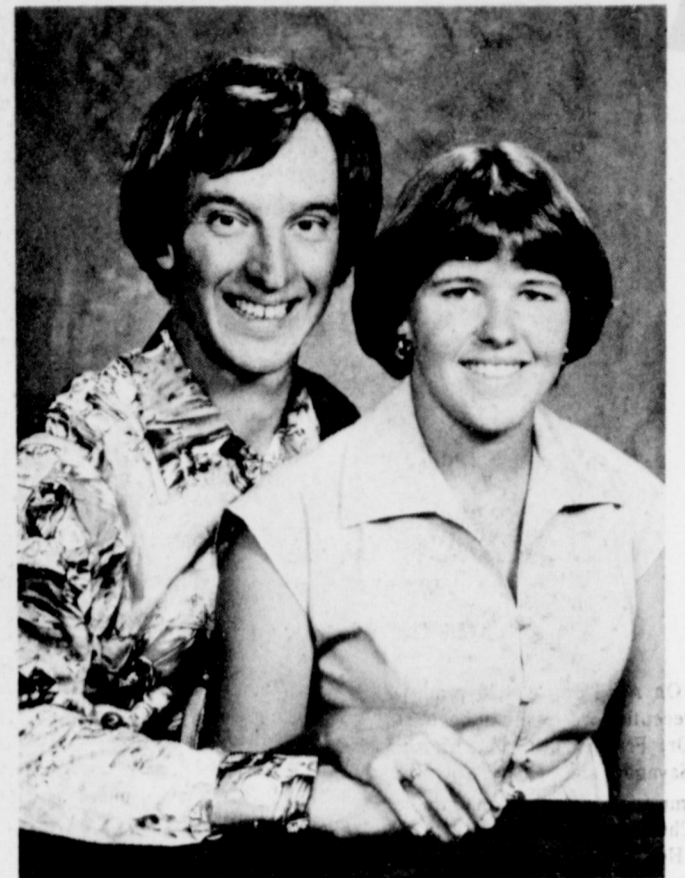

The Muleshoe Mullettes track team participated in the district meet in Olton Friday and Saturday, April 14 and 15. The girls made an impressive showing and took the team trophy by a 22 point margin. The team coming closest to the Mullettes was Dimmitt with 101 points.

These four girls took first in the 440 with a time of 50.6 and first in the 880 with an impressive time of 1:47.6, which is a new school record. The mile relay also took first and set a new school record with a time of 4:17.2. Team members are Frances Brown, Lupe Pacheco, Denice Reeder, and Shelly Dunham.

Evelyn Grace finished first in the 220 yard dash with a clocking of 26.5. In the 440 yard dash Lupe Pacheco turned in a time of 65.0 which was good enough for a fifth place finish. In the 880 yard dash two girls placed. Denice Reeder took the first spot with a time of 2:33.3, and Debbie Marth took sixth with a time of 2:48.5. Julie Barnhill finished in fifth position in the Mile Run with a time of 6:48.5. Debra Washington posted a time of 11.9 in the 80 yard hurdles. This earned her a fifth place finish.

Evelyn Grace was one position out of regional qualification in the broad jump. She took a third place finish with a jump of 16'7". Shelly Dunham qualified for regional in the Shot Putt and the Discus with throws of 37'1" and 100'8". Both throws were good enough for first place finishes. Angie Puckett followed Shelly in the Shot Putt with a throw of 29'2", which put her in the fourth spot. Glenda Rasco finished fourth in the discus with a throw of 88'4" and JoRonda Rhodes finished fifth in the same event with a throw of 83'1".

In their four years of track competition the girls have never won the district championship. They put forth superb effort and strived hard to win. They greatly deserved the championship and they earned it.

CofC Asking Deregulation

The president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States suggests a possible antidote for overzealous government regulators who impose unreasonable demands on the public, such as the requirement by a state agency in Ohio that a businessman install a \$1,200 antipollution pump and then buy another one just like it as a backup.

"I think all of those regulators who propose those kinds of solutions should be required to buy two catalytic converters for their car and two sets of seat belts," said Dr. Richard L. Leshner, president of the Chamber. "Maybe they'll get the message."
Dr. Leshner, who worked with the backup theory of safety and performance as a former U.S. space official, said the second pump was an example of unnecessary backup.

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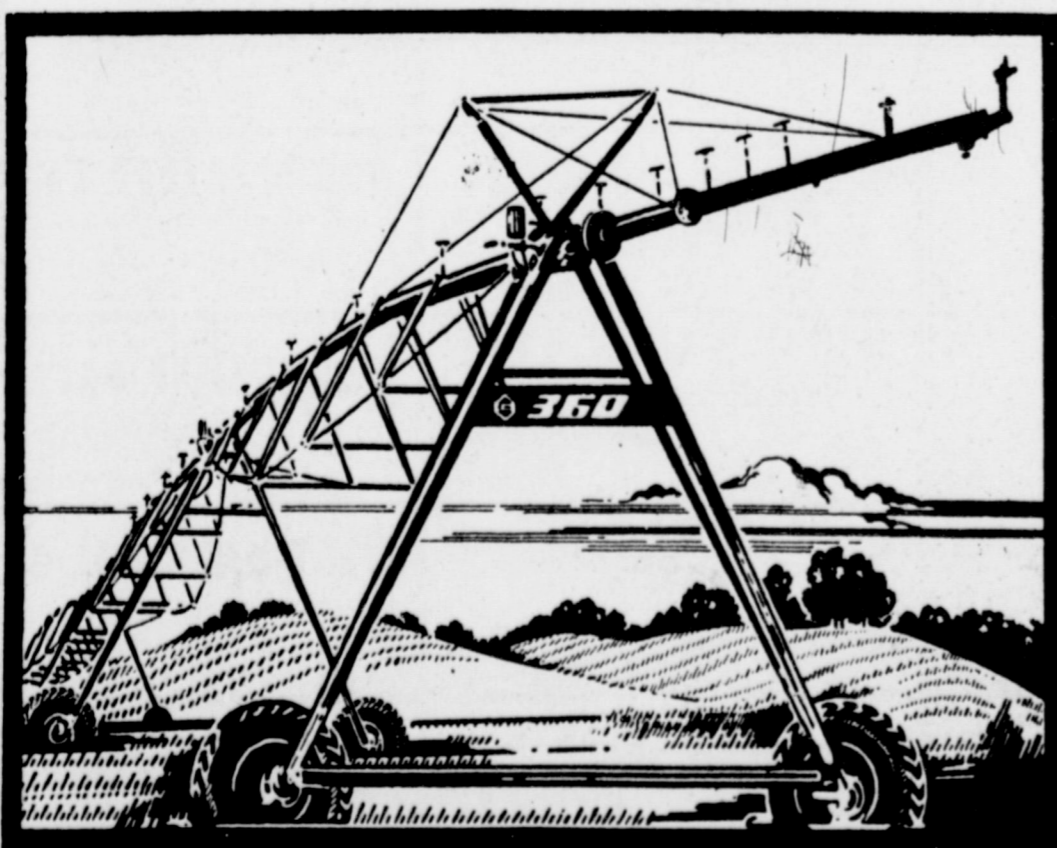
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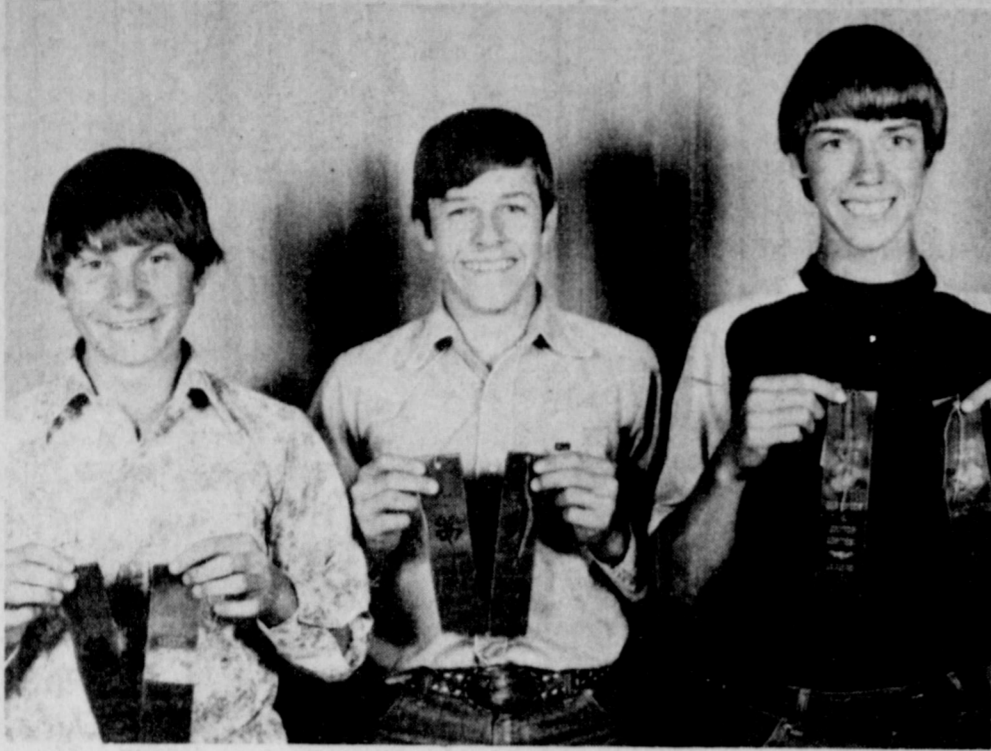

John Poerner Takes Issue

Railroad Commissioner John Poerner takes strong issue with President Jimmy Carter's remarks on oil imports. During a Washington speech before the American Society of Newspaper Editors, President Carter said that if Congress did not pass his energy bill, he would take action to limit oil imports.

Poerner said that while he appreciates the President's concern about inflation, his plan to cut imports is a mistake unless he also makes greatly increased domestic production possible.

Last week Poerner had a personal visit with Secretary of Energy James Schlesinger at the White House, and they discussed the need for increased production of our own oil and gas to hold inflation and lower the serious deficit in the U.S. balance of payments.

"Limiting imports without taking steps to increase our own production simply hurts Texas farmers, industries and consumers," said Poerner.

Waiting lines at the gas pumps and shortages of fuel and fertilizer are no solution for inflation, and the fact that this is planting time throughout the nation makes artificially imposed shortages an unacceptable approach, according to Poerner.
